Sam Weiss to Succeed Engel on Fire Board

Ex-Fire Chief Stanford (Sam) Weiss, an electrical contractor, was elected for a five-year term as Hicksville Fire Commissioner, Tuesday night, and will take office in January succeeding George Engel who is retiring after 10 years in office. Weiss received 405 ballots in a field of five candidates.

There were 1,426 votes cast, about 400 less than the last previous record high for a fire commissioner election. In the previous contest which set a high mark, there were three candidates for office. The results announced Tuesday night when the polls closed were:

- Harry Huttel 270
- James Matlenzo 293
- Edward Offenloch 247
- Sam Weiss 405

Chief Weiss today expressed his public thanks and appreciation to the voters of Fire District for their support at the polls and pledged himself to be worthy of their confidence.

In the three-way contest for the office of Fire District Treasurer, Frank Wallach was elected to succeed Bernard Schuster who was not a candidate. Wallach got 545 ballots.

On Friday and Saturday, the Orchestra, Band and Chorus representing the Nassau County Sectional All-State program will rehearse at Hicksville High School.

Break Ground for Factory

Servo Corp. of America, leading manufacturer of infrared and automation systems for industrial, railroad and military applications, will build a 120,000 square foot plant on a 22-acre site at New South Road and Karin Lane, in Hicksville. The \$1.5 million structure will consolidate under one roof the research and development, manufacturing and administrative activities of the firm's six present plants with their complement of 350 people.

Henry Blackstone, president, and two assistants began Servo a little more than a decade ago in a Huntington dance hall.

Ground-breaking ceremonies are to be held next Tuesday, Dec. 9, at 11 a.m. and will be attended by representatives of national, state and local government, the military, industry and the community.

The new facilities, to be occupied in August, 1959, will permit a 200 per cent production increase, Blackstone indicated. Citing a current backlog of \$5 million in orders, the president added that, "Allowance has been made for a continuing rapid growth in demand for Servo products. Land has been allocated for a 200,000 square foot increase when required. The number of employees would then be increased to more than 1,000."

The company's products include: infrared detectors, related instruments, and their optical components; electronic devices for precision measurement; radio communications and navigation equipment; radio direction finding systems; automation and servo-mechanisms; test and analysis equipment; analog and digital computers, and custom-designed machines and instruments.

Government and military sales, which once constituted Servo's whole business, now account for only 40 per cent of volume.

CURRENT COMMENT: Boundaries Getting Tight

IF WE NEED any positive evidence that Hicksville and this part of Long Island is running out of vacant space recent problems about boundary lines should settle that one - but fast.

Hicksville Board of Education has been particularly involved in several boundary questions. The original property surveys have been dug out to verify lines.

At Nicholas School, the community's oldest school site, the erection of a new fence brought out the fact that the old fence was as much as three feet off the true line, in favor of neighbors. At Burns Ave. School, where another fence was erected, the tail end of a private garage was found two feet over on school property.

One of the most interesting questions has been that of a line between the Junior High School and property owned by St. Stephen's Lutheran Church. For more than 15 years the School District has maintained a fence along its east boundary. Recently the Church Council found, according to a survey it possesses, that the fence was apparent on property owned by the Church.

The Title Guarantee and Trust Co. has now advised the School Board thru School Attorney S. Arnold Witte that a search of the records indicates that "from the earliest record of title" there was never common ownership of the two parcels. It does appear that there is an overlap, running as much as three to four feet. In other words, going back a couple of centuries, the land was always owned by two different parties and the overlap had never been corrected.

Today, the School District title to the disputed "gore" is insured by Title Guarantee and Trust Co. and they have advised the School Board that the "School District title is superior."

Probably even more interesting has been the recent incident involving the boundary line between Oyster Bay and North Hempstead Townships, which is also the school district line. There Mr. and Mrs. Walter J. Lehmann recently took up residence and their two children were accepted into Hicksville High. Then for reasons which do not appear too clear to us at this point, the Town Boundary line was re-established or re-drawn (even though it goes back for over three centuries) and the Lehmann children are no longer legally entitled to attend Hicksville School.

Whereas in the first instance about 90 per cent of the Lehmann property was in Oyster Bay (Hicksville), now only 10 per cent remains in Hicksville.

This matter is still to be resolved because the Lehmanns prefer to have their children finish the school year in Hicksville. However, since the neighboring district is getting the school taxes it is up to the Westbury Board of Education to either (1) agree to pay over the tuition to Hicksville out of the taxes received on the Lehmann property, or (2) refuse to forward the tuition, in which case the two students will have to attend Westbury schools.

All of which recalls the old Colonial custom of "running the boundaries" wherein the townspeople were periodically required to turn out and trace boundary lines, re-set piles of stones, etc. Those who failed to turn out, were fined under the old Colonial pre-revolution laws. This old custom was reenacted in 1948 by Boy and Girl Scouts at the time of the Hicksville Tercentennial Celebration.

Refuse Collection Cost Down

Municipal garbage collection costs to the homeowners will be further reduced this year. Supervisor J. Burns said today following receipt of a report from Sanitation Commissioner Louis Kappeler that the cost of refuse collection in Hicksville, which showed an average cut in costs of 11.31 per cent. The new reduced rates for the various garbage districts in the town became effective Jan. 2, and cover Bethpage, Hicksville, Locust Valley, North Massapequa, Old Bethpage, Oyster Bay, Plainview, South Farmingdale, Southside, Syosset and Woodbury. Commencing on Jan. 2, in response to the many requests from homeowners, the Sanitation Dept. will provide collection service for approximately 2,000 homes in Jericho.

The cost cuts for the various districts represent the second year in a row in which municipal garbage collection rates have been reduced and were developed as a result of a study of operations made by Kappeler and Councilmen Benjamin Zipper and Louis Sissa, members of the Town Board's standing committee on sanitation. Supervisor Burns said he was highly pleased with the new reduced rates and expressed confidence that continued tax savings to the homeowners in the various garbage districts would be effected "as we continue our studies of operations which we feel will produce further economies for the taxpayers."

Burns also said that he and Town Attorney Elmer Lane are scheduled

to go to Albany next week to meet with the legislative leaders to discuss the merits of possible legislation that would permit the Town to establish a larger tax base for certain special districts. Among the items to be discussed, according to Supervisor Burns, are municipal collection and parking.

The percentages of decreases under the new rates for 1959 are: Bethpage 9.51 per cent; Hicksville, extensions 3 and 4, 11.66 per cent; Hicksville, extensions 5, 5A, 6 and 7, 17.67 per cent; Old Bethpage 19.13 per cent; Plainview 21.62 per cent.
