Washington Gives Approval:

# LI National Plans 4th Branch Office

William E. Koutensky, President of the Long Island National Bank of Hicksville, has just received the approval from the Comptroller of the Currency, Washington, D. C., for permission to establish a Branch Office, Broadway Plaza, 550 South Broadway, Hicksville.

The Long Island National Bank of Hicksville was organized Nov. 15, 1917, and three years later had resources of \$600,000.

In 1951, the Bank reached \$12,000,000 in resources and at the present time, has increased to a figure of \$60,000,000, having its Main office

at 60 Broadway, Hicksville, and branch offices at 445 South Oyster Bay Road, Plainview; Mid-Island Shopping Plaza, Hicksville and Manetto Hill office, Plainview.

The new office is expected to be completed sometime after Jan. 1, 1960.

## Board Ready to Fight Wildfield Housing Proj

The Hicksville Board of Education is on record as opposed to reactivation of plans for a massive housing development on the former Press Wireless property in the northwest section of the district. The School Board on Friday directed Sullivan & Corcoran, school attorneys, to take whatever steps are necessary to oppose the adoption of a sub-division map for the tract which could result in the construction of nearly 400 homes.

The School Board was served with notice last week of a public hearing before the Nassau County Planning Commission set for yesterday (Wed.) upon a development map for Wildfield as the project is known.

Development of the tract for dwellings had been halted a year ago when Oyster Bay Town Board as part of an overall comprehensive zoning project, rezoned the 119 acres as industrial. The developers took the zone change to court and recently won a County Supreme verdict from Justice Mario Pittoni,

upsetting the industrial zone. Immediately the developers filed their original sub-division map.

However, Attorney Michael Sullivan told the School Board Friday night that the Town of Oyster Bay is appealing the Pittoni decision to a higher court and such appeal has the effect of retaining the tract in industrial classification until a final determination is made in the higher courts.

If homes are built on the former Press Wireless property, additional elementary school facilities will be required in the northwest section.

### Orientation for Teachers Starts

A special one-week orientation program for about 100 new teachers and other personnel of Hicksville Public Schools this fall starts Monday morning in the Senior High School where welcome will be extended by Allen S. Carpenter, president of the Board of Education, and Donald F. Abt, assistant superintendent.

The 100 new members of the faculty include about 55 additional teachers and special personnel such as guidance counselors, nurses, physical education instructors, etc. Most of the additional teachers are required for the increased enrollment in the secondary schools, junior and senior high.

This is the second year that Hicksville schools have provided

a special pre-school term orientation for new faculty members.

During the five day period, the new teachers will meet all school principals, department heads, see films about Hicksville schools, learn the district organization, receive information on housing, transportation, retirement, hospital insurance, etc.

Also discussed will be salary schedules, tenure, probation and professional organizations. On the third day, the new teachers will go to the home school buildings to which they have been assigned for more localized conferences. On the final day, Friday, they will be taken on a tour of Hicksville by busses.

### Harding Quits as Party Leader

G. Fleming Harding has resigned as Hicksville Democratic Zone leader and, according to informed sources, a wide open three-way contest for the leadership broke out early this week.

The decision between Irene Murphy, Robert Connelly and William A. Cislser, one time leader who gave up the position a few years ago, was expected to be reached at a hot meeting of Democratic committeemen representing 25 Hicksville election districts last night (Wed.) after this issue of the Herald went to press.

Harding resigned, he said, due to

the pressure of business but plans to retain his seat as a party committeeman in the Sept. 15 primaries. He had officially held the post as leader for about a year but had served unofficially, off and on, over a period of years. He had succeeded John Toppetta.

Mrs. Murphy first became known in the community as the campaign manager for Earl Ditmars in his unsuccessful bid for a seat on the Board of Education in 1958. Walter W. Schreiber was elected for a three-year term in that close contest.

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## CURRENT COMMENT: For Re-Election Of Harry Borley

AN ELECTION which, in recent years, has achieved little of the attention of the taxpaying voters that it probably deserves is that of Water Commissioner. Hicksville Water District resident property owners will vote on Monday night, Aug. 31, between 7 and 9 PM at the Hicksville Courthouse, Heitz Pl. and Bay Ave. Harry Borley who has served 18 years as a water commissioner as a candidate for re-election for a three-year term, and we most strongly urge his re-election.

Mr. Borley is one of those quiet men who goes about his job without fanfare or publicity. During the time he has been a water commissioner, the rate for consumers has been reduced 25 per cent from 40 cents to 30 cents.

The average real estate tax rate of the water district has been maintained at a reasonable 10.6 cents per \$100. over the past seven years.

During this interval, the facilities of the Water District have been vastly expanded to keep pace with our community growth. This summer all restrictions on the use of water for lawn sprinkling could be lifted because of our adequate facilities from the standpoint of pumps and storage capacity.

Mr. Borley has demonstrated his zeal and interest in the community welfare in other ways, too. A 35 year active member of the volunteer Fire Dept. he has served as its chief. He is past president of the Nassau County Fire Chief's Council.

We can recall vividly when Mr. Borley was first elected to the Board of Commissioners at the time when the affairs of the water district were week-in-week-out top news. There were heated controversies. The community health, was in effect, threatened by the failure of conflicting groups to agree on the solution of problems of water supply.

This has all changed and the water district has quietly, year in and year out, performed its important function without conflict.

We think Mr. Borley, in cooperation with the two other commissioners, has contributed in large measure to this excellent record. We urge the re-election of Mr. Borley.

No advance voter registration is required. Remember the date: Monday, Aug. 31. Polls open 7 PM to 9 PM.

### Official Action on RR Crossings

The symbol PSC NO. 10324 promises to be one of the most important in the recent history of Hicksville.

**Mother Swam Around NYC**

Today, at the age of 65, Mrs. Schoenmell resides in Ocean Springs, Mississippi. She still takes a swim every day.

Lawrence C. and Doris Gibbs have been married for 17 years. It all started with a blind date and almost ended then. For Larry, when asking Doris for another date was told - that she had other plans for this particular weekend. Larry himself thereupon took off to some resort only to meet up again right there with Doris. She of course had planned to spend a weekend there long before Larry had ever asked for that second date. The result of all this is of course Ken Gibbs age almost 12 and a neat and tastefully furnished home on Hedgerow Lane, overlooking practically all of Birchwood at Jericho.

Larry, in his early forties, was born in Brooklyn. He attended Erasmus Hall High there and later New York University. After graduation he continued his studies at Brooklyn College Law School. A very sizeable number of our community's finest citizens, children and babes in arms included, formed a motorcade to protest at the gas station hearing in the Town Hall at Oyster Bay. Each car received large posters taped on trunks and sides; and while the hand placards were being distributed, a telephone squad worked efficiently behind the scene.

Here was an example of the finest cooperation between a Civic Assoc., a committee, and the community it

is so gallantly working to protect. The police of Nassau County are to be commended on their efficient direction of our motorcade into the Town Hall parking lot. Except for an occasional infant's outcry, the hearing went very smoothly and quietly. Birchwood can well be proud of the manner in which its three spokesmen presented the case. We can also be proud of the compliment paid our community by Mr. Burns when he said that Birchwood had put it's best foot forward.

Now that the hearing is over and the decision of the Town Board is pending, we fervently hope that they will help us to keep our best foot forward by handing down a decision in our favor.

## Water District Explains Rules

There have been numerous inquiries to the Health and Welfare Committee of the Birchwood Civic Association concerning the homeowner's responsibilities with respect to his outside water system. Correspondence with the Commissioner of the Jericho Water District resulted in a meeting being

held with Mr. W. Hoagland, Superintendent of the Jericho Water District. All the arrangements were made promptly and efficiently.

Mr. Hoagland explained the Water District's and the homeowner's responsibilities as follows: There is, underground, usually about a foot in from the sidewalk, a "Curb Cock." It is the Water District's responsibility to maintain service from the "Curb Cock" out, including the curb cock. It is the owner's responsibility from the curb cock to the house (excluding the curb cock). An exception to this is the water meter itself. This, too, is the Water District's responsibility. Any part needed by the homeowner for replacement can be purchased from the Water District at its cost (plus a small handling charge) at the East Norwich Water District Office. The two possible parts that may need replacement, exclusive of pipe, are: 1 - Pit Cover, 2 - Ring Style Valves.

In addition, Mr. Hoagland explained that when water leaks in the street are reported they are checked immediately, but repairs, if not too serious, are delayed until the major ones are taken care of first.

The Water District operates, for emergency service, 24 hours a day, seven days a week, including holidays. A list of the emergency telephone numbers have been obtained by your Committee for your help under emergency circumstances.

Sufficient numbers of copies of Jericho Water District Regulations booklets were obtained to be distributed to the Block Captains. If you have further questions consult your Block Captain or feel free to call the Health and Welfare Committee.

Many of the classrooms are ready now and it is hoped that they will all be completed in time. The gymnasium, auditorium, and special spaces will be the last completed. Work on the central administration offices will not begin until all pupil-use rooms are completed.

There will be approximately 1,100 seventh and eighth graders reporting to the school which has now been officially named The South Woods Junior High School. Provision is also being made for six 6th grades, two each from Berry Hill, Village and Robbins Lane Schools.

Furniture and most of the equipment for the school has arrived and is awaiting transfer to rooms as they are completed.

As predicted in the Herald last week, the Hicksville School Board on Friday night officially set the tax rate at \$4.92 per \$100 for school and library purchases, a decline of about 3 cents.

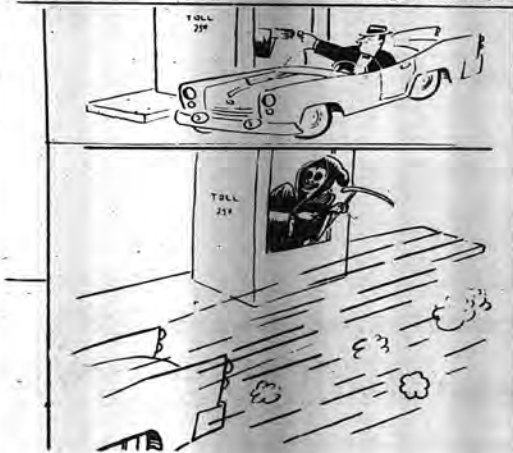

He recently said that "approximately 50% of the estates administered in New York are those in which no will was executed by the decedent. What does this mean to the wife? It means that in many estates, if there were no children, that the wife shared the estate with her in-laws. If there were minor children, two-thirds of the estate becomes their property and unavailable even to them until 21, except on proper application to the Court. Although the laws of inheritance vary from state to state, this is so generally true as to require each husband and wife to check the law of their own state so as to make certain that the family is properly taken care of.

"Nor are these the only reasons that everyone should have a Will—choice of executor, expense of administration, continuation of the family business and most important, the proper choice of beneficiaries, are among the many considerations that make a will a necessity for every man and woman who have the interests of the family at heart.

"Just as important, the will should be periodically reviewed and brought up to date. Many circumstances happen after the execution of a will, which require a periodic review, if it is to express the wishes of the decedent. Subscribing witnesses to the will die or move away, assets of the decedent fluctuate up and down, there are changes in the natural objects of the decedent's bounty by births and deaths in the family, estate tax statutes are constantly being enacted for the benefit of the taxpayer, which should be taken advantage of, and people who move from one state to another,

**Midnight to Morn Bowling Popular**

Hicksville like many a suburban community is viewed by most people from 8 a.m. to 12 midnight, unaware that at the point when they are sunning in another segment of the community is just awakening or is already engaged in some form of work that will continue into the wee hours of the morning.

There are, for instance, numerous airline pilots, hostesses, etc. just a short distance away at Idlewild Airport who are just finishing up their jobs at 1:00 or 2:00 a.m. There are men who will be placing milk bottles at your doorstep at 5:00 or 6:00 a.m., men getting ready fresh loaves of bread for your breakfast, many club entertainers, waiters and waitresses, taxi, cab, and truck drivers, etc. who are on a work-

play-sleep schedule which just exactly contrasts with the routine of most of the population.

What do these people do to entertain themselves after a long night's work? Certainly movies, nightclubs, etc. are already closed. But there is one place in the community that awaits and welcomes these people providing recreational activities, complete restaurant facilities, lounges to relax in and in which to freshen up, and most important companionship.

The place is the Mid Island Bowl in Hicksville, which like many other centers across the nation, is the favorite recreation spot for people whose participation in the service, entertainment and other trades requires them to spend their after-midnight hours away from home. Many people in such industries have organized into what is called "Owl" Teams. These Owl Teams often reserve alleys at Mid Island Bowl regularly for many weeks in advance at 2 or 3 a.m.

"In the winter time particularly, Mid Island Bowl is the midnight mecca of the community," states Ruben Dankoff president of the Bowling Corp. of America which operates the Hicksville bowling center. On week-ends ordinary bowlers join late shift workers by bowling as late as 4:00 or 5:00 a.m. States Dankoff "The success of our midnight to morn operation in Hicksville, of course, is not dependent on chance factors. It is important that alleys which operate on a 24-hour basis be located in a community where there are sufficient night workers to warrant such."

The fact that the Hicksville Center is fully air-conditioned and serves quality food is important in maintaining its popularity in the community. "Television is another reason why bowling has today such a large following," says Dankoff. Bowling has been featured on TV, winning in many new enthusiasts.

In one single year TV devoted over 9,000 hours to bowling, more than has been allotted for any other sport including baseball! Particularly with regard to women and children, interest in bowling has grown by leaps and bounds within the last 2 decades.

It was World War II that started the ball rolling for the expansion of the bowling industry," asserts Dankoff. Up until the time of World War II the bowling alley was considered some sinister, slovenly spot where the lower elements of the community congregated. With the coming of the war night work increased and extra money was put into the pockets of almost everyone. The tension created by the war and the extra money available increased the need for recreational activities.

Thousands of people from every walk of life, from the executive to the unskilled laborer, found a new outlet in bowling and as they pursued the game, bowling establishments became more and more elaborate. Today bowling holds the position of No. 1 participating sport in the country.

Bowling centers today offer such conveniences as baby sitting service, beauty parlors, game rooms, and swimming pools. Encouraged by the consistently high rate of attendance at Mid Island Bowl after midnight, Dankoff says "Mid Island's success as a 24 hour operation, has convinced us of the need for such 24 hour centers in many other suburban communities. We hope to establish a number of these new centers in the near future modeled on the Mid - Island operation."

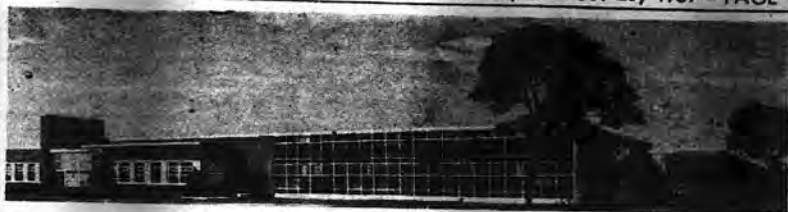
