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

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Salaries Help Boost Budget Half Million

The Hicksville Board of Educa-tion will meet again tomorrow (Fri) night' and Saturday morning at the ligh School Little Theatre, continu-ting its labor on the 1959-60 School District Budget which will be sub-dited to vote, May 6. An increase of about a half million dollars over the 1958-59 budget is frecast with t's tentative adoption of Code 3. If structional Services. Code 3 includes the salaries of administrators, supervisors, teach-ers and clerical help, plus office supplies, text books, etc.

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Teacher's Proposals

The Board last Saturday took action upon all sections of Code 3 except 3-4 (Clerical and other help salaries). A proposal that the Board reopen consideration of reachers' salaries was rejected by a 4-2 vote. Jack Nephew, representing the wel-fare commendations: (f) that the number of steps in the salary scale be reduced, and (2) that the differ-ential between Bachelor, Master and Doctorate degrees be increased by \$100 on each step. Nephew told the Board the pro-posals would add \$48,100 to the had-net, based upon \$52 teachers now in the system.



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
