2500 Pay Final Tribute to Francke, County Clerk Was Civic Leader

More than 2,500 persons from all sections of the County visited the Wagner Funeral Home over the weekend to pay their last respects to County Clerk Ernest F. Francke of 33 Field Ave., Hicksville, who passed away at Manhasset Medical Center, Friday evening.

Court Upsets PW Zoning; Town Appeals

The Town of Oyster Bay will appeal to a higher court the County Supreme Court decision which has "upset" the zoning of the 120-acre former Press Wireless property in Hicksville for industrial use. The property was rezoned from residential to industrial zoning about a year ago by Oyster Bay Town Board as part of a comprehensive master plan.

The decision of Supreme Court Justice Marion Pitoni in Mineola has declared the rezoning to industrial as "unconstitutional."

The rezoning to industrial use had the widespread support of the community and local school authorities. Upwards of 450 homes can be built on the Press Wireless acreage in the northwest section of the community which would require another elementary school there for Hicksville and upset the delicate balance in all planning for the use of Junior and Senior High Schools in the community.

The comprehensive master plan of zoning for the Town, developed over a period of several years, has been widely acclaimed. The rezoning of Press Wireless, over the objections of the speculator-owners, took place in June of 1958 after

First Alarm For Imperial

The Imperial Gardens development off Cantigue La. had its first fire alarm, even before the houses were completed and occupied. On July 27, one of the houses under construction on Marilyn La. caught fire accidentally, possibly from an acetylene torch that was being used on the job.

FRANCIS ANDERSON of East St., Hicksville, first deputy to County Clerk Ernest F. Francke, is expected to be appointed by County Executive A. Holly Patterson to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. Francke. Mr. Anderson will serve until a successor is elected and probably will be the Republican candidate on the ballot for the unexpired term in the November general election.

Town Merging Some Districts

Consolidation of existing garbage district and consolidation and extension of parking districts in the Township will become effective Jan. 1. The Town Board adopted a resolution on consolidation following a public hearing in Oyster Bay Town Hall, Tuesday.

Supervisor John J. Burns pointed out that the consolidation was considered "in the interest of greater efficiency and economy for the homeowners" and noted that the State Legislature enacted a bill at its last session at the request of the Town Board giving the Board power to separate existing park districts from parking districts.

"As previously stated some months ago, when this project began with the cooperation of Assemblyman Edwin J. Feherbach, the existing special garbage and parking districts no longer adequately serve the best interests of the homeowners and can be more efficiently and economically operated by consolidated," Burns asserted.

His death was attributed to coronary thrombosis. He had suffered a mild attack at his home a week ago Saturday. Last Thursday he was taken to Manhasset Medical Centre where he was fatally stricken. He passed away at about 6 o'clock Friday night.

Thomas R. Pynchon, chairman of the Oyster Bay Town Republican committee, said "The people of the Town of Oyster Bay and County of Nassau have lost a true friend and devoted public servant in the untimely passing of Ernest Francke. As an official of the county and town, I had come to know Mr. Francke personally over a period of years. As Town Republican leader, I had come to value his counsel and leadership in the cause of good, responsible government."

"On behalf of the Executive Committee of the Town, I joined his legion of friends in expressing the deepest sympathy to Mrs. Francke

(Editor's Note — Bill Nelson is still recuperating from his automobile accident. In his absence we offer the following commentary on the concept of a regional shopping centre as a centre for community activities).

Not only have regional shopping centers created a new pattern for retail merchandising, but in many cases they have become centers for community activities. It was noted this week by Walter G. Sackler and Leonard L. Frank, builders and owners of Mid-Island Shopping Plaza at Hicksville.

Citing their own experience after nearly three years of operation of one of the nation's largest regional centers, Mr. Frank said community activities at Mid-Island "are continually in progress," and range all the way from Easter Sunrise services through volunteer fire department tournaments, civil defense activities, garden club exhibits, automobile and boat shows and numerous free entertainment attractions.

"It is only logical that a regional shopping center should be used for every type of activity in which people of the community and surrounding trade territory are interested," Mr. Frank said. "The center is easily accessible from main thoroughfares, is well policed by its own department, and, in the case of Mid-Island Plaza, bus lines run directly into the center. The huge parking areas surrounding the central core of retail establishments can accommodate thousands of vehicles and afford space for practically any kind of activity or demonstration.

"It was part of our original plan when Mid-Island Plaza was being conceived," he explained, "that all possible facilities and assistance to community groups would be provided. A regional shopping center such as this is an integral part of the community in which it is located, and, as such, should be a good neighbor, and contribute in every way possible to the interests of that community."

Hicksville Population 1,000 When Ernie Francke Was Lad

County Clerk Ernest F. Francke who died on Friday, July 24, was born in Far Rockaway on Feb. 1, 1894, the son of Carl and Katherine Francke. At the age of 3, the family moved to the outskirts of Hicksville to McCarthy's Lane, Jericho; from there to Old Country Rd., Plainview and thence to Hicksville.

Ernie Francke attended the one room school at Jericho, the small school at Plainview and at the age of 12 graduated from Nicholai St. School, Hicksville.

When his father died, he became the man of the family. He held various odd jobs as a lad, including silver beating for Andrew J. Herfort and driving for Ofenloch's Livery Stable.

While working for Saunders Livery Stables, who hired out his teams and wagons to the Telephone Co., he became acquainted with the utility service and got his first lessons in pole climbing.

On March 11, 1911 he started with the Telephone Co. working in the Hicksville-Westbury Area. At that time Mrs. Saunders was the one and only operator in Hicksville.

He covered his assigned territory on a motorcycle in all kinds of weather, including trips to such far off places as Oyster Bay.

He was with the Telephone Co. for 41 years, retiring as the maintenance supervisor of the vast Hempstead office of the company.

EISEMANN RECALLS

Speaking of Ernie Francke's boyhood in Hicksville, Henry G. Eise-mann as speaker at a testimonial dinner in honor of Mr. Francke a few years ago recalled:

"When the family moved to the northeast corner of Bway and Cherry St., Ernie attended the then modern Nicholai St. School building. He continued steeped in his studies for the legal requirement in those days of 100 days following his 17th birthday. At which time this full-fledged scholar with his formal education behind him, secured his working papers and appeared on the Hicksville scene as Ernest Francke, bread winner.

"Now get no wrong impressions from the mild and subdued tones of my introductory remarks. As a kid, Ernie was no pansy. But a real, solid, typical fun loving American boy reared in a rural atmosphere that is truly America. We played cowboys and indians in Hicksville before the plains surrendered to an always welcome and increasing population that by comparison makes Hicksville today a metropolis. When we were kids the population numbered about 1,000.

"When Ernie and I were kids -- and this incident stands out in my memory because we considered it quite an achievement -- the movie industry, like us, was in its infancy and the Nickelodeon was located in a hall that was formerly a blacksmith shop on East Garfield St. Ernie and his pals were a pretty noisy bunch and whether by coincidence or design, most boisterous when playing directly outside the movie house. This was the day of the silent movie and the whoops of the kids playing a riotous game of cops and robber did not go any too well with the tender love story unfolding on the screen. The noise was so distracting to the movie paying public that finally in desperation the distracted proprietor would chase the whole gang in to watch the movie, just to keep them quiet."

Mr. Eise-mann also recalled that Ernie Francke played the trombone in a band organized by Pop Reynolds who was then developing Model Farms, Plainview. Ernie also auditioned for the Sengerunde, a singing society.

Recalling when Hicksville was the centre of the gold and silver leaf industry and Ernie Francke worked for Mr. Herfort, Mr. Eise-mann said that in 1913 he was working for the Bank of Hicksville under the same Mr. Herfort.

Mr. Eise-mann also remembered when Ernie worked for Ofenloch's

Livery Stables: "on Election Day he brought out an honest to goodness surrey with fringe on top and Ernie was given the job of driving that surrey to bring out the vote. However, the amicable relationship between Ernie and Mr. Ofenloch was brought to an abrupt end when the old man became aware that Ernie was using the surrey not only for Democratic voters but Republican as well. And Ernie has been bringing Republicans to the polls ever since. "As our community grows the more doorbells he rings, the more friends he makes, the harder he works. Always piling up an enviable record. Yes, then the results are made known you can always count on Hicksville, under Ernie's leadership, to be on top."

WED 39 YEARS

On Oct. 16, 1920, Pearl Stoll of Beatrice, Nebraska, became the bride of Ernest Francke and they moved into a newly built home on

Field Ave., the house in which Mr. Francke resided until he was stricken and taken to Manhasset Medical Centre last week.

Four years later, Henry G. Eise-mann and his bride moved into a house directly across Field Ave. from the Franckes.

Mr. Eise-mann's remarks at that testimonial continued: "Hicksville was destined for growth and needed men of courage and ability to further her interests -- Ernie just naturally grew along with the town. Looking at the bustling community that Hicksville is today, newcomers may not be aware of all the planning and hard work entailed for public spirited men like Ernest Francke... He was active either in the creation or the expansion of almost every special district which now serves the people of Hicksville. He served well on the Board of Appeals for many years. More than a quarter of a century ago, he was made a member of the Nassau County Republican Committee and for the past

15 or more years served as a member of the executive committee."

Mr. Francke became County Clerk in 1951 and was successively re-elected to the office. Under his leadership many practices of the County Clerk's office were modernized and improved, including the widespread use of microfilming to conserve space. He was past president of the County Clerk's Assoc. of New York State and served on important committees of that organization working closely with the State Education Dept and Legislature.

WATER COMMISSIONER

He helped organize the Hicksville Water District and was a water commissioner for ten years. He was a member of the Town Zoning Board of Appeals for a 20-year period beginning in 1932.

He was an active member of Hicksville Kiwanis Club and chairman of the public and business affairs committee of the club. He

was an organizer and director of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce Inc.

For a quarter century he was the president of the Hicksville Republican Club, one of the largest in the township. He was the acknowledged Republican leader for the community of Hicksville.

He served as chairman of the Boy Scout Finance Campaigns on three successive occasions and was slated as chairman of the drive this year for Arrow Head District embracing Hicksville, Plainview and Old Bethpage.

Mrs. Francke survives her husband. Also surviving is a daughter Mrs. Peter Elkington of Philadelphia, four granddaughters, and three sisters.

Friends are making contributions to the Ernest F. Francke Memorial Fund, care of St. Stephen's Lutheran Church of South Bway, Hicksville.

Permit Increase In Bus Fares

The Public Service Commission has accepted a tariff amendment filed by Checker Bus Corp. of Hempstead, designed to increase most of its fares effective July 19.

The company operates five year-round routes from Hempstead to Farmingdale, Levittown, South Levittown and Hicksville.

Present adult fares on the year-round routes range from a minimum of 15 cents to 50 cents for a through ride on the longest route. Children five through eleven years of age are carried at half fare.

Under the new tariff, adult fares will be increased by five or ten cents on each of four of the company's routes, bringing the new range from 20 to 60 cents. Corresponding changes will be made in children's fares. On the fifth route, operated between Hicksville and South Levittown, no increases will be effected since fares now charged on it are constructed on the same basis as is provided in the new tariff.

Motorcade Rolls on Tuesday

The hearing on the Merry Lane gas station application will be held at the Town Hall in Oyster Bay at 10 AM on Tuesday, Aug. 4.

THE VILLAGER has repeatedly publicized the facts and history relating to the development of a parcel at Merry Lane and Jericho Turnpike. Mr. Alex Williams, the owner of the Jericho Garage on Jericho Turnpike, has petitioned the Town Board of Oyster Bay for a permit to stake tracks, and to build and operate a gas station complete with curb cuts on Merry Lane on this parcel. If this petition is granted, and this gas station is sited upon us, it would be a serious traffic hazard to our community.

This gas station, should it become a reality would be 150 feet into our community, backing up on our playground. The curb cuts on Merry Lane would be used by trucks, trailers, and hundreds of assorted vehicles every day. Studies that we caused to be made by a reputable firm of Engineers show conclusively that this entry into our community is woefully inadequate. It is 34.6 feet wide. The main artery for 3000 homes is half as wide as entrances to neighboring communities that have only 60 houses. The curve at the neck of the entrance and the steep hill at the western approach to Merry Lane combined with the inadequate width make it difficult if not downright dangerous to enter or leave the community at peak hours. There is a Gas Station and we would have blood in our streets. The result of this survey has been made known to Oyster Bay.

The prospective gas station operator has assured us that one of the most cogent reasons for a situation at this point was his desire to supply us with an essential service. We have already pointed out to him that there are at least 5 other gas stations surrounding us with the same desire.

(I) Section 6.0 of Article 6 is hereby repealed.

(II) A new Section 6.0 thereof is hereby added reading as follows: Section 6.0. No consumer shall use District water for any lawn sprinkling system using an underground installation where nozzles are installed either below the surface, flush with the surface or above grade without first having secured a permit therefor.

Section 3.

(I) Section 6.1 of Article 6 is hereby repealed.

(II) A new Section 6.1 thereof is hereby added reading as follows: Section 6.1. No permit shall be issued for such use unless:

(a) The service line supplying such system is on a separate metered service.

(b) The installation has been inspected and approved by the Superintendent of the Water District and he has found that the proposed installation will prevent a return flow of water to the Public Water Supply.

(c) A vacuum breaker has been installed at the point of connection between the lawn sprinkler system and the service pipe supplying District water.

(d) All water available as a result of such installation shall be used for lawn sprinkling purposes only.

Section 4.

(I) A new Section 6.3 of Article 6 is hereby added reading as follows: Section 6.3. The owner, occupant or user of any premises upon which lawn sprinkling systems, using an underground installation where nozzles are installed either below the surface, flush with the surface or above grade, have been installed prior to the effective date of this ordinance shall notify the Superintendent of the Water District of the existence of these installations within 60 days of the effective date hereof. The owner, occupant or user of such existing installations shall comply with the provisions of this article on or before October 15, 1959.

Section 5. These amendments shall take effect pursuant to law. ALL parties in interest and citizens shall have an opportunity to be heard on said proposal at the time and place aforesaid.

AMEND Article 1, Section 4 by adding new paragraph 7, as follows:

7- Supervision of Construction. No permit will be issued for the construction of a building which is to have a total floor area in excess of 10,000 square feet until an affidavit is filed with the Building Department certifying that the construction of such building will be supervised by a Professional Engineer or registered in the State of New York. The affidavit is to be signed sworn to and acknowledged by the engineer or architect who will supervise the construction and is to have his professional seal affixed. In the event such engineer or architect shall, for any reason, discontinue his supervision of the construction of the building at any time prior to its completion, he shall immediately notify the Building Department of such fact and thereupon the building permit issued for such construction shall be suspended and no further work shall be done thereunder until another such affidavit shall be filed with the Building Department certifying that supervision of the construction has been resumed by another or the same engineer or architect.

No Certificate of Occupancy will be issued for such building until a final certificate is filed with the Building Department by the engineer or architect who supervised the construction that the building was, to the best of his knowledge, in fact erected in conformity with the plans filed with the Building Department.

AMEND Article V, Section 10, paragraph 1, by adding the following words at the end thereof:

"Except as otherwise specified hereinafter."

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LI Fund Gets Underway
