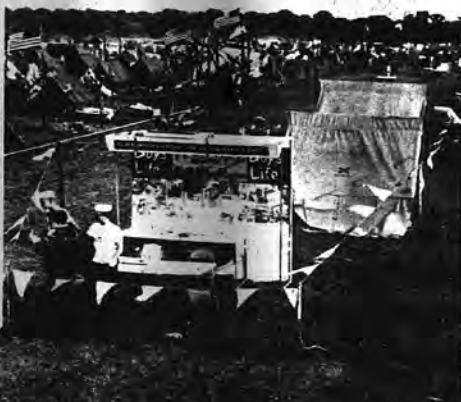

### Install Two Judges Here June 16

Formal public ceremonies to which everyone is invited to attend will be held at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, June 16, in the historic Hicksville Courthouse at Heitz Pl. and Bay Ave., for the installation of two new local District Court Judges.

To be publicly installed in office are Francis Donovan of Duffy Ave., Hicksville, formerly Deputy County Attorney, and Benjamin Zipper of Syosset, formerly Town Councilman. Thomas P. Farley, president of the District Court, will personally conduct the installation. Groups in

Hicksville, Syosset and other communities are planning special presentations of robes, gavels and other gifts to the new judges. Rt. Rev. Msgr. George M. Blizman, V.F., pastor of St. Ignatius R.C. Church in Hicksville, is also scheduled to take part in the ceremony.

### One Week Until School Summer Recess Starts

Six of the seven public and parochial schools in the Mid Island area will close their doors for the summer recess on Friday, June 19. Jericho closes on Monday, June 22.

Schools will reopen on three different dates in the fall. Bethpage public will reopen on Sept. 8; Hicksville Public Trinity Lutheran; St. Martin of Tours in Bethpage and Jericho Public on Sept. 9; Plainview and St. Ignatius, tentatively on Sept. 10.

Trinity Lutheran School in Hicksville will hold the earliest graduation, this Sunday, June 14. Baccalaureate Services will be held at 9:45 a.m. Kindergarten graduation will take place at 3:30 p.m. and eighth grade at 7:30 p.m.

St. Ignatius School in Hicksville will hold their graduation on Saturday, June 20, following the 8:15 a.m. Mass and benediction.

### GOP to Meet Friday Night

Louis Rappstatter will officiate at his first meeting as president of the Hicksville Republican Club at 8:30 p.m. Friday (June 12) at the Masonic Temple. The program will feature a movie entitled, "Knock on Every Door." The public is invited.

On Sunday, June 21, Bethpage and Hicksville High Schools will hold their graduation exercises and Plainview will hold theirs at the Syosset High School on Monday, June 22. Every year there are three awards presented to Trinity Lutheran graduates with the highest scholastic standings: the Paul Jud Memorial Award to the boy intending to become a minister who has the highest average, and two Parent-Teacher-Friends Assoc. Awards to the students having the highest average. This year David Susan of Hicksville won both the P-TFA award and one of the P-TFA awards. The other P-TFA award went to Vincent Carretta of Bethpage. David intends to continue his studies at the Concordia College Institute in Bronxville and Vincent intends to enroll at Bethpage High School.

### Lamb Urges School Site Approval

A shade over 4,000 persons are registered and qualified to vote on Friday, June 12, between 12 noon and 10 PM upon a proposition to purchase an elementary school site in the north section of Hicksville School District.

A total of 770 persons added their names on two registration days with a grand total of almost 900 enrolled at the East St. School, the voting district which embraces the Willett Ave. school site. Almost 350 names were added on the reg-

istration days at East St. alone.

School Superintendent Wallace E. Lamb said today he regards the Willett Ave. site vote as of tremendous importance. He points out that this is the last opportunity to obtain this site. He declares that site approval would prevent hundreds of boys and girls from being on double sessions or in very large classes. He repeats that this referendum is the key to the educational future of Hicksville.

He states that a school on the

Willett Avenue site will benefit not only the Willett Avenue neighborhood but also all other parts of the School District and feels that a favorable vote on the site is a necessity for good education in Hicksville, not a luxury. He appeals to parents and taxpayers to vote yes on Friday, June 12.

The Hicksville Board of Education will hold a regular meeting tomorrow (Fri) night in the High

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## CURRENT COMMENT:

# Your Vote This Friday

WE RESPECTFULLY urge all 4,000 persons who are registered and thus fully qualified to vote tomorrow (Fri) between 12 noon and 10 PM to vote in the referendum on the proposed purchase of a four-acre school site. We believe you will want to vote in favor of this proposition for the very simple reason that failure to approve at this time may mean the loss of an urgently needed parcel of land.

A developer is poised and ready to put up houses on the land. In fact, he has started a model house and has been halted by legal action pending the outcome of the referendum this Friday.

The land is in the precise location where Hicksville needs another elementary school. This referendum does not involve the construction of the building. The question before the voters this time is just on the purchase of the property.

The parcel is small but thanks to a working arrangement with the Town of Oyster Bay, the school district will have the use of an adjacent section developed for park-recreation purposes. The dual use of the property had led the State Education Dept to say, it's okay for a school site.

The eventual construction of a school on this location will speed the day that we can dispense with the use of Nicholas St building for a school.

There can be no serious quarrel with this proposition to buy the Willet Ave site. We are running out of open space in the right locations for such purposes as schools. This may well be one of our last opportunities in this area. Failure to act now will only cost a great deal more in the future, either in condemnation and clearing of a site or in the purchase of a less desirable location which will provide us with a perpetual transportation cost factor.

Voting should be rapid. There is only a single question to be answered. We hope your answer will be "yes".

## It's Your Problem, Too

Two things are gratifying on the eve of our School Referendum on Friday, June 12. ONE is that extended publicity has been given to our economy building program. Over 30 separate articles have been presented in the MID ISLAND HERALD, the LI Press, Newsday and other local papers. A four-page explanation of the need and desirability of securing this additional school site (in the north central section of our community) was sent to all Hicksville residents by the School Board. The SECOND thing that is gratifying is that the registration, which we have come to expect to be small, was relatively large. Some 770 people registered ESPECIALLY TO VOTE ON THIS ISSUE. Together with the 3,148 people already eligible to vote (out of our 45,000 population), 4,118 people are in a position to decide the future of our School District's Education Direction.

A CRUCIAL VOTE because upon its result will depend the future of all school board members.

PROPOSITION FAILS, the Board will make its plans to educate the children of Hicksville in the buildings and facilities now available. This can be done. But it will involve double sessions for the next six to ten years.

PROPOSITION PASSES BY A SLIM VOTE of approval, we will have a present economy program, calculated to provide for all junior and senior high classes and double sessions for the next three to five years. For a limited number of years, the Board might very well revise its estimate of the needs of its children. If this happens I shall be glad to support our expansion program. As matters now stand, the "economy program" is the only one.

Registration is part of the economy program --- your vote and needed. The recent school board election, without the proper tools, on the School Board, the reasonable men who will shoulder their part of the burden.

Return to the Board a man who acknowledges no duties of his office, my faith in the true outcome is, to say the least, shaken.

### AGAINST PROPOSITION

To the Editor:

The Hicksville School Board, in releasing information relative to a referendum on June 12 to authorize purchase of land at a cost of \$72,750 for a future 14 - room school, has either withheld information regarding pending parochial school construction in the District or neglected to inform itself regarding such construction.

Parochial schools under construction or about to be constructed will provide from 39 to 43 additional classrooms right in Hicksville. If only one - third of these classrooms are utilized by pupils who would otherwise go to the Hicksville public schools, the need for an additional 14 - room school will no longer exist.

Currently under construction is a 7-room addition to Trinity Lutheran Parochial School. It should be ready for use in September 1959. Out for bids is a 24 - room school for the Holy Family R.C. Parish. It is expected to be ready in September 1960. Being planned is an addition of from 8 to 12 classrooms to the parochial school of St. Ignace R.C. Church, also for use in September 1960. In addition, the Roman Catholic Parish of Our Lady of Mercy on the eastern boundary of Hicksville expects to build a school the size and character of which is as yet undetermined.

These imminent valuable additions to school facilities in Hicksville have seemingly been disregarded by the School Board in setting up the referendum on June 12th. EDWARD J. SZENDY

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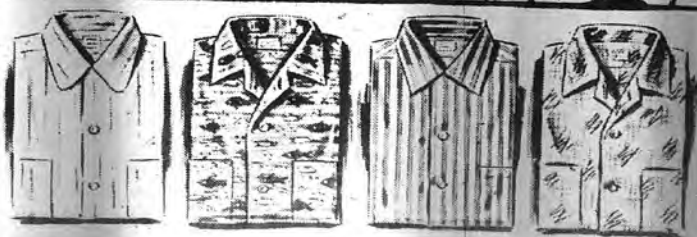

## Gas Station Fight Is On

On Thursday evening, June 4, at the George A. Jackson School, the first 1959 general meeting of the Birchwood Civic Assoc. at Jericho took place.

Heading the list of important business on the agenda was an issue with which this community is not unfamiliar; a gas station and zoning issue. The parcel of land at the Merry Lane and Jericho Tpke. entrance has been down-zoned by the Town Board in Oyster Bay. In the face of strenuous objections from this Civic Board of Directors. The change from F to G on this corner property makes it possible for a gasoline station to be located there.

As explained by Ralph Diamond, Pres. of the Civic Assoc., application for a special use permit has already been filed by Mr. Kaye attorney for Mr. Hoffman. If granted, this entrance corner of Birchwood will have a service station with two curb cuts on Merry Lane, enabling cars and trucks to enter and leave the station on Merry Lane. The property in question is adjacent (up to the fence) to the Merry Lane Park, where plans have already been completed for a skating rink and other recreational facilities for children of all ages.

Since it appears the Town Board has seen fit to disregard their wishes; and after several meetings with Mr. Kaye and Hoffman; the Board of Directors of the Civic Assoc. has decided to fight the gas station and the down-zoning with every possible means.

The following plan of action has been drawn up by the Board of Directors to keep the station out, and to attempt to get the Town

Furthermore, many of us have forgotten that, included in the 1959 Town Tax Bill is the new tax for garbage collection.

In order to assist the resident to compute his own 1959 tax payments, the following formula is printed:

### TOTAL 1959 TAX

\*Total combined 1959 School and Town Tax per \$100.00 of assessed valuation: Jericho School District \$7.253, Syosset School District \$8.185

The Town Tax always covers the calendar year from January 1 to December 31, however, the School Tax is levied on the basis of the calendar year ending June 30, and is payable in three installments: one on or before June 30, one on or before September 30, and one on or before December 31. ## Gas Station Fight Is On

On Thursday evening, June 4, at the George A. Jackson School, the first 1959 general meeting of the Birchwood Civic Assoc. at Jericho took place.

Heading the list of important business on the agenda was an issue with which this community is not unfamiliar; a gas station and down-zoning issue. The parcel of land at the Merry Lane and Jericho Turnpike entrance has been down-zoned by the Town Board in Oyster Bay. In the face of strenuous objections from this Civic Board of Directors. The change from F to G on this corner property makes it possible for a gasoline station to be located there.

As explained by Ralph Diamond, Pres. of the Civic Assoc., application for a special use permit has already been filed by Mr. Kaye attorney for Mr. Hoffman. If granted, this entrance corner of Birchwood will have a service station with two curb cuts on Merry Lane, enabling cars and trucks to enter and leave the station on Merry Lane. The property in question is adjacent (up to the fence) to the Merry Lane Park, where plans have already been completed for a skating rink and other recreational facilities for children of all ages.

Since it appears the Town Board has seen fit to disregard their wishes; and after several meetings with Mr. Kaye and Hoffman; the Board of Directors of the Civic Assoc. has decided to fight the gas station and the down-zoning with every possible means.

The following plan of action has been drawn up by the Board of Directors to keep the station out, and to attempt to get the Town

## More Facts About Taxes

All of our residents were aware of the fact that recently our School Taxes have increased. However, many of our residents are not aware of the fact that our Town Tax has been increased. Furthermore, many of us have forgotten that, included in the 1959 Town Tax Bill is the new tax for garbage collection.

In order to assist the resident to compute his own 1959 tax payments, the following formula is printed:

ASSESSMENT \$  
 \*COMBINED TAX X-----

### TOTAL 1959 TAX

\$ Total combined 1959 School and Town Tax per \$100.00 of assessed valuation: Jericho School District \$7.253, Syosset School District \$8.185.

The Town Tax always covers the calendar year from January 1 to December 31. However, the School Tax covers the period July 1 of one year to June 30 of the following year. In order to arrive at the correct 1959 calendar year School Tax, an average was worked out by dividing the amount of the 1958 tax by 6 months (July 1, 1958 to June 30, 1959) at the new increased school rates. The full impact of the increased school tax will be felt in 1960.

1. War Chest - which means that the residents will have to raise money to defray legal expenses, in the event the Town Board denies petitions.
2. Post Cards will be distributed.
3. Publicity in all newspapers.
4. Two Petitions - (A) For upzoning (B). To deny application for gas station.
5. Legal Petition to Town Board to up-zone.
