Close Race for School Candidates, 638 Add Names 1st Registration

Depending upon the number of voters who registered yesterday (Wed) supporters of some candidates for the Hicksville School Board election next Wednesday, May 6, feared a repetition of last year when a narrow margin of five votes decided the elected trustee. While Hicksville has registered more than 6,000 voters upon certain issues, there were only 3,130 on the books as final registration began. The last day figures were not available as the HERALD went to press.

Only 638 took advantage of the opportunity last Saturday to add their names to the list of registered voters during a six hour period. There were 2,494 previously registered from the 1958 election and annual meeting.

Saturday registration was extremely light at Burns Ave. (26) and Fork Lane (37). It was high at Dutch Lane (164) and East St. (137). About 90 registered at each of these three places: Woodland, Lee Ave. and Old Country Rd.

Frank Hester of 15 Colony St., Hicksville, continued as a candidate for all three vacancies. While he told an audience at a candidate's forum at Woodland Ave. School last Thursday that he proposed to "withdraw" from two positions, he declined to do so when the question of his triple nomination was before the Board of Education on Friday night.

While School Attorney Arnold Witte said there were certain technical points which could be raised about the Hester nominations for two seats, the Board of Education voted unanimously to accept all three petitions.

All possibility of Hester withdrawing from any or all nominations expired yesterday when the printed ballots for the May 6th election went to press. The School

Seniors Achieve Highest Score on College Exams

Two senior students of Hicksville High School who took the recent College Board examination received the highest possible scores for the examination. Joseph Pugarelli, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Pugarelli of 28 Burkland Rd., Hicksville, high scored in advanced mathematics, while Catherine Wakefield, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Wakefield of 29 Arbor L.A., Hicksville, scored high in English.

It was noted that quite a few of this year's seniors who took the College Board examinations scored above 700 mark. 800 is a perfect score.

Lutherans Build 7 More Classrooms

During the latter part of 1958 Trinity Lutheran Church of Hicksville, was engaged in a \$400,000.00 Fund Raising Campaign for the expansion of its Parish facilities.

On Feb. 9, ground was broken to construct additions to the present school structure. The new construction will provide seven additional classrooms, a cafeteria and kitchen twice the present size, offices and storage area. Included in the new building is a very large youth room for the purpose of providing adequate space and facilities for their meetings, activities and recreation. This expansion will further pro-

vide for the rearrangement of existing space to be utilized to better advantage for the Parish.

Trinity Hicksville dates back to 1850, at which time a Lutheran Church was organized. The original church was built on a site across from the existing structures on Nicholas St. In 1930 the present church was dedicated and in 1954 the parochial school adjoining the church was built.

The present Pastor, Rev. Edward H. Stammel, was called to Trinity in 1942 at which time the membership numbered approximately 400. Today its has 1700 members.

How Ballot Shapes Up

VOTING MACHINES will look something like the above on Wednesday, May 6th, with the candidates arranged in alphabetic order for each of three vacancies on the Hicksville Board of Education. Frank Hester declined a public opportunity to pick his spot, Friday night, and his name will appear under each of three positions. Last week the Herald published a diagram of how the ballot might look to emphasize the various running mates. Voters will pull down one lever in each column, reading from top to bottom, and LEAVE IT DOWN. Two propositions also appear on the top of the voting machine, one for the school budget and the other for the library budget. There will also be a single column of names under library trustee for 5-year-term. The filed candidates are, as they appear on the ballot, Mary Goodrich, Elizabeth Scherer and James Wise.

Wise Spells Out Plans for Library Board

James F. Wise, candidate for Library Trustee in Hicksville on May 6, has gone on record to have the Library Board Institute and draw up a broad but well-defined field of operations within which our professional library staff can work and under which the Library Director can operate as the executive officer of the Library's day-to-day business. He feels we should consult our professionals and use their training, background and experience when formulating policy and that all decisions should be very carefully studied before being issued to prevent shillyshallying as this indicates a lack of maturity.

Mr. Wise suggests a quarterly or interim report be given verbally by the Trustees on visits to our PTA and civic organizations to keep them informed and to get their ideas on major issues prior to the Board convening to decide on major issues.

As a result of 22 years' association with one of the nation's oldest and largest manufacturing firms as a sales manager, Dept. head and buyer he feels his business background would be useful to the Board and to the taxpayers. In business the candidate has assisted in budget making and in forecasting business trends besides working at arbitration, and compromise to insure harmony and high morale.

Mr. Wise suggests a careful study of Nassau County Library System under which he would not lose any of our autonomy or pass on any of our titles to real property.

This system is said to afford more books for our dollar under central purchasing and books would be delivered, catalogued and ready for issue. We would have unlimited inter-library loans and a better book selection through the use of check lists. It is possible to secure 22 1/2¢ per person through state aid and a yearly grant of \$5000 to the system. If and when a bookmobile is deemed necessary by the taxpayers this is the cheapest method of securing and operating a bookmobile. The Nassau County Library system is not to be confused with any county library federation.

Mrs. Scherer pointed out that people have the right to know exactly where their representatives stand on issues, so that they can be sure they are voting for the person who really shares their interests.

"When mistakes are made by a boards, or any of its members," Mrs. Scherer concluded, "it should not be asking too much to expect the courage to admit the error and take steps to correct it."

Mrs. Scherer will speak at a candidates meeting to be held by the PTA Council on April 29 at the high school, and at a similar meeting on April 30 at the Dutch Lane School PTA.

"James Wise has both the qualifications and the program for providing the Library service need in the community. 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CURRENT COMMENT :

The Election On Wednesday

NEXT WEDNESDAY, May 6, is "election day" in Hicksville School District. As of yesterday (Wed) morning there were only 3,132 persons registered and qualified to vote. Registration places were open yesterday until 11 PM and this issue went to press before that time. It is possible that another couple of thousand people found the time to place themselves on the books.

May 6 is a little different this year than it has been in previous years. This marks the first time that the Library Trustees are to be elected during the 10 hours of voting, instead of toward the tail end of a lengthy annual school meeting. This is also the first time that everyone voting on school trustees will also have the opportunity to vote upon the proposed school district and library budgets. These appear at the top of the voting machine under "propositions", a zone of voting machines all too often ignored by voters in general elections.

First let us comment briefly upon the School Election race. Developments of the past several days with the official filing of nominating petitions, dozens of parlor conferences, plus tons of literature have not changed the basic situation.

We find no difficulty in recommending the re-election of Allen S. Carpenter. We have known Mr. Carpenter for a number of years and have always been proud to recommend him to the community and we have never been sorry for or ashamed of our support. He continues to acquit himself in a most satisfactory manner. In his opponent we find mirrored so many of those characteristics which in past elections made the voter's decision so simple and decisive. Morton Cohen promises to solve everything and adds the pledge to see that you get your money's worth. He says nothing of economy. As a matter of fact, his friends promise a \$10 million dollar school budget in a few years and we can well believe it if he gets the chance.

We also recommend most sincerely the election of Herbert Backman to succeed Robert Eaton. Mr. Eaton during his first term has earned the title of the "Absent Mr. Eaton". At a recent candidate's forum he made the promise that if re-elected he would continue to go home early, regardless of the urgency of the District business to be transacted. Mr. Backman by past performance has proven himself a person who can assume responsibility and do a job. For example under his leadership in charge of membership, the Senior High P-TA membership has never been at the peak it has reached this year.

As for the third vacancy, we announced our candidacy some weeks ago and said we leave it up to you who know us. Nothing has transpired in recent days to change our position.

As for the School Budget, we feel that something must be stated. There is a tide running throughout Long Island which openly urges negative voting on budgets. While we appreciate the spirit behind such agitation, we believe it is futile and fool hardy in the extreme. The people elected to the Board of Education develop the budgets. They are all taxpayers and parents. Responsible Board members are just as keenly aware of the pinch of taxes as you are. Many of the items which comprise the budget are mandated by law, by contract, by policy decisions over the years.

If you sincerely wish to keep taxes at a reasonable level, make certain that the people you elect to various public bodies are as tax-conscious as you are. Defeat of a budget by vote solves nothing. A new budget may eliminate those items which you may hold dear -- for example, student transportation.

I wish to commend James V. Hood for his interest in David Hurwitz's candidacy. He poses several important issues. (Mid - Island Herald, 4/23/59)

When Mr. Hood speaks of the Board as an "impartial group representing all people with no sentimental or personal attachments" and, on that basis, excludes Mr. Hurwitz from consideration of such duty, he automatically relegateth him to second class citizenship.

This meaning should be made clear. I am certain that Mr. Hood would not advocate Business without businessmen or Politics without politicians. Why then Education without educators? For fairly obvious reasons, we must recognize that dedicated schoolmen are the most competent, professional sources of educational information. When Mr. Hood needs to repair his shoes he goes to a shoemaker. When he has a toothache he knows he needs a dentist. However, on the larger issue of education -- the candidacy of school board trustees, he denies the desirability, if not the pressing necessity, of having the most competent assistance possible from the dedicated professional schoolman.

The question which should really concern Mr. Hood is: How important is the welfare of our children to a dedicated schoolman campaigner like Mr. Hurwitz? The best answer, of course, will come from those enlightened people in the community who already see clearly the need for long range effective planning of the educational future of Hicksville. For without the active participation of competent schoolmen in the life - blood of the community, which includes the school board, what kind of educational future is there?

Down With Budgets

To The Editor:

When voting on Hicksville school and library budgets on May 6th the taxpayers will have two choices, either to accept or to reject.

Neither the School Board nor the Library Board has elected to submit the budget in parts, as permitted by law.

On the contrary, in one controversial area, winter recreation, vo-

ted down when last submitted to the taxpayers, the school board flatly refused to submit the matter in separate vote. The estimated cost of winter recreation is \$34,800 plus three or four thousand additional for lighting the schools at night. While recreation is said to be a deterrent to delinquency, the Board is also spending \$4700 for uniformed patrols to prevent vandalism.

The function of the School Board is education not recreation. But for the summer remedial and advanced elementary school programs so highly successful last year the Board is spending \$18,000, and \$23,000 for summer recreation.

Transportation bids actually received are \$16,000 less than the budgeted amount. Why so large an excess? Excess funds last year amounted to \$425,000, more than 10% of the amount collected from the taxpayers.

While excess funds accumulated, the Board went into hock for \$180,000 for State Advances. It proposes to go into hock for \$160,000 additional during the coming year. These amounts will have to be paid back from future budgets. Deducting these amounts make current budgets look good.

On the other hand, the Board included nothing whatever in the budget for remedying hazards in the permanent schools demonstrated by the Chicago parochial school fire. Recommendations to the Board president documented with an analysis of the Chicago fire were not even presented to the Board.

The Library Board again proposes to spend \$2,000 on publicity and programs. Are we due for some more Charlie Chaplin and foreign language films? It also proposes to spend about \$1800 for the New York Times on microfilm - back to 1950 - plus a microfilm reader. And all the while the reference library is woefully inadequate.

The taxpayer can take it or lump it. I will lump it. The budgets take effect only on July 1. Between May 6th and July 1 the Board can submit new budgets, with justification of the amounts and no sales pitch, divided into parts for public acceptance or rejection. Vote NO on the Hicksville School and Library budgets.

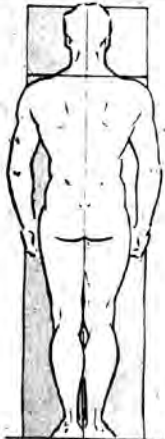

Education Comm Approves Budget

A special sub-committee of the Syosset Education Committee, consisting of Horace Bernstein, Ralph Diamond, Arnold Koplik, and Leon Newman met last Monday night at the Syosset High School with the Board of Education to discuss the proposed School Budget for the year 1959-1960.

The entire budget was discussed step by step as outlined in the information Bulletin that each family has received in the mail. 75% of the budget goes for essentials which regardless of how the vote goes, must be provided for. This includes teachers salaries as well as administration salaries. The largest increase in the budget is for this item. The reason being that teachers salaries have been increased and the teaching staff has been increased from 308 to 353. This in turn, is due to the increase in enrollment of 1000 students, and the new junior High School. Our classes now average 26-27 students in a room. This, the board of Education feels, is the maximum size that a teacher

can handle and still give adequate instructions.

If the budget should, for some reason or other, be defeated on May 6, the only ones who will suffer will be the students. Transportation will have to be curtailed, textbooks, furniture, library books, and school improvements will be done away with.

The voting record of Birchwood for the past two years has been anything but good. We, the Education Committee, are distressed to note the complacency of its residents. Voting on Wednesday May 6th is from 10 in the morning till 9 at night. Plenty of time for every resident of the Syosset section to do its duty not only to the community but to its children and vote "YES" FOR THE BUDGET. An absent voter is like a NO vote. REMEMBER those opposed to the budget will not be complacent.

We cannot emphasize strongly enough the necessity of making it your duty to go to the High School and vote and VOTE "YES" ON THE BUDGET.

Attempts to get information from the Town Board and Town officials have had little success beyond a reply that the downzoning was provided for in the new Comprehensive Zoning Map.

Directors are trying to learn why the action took place, when hearings will be held on gas station permits, and why our representatives have had their inquiries ignored. The Board moved to send a registered letter expressing the indignation of our community to the Town Board and to request a meeting for discussion of the subject.

Lawrence C. Gibbs, 68 Hedgerow Lane, announced his candidacy for the vacancy on the Jericho School Board and requested endorsement from the Board of Directors. The Board voted to endorse Mr. Gibbs. (Editors Note: Mr. Gibbs has since withdrawn his candidacy. See elsewhere in this issue for his statement.)

Study Changes In Sanitation

Due to the requests of most of the homeowners of Birchwood, the Sanitation Sub-committee is trying to have the "rubbish pick-up" day changed from Saturday to Tuesday. Get Out and Vote

We presume that every parent whose child attends school in either the Jericho or Syosset District is aware of the budgets, the school members, the issues to be voted on. Local papers and school bulletins have sent a deluge of vital information into every home and we may vote on the basis of that information in Jericho on May 5, and in Syosset on May 6.

This editorial is devoted to those parents who may have run out of excuses for their complete detachment from these vital school matters. We acknowledge that it is never easy to answer a child's questions. If you should inquire, someday, why his school is a beat up old building, or why 50 kids are crowded into his classroom, or why isn't something done about his miserable school facilities, you may use one or all of the following standard answers:

"What was good enough for me is good enough for you."
"I'm just too darn busy with the lawn."
"Let's not make a federal case out of this."
"Our taxes are high enough already."
"I have a luncheon at the Villa Villa and won't have time to vote."
"None of the candidates are from our block, so why vote?"
"I have to take a golf lesson on election day."
"Too many city people are moving out here."
"Next year, son, I'll check into your school and straighten things out."
"Anybody can work on a school board, so why bother?"
"Things will take care of themselves."

Undoubtedly, there are many more excuses that we may use for our negligence, but why look for them? The simplest remedy is to know our facts and exercise our voting privileges on election day.

Don't fail to vote — wisely — in Jericho on May 5; in Syosset on May 6.

Zoning

The Editorial Board of THE VILLAGER was shocked to learn that the Town Board of the Township of Oyster Bay had adopted the Comprehensive Zoning Plan, part of which provided for the expansion of a small "G" zoned parcel located on the southeast corner of Jericho Turnpike and Merry Lane to a considerably larger "G" zoned parcel. This "G" classification permits the parcel to be used for general business, gas stations, etc.

This action by the Town Board was taken despite the fact that the Birchwood Civic Association at Jericho, representing a community of over 1000 homes, had, on numerous occasions, informed the Board that it was opposed to this down-zoning at the entrance to the community. On October 27, 1958, a letter was sent to the Town Board from the Board of Directors of the Civic Assoc. protesting the provision of the Comprehensive Zoning Plan with regard to this particular parcel, and presenting arguments to substantiate this position. On March 25, 1959, Mr. Charles Heep, Chairman of the Zoning and Town Planning Committee of the Civic Assoc., appeared before the Town Board in person, reiterated the points covered in the letter, and expanded upon them. The following day, Mr. Lawrence C. Gibbs, of the same Committee, sent a letter to Messrs. Burns, Curran, and Zipper of the Town Board, reaffirming this same position on behalf of the residents of the Community.

THE VILLAGER would like to know the reasons why, despite the wishes of a large community, expressed and presented to the Township of Oyster Bay time and again, the Town Board has seen fit to down-zone this parcel at the entrance to Birchwood.

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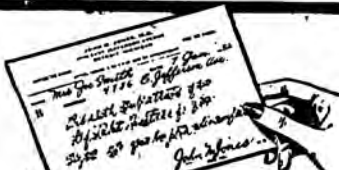

at public expense. A change in board membership is badly needed. The Friends recommend Mr. Wise to all interested in substantial, proper library service" the statement concludes.

Written and Taped Record of Meetings

Robert D.P. Eaton who seeks election to Hicksville School Board has a record of being absent or leaving early from almost 60 per cent of the Board meetings during

the first two years of his term, it is charged by the Voters Committee for Carpenter-Backman and Noeth, based upon a study of minutes of Board meetings on file at Public Library.

"This probably explains why Eaton joins Hurwitz and Cohen in charging 'secrecy' by the Board of Education in its decisions", a spokesman for the Voters Committee declared. "Eaton has been absent so often or left early so frequently that he really doesn't know what's going on. He has also stated that if re-elected, he still plans to leave meetings before they adjourn."

The record shows that from July 1, 1956 to Dec. 31, 1958 there were 138 meetings of the Board. Eaton was absent from 33 entire meetings and left early from 48 or a total of 81 out of 138.

The Committee seeking the reelection of Allen S. Carpenter and the election of Herbert Backman and Fred J. Noeth pointed out that copies of approved minutes of meetings of the School Board are on public file at the Public Library with extra copies available for those who want them. In addition, all regular and special Board meetings are tape-recorded and such recordings may be heard at any reasonable time by any interested resident.

Carpenter, Backman and Noeth have declined a demand of HOPE for abbreviated answers to a questionnaire. In a group statement, they wrote: "We do not believe that these questions can be answered with simple comments. We must confess that our past experience as to the activities of this organization lead us to the conviction that it politically is interested in certain candidates and thus cannot be regarded as truly impartial or non-partisan."

Morton L. Cohen, running with Hurwitz and Eaton, was HOPE president until he filed for the May 6th election. A press release from HOPE emanates from 37 Admiral Lane, the same address as the Campaign Committee for Eaton and his running mates.

Hurwitz Repeats 'Secrecy Charges'

David Hurwitz, candidate for the Hicksville Board of Education, reiterated his charge of "secrecy" against the present school board majority this week. Hurwitz and his two running mates, Robert D. P. Eaton and Morton Cohen, spoke at a meeting in Hurwitz's home Monday night. Around 65 persons attended the meeting, which was one of a series of home meetings being conducted in order to provide platforms for the candidates.

Hurwitz accused the board of failing to inform the public of serious problems in the district, including the projected maximum class size for next year. He also said that the board has not made efforts to let the public know of its plans to place the district's first graders on double sessions next year, and to transport third graders from throughout the district to Nicholas Street School. Hurwitz said that the board plans to transport third graders who would normally attend other schools in the district to Nicholas

Street School. He said that third graders in the Old Country Road School area would be an exception.

Robert Eaton, who is seeking reelection to the board after serving one term, accused Board President Allen Carpenter of failing to bring to the attention of the board a letter advising the board of a safety hazard in some of the district's schools. He referred to a letter sent to Carpenter around two months ago by former board president Emil Szendy, an architect, in which Szendy

said that portions of schools in the district are constructed of "flammable acoustical tile." Eaton said that the board first heard of the letter at the open hearing on the school budget last Friday night. At that time, Szendy raised the question of the letter and Carpenter acknowledged having received it.

Morton Cohen, speaking at the meeting Monday, charged that the board was not acting in the best interests of the district in its failure to reimburse teachers in the district who participate in extra-curricular activities. He charged that the Hicksville School District is one of two on Long Island which does not pay its athletic coaches for their coaching duties. Cohen, referring to a recent piece of literature distributed by the campaign slate of Carpenter, Fred Noeth, and Herbert Backman, in which the Cohen-Eaton-Hurwitz slate was referred to as "eggheads," said, "I would rather be called an egghead by a blockhead than a blockhead by an egghead."

Singer Wins New Honors

Once again Andrew Singer has brought honor to his school, his parents and himself. Last year he won first award in the physics-electronics category at the Nassau Science Congress held at Syosset High School. This year Andrew again won first prize in that division, and then went on to win one of the three grand awards from amongst a group of 11 first prize winners from the various science categories. Andrew and two other boys will be sent to the University of Buffalo to compete for scholarships with other science fair winners from the State of New York. The trip will be completely expense free and is sponsored by the North Nassau Science Teachers Association.

The project entered was an electronic visual analogue - a device that simulates the action of the human eye when hunting for and following a moving object. Andrew, 16, years of age attends Carle Place High School, and is the son of Lillian and Larry Singer of 86 Briar Lane, Jericho.

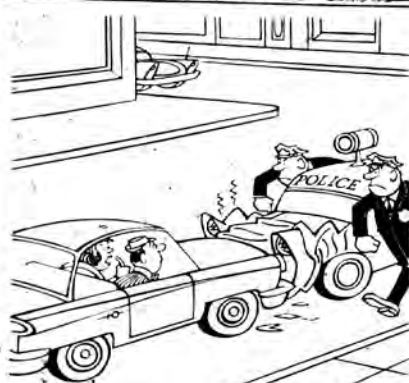
