Hicksville Post Office has achieved the status as one of five post offices in Nassau and Suffolk Counties which does a million-dollars a year or more in postal business, it was disclosed this week by Postmaster Harry C. Cotier. During the past five years the local office gained more in revenues than it had in the previous 95 years of existence.

The office hit the million-dollar category as of the fiscal year end-ing Mar. 31st. There are 55 post offices in Nassan and 110 in Suffolk. It has gained \$700,000 during the past five years. The local office has shown a 49 per cent increase in receipts during the first quarter of 1959 over the first quarter of 1959 over the first quarter of last year. As a mat-ter of fact, the Postmaster says "the Christmas rush never seemed to end. There was a slight passe, and then the volume continued to mount." The Hicksville office, according



Congratulations are in order for the Hicksville School District, which is leading the he way in taking a realistic approach to class sizes in the face of increasing enrollments and skyrocketing taxes.

ing taxes. While many other districts are pushing the expansion programs, some of questionable need. Hicksville Superintendent Wallace E. Lamb has issued a warning against overbuilding. While some districts insist on small class sizes and then the resultant double session as an argument for more schools, Hicksville plans to keep addi-tional building at a minimum and to permanently avoid double sessions above the second grade. even during its peak enrollment, by utilizing classes of up to 33.



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



#### Syosset Tax Rate Up Next Year

BY HORACE BERNSTEIN Central School District No. 2, Syosset, will present a \$5 million budget to the taxpayers on May 6. The new budget will mean an in-crease of 75 cents per one hum-dred dollars of assessment. This will mean anout a \$75,00 a year increase in our taxes. Our faxes (In the Locust Grove section) will be \$4,737. Mr. McGurk stated that in pre-paring the budget, they were able to cut off a third of a million






