TINY TRUCK IN RAIL ROAD CROSSING ACCIDENT

HEAP OF RUBBLE in foreground is all that was left of a fork - lift vehicle operated by Donald Lareau of Wyandanch when it was in a collision with a 100 horse - power LIRR diesel engine at the Charlotte Ave crossing in Hicksville at about five o'clock Wednesday afternoon, Feb. 18. Fuel tanks of the diesel engine were ruptured and about 1,000 gallons of diesel oil oozed over the scene. After a 30-minute delay at the grade crossing which is protected by automatic gates, the engine limped into Hicksville Station with its six cars. Another engine

was sent out from Jamaica to finish the run to Montauk. Eastbound commuter trains were switched, to the northside tracks at Mineola with delays on following trains held to about 10 minutes. Two westbound trains, however, were held at Hicksville: a Greenport train for 54 minutes and a Port Jefferson train for 26 minutes. When the lift vehicle became jammed between the rails at the crossing, the driver apparently leaped from the seat before the train hit. No one was injured.

Board Pushes Work on Budget

Hicksville Board of Education is pushing to complete the 1959-60 School District Budget earlier than ever before, it was disclosed this week. The Board has scheduled special meetings for Friday evenings and Saturday mornings until the budget is completed.

The LI Daily Press on Monday incorrectly reported that the School Board is holding "budget hearings." Such a hearing or hearings would take place only when the budget has been prepared. To date one section, Code 7, has been established. At a special meeting this Saturday, it is anticipated that Code 3, salaries for instructional services and the largest segment of the entire appropriation, will be acted upon.

Tomorrow (Friday) night the Board will hold a regular meeting in the Senior High Faculty Cafeteria, moved out of the Little Theatre.

stead Ave. and 150 feet on Newbridge.

Harry L. Nelkin and Myron Nelkin want permission to operate a public garage and gas station at the northwest corner of W. John St. and Seckett St. The site has a frontage on each street of about 100 feet.

A recent count indicated there are about 50 gasoline stations in the Hicksville area today.

Burns Receives Notice:

State Orders Fordham Ave Signal Light

Supervisor John J. Burns of Oyster Bay Township has received official notice from the NY State Traffic Commission that the installation of a complex semi-traffic-actuated signal light has been ordered for installation at the intersection of Newbridge Rd with Fordham Ave., Hicksville. Receipt of the order successfully concludes cooperative efforts between the Chamber of Commerce, residents of the area with an effective assist from the Town.

The need for traffic control at this five-street corner which is adjacent to Holy Family RC Church has long been recognized. Since Newbridge Road is a state highway, an official order from the State Traffic Commission was necessary to order the installation.

Supervisor Burns yesterday (Wed) received an advance copy of the official order from Lloyd A. Maeder, director of the State Traffic Commission at Albany, specifying the type of installation and ordering the work by the State Dept. of Public Works.

Traffic detectors on Elmira St., Fordham Ave. and Cherry Lane will activate the signal. In addition, the order provides for pedestrian push buttons to permit control of the signal from the east and west sides of Newbridge Rd.

The State Dept. of Public Works told Burns it is reluctant to estimate when the installation would be completed since it is a complicated project including a certain amount of underground work.

Patrick J. Caputo, president of Hicksville Chamber of Commerce, when he was advised of receipt of the order said he was gratified to learn that the cooperation between the Town and State officials with the Traffic Committee of the Chamber, headed by Francis Anderson, had resulted in success. He said it verified information given to him two weeks ago that the signal was scheduled for installation at an early date.

"Other traffic control efforts of the Chamber, working with Councilman Henry McInnes, Supervisor Burns and other town and county officials, I am certain, will be successful in time to come," Caputo said. "Traffic studies take time and

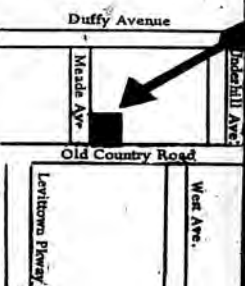

PSC Approves 110-Ft Bridge Over Newbridge at Station

ALBANY, Feb. 20--The Public Service Commission today approved a proposal by the State Dept. of Public Works to extend Newbridge Road under the tracks of The Long Island Rail Road, which are to be elevated in connection with the Hicksville RR grade crossing elimination project. This proposal was reported in detail by the HERALD together with a map, in the issue of July 3.

At the same time, it authorized revisions in previously approved plans to provide for the relocation of the temporary station plaza from the east to the west side of the proposed Newbridge Road extension, but restricted the area to be used to about two-thirds of that proposed by the LIRR.

The State Dept. of Public Works has directed to continue with preparation of plans for the project, modified as required by today's action. Newbridge Road now extends from Bellmore northeasterly to Hicksville where it connects, south of the railroad tracks, with Jerusalem Ave. (Route 106) which, in turn, continues northerly to Broadway (Route 107). The DPW proposes to widen Newbridge Road for its entire length to realign it within Hicksville from a point just north of Old County Road to about 1,800 feet north of the railroad where it will make a new connection with Massapequa Glen Cove highway (Routes 106 and 137).

110-FOOT BRIDGE

The new highway will have two 25-foot roadways separated by a 20-foot mall and will be flanked either side by 10-foot parking areas and 10-foot sidewalk areas. At the point where it crosses the tracks, the railroad will be carried over the street extension on a two-span 110-foot bridge. This will be a substitution for the formerly planned structure to carry the railroad over Jackson Pl., which will be obliterated by the Newbridge Road extension.

By today's order, all costs for the Newbridge Road extension will be financed from highway appropriations and will not be chargeable to the elimination project.

In the original plans for the Hicksville project, which are now being incorporated into construction plans by DPW, a temporary station plaza was to have been provided east of proposed Newbridge Road extension in an area bounded in the

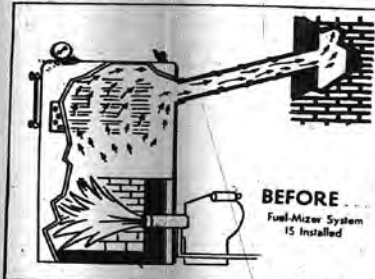

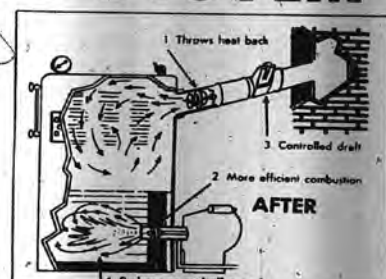

The Future For Hicksville

MANY OF US would, on occasion, welcome the opportunity to take a look into the future to see what is to befall us. It was for this reason that we found the informal remarks of Murray M. Bisqaier at a recent meeting of Hicksville Chamber of Commerce particularly of interest.

Mr. Bisqaier is with Community Housing and Planning Assoc and was present at the Chamber directors' meeting as the guest of Henry G. Eisemann. While we did not agree with everything he had to say, we were vastly heartened to find that some of our in-expert conclusions and past guesses have some official recognition and further that there is some thinking and planning being done about Hicksville's tomorrow.

For example: Hicksville is now the center of a regional area with a population of 80 to 90 thousand people. It is definitely developing as a metropolitan shopping area. Further Mr Bisqaier opines (as we have several times) that the Mid Island Shopping Plaza can supplement and implement Hicksville as a regional shopping centre. That is to say, if Mid Island Plaza were not located where it is, the diversion of business and shopping to other neighboring communities would have continued. Now the trend is reversed.

Basically, downtown Hicksville has a fine potential, Mr Bisqaier stated. There is adequate parking (see map at the right) there is a good street pattern (a tribute to those who originally laid it out.)

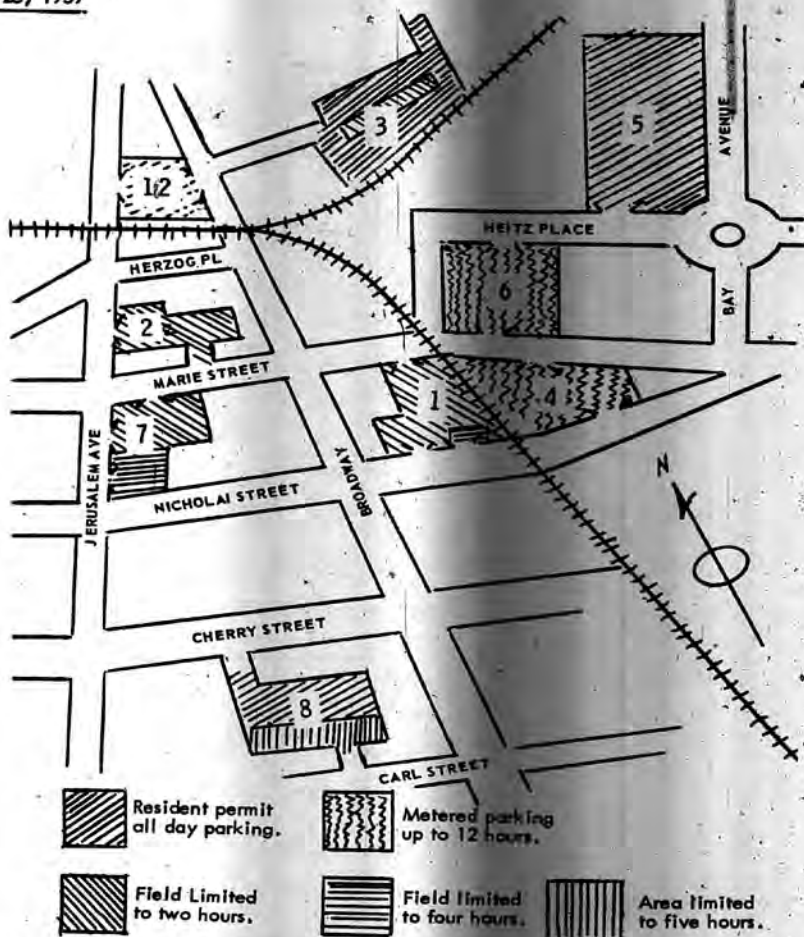
But there are things to be done. Some of this will be forced by the RR elimination and the eventual widening of Broadway, if and when. He went on to talk about Urban Renewal and we learned more about this program than we ever knew before.

The questions handed the speaker indicated there is a general air of confused suspension on the part of downtown merchants and landlords.

For instance: will the State slice 37 feet off the structures on the west side of Broadway? and if so, when? Mr Bisqaier could contribute little on this score. As we reported over two years ago, the State has drawn a line on a map. If and when, if ever, the State decided to make this map "official", is anyone's guess.

The ostrich-like attitude of some merchants in failing to do anything to improve their properties and make their stores more attractive to shoppers was another point made by Mr Bisqaier. How to force merchants and landlords to halt what he described as "a form of real estate cancer" is a topic which could be debated and discussed for the next 50 years.

The keynote, for us, was this point: Hicksville has the potential and it never was as good as it is right now. It may even get better.



USE DETERMINES PARKING FIELD TIME LIMITS

THIS SKETCH MAP indicates the location of all municipal parking fields in Hicksville with a total capacity of almost 1,100 cars. In addition, and not shown, is an area for 460 commuter cars in the former freight yard at the RR station. Effective with the installation of signs at the respective fields, about half of field No. 7 at Jerusalem Ave and Marie St. will be set aside for four hour parking (the balance for 2 hours) as well as 38 stalls at field No. 1, next to the Legion Hall. The four-hour areas are designed for the convenience of local business people.

About 100 spaces on field No. 8 will be assigned to resident parking for those who obtain stickers. The south end of this field will be held for 3 - hour parking. Field No. 5 remains a resident - permit parking field. Fields No. 4 and No. 6 are metered for up to 12 hours. Field No. 2 is also largely resident - permit with the centre stalls for two-hour parking. Councilman Henry McInnes today made public the revisions in the parking time limits. Resident parking permit stickers are available at the Town Hall Annex at 65 Broadway, just south of the RR crossing.

Law Prohibits Adv of Bingo

Q. Does State law making bingo legal within individual States make it possible to use the mails to advertise bingo so long as such advertisements go only within State borders?

A. No. Changes in State laws do not affect the federal statutes restricting bingo.

The Postal Lottery Law, Title 18, Section 1302, United States Code, prohibits any mailing of lottery matter and bingo is considered a lottery whether such mailing is a ticket, payment or advertisement.

It makes no difference that such mailing is confined within the borders of the State where such lottery may be legalized.

Q. Does the restriction against lottery "advertisements" apply only to newspaper advertisements?

A. No. The restriction applies equally to magazines and periodicals which go through the United States mails, as well as to any form of notice advertising a lottery sent through the mails by individuals or organizations.

Q. One does not think of bingo as being in the same category as the big lotteries such as the Irish Sweepstakes. Why is bingo considered a "lottery"?

A. The law says it is a lottery. Under federal court decisions, the classic identifications of a lottery are "consideration, chance and prize." There is consideration in the form of the fee paid to play.

Q. Suppose the advertisement of a bingo game does not mention "bingo" at all? Is it still prohibited in the mails?

A. Yes. Bingo, or similar games using different names, cannot be advertised in any matter carried through the mails. The law cannot be evaded by such words as "Party" or "Big Game Wednesday Night" or by merely printing "S." If the advertisement in fact relates to a lottery, it is a violation of the federal law.

Q. Are lotteries conducted for charity exempted in any way from the federal prohibitions?

A. None whatever. The Postal Lottery Law makes no exceptions in favor of lotteries conducted for worthy causes, or which might be regarded as a "little raffle."

"I hope," Mr. Summerfield commented, "that these answers will aid in public understanding of these laws, which the Post Office Department is duty bound to enforce."

Pynchon Outlines Republican Town Program

A brief program highlighting the achievements and goals of the Oyster Bay Town Administration was presented by town officials at a meeting of the entire Oyster Bay Town, Republican Committee at Bethpage State Park Clubhouse attended by 250 enthusiastic GOP committeemen representing the 142 election districts of the Town.

Below freezing temperatures, Thursday night, Feb. 19, failed to hamper attendance at the meeting called by Thomas R. Pynchon, Town Chairman and leader.

Pynchon's plan of action for the GOP party members was applauded and cheered at the meeting. He pledged more frequent meetings of the entire Town Committee, proposed a series of meetings with executive committeemen in each population center of the Town together with town officials for the purpose of discussing local issues, establishment of a central finance committee with its own special chairman, and meetings between the executive committeemen and the representatives of Republican Clubs, women's divisions and Republican recruits in the town.

Pynchon was introduced by Edward Poulos, Republican leader of South Syosset-Locust Grove-Jericho, program chairman for the meeting.

Six speakers each gave brief, concise reports on some phase of Town government. Supervisor John J. Burns asserted that the town's financial status is "excellent." He noted "the town Board has followed our traditional pay-as-you-go policy which has resulted to the continuing advantage of the homeowners and taxpayers. As a result of this practical approach to money matters, we have been able to initiate many needed long and short range public improvement projects without placing undue burden upon homeowners."

"Our Town's credit is rated as 'A' and we have utilized only 17.6 per cent of our allowable debt limit," Burns told the committeemen. "This remarkably low level of bond-

ded indebtedness, despite the many public improvements achieved, effectively demonstrates the Administration's continuing prudence in the management of the Town's fiscal affairs," he noted.

Councilman Benjamin Zipper of Syosset told the committee that the Town Board's developing Comprehensive Zoning Plan which will be the subject of a public hearing late in March is the result of the combined efforts and hard work of the Town Board, its expert planning consultants and many of the homeowners from the various population centers of the Town.

Councilman Edmund Ocker of Plainview spoke briefly on the Town's Beach-Recreation improvement program advising the Committee that a substantial portion of the program will be ready for enjoyment by residents this summer.

Town Clerk Henry M. Curran of Oyster Bay cited the many services provided by the employees of his office and briefly explained the new Bingo Law which provides that the Town Clerk must supervise the games in addition to handling the overall administration of Bingo in the Town.

Tax Receiver David Welsh of Farmingdale spoke on the use of modern business machines in his department which has enabled him to handle efficiently the increased volume of work in the Tax Receiver's office. In 1948 the Tax Receiver processed 73,000 tax bills and in 1958 the number of bills had increased to over 167,000 reflecting the subdivision of land and property in the Town.

Councilman Henry J. McInnes of Hicksville spoke on the commuter parking situation, stating the Town Board has encouraged the introduction of legislation which would permit the Town to enlarge commuter parking facilities. "This will be a great help to thousands of commuters as it will take care of a large segment of our residents who commute but do not reside in population centers that have railroad stations where resident parking is provided."

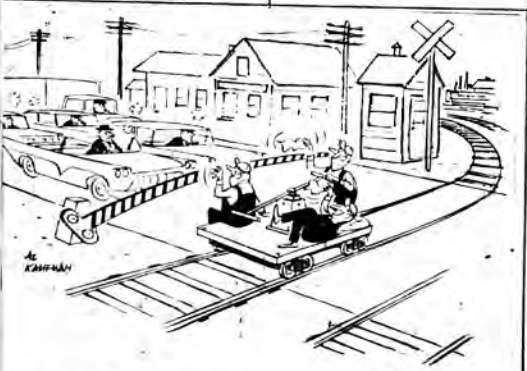

Although it has won only three championships in 34 years, it has been rare that Hicksville High has found itself in or even sharing the cellar of its basketball division.

It is a bit ironic that the 1959 season should be ending for the Comets on both an important and dismal note.

For the Comets have now lost six in a row and invade Farmingdale, Friday night, for the season finale with the Dalers anxious to win. That would draw the Comets back into a tie for the cellar at 3 won and 9 lost.

It also would leave Hicksville with a losing campaign. The record automatically falling below .500 at 8 wins and 9 losses.

Since Hicksville took the Dalers twice, early in the season, the Farmingdale group must be regarded as having made the most improvement between the two. Just recently the Dalers upset Garden City which last Friday defeated the Orange on the Hicksville boards, 75-50.

Hicksville actually played well until mid-way of the third period when the champion Trojans pulled away from a tight 36-33 game.

We used to use the old Hicksville war cry that "You Just Don't Lose To Farmingdale!" to spur a little interest. For many this will be the last varsity game for the Comets. And it should echo the usual desire to close on a high note.

And the issue is big. If the boys are not interested they can end up by losing seven straight, having the record book display a losing season and winding up in the cellar.

We believe they are interested. Hicksville 32, Farmingdale 26.

Ted Greve was decisively in his final last year, 2-1, in an overtime match as th sellout crowd at Wantagh howled at the officials point awarding.

It was our understanding that he would have been the first North Shore wrestler to win a Nassau laurel.

Hicksville appears to have lost both Hempstead and Westbury as football opponents for 1959 as the North Shore League continues to jockey its realignment.

The great problem is that so many of the North Shore schools are patsy seekers who want to pad their records with easy victories so that they are not so resolved.

This uproar should give evidence to the argument that school enrollment is not the answer to scheduling or league makeup.

The best hope for Nassau is a major county league made up of the schools who are actually willing to play on the level of school interest, administration support and coaching ability.

Hempstead, Hicksville, Freeport, Massapequa, Baldwin, Farmingdale, Mineola, Great Neck or a makeup of that order would keep the parties in their place and allow a respect for true accomplishment in Nassau County.

The last time we went to the National AAU Indoor Track and Field Championships at Madison Square Garden, Ed Coleman won the scholastic Shot Put and Discus title for Hicksville High School.

He set a record with the Shot that day 15 years ago and it was the first and only time that a Hicksville High School Boy won a National Championship.

We went back Saturday night on the 15th anniversary and saw five World's Records established.

It sure made you wish they could revive the scholastic sport on Long Island to its previous high degree of interest.

Although Hicksville High basketball games are conducted as orderly as ever there were more and more MATT LESS men in blue with nightsticks at the Garden City game, Friday night.

For those who have been pelted us with questions about this and feel it is degrading to the Hicksville youth and faculty we suggest you turn your questions to the School Board.

south by the railroad tracks and on the north by West Barclay St.

At further hearings on the matter, it was testified that the relocation of this area to the west of the new street extension would result in greater convenience to commuters and in less traffic congestion during rush hours. As proposed, the new area would have included 114,700 square feet compared with 61,100 square feet in the originally planned area.

It has been contemplated that the temporary plaza might be paved and ultimately converted into a municipal parking facility after its immediate need for station purposes had been concluded.

GLF TO GO

In today's action, however, the PSC, acting on recommendation of DPW, ruled that only about two-thirds of the area proposed as the site of the relocated plaza is necessary, confining the lands to be acquired primarily to property owned by GLF Agency Corp. An access roadway from Barclay St. to the new permanent station will be provided. Examiner Harold M. Olmsted says, in a report to the Commission, that the plaza area as ordered today contains "as much space as the State should provide, even temporarily."

With respect to the use of the plaza for parking purposes, Olmsted adds: "Any parking facilities included therein would be merely incidental to the use of the temporary station building. General commuter parking would have to be provided by others than the State." He observes further that the Commission had ruled in a prior case that "provision for off-street parking facilities is primarily the responsibility of the community." Decision as to the paving of the temporary plaza will be made in connection with the preparation of construction plans.

The Dept. of Public Works may now complete its plans for construction of the Hicksville project. After these, together with necessary cost estimates and construction specifications, have been submitted to and approved by the PSC, the project can be advanced to the construction stage.

The proposed establishment of an FM radio transmitting station with a 147 foot slender, metal antennae at the northeast corner of North Bway and Notre Dame Ave., Hicksville, which was the subject of a public hearing last month, was turned down by the Oyster Bay Town Board on Tuesday.

The decision noted that 150 residents of the immediate area had registered protests, that testimony at the hearing indicated the pole would sway, as much as eight feet in high winds and that the applicant's engineer had stated the pole could be located in some other area.

The application was made by John R. Rieger Jr. of Merrick.

The Town Board also expressed the opinion that it would appear feasible to locate the pole in an

area devoted to either business or industrial use which would not involve the dangers of the proposed location.
