Eisemann Directs GOP Finances

Henry G. Eisemann of Field Ave., Hicksville, prominent insurance broker and businessman, has accepted the chairmanship on financial matters for the Oyster Bay Town Republican Committee. It was disclosed today by Thomas R. Pynchon, chairman of the Town GOP.

Mr. Eisemann, head of the firm of Seaman & Eisemann Inc. in Hicksville, has been active in civic and community affairs for many years. He is a former member of the Nassau County Planning Commission and was a member of the Citizens' Advisory Committee on Planning for the Town of Oyster Bay. He has been a leader of programs for the Nassau County Council, Boy Scouts of America, and has been active in the building programs of the Trinity Lutheran Church of Hicksville. He was president of the Bank of Hicksville at the time of its merger with the Meadow Brook National Bank.

A meeting of the Town Republican Executive Committee with the presidents of Republican Clubs and women's divisions of the Township has been called for Thursday evening, March 19, by Pynchon. At this meeting the plans of Eisemann for the fiscal affairs of the town GOP will be outlined.

SCHOOL BUDGET TAKING SHAPE.

Require 35 Buses to Transport 6,876 Pupils to District Schools

Student transportation continues to grow and grow in Hicksville School District. During the coming fiscal year more than a quarter million dollars will be expended on transportation as a total of 6,876 pupils ride to school within the District. This year 6,419 are riding back and forth to classes.

The Board of Education has completed tentative action upon Code 9 of the proposed 1959-60 School Budget which comes to a total of over \$640,000, including the item of transportation.

Code 9 covers "Auxiliary Agencies" including school librarians and secretarial salaries \$83,200 with \$78,700 as the pay for 10 school librarians next term; repair and replacement of books and periodicals at a cost of \$4,970.57 with \$3,019.85 representing the cost of subscriptions to periodicals; other expenses of libraries at \$2,719.13; medical inspections, medical supplies, etc. at \$18,533 which covers the physical examinations given by local doctors at \$1 per child; nurses salaries (15 nurses) of \$93,300 and supplies of \$2,734.51; dental hygiene pro-

The request should indicate the child's name, age, grade, address, name of outside school and, if possible, the hours of the school day anticipated.

Bank Thieves Ignore Hicksville

The daring daylight robbery of a branch of Security National Bank in Massapequa this week where the thieves made off with an estimated \$73,000 in cash and the robbery of other banks in the vicinity during the past year or so calls to mind the fact that Hicksville has never experienced a bank robbery in the 56 years since the first banking institution opened here.

Thieves got \$11,281 at Franklin National in Levittown on Sept. 18, 1958; took \$5,000 from Eastern National, East Northport on Sept. 26, and \$3,000 from Second National of Hempstead on Nov. 17, all last year, plus other assorted holdups in New York City and New Jersey. The tap at Massapequa on Monday was the first in this vicinity for 1959.

Hicksville's oldest financial institution is the Hicksville office at Meadow Brook National Bank which was founded April 21, 1903. After more than 50 years as the Bank of Hicksville, it merged with Meadow Brook. The L.I. National Bank, which today has four offices in Hicksville and Plainview, opened for business in Nov. 1917. Four or five years ago a thief hit the Bethpage office of the Bank of Hempstead and that was the closest bank robbers have come to playing their trade in this area.

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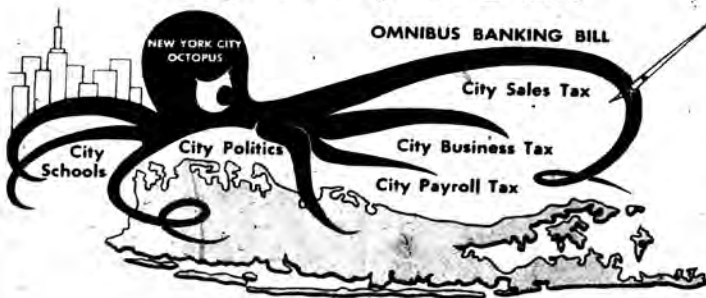

State Sets Date to Start Work on RR Elimination

The actual construction work on the Hicksville Rail Road Crossing elimination program will commence in April or May of 1960, it was asserted this week by Assemblyman Edwin J. Fehrenbach following a conference at Albany, Tuesday morning, between the legislator and James A. Lundy, chairman of the Public Service Commission. It marked the first official commitment by state authorities on the start of work.

Lundy told Fehrenbach that plans for the ten - million dollar project will be finalized about October of this year. After approval by all agencies and authorities concerned, the official call for bids will be issued. When bids have been awarded and contracts signed, the project begins in earnest.

Meanwhile, Hicksville Chamber of Commerce is well underway with a massive petition campaign. The petitions are addressed to the Governor, legislative leaders, Public Service Commission and State Dept.

of Public Works, urging the greatest speed on the project.

A Chamber spokesman said yesterday that over 50,000 signatures have been collected in the first few days. Printed petitions are available at the sales counters of all down town and Mid Island Plaza stores.

Ambulance Merits Praise

ONE OF THE UNSUNG but highly appreciated volunteer services provided by members of Hicksville Fire Dept (and in like degree and kind by Bethpage Fire Dept) is community ambulance service.

A firm believer in the fact that each person in a community should do those things that he can in the service of his neighbor, as best he can, it has been our pleasure to be an active ambulance volunteer as far as time from other pursuits permit. And so it was that during the week we accompanied two friends of long standing on their journeys to Nassau Hospital in pursuit of the kind of fine professional care which today's modern medical institutions can provide.

It has been our limited experience on these errands of mercy to observe the tender care rendered by the men of the fire department. The expressions by the kin of those who utilize the ambulance is justification, many times over, for the establishment of this 24-hour a day service. The purpose of this comment is to advise each and every person who contributed to the fund campaign which purchased this vehicle and had it presented to the fire district that they have rarely made a better investment, regardless of the size of their individual contribution.

This is not intended in any way to detract from the many other fine emergency services of our volunteer firemen. It must be conceded, however, that there are a few services which are more appreciated than those which help ease pain and suffering.

Eugene Staehle of 203 Newbridge Rd. went to Nassau Hospital on Friday. Mr Staehle for more than a generation was a key volunteer leader in the Boy Scouts of America. He was probably on the Court of Honor when we received our First Aid merit badge at Nicholas School more than a few years ago. There were three more ambulance calls on Saturday.

Monday afternoon saw Mrs. Joseph Heim of Twinlawns Ave also taken to Nassau Hospital. Mrs Heim is one of our Gold Star mothers and one of the kindest ladies we know. Her son, Joe, who was killed in the Battle of the Bulge, started in the newspaper business just about the same time as we did, although his specialty was sports reporting.

We've never had a more intimate and personal demonstration of the value of our community fire department ambulance service than we did this week.

SZENDY'S REQUEST
The School Board at its special meeting on budget preparation last Saturday considered a request from Emil J. Szendy, former Board president, that the so-called "winter recreation" program be submitted to a separate vote when the budget is voted upon, May 6.

There were about nine members of the Recreation Advisory Committee in the audience Saturday morning, led by Chairman George Winsor. Robert Sklarz who was also in the audience described the request made by Szendy as "blackmail." The total appropriation for recreation for 1959-60 is \$57,922 or an increase of \$4,237 over the current year. The budget breakdown shows \$19,191 for summer salaries, \$3,695 for summer equipment and program expense, \$14,910 for school year salaries, \$1,626 for winter equipment and program expenses, \$17,250 for administrative costs and \$1,250 for operational costs.

In the proposed budget the salary of the Director, Joseph F. Madden, continues at \$9,000 without change as does the salary of a program coordinator at \$5,000.

Two trustees, Robert D.P. Eaton and Arthur L. Erlich, were absent on Saturday. The other members voted 5 to 0 to include the entire recreation appropriation in the budget which had the effect of rejecting the plea of Szendy for a separate vote.

DENTAL EXAMS

In the field of dental hygiene the Board voted 4 to 1 to eliminate dental hygienists and instead to appropriate \$9,800 next term to have dental inspections made by professional dentists on the same general basis as physical examinations are now conducted by doctors. Robert Goodrich objected, requesting the District hire one hygienist next year.

The Board also voted to have the nurse-teachers submit reports to parents regarding the dental examinations.

At the present time the District has two dental hygienists on the staff whose total salary next year would have represented the same sum as that appropriated for examinations by dentists, \$9,800.

The Board has tentatively adopted Codes 9, 3, 4, 6, and 7. Skill to be acted upon are Codes 2, 3, and 8, with a special meeting set for 10 o'clock this Saturday morning, Mar. 14, the Board has high hopes of completing the tentative budget more than a month ahead of schedule to permit preliminary public discussion meetings.

Under Code 6, fixed charges, the increase of \$124,783 for a new appropriation of \$652,396. Two thirds of this amount is for teachers state retirement and the bulk of the balance is for state retirement for custodians and clerical help and Social Security. About \$60,000 is for insurance on buildings and contents, physical education and compensation insurance.

Code 4 covers operation of the plant, including \$325,000 for wages of custodial and operating staff, \$73,634.81 for fuel, \$2,775 for water, \$59,950 for light and power, \$43,531.57 for custodial supplies (exactly the same as current year), \$33,149.50 for services other than personal and \$3,600 for other expenses or a total of \$541,660.88.

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Bankers Rally to Fight Omnibus Bill

New York City banking institutions were promised a "fight to the finish" today against their efforts to invade Long Island's two suburban counties.

Nearly 100 representatives of financial institutions from Nassau and Suffolk Counties attended a meeting at the Sky Club, Roosevelt Field, at which they agreed to wage an "unrelenting battle" to defeat the proposed "octopus" bank bill and to remain independent of any domination by New York City.

The meeting was called by the Nassau-Suffolk Financial Council, a group formed in the Fall of 1958, and comprising representatives of substantially all the commercial banks, savings banks and savings and loan associations in the two counties.

A spokesman for the group said a preliminary study of the proposed legislation has raised "grave doubts" as to its constitutionality. The Council demanded that a "full and unprejudiced" public hearing be held before the bill is considered by the Legislature.

The three co-chairmen of the Financial Council, H. B. Dufferin, president of the County Federal Savings & Loan Association; Walter E. Van der Waag, president of the Meadow Brook National Bank and Irvin S. Hawkins, vice president of the Union Savings Bank of Patchogue said the group will spark an all-out drive to "warn the people of Nassau and Suffolk Counties of the inevitable consequences of the bill."

Van der Waag categorized the legislation as "an attempt to force local commercial banks into mergers with the New York giants."

"Once these banks gain control

of the Nassau-Suffolk economy, the domination of the area's political life by New York City will inevitably follow."

COUNCIL CREDO

"Declaration of Independence" unanimously adopted by the Council members is as follows:

We commercial banks, savings banks and savings and loan associations of the Counties of Nassau and Suffolk stand united in purpose, dedicated in principle, determined in effort and confident of achievement.

We are united in a belief that Nassau and Suffolk Financial institutions know and serve the area best. Or as the Bible says, "I know mine, and mine know me."

The reason is simple. We are here. We serve our communities firsthand, not remotely.

Our facilities are sufficient in number by any standard. We strive for and feel we have succeeded in providing a quality of service which any community may well model.

We are dedicated to the principal that commercial banks, savings banks and savings and loan associations can sit at one table for a common good.

We are determined to defeat encroachment of Nassau and Suffolk Counties by big city institutions' either socio-economically or financially.

We hasten to point out that the eyes of the nation's planners of financial legislation are on us, or on what happens to us. New York's decision may well have far-reaching effects.

We are confident of achievement because we are prepared to actively

seek achievement.

Finally, we are resolved to take whatever steps are deemed necessary to vigorously and fruitfully oppose passage of the so-called Omnibus Bill introduced in the New York Legislature, March 2, 1959.

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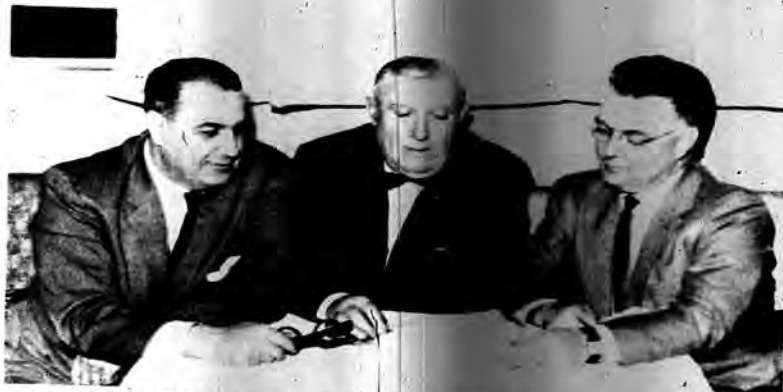
