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School District Downtown Office Opens Next Tuesday

Transportation, census and attendance offices of Hicksville School District expect to be conducting business at the corner of Broadway and Marie St., Hicksville, in the former Hutmier building, on or about next Tuesday, July 1, it was learned today. Other school offices will move into the former store during the weeks to follow. The School Board has rented the building for a year to free classroom space in various district buildings which up to now have been occupied by various administrative staffs.

Newly arrived students in the District will have the opportunity to register for the fall term at the downtown office during the summer months. Until recently the store was occupied temporarily by All-State Insurance while its new building was being erected in Melville.

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CURRENT COMMENT :

A New Year
For School Bd.

THIS FRIDAY night marks the last regular session of the current fiscal year for Hicksville Board of Education. Four days later Arthur L. Eirich will come to the end of his second three-year term on the Board and as July 1st David Hurwitt will be a member.

The Board will hold its reorganization meeting, as set by law, on Tuesday night, July 7.

Because there are several urgent legal matters confronting the District, including the start of condemnation of the Willet Ave site—the purchase of which has been approved by the voters—the Board may act this Friday night on designation of an attorney. S. Arnold Witte has resigned, effective next Monday, June 29.

We personally are sorry to see the District lose the services of Mr. Witte. In our official capacity as District Clerk, we have had many occasions to work closely with Mr. Witte on various district matters for almost two years. It has been a real pleasure to work with him and even the most involved matters have been accomplished without fuss and feathers.

A full dozen applications for the position of School Attorney have been filed with the Superintendent of Schools, as requested by the School Board, and interviews with applicants were scheduled for last night.

All the applicants are residents of our community and we can appreciate the problem facing the Board in making a selection. However, the abundance of applications speaks well for the progress which has been made in achieving stability and harmony in our school affairs. There was a time, not so very long ago, when certain members of the legal profession made it plain they wouldn't touch the job "with a ten foot pole".

During the recent School Board election campaign, incumbent member Robert D. P. Eaton answered criticism of his record of absenteeism and practice of leaving meetings before midnight by promising, if re-elected, to keep right on leaving around 11:30 PM. He stated that he had read somewhere that School Board meetings should end in 2 1/2 hours.

There have been three regular meetings since the School Elections which saw Mr. Eaton returned to the Board for another three years by the voters. One meeting he did not attend. At the other two, since the election, his move to depart before 12 o'clock led to the prompt adjournment of the meeting by the other members. A voting majority feels that if the people re-elected Mr. Eaton on his promise to go home early, there is no good reason for the rest of them staying around after he leaves.

The following graduation remarks were made at the 5:30 Junior High School graduation ceremony in behalf of the School Board.

Your parents and other citizens in our community spend in the neighborhood of nine million dollars each year to operate the public schools of Hicksville.

They do this so that our schools and your teachers can in twelve short years make available to each of you the basic knowledge that it took all mankind hundreds of thousands of years to accumulate.

By now you are old enough and I hope wise enough to realize that all that can be done in these 12 short years is to touch the high spots, to point out in passing the hidden depths of knowledge already explored. And to show in fleeting glimpses the vast areas yet unknown and unexplored by mankind.

Not so many hundreds of years ago, each group of people had to find out for themselves things that other groups had known for years. People in different parts of the world lived in altogether different ages of civilization. This was because of the lack of communication, and because accumulated knowledge was not commonly available to all men.

Even today with communication by radio, television, trains, airplanes, so wonderfully advanced, these vast parts of our world still cut off from civilization. The difference in standards of living, some good and some bad, can be traced directly to education or the lack of it.

We are not here on this earth to serve only ourselves. Each of us has an obligation to the family we are born into, we leave our obligation to our school, and our community. The obligation is to make the most of our own individual opportunities.

It is said that only one or two of each thousand of all men and women leave the ability and the inclination to add something new to the sum-total of mankind's knowledge.

These few are the ones to whom we give our civilization, without them we would be living still like savages back in the stone age.

Some few of you will be able, because of your ability and determination, to bless and make better the lives of millions of people. To do this you must pursue all the opportunities that are available. You must offer, then go on until by work and study you have reached the very edge of man's knowledge and then build on and beyond. The few of you who will do this will be remembered and honored by all mankind.

What's in store for the rest of us? None of us, even if we become senators or governors of our states, cannot serve mankind in as striking a manner as the scientist who will produce the control of Cancer, or the man who "licked" Polio.

But the rest of us leave the opportunity and the obligation to be the workers, the men and women who will use the knowledge and genius of the inventor, the scientist, and the philosopher, to supply the wants and the needs of mankind.

We must be the business men, the bankers, the lawyers, the doctors, the teachers, without whom there can be no genius; without whom we could not utilize the knowledge of mankind.

We must operate the airplanes, the steamship companies; we must produce the food, the clothing, the cars and the trucks, that keep the wheels of the world going around.

The World is an interesting place, and it's all yours. Someday there won't be any one here but you and yours of your generation. It will be your job to raise the children, support the schools, teach, administer and finance the world's operation.

You are not ready yet - we will call on you three more years of educational opportunity.

Your parents, your teachers, your School Board want you to use the three short years remaining here in the Hicksville Schools to the best advantage. So that you will develop your own special abilities, so that you will be prepared to fill an important place in this interesting world of ours.

First Temple Rising in Historic Jericho

This Sunday June 28, at 11 AM, groundbreaking ceremonies for the erection of the Jericho Jewish Center's new Temple will take place. This new building will rise on the three and one half acre site that this congregation recently purchased. It is located on the West side of Broadway, between Jericho Turnpike and Northern State Parkway, adjoining the new Fire House.

This occasion marks the first time in the recent history of Jericho that a religious institution has been constructed here.

In view of the historical significance that is attached to this occasion, a vast array of prominent speakers and dignitaries will be present at the groundbreaking ceremonies.

The architects, Keith I. HIBNER Associates, of Hicksville and New York City, have recently con-

cluded the final working drawings for this new edifice. The first stage of construction will provide a building size of 120' x 120', which will be a steel framed brick and curtain wall structure, affording approximately 14,440 square feet of column free interior space. A seating area for 960 people, which includes the combined seating of sanctuary and social hall, is expected to fill the religious and social needs of the congregation. The initial stage of the building will contain six classrooms each seating 28 pupils, with folding partitions that will also provide three oversized meeting rooms.

The outside structural appearance will embrace all the fine concepts of contemporary architecture, with emphasis on decorative materials to provide richness in color and texture, and lend warmth and dignity befitting the religious nature of this Center.

Birchwood Unites to Stop Garage

In a display of unity not often seen in a community the residents of Birchwood are pitching in to stop the erection of a gas station at the Merry Lane Entrance to Birchwood Park. The campaign of the Birchwood Civic Assoc. has picked up momentum all through the area. Opinions are almost unanimous that, in this community, which is one of the most beautiful on Long Island, the proposed gas station, with its curb cuts, on one of our streets, leave much to be desired. Furthermore, the owner of the proposed station, has given no indication of what he intends to do with the rest of the property, and fears are growing that the station may be joined by a used car lot, an ice cream stand or any one of many more eyesores.

Plans that too many homes have already been afflicted upon them. Post cards are also being mailed into the Oyster Bay Town Board. In addition to its unsightliness, it is said the gas station will further degrade the area by:

1. Diesel trucks on our streets.
2. Traffic backed up at our entrance.
3. Glaring lights.
4. Fumes from the station blasting children in the playground directly behind the area.
5. A general lowering of real estate values.

The Civic Assoc. urges the residents to "let the present owner of the Jericho Garage know they intend to fight."

POSTERS PREPARED

Posters showing an artist's conception of what the entrance to Birchwood Park could look like if the erection of the gas station is stopped, are being prepared for circulation throughout the area. The feeling of helplessness and pessimism which prevailed when the fight started, has given way to one of cautious optimism and the feeling that "BIRCHWOOD can do it."

Residents To Patrol Streets

The Board of Directors discussed the growing problem of drug races being run on the streets of our community. These seem to be involving our own teen agers, who have been timing each others cars in speedy trips around certain of Birchwood streets. The Board moved to have a committee call on the parents of any young driver whose car is seen in a drug race. The Board also moved to form a committee of residents who will patrol our streets in an attempt to stop this growing menace. Several members of the Board immediately volunteered their services.

Ralph Diamond, President of the Civic Assoc., reported on the letters that he had sent to Supervisor John Burns and Town Clerk Henry Curran, June 10. These letters requested the opportunity to discuss the problem of down-zoning, and also asked for the time and date of the hearing on Mr. Hoffman's application for a permit to sink gas tanks at Jericho Turnpike and Merry Lane. The letter to Mrs. Burns was not answered (as of June 16). The letter to Mr. Curran brought the reply that no hearing date had been set, and that Mr. Diamond would be advised.

The Board discussed the problem of those residents on Hazelwood Drive whose properties adjoin the shopping center. Highly piled dirt and refuse on the shopping center side of the boundary fence has been leading to large run-offs of rain through residential property. Mr. Diamond reported that Messrs. Sosnow and Schwartz have promised to remove all dirt piles, to grade and clean the shopping area, and to put up a retaining wall by July 1. In addition, they will repair all the damage to the affected properties.

A motion was passed to request from the owner of the Shell gas station that he cease and desist from throwing empty oil and gas cans on the property of residents of Hazelwood Drive.

Larry Singer reported that the Jericho Players showed a profit of \$95.79 on the production of Wizard of Oz. He requested an appropriation for the Players in view of the productions being planned for fall showing. The Players are

planning also to develop a workshop and acting course. They are actively engaged in the selection and casting of new plays and are considering hiring professional directors rather than using residential talent. Mr. Singer requested that the Board plan to acquire use of the Jericho High School Auditorium (when completed) in the same fashion that the Syosset High School is used for residents of that school district.

Dr. Martin Lawrence has been named head of the newly formed Gas Station Committee which is now creating a program. The committee has distributed the first of a series of protest circulars. It will prepare post cards for mailing to the Town Board, and petitions. These will be distributed by Block Captains. In addition, posters will be procured, and details will be (Continued on Page Ten)

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Latest Local Menace. DRAG RACES

Between the hours of 7 and 9 PM Birchwoodites have been exposed to a motorized menace which if permitted to continue could easily lead to fatal injury and considerable property damage.

A number of local teenage drivers have been observed by residents to conduct what is known as "drag races" right in the middle of our Community. Witnesses have told the writer of such instances occurring at Merry Lane, Forest Drive and Forsythia Lane. Usually one youngster is stationed at a particular corner with a stop watch in hand, while others in their automobiles race around a block against time. Reliable informants claim that these cars attain a rate of speed in excess of 50 MPH from a standing start within but 100-200 feet.

Residents have called for assistance on Nassau County Police but of course by the time a patrol car arrives, these motorized delinquents have disappeared. Due to the excessive speed of their vehicles, it is difficult for anyone to obtain license plate numbers. One youngster when cornered, dared a resident to have him arrested stating that he had plenty of bail money on him.

The Birchwood Civic Assn. Board of Directors at its meeting held June 16, took up this matter and immediately set up a special committee, headed by Dr. Walter Sugarman, Chairman of its Public Safety Committee to deal with this menace. Dr. Sugarman as of this date advised that local volunteers patrols have been organized and private automobiles, driven by members of the Civics Board of Directors are patrolling all of Birchwood in order to record the license plate numbers of any violators.

This writer on June 17th interviewed Inspector Looney of the Nassau County Police who promised Birchwood residents maximum cooperation in this as well as other traffic hazards. Inspector Looney advised us that two patrol cars of the 2nd Precinct Nassau County

Police are spending a great deal of time in Birchwood apprehending traffic violators. In fact, a great number of traffic summonses have been headed out and usually a patrol car will be stationed at a critical spot for perhaps one week to ten days apprehending traffic violators until a particular situation in that location has been alleviated.

Inspector Looney urged us to turn over to the 2nd Precinct the license numbers of automobiles engaged in drag races and similar excessive speeding activities. The police will then take appropriate action which might result in the eventual revocation of driver's licenses.

We urge all Birchwood residents to be on the alert and note down such numbers and phone same in to Dr. Sugarman together with their own names and addresses so that a proper complaint can be filed with Nassau County Police. Unfortunately these teenage motorists seem to be members of our own community and it is for this reason that despite of very fine police cooperation we must act ourselves to help solve our own problems.

One more word to all Birchwood drivers and those who touch our homes by car, sudden wagon or truck to service our homes, make deliveries or solicit our business. This is a young community with many children. Our speed limit here is 30 MPH. By driving carefully and within our speed limits, by observing STOP signs and by adhering to common courtesy and sensible rules of the road, you may very well avoid causing injury, death or disaster. One minute saved may mean one life lost. Please, let's live to enjoy our beautiful homes, take it easy and drive carefully.

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Way Clear For Lutheran High School

The Lutheran High School Assoc. of Nassau-Suffolk announces that an agreement had been reached with the Board of Zoning Appeals of the Village of Brookville for the establishment of a Lutheran High School on the 31 acre estate of the late Elizabeth Rutherford.

A stipulation was filed Tuesday

with the Supreme Court of Nassau County discontinuing proceedings the Assoc. had previously commenced against the Board of Zoning Appeals of Brookville. The Assoc. had been denied a variance to use the Rutherford property which was purchased Jan. 5, 1959 for a high school.

The Rev. Edward H. Stammel, secretary of the Board of Directors of the 3200 member Lutheran High School Assoc. and pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church in Hicksville, said that he was "most gratified" at the agreement with the Village of Brookville. He further stated "this action strengthens the hope of the Board of Directors of the Assoc. to meet its goal of opening the doors of the Lutheran High School by Sept 1st, 1960. Success depends on the continued support of all those who are interested in a Christ-centered secondary education."

The high school is the immediate project of the Lutheran High School Assoc. whose aim is to establish several strategically located secondary schools in both Nassau and Suffolk. Membership in the Assoc. is open to any interested person. Further information about the Association may be obtained by writing to the Assoc. at Brookville and Frutledge Roads, Brookville, L.I., N.Y., or calling Mayfair 6-1580 (in Brookville).

The agreement provided for mutually acceptable safeguards to protect the property in harmony with the community environment.

The Assoc. had initiated legal proceedings against the Board of Zoning Appeals of the Village of Brookville, under Article 78 of the Civil Practice Act, to reverse its decision. The Court of Appeals of the State of New York, the highest court in the State, had determined in the past that such schools cannot be arbitrarily excluded from a community.

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Offers 10-Point Chamber Program

Hicksville Chamber of Commerce under the leadership of its new president, Aaron Rochman, is today embarked upon a "10-point program" with a plea from the President that "we all get together as a team for a bigger and better Hicksville." The Chamber at an open meeting last Friday saw the designation of a committee to look into a "promotional program" for the fall, probably a second edition of Hicksville Festival Days. The committee including William Nelson, Jules Mirel, Lawrence McCaffrey, Julius Schwartz and Patrick Caputo, is scheduled to make a report at the next meeting on Friday, July 10.

Point 1. BUILD UP OF CHAMBER MEMBERSHIP. It is deemed essential to have wider membership coverage in order to carry out the program proposed for the coming year. As Chairman of the Membership Committee, I have selected a man who has both the experience and the capacity to do the job that is necessary. That man is William E. Koutensky.

Point 2. ZONING AND PLANNING. This is an essential program for a fast growing Hicksville. Planning should be well ahead of actual development, so as to make for better coordination. As Chairman of this Committee, I have selected a man who has served in various capacities in relation to planning, both for the Town and the County. He, therefore, has invaluable experience which could be made available to the Chamber. That man is Henry G. Eismann.

Point 3. RAILROAD CROSSING ELIMINATION. This important point is the Chamber program, which has now progressed to the stage where the fruits of our many years of labor are now visible, yet requires much to be done. Since this project is essential to the proper and orderly development of Hicksville and since considerable time and effort must still be allocated to it, I have selected for Chairman of this Committee, one of the men who has pioneered in promoting the project. This man is Mal Pierce. To assist him, I have added the names of the following, whose labors during the years cannot go unrecognized. They are Al Schachner, Patrick P. Caputo, Ernest Franke and Michael J. Sullivan.

Point 4. PARKING. This is another essential project which ties in with the elimination program and is of comparable importance, since during the period when the elimination construction will be in progress, many changes of parking areas and additional and temporary parking sites will have to be provided. For Chairman of this Committee, I have selected a man who has done much good work for parking in Hicksville. His name is Julius Schwartz. To assist him, I have named William Payoski and John Dobson who, by experience, are well qualified in this field.

Point 5. HIGHWAY AND TRAFFIC. Due to Hicksville's steady expansion, highway and traffic conditions in Hicksville are presently, as you all know, in a deplorable state. Therefore, this project is also an integral part of the overall Chamber program. As Chairman of this important Committee, I have named a man who has been of inestimable help to the Chamber in the past, despite the ever increasing demands upon our arterial thoroughfares. I know he will serve well in this

essential post. His name is Francis Anderson. To assist him in this project of growing importance, I have named Fred Herman.

Point 6. ESTABLISHMENT OF A GREATER HICKSVILLE. It is hoped that we can combine the downtown with the uptown Hicksville business areas into a cohesive unit. For this task I have selected two men who are well qualified merchants in their respective areas. I am sure they will be able to work together and have named as Co-Chairmen of the Merchants' Committee, Irwin Goldman and Mort Kassel.

Point 7. BETTER PROMOTIONAL ACTIVITIES. The Chamber, with the assistance of the merchants will undertake to promote such activities, although no definite program under this point has as yet been determined upon. A decision in this field, however, will soon have to be made. To consider the program, I have named three men with ideas and imagination whose thoughts on the subject will be welcomed by the Chamber. As Chairman of this Committee, I have named, Larry Wayne, and to assist him John Staryk and Herb Beach.

Point 8. CHAMBER MEETING PROGRAM. This point of the program is designed to increase the interest in and attendance at our Chamber meetings. The ideas of successful business, economists, public officials and professional men in this as well as in other areas should be made available to the membership. It is hoped that during one meeting in each month, those who take the trouble to attend, should have the benefit of the ideas of a qualified speaker. This is an important Chamber function and as Chairman of this Committee, I have chosen a man whose contacts range over a wide area. This man is Ernest Franke.

Points 9 and 10. PUBLIC RELATIONS AND PUBLIC INFORMATION. These points in the program, although left for last, are of the most vital importance in that each of them reaches out into all of the other previously mentioned programs. Unless the Chamber can achieve good public relations and obtain wide dissemination of information in regard to its program, public acceptance may be indifferent or altogether lacking. These programs are also placed together because in many ways they tend to overlap. However, I am confident that I have chosen two men who are well qualified in each of the respective fields and who can work well together. As Chairman of the Public Relations Committee, I have selected Bill Nelson and as Chairman of the Public Information Committee Jules Mirel.

"This is the Chamber's 10-Point Program for the ensuing year. Other committees may be formed and other projects may be undertaken if the same appear necessary or advisable. Each committee chairman should feel free to add additional members to his committee if he so desires," Rochman concluded.
