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Saturday Morning Board Sessions Become Regular Thing in January

Hicksville Board of Education has set the third Saturday morning of each month, starting in January, for a special monthly meeting devoted to topics brought up by individual Board members and issues raised by the attending public. The decision to schedule the weekly Saturday morning sessions was made at a special meeting last Saturday.

Section 8 of the regular school board meeting agenda includes "Individual Board Members" followed by "General Public". Since July the Board has twice monthly concentrated upon the urgent District business, including the matters brought before it by the Administration, leaving the individual trustee topics for final action if reached.

Over a period of weeks, Section 8 grew as to the number of topics until the special session last Saturday disposed of most of the subjects.

The presence of former Board President Emil J. Szendy in the audience last Saturday was noted by the incumbent President, Allen S. Carpenter. Szendy did not address the Board.

The third Saturday sessions will start at 10 AM and are expected to conclude by 1 PM. All Board members were present except Robert D. P. Eaton who was absent because he had to work that morning.

Pius X Society Hears Sister

Following a short business meeting members of the Pius X Society of St. Ignatius Loyola R. C. Church at the Dec. 1 meeting heard a very enlightening talk, accompanying a film, by Sisters of the Medical Missionary Sisters of Mary covering their work in Nigeria, Africa. They explained, although their work is mainly in establishing hospitals and dispensaries, along with caring for maternity cases, no one is forgotten, least of all the mistreated, outcast leper. Now that sulfa drugs arrest leper cases and the ever increasing early diagnosis, more and more cases live useful lives. Many return to their families and homes after initial treatment period at the leper colony.

In addition to nurses, the Medical Missionary Sisters of Mary have doctors, sociologists and medical technicians in their community. Their mother house is in Ireland. A young organization, established in the mid-1930's, their numbers are still few but their accomplishments many.

Sister Theresa, with her pleasant Irish brogue, was a delightful speaker. She answered questions from the floor and told of several personal experiences during her eight and a half years in Nigeria. In spite of the hardships, oppressive heat and humidity, her heart lies in Nigeria. She counts the weeks until she can return to help those so much less fortunate than we.

Following the informative talk and film, refreshments were served by the Woodland Ave. mothers, and Father "Santa" Dallweg distributed the grab bag gifts.

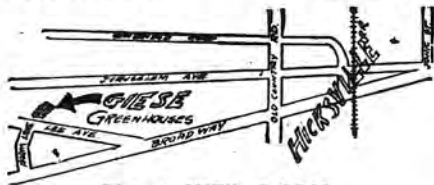

Race Model Trains at Plaza

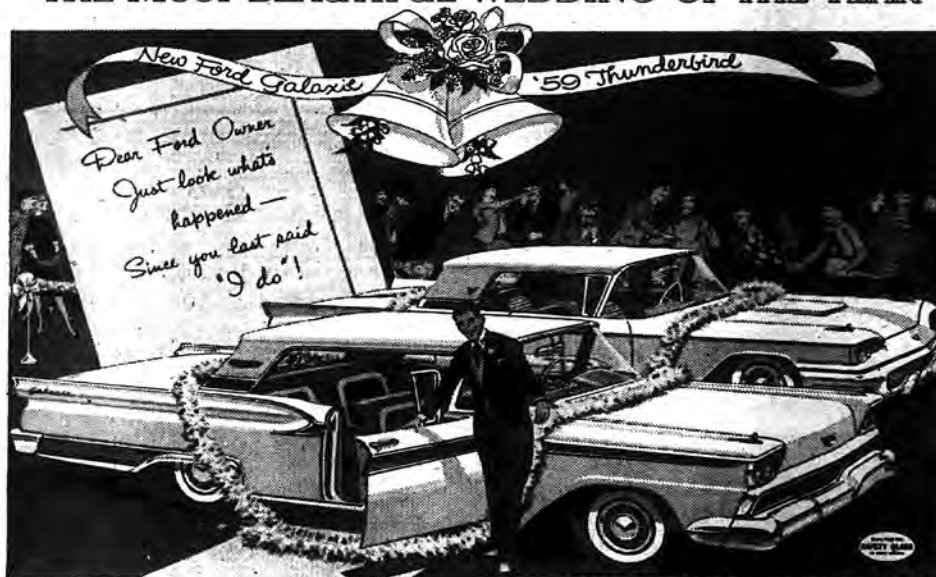

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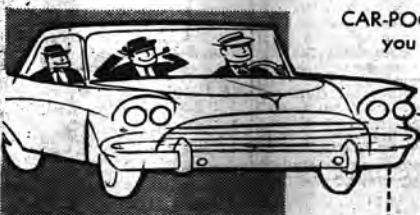

The electrifying touch came short

ly after. Rennie passed a bullet ten yards to right and Frank Pulin and he swirled downfield 50 yards for the third touchdown.

Rennie coolly directed his drop kick between the uprights for a 19-19 deadlock.

A quarter hour was required to clear the field of jubilant Hicksville fans for the play of the last 16 minutes. There was plenty of excitement but the goal lines went uncrossed.

PONY EXPRESS

The Pony Express thundered over Manhasset, 28-13. Hempstead Monitors and Oyster Bay were routed 50-0 and 28-0.

Mayer ran 37 yards against Locust Valley but the B&W was trailing 7-6 late in the game. With seconds remaining, Crist Millevolte escaped over the right side and without a hand being laid on him chalked off 54 yards and a 13-7 win.

Grande's reminiscence that Thanks giving Day was the finest tribute to a Hicksville athlete ever published. Mayer and Pellico chalked off Western Front, 12-7 and the Sebas

were repulsed 9-0.

St. Albans was clipped 25-0 and Cedarhurst blasted 34-6 in non-league encounters.

Hicksville and Westbury were undefeated and the crafty mentor, Millevolte, awaited the day that scoffers in September said he would never realize.

LAST GREAT CROWD

On a cold raw Dec. 19 over 9,000 fans, the last great semi-pro crowd in Nassau, circled the Hicksville gridiron for the championship decision.

"Hicksville Field Club Wins Grid Title, Glen Kerbs Kicks Field Goal To Decide Dramatic Battle, 3-0" proclaimed Hicksville's fifth championship.

From a difficult angle on the 28-yard line, Kerbs planted the ball squarely between the uprights in the third period.

With Ted Galvin and Ed Kilbride the losers engineered over 300 yards net gained but always a goal line stand stopped them.

The last came in the final two minutes as Hicksville withstood four running assaults from its own two yard stripe.

Far from impoverished, an undefeated team and a fifth straight championship exhilarated Hicksville.

Board OKs New School Project

At a special meeting called to consider the need for new schools to use the expanding number of children in the District, the Jericho School Board approved the construction of a new 16-room school south of Northern State Parkway and a 10-room addition to the Jackson School in the Birchwood Section.

This action, by unanimous vote of the full Board membership, authorizes the architectural firm of Knapp & Johnson, the designers of the Jericho High School building, now under construction, to prepare preliminary plans and estimates to be presented to the voters next Spring.

Appointment of a Citizens' Advisory Committee, composed of representatives of civic and school groups, will be announced at the regular School Board meeting next week.

The Committee will work with the board and the architects in designing the school. The Board expressed the hope that construction, on an acre site in the White Birchwood section, could be started in September 1959 so that the building will be ready for occupancy by September of 1960.

With an anticipated elementary school enrollment in 1960 of 2,145 pupils, Board Chairman Martin Penn estimated that 86 elementary class-

rooms would be needed by then. The District now has 46 classrooms; the present construction program calls for the addition of 23 more by 1960.

The deficit of 17 classrooms, he stated, can be absorbed temporarily by housing the fifth and sixth grades in the high school building.

However, as the high school enrollment increases and the use of high school classrooms by the elementary grades becomes impossible, Mr. Penn said that there will be a need for a fourth elementary school. This need will be intensified by the influx of additional children, particularly in the western section toward Brush Hollow Road. For this reason, the Board has been negotiating for the purpose of a school site in that area.

Mr. Penn announced that it is hoped that an open meeting can be held within a few weeks to discuss this site.

Ty proposed addition to the Jackson School, bringing the total number of its classrooms to 28, will enable it to house the pupils from the Birchwood area plus the new influx from the Jericho Park Development.

Summarizing the Board's thinking behind its construction proposals, Mr. Penn stated, "We need classrooms and we need them fast."
