IN YOUR OPINION: Astonishing Support For Off-Track Betting

An astonishing 82.3 per cent of Mid Island residents responding to the third in a series of local public opinion surveys told the MID ISLAND HERALD they approve of off-track betting as a source of revenue for the State of New York, while 17.6 per cent of those answering the question registered strong opposition.

Residents of Hicksville, Jericho and Bethpage were also questioned as to "other sources of revenue" they would favor to help the State meet its financial obligations.

There were 76.4 per cent of those answering in favor of a state lottery, while 17.6 per cent opposed a lottery.

Only six tenths of a per cent expressed approval of a state-wide sales tax. None were in favor of a county sales tax and 47 per cent had "no opinion" as to other possible sources of revenue.

Comments regarding "other sources of State Revenue" included: "One dollar year road use tax for cars."

"Luxury tax and liquor tax."

"Withholding tax on payrolls."

Voicing strong objections to either off-track betting plans or a state lottery, one person asserted "The end does not justify the means."

Thomas Ruth of 85 Fourth St., Bethpage, went into considerable detail: "My reasons for not favoring off-track betting or, for that matter, any form of gambling, are these:

"I have always been taught that the wealth of a nation lies in its ability to produce. As we look back in the history of man we find that this ability or lack of it led to the rise or fall of various nations. Since gambling does not produce anything but rather it takes away the desire of a people to produce, it is therefore a false doctrine which in the long run will be very harmful to our country and to our children.

"As to the matter of taxes," Ruth continued, "if we insist on government giving us more service we shall have to pay the price. It is our habit to place the blame for all our ills on anyone but ourselves. We seem to think the cure-all is to put a few dollars here or there and that will fix it.

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Salaries Help Boost Budget Half Million

The Hicksville Board of Education will meet again tomorrow (Fri) night and Saturday morning at the High School Little Theatre, continuing its labor on the 1959-60 School District Budget which will be submitted to vote, May 6. An increase of about a half million dollars over the 1958-59 budget is forecast with the tentative adoption of Code 3, Instructional Services.

Teacher's Proposals

The Board last Saturday took action upon all sections of Code 3 except 3-4 (Clerical and other help salaries). A proposal that the Board reopen consideration of teachers' salaries was rejected by a 4-2 vote. Jack Nephew, representing the welfare committee of the Classroom Teachers Assoc. presented two basic recommendations: (1) that the number of steps in the salary scale be reduced, and (2) that the differential between Bachelor, Master and Doctorate degrees be increased by \$100 on each step.

Nephew told the Board the proposals would add \$48,100 to the budget, based upon 552 teachers now in the system.

Board trustee, Jerry Zettler recalled that when the Board has es-

tablished changes in the teacher salary scale which became effective on Jan. 1 of this year, there had been the hope expressed that the salary scale would "stand for at least two years."

To bring the matter to a head, Zettler moved that the teacher scale be reconsidered for this year's budget. Trustees Zettler, Johnsen, Schreiber and Carpenter voted "no" while Trustees Eirich and Goodrich voted "yes" and the motion lost, 4-2. Robert D.P. Eaton was not present.

It was noted that action by the Board last year on teachers' salaries cost the District \$390,000.

Code 3 represents more than half the total district budget. This year the appropriation was \$4,087,087.91 and the code is expected to increase by at least a half million dollars for next year.

Supervisors' and Assistant Principals' salaries will total \$198,400, a gain of \$28,300; Principals' salaries is up \$11,920 to \$116,320; other expenses of administration and supervisors will be \$25,381.16, up \$6,960.25.

Textbooks will be \$123,483.22, an increase of \$34,591; supplies used in instruction total \$126,864.10 and other expenses of instruction amount to \$85,095.19 in the new budget.

Salaries of teachers, kindergarten thru 6th grade, will amount to

\$2,108,400, an increase of \$124,550; and 7th thru 12th grade teacher salaries will cost \$1,098,220, a gain of \$257,370.

50 New Teachers

The Board was advised by the Administration that 17 additional elementary and 33 more secondary teachers will be needed next term. The category also includes \$22,000 for the employment of 26 teachers working on curriculum during the summer. \$100,000 was appropriated for this last year.

Also included in this code is \$15,000 for a one-week orientation program for new teachers. A two-week orientation was staged this past summer. The Administration has recommended reduction of the period to one week as being adequate.

The School Board also received letters from Burns Ave. and Woodland Ave. School P-TA's urging the construction of additional permanent school facilities in the District.

The Board received recommendations from Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, superintendent of schools, regarding proposed facilities for housing the student population. Action was delayed pending the receipt of further alternate information requested by members of the Board of Education.

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Contemporary Comment:

Why Rockefeller Insists on Taxes

Governor Rockefeller's idea is simply that the State of New York ought to collect enough revenues to pay the bill for necessary and desirable expenditures. That's what pay-as-you-go is all about.

The Governor's \$2 billion-plus budget isn't pure pay-as-you-go - not by a long shot. Despite the proposed income-tax exemption changes and added upper-level brackets, as well as all the other tax increases recommended, Mr. Rockefeller is still counting on using up most of the dwindled cash reserves and also doing some husky borrowing.

But the new man at Albany does emphatically expect to have the State of New York on a completely pay-as-you-go basis by the end of '62, and perhaps before then. This means a genuinely balanced budget, without recourse to borrowing that adds 50 percent interest cost in the long run. It means putting the state on a fiscally sound basis which not only stimulates the whole economy but thus makes possible improved schools, hospitals, roads, etc., at proportionately diminished strain on government and the taxpayer's pocket.

Now it is never popular to raise taxes. But Mr. Rockefeller's opponents in the Legislature and elsewhere are disposed ever so conveniently to overlook that meaty assault on the budget and installment-buying finance aren't going to save any money. The Senators and Assemblymen won't dispute this in private. And neither will they dare to whack "state aid" so that spending is actually in balance with non-accelerated receipts. If the lawmakers ever did, they would hear the uproar from Montauk to Niagara Falls.

What Nelson Rockefeller recommends is that a bad situation be dealt with at once. Don't let it deteriorate, the Governor says. His program is to face up to the facts now, get this mess over with as fast as possible, and meanwhile not forget to squeeze the waste out of government as added taxation speeds the return of pay-as-you-go.

The Rockefeller prescription can be called rough or realistic, according to who is doing the talking. But one thing is certain - the Governor's program is bound to save a lot of trouble for the future. That's why it's right.

Real property of war veterans is allowed a limited tax exemption under the Tax Law of the State of New York. The law provides that where a home is purchased with the proceeds from "eligible funds" (text Bonus, Pension, Insurance Dividends etc) paid by the United States or New York State, the veterans property up to the statutory limitation of \$5,000 is exempt from Real Estate taxes.

The exemption applies to State, County and general municipal taxes, including village taxes. It does not apply to School Taxes or special district taxes or Assessments such as those imposed for water, sewer, light or fire protection.

For example, if a Veteran's property is assessed for \$14,000, assuming that he is eligible for the full \$5,000 exemption, then his taxes (other than school, etc) will be computed on the basis of property assessed for \$9,000, thereby reducing his tax bill. (Note: If he only put in \$3,000 cash in his property, the exemption is limited to this \$3,000).

Veterans in order to take advantage of his tax reduction must file an application with the Dept. of Assessment, New Court House, East Wing, Mineola, N.Y., prior to May 19, 1959. In order to file an application the Veteran is required to present proof as to the amount of monies he received for mustering out pay, bonus etc.

The Veteran must obtain this proof by writing to the various Government Agencies requesting the desired information. Experience has shown that it takes considerable time to receive a reply to the veterans request and it is therefore strongly suggested that the residents of our community who have not as yet filed an application, get busy at once. Those veterans who have already applied in any year need not file again; however, if a veteran has already filed, and did not receive his full exemption because the amount he paid into his property was less than his eligible exemption he should again apply because he has now reduced some of the principal on his mortgage or made other improvements on his property, thereby making him eligible for an additional tax saving.

Sec. E-3. LOT AREA. In "E-1" Apartment House District, no building shall be erected or altered on a lot having an area of less than five (5) acres.
Sec. E-4. FRONT YARD. In "E-1" Apartment House District, no building hereafter erected or altered shall have a depth of front yard less than twenty-five (25) feet.
Sec. E-5. CORNER LOT. In "E-1" Apartment House District, such lot shall have a front yard along each street as provided in Section E-4.
Sec. E-6. SIDE YARDS. In "E-1" Apartment House District, there shall be two (2) side yards, one on each side of the plot. The total of the width of both side yards

shall be not less than fifty (50) feet, and neither side yard shall be less than twenty-five (25) feet.
Sec. E-7. DOUBLE FRONT LOTS. In "E-1" Apartment House District, the required front yard shall be provided on both streets.

In "E-1" Apartment House District, a minimum area for recreation and for children's play areas shall be provided at a ratio of one hundred fifty (150) square feet for each dwelling unit, provided, however, that off-street parking areas shall not be included in the computation of the areas required to be furnished for recreational purposes.
Sec. E-12. MINIMUM FLOOR AREA. In "E-1" Apartment House District, the minimum habitable floor area for each dwelling unit shall be not less than five hundred (500) square feet.
Sec. E-13. LANDSCAPING. In "E-1" Apartment House District, there shall be suitable landscaping, shrubbery, trees and screening, and at the rear and side lines where the site abuts a residence district there shall be a thick growth evergreen planting strip consisting of evergreen shrubs not less than five (5) feet in height.
