Another Vote Within Month

Voters of Hicksville School District will probably be going to the polling places in about 30 days. The Board of Education at its regular meeting this Friday night, May 8, is expected to set June 12 as the date for a referendum vote on the proposed purchase of a four-acre school site in the north section of the District.

The quick action on a referendum is being forced by law. The School Administration has recommended the site, which has also been approved by the State Education Dept. of Buildings and Grounds. The present owner has plans to erect 15 or more houses on the tract and has already started a model house. To forestall further development of the site and to permit a public vote on the question, the Board of Education was forced to file legal papers to designate the site. Under this designation, a referendum by the public must take place within a limited period of time.

Louis W. Armstrong of the State Education Dept. has advised Dr. Lamb, superintendent of Hicksville Schools, that the State is prepared to give approval to the site for a k-3 building of about 14 classrooms when a commitments is made by the Town of Oyster Bay permitting the use of an adjacent park area for school recreation purposes.

All persons who registered for 1959-60 when they voted yesterday (Wed.) for school and library trustees are now registered for the June referendum. They received a yellow-colored card. An additional registration will be held prior to the actual voting.

Voters of Hicksville School District in two separate referenda in 1955 (March and November) twice defeated proposals to build an elementary school on the Willet Ave site. Both times the question of site purchase and bond issue for construction was lumped as one issue. The voting next month will be probably be limited to the actual purchase of the four acres, expected not to exceed \$60,000.

The official amount of the purchase planned and other details of the June referendum will be set by Board action tomorrow (Fri) night when the Board of Education meets. Newly elected or re-elected School Board members, resulting from yesterday's balloting, will not take office until July 1.

School Tax Really Drops

The Hicksville School District tax rate, provided the voters approved the budget yesterday (Wed), will actually be less next year. It was disclosed on Tuesday.

The current school tax rate is \$4,822 per \$100 and upon the basis of an unofficial, revised total assessment of \$86,387,768, the rate next year could be \$4,818 or a reduction of four-tenths of a cent per \$100.

The library budget, also on the ballot yesterday, provided for a rate this year of 13.2 cents per \$100 with 16.5 cents per \$100 forecast on the new assessment or an increase of 3.3 cents per \$100. The combined total tax for both library and schools this year is \$4,954 with a forecast of \$4,983 for a net gain of less than three cents (2.9 cents per \$100).

The official tax rate will be set in Aug. 1 when the official total assessment for the district is established by the Nassau County Board of Assessment.

At a time when many districts are exceeding \$6 per \$100 in school taxes, the Hicksville District this year has been able to remain below \$5 per \$100.

Final Concert

The final concert of the fifth season of the L.I. Symphony orchestra took place on Saturday, May 2, at 8:40 PM at the W. Tress Clarke High School, Sarah Drive, East Meadow. The featured work of the evening was the Liszt Piano Concerto No. 1 in E Flat major played by Morton Estrin of Hicksville.

Bethpage Cuts School Budget

The Annual Meeting of the Bethpage School District was opened Tuesday night, May 5. A motion made at the beginning of the meeting provided that the meeting be adjourned at 11:30 PM, and be continued Thursday night (tonight) at 8 PM. The motion also provided that the Budget be voted upon Saturday, May 9, at the Broadway School. Unless a change is made at tonight's meeting, voting on the Budget will take place Saturday from 12 Noon to 10 PM.

The proposed Budget of \$2,186,686 was reduced by \$30,500, Tuesday night when the taxpayers voted to reduce Code 4, Operation of Plant, by that amount. The proposed figure had been \$342,782. The tax rate based on the original figure was forecast at \$5.81 for Schools and 22¢ for Library.

2 More Years on Ford Grant

Continuation of the Ford Foundation program in cooperation with Hicksville Public Schools for the next two years was pledged this week, according to Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, superintendent of schools. Dr. Nelson of the Ford Foundation, following a careful study of the first year's program under a \$300,000 grant, advised Dr. Lamb that the grant has been officially extended "as originally anticipated." The District will receive another \$30,000 in the coming year and \$20,000 in the year 1960-61.

"The continuation of the grant" was based on a favorable report by the committee headed by Dr. Nelson after a study of Hicksville's pilot programs in science and foreign languages. Dr. Nelson told me, "the superintendents reports, 'that the committee was impressed and delighted with what they saw in Hicksville.'"

Spring Concert to Include Premiere Presentations

The Music Dept. of Hicksville High School will present its Annual Spring Concert on Friday, May 15. Featured groups will be the Mixed Chorus and Boys' Glee Club, directed by William Golecke, the Spring Orchestra, conducted by Thomas Butzke, and the Concert Band under the directorship of Charles F. Gouse.

This year the Concert Band will have two guest conductors, and will give two first performances, pro. Tickets are on sale from any chorus, orchestra or band member, at the High School, or at a box office on the evening of the Concert. Donation is 75¢.



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CURRENT COMMENT:

In Defense Of Our Friends

WE HATE TO SEE friends of long standing used or abused. And we have the uncomfortable feeling that some are being so mistreated by certain people for their own selfish ends.

We were in the editor's chair at the Centre Island News for more than 15 years and over the years we sought to make that position one of respect and integrity. We were pleased, during our tenure, to find the paper twice cited by Sigma Delta Chi as the top winner of the New York State Press Assoc community service award. We were further honored when our efforts resulted in winning the silver plaque of the University of Missouri, School of Journalism, in a National Editorial Assoc competition first in the nation for outstanding community service.

In recent months and weeks the continued publication of that medium with its scatter-brain step-child Thursday twin has been one which has made us wonder and gasp.

The views of certain people were glamorized and emphasized while the legitimate news of opposing candidates were either dropped in the round file or rip sawed into items for the personal column.

But by the time you read this the School Election will be over and the results known. The ballot box will have spoken.

We are more gravely concerned with the manner in which other friends are being used in the good honest name of "safety" and "civic effort."

Thomas R. Pynchon, town highway superintendent, saw red when he read in print, a week or so ago, a claim that the paving of Bay Ave was achieved by the so-called "Safety Committee."

The paving contract on Bay Ave had just been let to the low bidder for \$86,000 with completion expected by mid-summer. The preliminary contract had covered the installation of drainage work before the installation of a class A stone base, black top, 4-lane highway including curbs and sidewalks.

In days gone by, such irresponsibility by a newspaper could be ignored because the people of the community knew everyone and everything. Today we have a full-scaue city with many new faces joining us day by day. It used to be that folks subscribed to the local paper to see if the editor heard about the things they knew about.

In today's community, the trust and responsibility of editing and publishing a newspaper is greater than it has ever been. It is the newspaper's duty and obligation to be, as far as humanly possible, sincere and accurate -- and above all, honest.
