Among Top Five on Island:

# PO Achieves Million \$ Sales Rank

Hicksville Post Office has achieved the status as one of five post offices in Nassau and Suffolk Counties which does a million-dollars a year or more in postal business. It was disclosed this week by Postmaster Harry C. Cotier. During the past five years the local office gained more in revenues than it had in the previous 95 years of existence.

The office hit the million-dollar category as of the fiscal year ending Mar. 31st. There are 55 post offices in Nassau and 110 in Suffolk. Great Neck, Garden City and Hempstead post offices are well into the million-dollar class with revenues of about \$3 million each annually. Hicksville is now close to the other million dollar office, Rockville Centre, to complete the top five.

Cotier became postmaster in Hicksville on April 1, 1955 when the receipts of the local office were \$300,000. It has gained \$700,000 during the past five years.

The local office has shown a 49 per cent increase in receipts during the first quarter of 1959 over the first quarter of last year. As a matter of fact, the Postmaster says "the Christmas rush never seemed to end. There was a slight pause, and then the volume continued to mount."

The Hicksville office, according to a recent study, has passed Great Neck, Rockville Centre and Garden City in the amount of postal service rendered and is second to Hempstead in Nassau.

## Specht Is Victor In Fire Contest

John Specht, captain of Co. 5, won the three-way race for third assistant chief of Hicksville Fire Dept. Thursday night. He was installed together with Chief Charles Saurer and other officers Monday night.

Specht received 70 ballots, while Gus Cotsorfas got 54 and Edward Lauritsen, 31. There was one write-in for Clifford Davis.

Carl Elsemann of Co. 1 was elected treasurer, succeeding Harry Borley of Co. 5. Stanford Weiss was re-elected battalion delegate. There was one write-in for Henry Gebhardt.

Also elected were Walter Wertheissen, first assistant chief; Walter Telender, second assistant chief; Arthur Isaksen, secretary; and Joseph Elsemann, financial secretary.

Saurer succeeds B. Medard Ofenloch as department chief.

## Vote in June Looms As Board Designates Proposed School Site

Voters of Hicksville School District may be required to go to the polls in June to vote upon whether or not they want to buy a school site in the north side of the District for a future elementary school which will eventually replace Nicholas St. School. Acting on the recommendation of School Attorney Arnold Witte, the Board of Education this week designated a 4.1 acre site as a possible school site to legally delay the construction of dwellings upon it until the voters decide.

## Carpenter, Backman, Noeth First Nominees for May 6

While rumors of candidacies continued to ripple thru the community this week, only three persons were officially nominated this week for three vacancies on the Board of Education as of noon yesterday (Wed.). Six days remain for the filing of designating petitions. The deadline is next Wednesday, April 22.

Allen S. Carpenter has been nominated to succeed himself on the board. Fred J. Noeth has been named to fill the vacancy when the term of Arthur L. Elrich expires and Herbert Backman has been nominated to fill the vacancy when the term of Robert D.P. Eaton expires.

Eaton has said in print he is going to run again in the company of Morton Cohen of Switzerland Rd. and David Hurwitz of Baker Lane. Petition forms have been requested by other individuals who may not decide to file by April to assure a place on the voting machines on May 6.

The term of Mary Goodrich as a library trustee expires this election. Elizabeth Scherer has filed a nominating petition for the five-year vacancy. Friends are also known to be circulating petitions for Jim Wyss, a candidate filing has become official in Hicksville District in five years. ## How to Keep School Taxes Down

Congratulations are in order for the Hicksville School District, which is leading the way in taking a realistic approach to class sizes in the face of increasing enrollments and skyrocketing taxes.

While many other districts are pushing the expansion programs, some of questionable need, Hicksville Superintendent Wallace E. Lamb has issued a warning against overbuilding. While some districts insist on small class sizes and then use the resultant double session as an argument for more schools, Hicksville plans to keep additional building at a minimum and to permanently avoid double sessions above the second grade, even during its peak enrollment, by utilizing classes of up to 33.

With much smaller class sizes locally than in Europe, which is generally conceded to be doing a superior job in education, and than in Los Angeles, Philadelphia, Detroit and Chicago (according to the April 2 "Herald Tribune"), it's time for hard-pressed school boards and taxpayers to examine this convenient method of saving money without harming the quality of education.

There have been many research studies of class sizes and pupil achievement, with the educationists trying to prove that smaller classes were superior. But of the 73 important studies reviewed by the "Encyclopedia of Educational Research," better than two to one found achievement higher in large than in small classes. "The general trend of evidence places the burden of proof squarely upon the proponents of small classes," the encyclopedia concludes. "On the whole, the statistical findings definitely favor large classes at every level of instruction except the kindergarten."

The relation between too-small class sizes and too-high tax rates is emphasized by the recently-released "Part II" of the 55th annual Statistical Report from the State Education Department.

By excluding the costs which vary from district to district (debt service, capital outlay, transportation, etc.), the report gives us the "net current expense per weighted pupil" for expenditures common to all schools. It makes perfectly obvious that the tax rate is heavily dependent on the class size.

Locally, the ten comparable school districts, with largest average class sizes are New York City; East Meadow, Farmingdale, Freeport and Hicksville in Nassau County; and Central Islip; Greenport, Kings Park, Riverhead and Smithtown Branch in Suffolk. Their expense per pupil averages \$477 annually, with East Meadow paying \$377, Riverhead \$420, Central Islip \$451, New York City \$462 and Hicksville \$477.

The ten comparable school districts with the smallest average class sizes are Garden City, Great Neck, Hempstead, Long Beach, Manhasset, Roslyn, Sea Cliff and West Hempstead in Nassau and East Hampton and Northport in Suffolk. Their expense per pupil averages \$699 annually, with Hempstead paying \$701, Roslyn \$719, Great Neck \$720, Sea Cliff \$733 and Manhasset \$914.

The "net current expense" figure provided by the State Education Department is a valuable guide to help the taxpayer decide if he's getting his money's worth. The small-class group above has 23 percent more teachers and spends 45 percent more money per pupil. (Of course, higher-income districts can afford smaller classes, even though there seems to be no educational advantage; but our concern is with the middle and low income districts where the taxpayers have to work hard to make ends meet.)

Class sizes—and the attitudes towards them—are among the key considerations in evaluating school budgets and candidates in the voting which faces Long Island taxpayers during the first week in May.

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## Wants Library Bd To Study Bookmobile

The addition of a bookmobile to the facilities of the Hicksville Public Library should be considered in open session by the Library Board, is the belief of Mrs. Elizabeth Scherer of 39 Bamboo Lane, who has filed for library trustee in the May 6 elections.

"Many citizens who support the library through taxes are unable to avail themselves of its benefits, either because of complicated domestic schedules or because the library simply isn't easily accessible to everyone," Mrs. Scherer said. "The classic example" she observed "is the ordinary housewife. Often she is the mother of pre-schoolers or has children on staggered schedules in elementary school. A trip to the library is out of the question for her, and the present method of circulating books from a central source only is hardly calculated to meet her needs."

Another point in favor of a bookmobile is its characteristic appeal to children, Mrs. Scherer observed. "It's a bigger neighborhood attraction than the ice cream ven-

dor," she said, "and an excellent method of extending library services into the community. For children, it provides the earliest possible experience in selecting books and an early exposure to the pleasure of books."

"A bookmobile also has an important place in these times of emphasis on adult education," Mrs. Scherer continued. "The nearby community, Farmingdale, with a smaller population than Hicksville, has found that use of its bookmobile equals the use of the entire library three years ago. At the same time circulation at their main library has increased."

Several other communities neighboring on Hicksville have successfully used this method of increasing the circulation of books. "The time is at hand," she said, "for a study of the situation and a report to the citizens of Hicksville."

Mrs. Scherer will discuss library problems April 29 before the Hicksville PTA Council, and, on April 30, at Dutch Lane Elementary School, where her own two children are pupils.

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## SCHOOL AND LIBRARY ELECTIONS

### Three Candidates Stress Responsibility

The first officially nominated candidates for the May 6th annual Hicksville School Election today asserted that "responsibility" is the key to their joint position in seeking election to the Board of Education.

Nominating petitions have been filed for Board President Allen S. Carpenter of 11 Loretta Lane to succeed himself, for Fred J. Noeth of 22 Twinlawn Ave to fill the vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of Arthur L. Elrich, and for Herbert Backman of 8 Brooks St. to fill the vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of Robert D. P. Eaton.

Carpenter, Backman and Noeth in a joint statement said "We can think of no single ability to be expected in a candidate for election to the

Board of Education than that of "responsibility."

"The definition of responsibility: the ability to meet an obligation, can be explored in such things as the willingness and ability to participate with other duly elected trustees in all decisions of the Board of Education, Prolonged and frequent absences, or partial attendance at Board meetings can not be construed as 'meeting an obligation'."

"The ability to meet the obligation of serving as a School Trustee includes the ability to participate, fully."

"Responsibility also includes the obligation and duty to consider the present and long range effect of decisions made by the Board of Education. Responsibility thus includes the imposition of policies and commitments which pledge the entire community for this and future generations."

"Responsibility can be measured in the past performances of persons who seek election to the Board through their demonstrated willingness to assume responsibility in a variety of community affairs and activities."

"We further believe that mature considerations, which in some circles might be regarded as conservatism, are to be desired."

"We further believe that all people of the community have the responsibility to exercise their civic duty in the selection of members of the Board of Education. This voter responsibility includes the registration of each voter and then the exercise of that vote on May 6th."

Registration of voters takes place on Saturday, April 25, from 12 noon to 6 PM and again on Wednesday, April 29, from 4 PM to 11 PM at seven elementary schools where voting also takes place.

Carpenter, Noeth and Backman all have children attending schools of the Hicksville District.

Carpenter is completing his second term on the Board of Education. He is past commander of the Charles Wagner Post No. 421, American Legion; has been a Cubmaster, leader in Boy Scout affairs in the Arrow Head District of Nassau County Council.

Backman, currently membership chairman of the Senior High School Parent-Teacher Assoc., has been manager of a Little League Team and president of the Hicksville International Little League. He has also been a member of the School District recreation advisory committee.

Noeth, resident of Hicksville since childhood, has served as a member of various Citizens' Advisory and School District Building Committees as well as a member of the Adult Education Advisory Committee since its formation in 1951. He is former captain of Emergency Fire Co. 5 and a member of the rescue squad. He is past president of the Nassau County Press Assoc. and has won both state and national recognition for community service in the weekly newspaper field. He has received American citizenship medal from the Veterans of Foreign Wars and has been honored with citations from the Jewish War Veterans, Catholic War Veterans and the Armvets.

He has been secretary of the Hicksville Business Men's Assoc. Inc., Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc., Inc.; Hicksville Lions Club, and Hicksville Civic Information Exchange. He was chairman of the village canvass for the Nassau County Chapter, American Red Cross, in 1945.

### Eaton Is Running With Cohen, Hurwitz

Robert D. P. Eaton, a member of the Hicksville Board of Education whose term will expire this year, has joined with Morton Cohen and David Hurwitz to form a three-man slate. The three will oppose a slate made up of Board President Allen Carpenter, School District Clerk Fred J. Noeth, and Herbert Backman; and any other candidates who

might enter the race for the three positions on the board which will be open this year. Candidates have until April 22 to file for election.

Cohen and Hurwitz, who had previously announced their plans to run, said that Eaton, while serving on the board, had "worked for good education" in the district, and that they were "pleased to be able to run with him."

Eaton said that Cohen's and Hurwitz's decisions to run for the board offered "an opportunity for better education" in Hicksville.

Eaton will be seeking his second term on the board.

### Claim Bungling On School Site

Hicksville School Board President Allen Carpenter and the "majority" members of the board have been accused of "bungling" in regard to a proposed school building site in the district. The accusation came from Morton Cohen, a candidate for election to the board.

Cohen's accusation followed a meeting of the school board on Friday night, when the board learned that the school site, near Willett Ave., had changed ownership since the first of the year, and that the new owner wanted \$110,000 for the site. Cohen said that the board "bungled" by not filing a notice of its intentions regarding the property as soon as the administration offered its recommendation that the property be acquired.

David Hurwitz, another candidate for the board, who is running as a member of a three-man slate with Cohen and present Board Member Robert D. P. Eaton, said that the board had also failed the district by not recognizing two years ago that the property would have to be acquired. The same site was under option to the district two years ago, and at that time could have been bought for around \$64,000, Hurwitz said. He said that after it was presented in a referendum and voters of the district failed to approve the purchase, the board made a mistake by not organizing a program aimed at informing people of the district of the importance of acquiring the site.

The present owner of the property told the board at the meeting Friday that he had purchased the property for the purpose of building homes.

### Grandjean Seeks Bethpage Re-Election

Howard Grandjean this week announced that he will be a candidate for re-election to the Bethpage Board of Education.

Grandjean is running on his record of continuing progress in the affairs of the School District.

In announcing his candidacy, Mr. Grandjean remarked that much has been said and written, in the past few months, against the policies of the present School Board. These charges, he asserted, have had only one purpose and that is to arouse the public in a desperate attempt to elect to the board two candidates, one previously unsuccessful last year.

Mr. Grandjean further noted that all the charges have been about financial matters and have presented only part of the facts, have offered no better solution and have failed to point out the many advantages of the decisions made by the board. His opponents have not attacked the educational policies of the board but have even praised them.

Quoting from the campaign announcement of his opponents, he read, "During the past year the educational standards in Bethpage have improved. We have engaged a well qualified Superintendent of Schools. Our high school is now operating under the competent leadership of a new principal. The educational picture has brightened."

He vied red the quotation, Mr. Grandjean pointed out that it is the same group who previously commended the board but have even praised them.

## IN EDITORIAL: Vote April 25th to Assure Building of 24 New Classrooms

On Saturday, April 25, the registered voters of the Jericho School District face three choices. They can, between the hours of 12 noon and 10 PM, go to the Robert Seaman School to vote for the 10 room Geo. Jackson School Addition as well as for the building of the new 16 room South Parkway School. The second choice, and one we trust none of our community-minded fellow residents will take, is to vote against these propositions. The third choice, and in our opinion the most dangerous one, is for our residents to stay away from the polls all together thus failing to participate in one of our communities' most crucial decisions.

THE VILLAGER urges all Jericho residents to cast their affirmative votes on these two propositions. By fall of this year, 200 or more additional elementary school children will register here. Kindergarten, First and 2nd Grade are on double sessions already. Unless passage is assured for these new school building propositions, we shall have to look forward to split sessions in all our lower grades as well. Aside from this, existing classes may have to be enlarged.

There is in this community a small hard core of education-minded residents. Knowing that the future of all our children is at stake, we know that they will cast their affirmative votes. However, this is not enough. Each and every registered resident must vote. Either you cast your ballot for better education and adequate educational facilities, or, by your failure to vote, you actually are in effect voting against progress and community betterment. A few minutes of your time on Sat. April 25th, may well help to assure our children of a lifetime filled with opportunities. ## Syosset Tax Rate Up Next Year

BY HORACE BERNSTEIN

Central School District No. 2, Syosset, will present a \$5 million budget to the taxpayers on May 6. The new budget will mean an increase of 75 cents per one hundred dollars of assessment. This will mean about a \$75,000 a year increase in our taxes. Our taxes (in the Locust Grove section) will be \$4,737.

Mr. McGurk stated that in preparing the budget, they were able to cut off a third of a million dollars which results in a savings of about 4 cents a hundred of assessed valuation. He further stated that: "Had the State Legislature approved the State Aid recommendations of the Educational Conference Board, the tax rate to support this budget could have been much lower."

Almost 75% of this increase will provide for new teachers to handle an enrollment jump of 1,000 pupils, salary increases to teachers, and increase in pension and insurance costs.

It seems that our Son of The American Legion Squadron's Bowling team is doing all right for themselves. After Saturday morning's competition at the Roosevelt Field Bowl, they moved into clear possession of first place in the standings - I attended the first meeting held by the newly installed county staff of the S.A.L. last Sunday at the Oceanside Memorial Post and noted with pride the manner in which these youngsters conducted the meeting - Far better than many adult meetings - Lots and lots of credit must go to the group of rather dedicated Legionsnaires who act in capacity of advisors to this group - It is not an easy task to bring together a group of boys, strangers for most part to each other, in a short space of time and weld them together to form an overall governing body for some 500 members - Yet this very thing has been done by this group headed by County S.A.L.
