Another Election Campaign Scare Issue Bites Dust

Another ghostly scare issue, raised as a last-minute campaign gesture by the Cohen-Eaton and Hurwitz slate in the May 6 school election, was firmly laid to rest this week. Former School Board President Emil J. Szendy, an architect, at the April 24 public discussion of the 1959-60 budget, raised a question about the use of "inflammable materials" in school construction in the district. He wanted to know, at the budget hearing, if the Board had funds in the proposed budget for the "fire - proofing of acoustical tile" in the school corridors of permanent school buildings in the district. He did not name any particular schools.

He claimed he had objected when the buildings were built, regarding the use of the acoustical tile, and the material was used over his protest. He charged the tile is inflammable and was found inflammable in the tragic Chicago school fire recently. He said the problem could be taken care of by (1) application of fire resistant paint or (2) by the enclosure of stairways in two story buildings.

Allen S. Carpenter, president of the School Board who conducted the discussion, assured Szendy that the new budget under maintenance of buildings and grounds included sufficient money to apply the required paint.

Nevertheless, the Cohen-Eaton-Hurwitz campaigners mailed out a day-before-the-election flyer headlined "Fire Hazard" and went on to say: "A former board member has written to the Board about a possible fire hazard. This letter was received by the Board President over two months ago but other Board members were not told about it."

EATON MISSING

Robert D.P. Eaton, who has been re-elected to the Board for another three years, was absent again when the Board held a regular meeting last Friday night. The Board received five-page report dated May 15 from Knappe & Johnson, school architects, giving detailed data on the installation of acoustical tile at the East St. School, Lee Ave. School and Woodland Ave. School, all of which were built by or modernized in recent years while Knappe & Johnson were architects.

The Board of Education with Szendy as a member on April 1, 1953, decided to "adhere to the specifications calling for a fibre-tile attached to the one-half gypsum

Zoning Board to Hear Appeal On Gas Station Permit June 11

The Hicksville Board of Education will appeal the granting of a building permit for a gasoline service station at Broadway and Lee Ave., Hicksville, within 200 feet of Lee Ave. school premises. In an action which seldom comes before the Zoning Board of Appeals, the appeal is scheduled for hearing at Oyster Bay on Thursday night, June 11, at 7:30 PM.

Norman Wolf, Town Building Dept. Manager, issued a permit for the building on May 25, following a pub-

lic hearing before the Zoning Board of Appeals. The School Board, which had originally gone on record opposed the new station in January, instructed Attorney S. Arnold Wolfe on May 8 to take whatever legal steps are necessary to stop the construction.

Notice was served upon the Building Dept. Manager by Wolfe, as instructed, and work on the project has now come to a dead halt. Part of the masonry for the service station has been erected.

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CURRENT COMMENT: Politicking And Safety

NASSAU MOTORISTS' on Memorial Day weekend did themselves proud. While the rest of the nation rolled up a total of more than 300 traffic deaths, exceeding official estimates, Nassau County police recorded none.

In the 64-hour period from 4 PM Friday, May 29 to 8 AM Monday, June 1, Nassau police listed 95 accidents with none dead and 64 injured. Of the injured, 30 were hospitalized.

Nassau County Police Commissioner John M. Beckmann this week thanked the motorists of the county for their cooperation in the drive to cut traffic deaths.

Which goes to prove, it takes the full cooperation and participation of every driver in campaigning for careful and courteous driving.

It also goes to prove, that would-be politicians and aspirants for public office can shout and view-with-alarm all they wish, their baseless tirades will never correct anything.

Hicksville as a community has one of the largest, full-scale traffic hazard elimination programs underway anywhere in the state. The project is elimination of our RR grade crossings. We can only wonder --- since direct questioning has failed to provide the answer --- why the Democrat candidates who speak so lovingly of safety and traffic find it inconvenient to get behind this effort.

It's Your Problem, Too

Our Junior High School Building on Jerusalem Ave in Hicksville was built to accommodate 1900 students. This coming Sept. 1959 we shall have in our 7th, 8th and 9th grades over 2700 pupils.

By using all available areas to 100 percent of efficiency, our administrators tell us that they expect to be able to handle all 2700 pupils in this building next term.

However, the following year when the Junior High enrollment will reach 3185 students (Sept 1960) there must be more rooms available, if we are to operate on single session. We shall need 12 of the temporary classrooms at the Junior High School location not later than one year from this September. With these 12 temporary classroom units located at the Junior High School we can operate the school on single session with a class size of approximately 33 pupils per room.

But in Sept. 1960 we shall also be faced with our largest elementary school enrollments. Sept 1960 will see 8600 pupils in our grade schools and unless we can find more room for them, we cannot move the necessary 12 temporary classrooms from their present elementary locations.

If, however, we can have a 14 - room elementary school ready for occupancy on the Willet Ave site by Sept 1960, we will be in a position to move 12 temporary classroom units to the Junior High School in time. As the peak enrollment drops off in the elementary grades (the peak year is forecast as 1960), we shall be able to move more and more of the moveable units to the Junior and Senior High School sites.

Permanent rooms cost approximately \$45,000 each to build. Eventually (before the Peak Enrollment is passed) we shall need 21 rooms at the Senior High School and 29 rooms at the Junior High School. To build permanent rooms would cost (50 x \$45,000) approximately \$2,225,000. We have the needed 50 rooms, all we need to do is to move them to where they are needed. It cost us approximately \$17,000 each to where they are needed. It cost us approximately \$17,000 apiece to build the temporary - type classrooms. Every dollar less than \$17,000 each that it costs to move them will be that many dollars saved. But before we can move the temporaries we need 14 more permanent elementary classrooms.

The referendum for the purchase of the Willet Ave School Site will be held on Friday, June 12th. Your chance to express your opinion, THE RULING OPINION, is at that time. This decision is important for it will direct all School Board action thereafter.

6 Week Summer Recreation Starts June 29

With the close of schools for summer vacation two weeks away. Some plans for the summer recreation and playground program in Hicksville were disclosed today by Joseph F. Madden, director of recreation in Hicksville Schools.

A six-week program will start on Monday morning, June 29, with specific details promised for release later.

The regular activities will include the morning playgrounds and the evening centers. The special features being inaugurated this summer are the Junior Theater, daily trips, teen theater, tennis instruction, bowling and others. The teen and junior theater will register boys and girls who would like to be a part of a complete theatrical production.

Some seventh and eighth grade

The Board of Education at its regular meeting last Friday night approved the employment of 38 directors, group leaders and arts and crafts directors at salaries from \$600 to \$2000 for the season, plus 44 student and trip leaders at \$108 each and four substitutes at \$9 per session.

Presenting the list Madden told the Board the persons recommended are all either residents and/or teachers in Hicksville School District.

Thomas A. Burke, former president of Northeast Civic Assoc., called for defeat of the proposition on June 12 which seeks the expenditure of not more than \$72,750 for the purchase of a new school site. He said he was not prepared to challenge the need for additional classrooms, but thought such needed rooms should be placed on existing school sites such as Woodland Ave.

The opposite viewpoint was voiced by several speakers including Robert Sklarz who wondered if the Board of Education was doing enough to accommodate anticipated enrollments.

There was some discussion regarding proposed parochial and private school construction in the area, the McCormick Report and long range projections, and recently published comments of Board President Allen S. Carpenter appearing in the HERALD and other newspapers.

The meeting opened at 8:30 PM with less than 10 in the audience of the 800-seat high school auditorium. By the time the meeting ended at 10 PM the total had increased slowly to about 30.

All Board of Education members were present except Arthur L. Ehrlich. School Attorney Arnold Witte was ill and could not attend.

Less than 4,000 persons are registered and qualified to vote in the June 12th referendum, as of yesterday. A final registration day was held yesterday (Wed.) concluding at 11 PM.

The Hicksville Organization for Public Education, through a press release this week, announced its support of the proposition. The HOPE comment follows:

"The Hicksville Organization for Public Education after studying the available information on the site and its proposed uses, announces its support of the proposition, which is a much delayed necessary action on the part of the Board. The Willet Ave. site appears to be one of the last available sites, and while a small school will not solve the overcrowding and double sessions

which are forthcoming throughout the district, it will alleviate the situation somewhat. Therefore, while recognizing that this is a minimal effort compared to the magnitude of the problem, HOPE nevertheless strongly urges the Hicksville voters to vote 'YES' on the proposition."

The proposed construction of a school at Willet Ave. was twice rejected by the voters in 1955 when referenda were held in March and again in November. These proposals included construction of a building. The June 12th vote is for land only. A bond issue on construction will follow if the site purchase is approved.

board backing." The minutes of the meeting, the School Administration noted, fails to indicate individual action by anyone opposed.

The architects also quoted from the American Institute of Architects newsletter of May 4, which stated that "basic guide-lines (are being set up) to protect the public against needless demands and forestall unnecessary requirement, as the Chicago fire has resulted in many local officials 'leaning over backwards and imposing unreasonable and frequently excessive requirements which radically affect the design and costs of school buildings!'"

Questioned by David Hurwitz, Board member-elect, at the April 24 discussion about "fire hazards, Stendy declared the use of combustible tile is a source of rapid flame spread, although he admitted it has been used "extensively" all over the country.
