Hester Runs 'Alone' with Himself, Files for all Three Vacancies

Nomination petitions were filed this week requesting that four additional names be placed on the voting machines for the Hicksville School Board Election of May 6. Previously nominated were Allen S. Carpenter, Hebert Backman and Fred J. Noeth. Additional nominations filed Monday were for Morton I. Cohen, Robert Eaton, David Hurwitz and Frank Hester.

HOW ELECTION BALLOT COULD LOOK

WHILE THE DEADLINE for filing of nominating petitions for School Board and Library Trustee came after this issue of the Mid Island Herald went to press, seven persons were nominated by petitions for the three school board vacancies as of early Wednesday (yesterday) and three candidates for one Library Board vacancy. All petitions are being reviewed by the School Attorney prior to printing of the ballots for the voting machines. Two machines will be used at each of seven voting places (see map on page 4) on May 6.

Cohen filed for the position now held by Carpenter, a two-year term. Eaton filed for his own position, which becomes vacant June 30. Hurwitz has filed for the position now held by Arthur L. Ehrich.

A petition nominating Frank Hester was filed by Mrs. Hester, Monday, for the Eaton position. Tuesday morning another petition was filed nominating Frank Hester for the Ehrich vacancy and later in the day a third petition was offered nominating Frank Hester for the Carpenter position.

Hester, whose address is 15 Colony St., has thus achieved the distinction of having nominations filed for himself for each one of the three vacancies to be filled on May 6th. Francis Hester was unsuccessful in effort to get elected to the Board of Education in 1957 when the term of Mabel R. Farley expired. Hester was opposed by Herbert H. Johnson, currently vice president of the Board who won 2,679 to 1,418.

Pending the final deadline for filing of nominations, there are now apparently three candidates filed for each vacancy. Since District Clerk Noeth is himself a candidate in the election, he has declined to formal-

Chamber Launches Push For Elimination

Spurred by the announcement that the State is preparing to call for bids on Floral Park's grade crossing elimination program, the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce this week called upon all citizens to join in its massive petition campaign to get the Hicksville program started as soon as possible.

Gov. Rockefeller has included ten million dollars in the current state budget, earmarked for the Hicksville RR elimination program and there are high hopes that the completed local engineering plans will be ready in a matter of weeks.

President Patrick Caputo of the Chamber of Commerce at an open Chamber meeting, Friday morning, outlined plans to set up "Petition Booths" at the RR stations, and at other key points in the community, to get thousands of signatures on petition forms urging continued efforts on the Hicksville project.

Aaron Rochman, chairman of the Chamber's special action committee, is organizing crews of volunteers who will seek signatures from morning commuters and shoppers thru out the day.

"Everyone who is ever stopped by the lowering of the gates across one of our main streets should be eager and willing to sign a petition which will speed the day of elimination," Caputo asserted. "This applies not only to Hicksville residents, but anyone who drives north or south, east or west."

The Chamber is preparing for its fourth annual Installation Dinner - Dance to be held at the Milleridge Inn, Jericho, on Saturday night, May 23.

Proper For Clerk to Run

In reply to certain rumor spreaders who are at work in this pre-school election period, Fred J. Noeth today released the following letter from Dr. Charles A. Brind, counsel for the State Education Dept. at Albany, dated March 24th:

"There would be nothing wrong with your continuing as Clerk of the Board of Education and also serving as a member of the Board because Section 2130 of the Education Law specifically permits such practise. It would follow, consequently, that you would not need to resign as Clerk in order to run for the Board of Education."

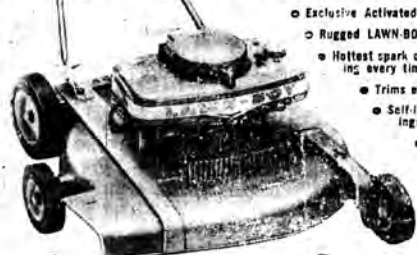

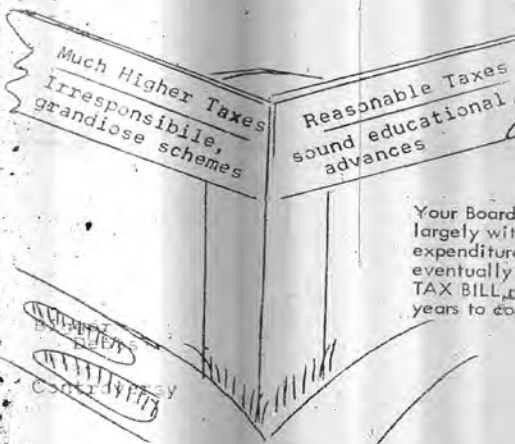
Local Twins Start Triple Take

To the Editor:
Shall we have the ideas of the New York City School System injected into our local schools via the School Board? Can a candidate who sits at School Board meetings open his remarks with the comment, "speaking as a teacher" serve the best interests of the community? Or will he be "thinking as a teacher" rather than a taxpayer?
I commend Mr. Hurwitz's zeal to serve on the School Board, but in my opinion the Board is an impartial group representing all people with no sentimental or other personal attachments. School District 17, our District, is nationally recognized as one of the finest in the nation, mentioned in leading periodicals as being such.

I am afraid that Mr. Hurwitz's problems experienced as a member of N.Y. City educational system are not quite similar to those of our school district and we should bear in mind the major financial and administrative problems can be best viewed impartially when one's livelihood and colleagues are not concerned.

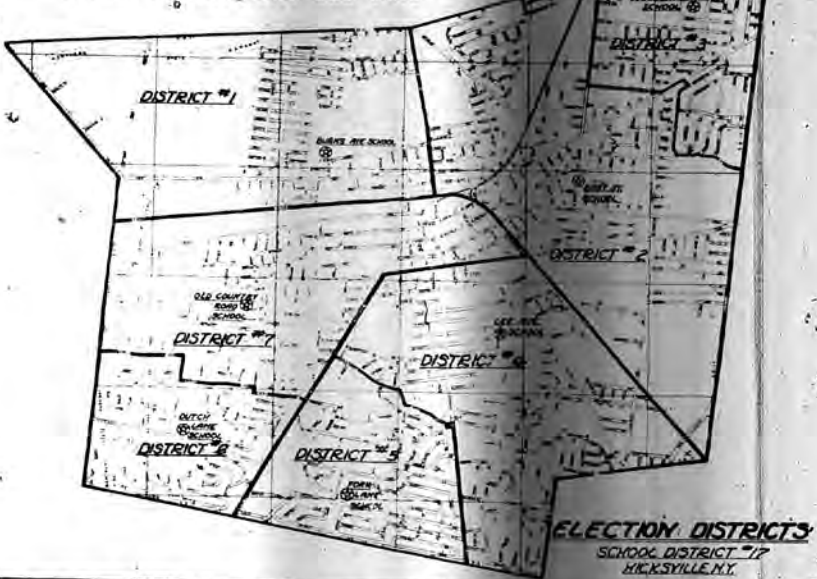

ILCO Share Owner's Meet

Long Island Lighting Company's Chairman of the Board, Errol W. Doebler, addressing the share owner's Annual Meeting held in Hicksville, Tuesday, April 21, reported that revenues for 1958 were just short of \$122 million, "an increase of \$12 million over 1957," he said. "Electric revenue was almost \$93 million, up about 8%; gas revenue was \$29 million, 2% higher than 1957." The Chairman pointed out that "these increases are higher than experienced by most utility companies last year."

"Net income was \$2 million ahead of 1957 and earnings per average share were \$1.62 for 1958 as against \$1.44 for 1957." As "a fair indication of the continued growth of ILCO", Doebler compared the company's income in 1948 of \$2,000,000 with 1958's \$14,700,000. "Expenses were 10.3% higher in 1958 than in 1957, reflecting additional fuel use and somewhat higher fuel and labor costs. The largest increase in expense over last year was again attributable to taxes which increased in greater proportion than the growth in property and equipment. Out of each dollar of 1958 revenue," he continued, "25¢ went to local, state and federal taxes, 17¢ for wages and employee benefits, 44¢ paid for fuel, natural gas charges; depreciation interest and other items, leaving 12¢ for owners of the business, that is, the common and preferred share owners."

Cites Need for Library Improvement

"Over two hundred citizens of Hicksville voiced by opinion their desire to have an extension to the children's library placed on the May 6 ballot," declared Mrs. Elizabeth Scherer, who is running for trustee of the Hicksville Public Library Board. "This request has been ignored by the Library Board, and voted down by the School Board," she contended.

Mrs. Scherer pointed out that when asked for support for the petition the Library Board refused on the ground that it had "made its decision," with regard to this matter. "The truth is," said Mrs.

Scherer, "there is no record of any discussion of a children's extension by the Board; let alone any decision."

The candidate called on the library board to keep the public informed of the needs of the library, and for the public to decide if they are ready to act. This is more important than "wasting hours" on a "continued preoccupation with stones, and how to build do-it-yourself tables for its monthly public meetings."

"Our children, who represent over half of Hicksville's population are the biggest losers," she said. Mrs. Scherer noted that the circulation in the children's library has gone up fifty per cent in the last year, that the young people crowd around a couple of tables in a small room, and that they have just lost the children's librarian. "Although they are sadly in need of more non-fiction books," she stated, "yet, half way through the year, the Board saw fit to reduce children's book purchases to twenty per cent of the remaining book budget."

She reported that seventh and eighth grade books are being brought into the Teen-Age section. "In spite of the fact that these members of the professional staff, on the grounds of inadequate space, extreme difficulties of administration, excessive, unnecessary cost for duplication of books, and lack of trained assistance for the young people."

"Increased space in the children's room," she said, "would promote a much-needed separate section for junior high school students, that in-between of our whose library require loans extend from the sixth grade level up to adult reference sources. The needs of this group have become particularly acute with the adoption of a three-track system in Hicksville schools."

Access to adult material should be through a qualified Youth Liaison (continued on page 16)

brarian who could offer guidance in the choice of books and other study materials."

"If the Board would only delegate the internal administrative authority to its professional staff, like any well-run corporation does," she concluded, "and if it would show respect for their expert opinions and proposals, it would have the time to attend to public interest in bookmobiles and increased children's facilities."

Kops and Villafranca Attack 'Twisted Facts'

School Board candidates Mario Villafranca and Ronald Kops on April 21 accused Trustee Howard Grandjean of taking credit for ed-

ucational advances in Bethpage while actually, he held back educational improvement during his term of office. "Mr. Grandjean certainly has distorted the facts", said Villafranca. "Apparently he can find no way to defend his financial policies and now he is trying to borrow credit for whatever advances in education have taken place in Bethpage during the past year. The truth is that if it were up to Grandjean, we still wouldn't have Village Superintendent Bryan in the District. Grandjean even insisted that Chisholm was good for Bethpage."

Mr. Villafranca was referring to District Superintendent Chisholm who, until last year, controlled the Bethpage School District along with 16 other districts. There was a public clamor to rid the district of Chisholm's influence after a teacher strike and an investigation of the District by the National Education Association. The position

of Village Superintendent finally was created last year and Mr. Charles Bryan took over the district from Mr. Chisholm at the beginning of this year.

Kops recalled that the position of Village Superintendent was approved through the efforts of three new Board members. "Two of those three became trustees when the size of the Board was increased from 5 to 7 members in 1957", Kops remarked. "Grandjean opposed that, of course. As a matter of fact," noted Kops, "Grandjean joined a conspiracy last year to reduce the size of the Board back to five members in order to get rid of Trustee elect Anthony LoFaso. It was pretty odd behavior, foreshadowing claims to have helped our educational standards."

Villafranca and Kops agreed with Grandjean on one point. "The public won't be fooled", they said.
