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30,000 Pupils Return To Classes in 2 Weeks

Many Mid Island schools will resume classes in less than two weeks.

Bethpage public schools start Tuesday, Sept. 8; Hicksville public schools, Trinity Evangelical Lutheran School, Hicksville, and Good Shepard Lutheran School, Plainview, will open Wednesday Sept. 9. Plainview Public Schools and St. Ignatius Parochial School in Hicksville will open Thursday, Sept. 10. Jericho Public Schools will open Wednesday, Sept. 9.

Hicksville, will be opening its doors to an enrollment of 13,000 students, Bethpage, which is opening a new high school this fall, expects an enrollment of 5,037 pupils.

Plainview, expects to open two grammar schools this September. (continued on page 15)

Class Starting Times Change

Class starting times in Hicksville Public Schools, effective with the new term starting Wednesday, Sept. 9, were repeated today for the benefit of parents. Where students travel to classes by bus, the bus stop departure time is approximately a half hour before the class time.

For Kindergartens at Burns Ave. Dutch Lane, East St., Fork Lane, Lee Ave., Old Country Rd. and Woodland Ave. classes start at 8 AM, 10 AM, 12:15 PM and 2:15 PM. Each session is two hours.

For first graders at the same schools, classes are from 8 AM to 12 noon and from 12 noon to 4 PM.

Second graders at the same schools, classes start at 8 AM and conclude at 2 PM.

Third graders attending Nicholas St. will go to classes from 8 AM to 2:15 PM.

Fourth, fifth and sixth graders at Burns Ave. Dutch Lane, East St., Fork Lane, Lee Ave. Old Country Rd. and Woodland Ave. will start at 9:20 AM and conclude at 4:05 PM.

Junior and Senior High (7th thru 12th grades) attend sessions from 8:20 AM to 3:20 PM.

Vocational groups at Senior High - 8:20 AM to 3:50 PM.

CRMD (primary and intermediate) at Dutch Lane attend from 9:20 AM to 2:30 PM.

LIQ (Primary and Intermediate) at Old Country Rd. will overlap lunch, attending from 8 AM to 12:30 PM, and from 11:30 AM to 4 PM.

Contest for Water Commissioner Monday at Hicksville Courthouse

Resident property owners of Hicksville Water District will go to the polls at the Hicksville Courthouse, Monday night, Aug 31, between 7 PM and 9 PM to elect a water commissioner. Harry Borley who is seeking re-election is opposed by Charles W. MacFarland who was an unsuccessful candidate for water commissioner last year when George A. Kunz was re-elected.

Borley who has been a water commissioner for 18 years and is an ex-chief of Hicksville Fire Dept. is running on his record of experience and achievement.

"Since I have been a member of the Board of Commissioners," the Chairman stated, "the water rate has been reduced 25 per cent from 40 cents to 30 cents per 1,000 gallons. The average water property tax rate during the past seven years has been 10.6 cents and for the current year is only 11 cents.

"I am quite proud of these rates since they have been made possible in spite of rising costs of everything else and in spite of the rapid growth of the District with large expenditures for improvements required.

"Upon completion of the two new water plants at Miller Rd and Dean St and many new transmission pipe lines, the District has lifted the temporary sprinkling restrictions which were necessary for a time to plan and construct the new improvements in our system. The present Board of Commissioners, of which I am a chairman, will continue to do its best to provide the maximum benefits at a minimum cost to the people of Hicksville," Borley stated. MacFarland who lives at 80 Sackett St. states he has 35 years experience in the field of purchasing, acquisition of pumping station and construction equipment.

He is a member of the Edison Engineering Society of New York, has been a Hicksville resident for 12 years and is employed by Con Edison. He is an active officer of the Hicksville-Levittown Lodge of Elks and a member of the Knights of Columbus.

Running against Kunz last year, MacFarland received 148 ballots out of 566 cast. Kunz received 383 (continued on page 8)

LIVING UNDER LAW

OUTLAWED DEBTS

You may hear that some debt has been "outlawed." Why should someone get rid of his honest debts merely by not paying them for a long enough time?

Well, the law looks at delayed claims this way: If you have a just claim, you owe the debtor a duty to press your claim within a reasonable time. You should not "sleep" on your rights.

Why? Because stale claims are hard to prove, and defense against them is sometimes harder to make. One party to a law suit might wait until the only witness against him has died or gone away. Then he could sue and win unfairly. Anyhow, memories dim. Sometimes men and women honestly change their memories to fit their later views.

What is reasonable time? Statutes of limitations set up the times after which you may not start a law suit. The time varies. For instance:

Under New York law you

cannot normally sue for possession of real property after fifteen years. You cannot normally sue on a written contract after six years have elapsed. In personal injury cases, such as an automobile accident, you cannot bring a suit after three years have gone by.


The time does not run while the debtor or "defendant" is out of the state. Nor, as a rule, does the time run if a plaintiff



(the one who brings the action) is a minor, or is insane, or is in prison, when the right to sue first begins.

The same holds in criminal actions. Courts have thrown out cases because a district attorney had not acted promptly. For witnesses in criminal cases like those in a civil suit also die, forget, change their minds, or leave the country. So, most criminal actions must go to court within a certain time. But there are exceptions. A murder charge, for instance, can generally be brought anytime.





WHEREAS, at a Special District Meeting of Union Free School District No. 15 of the Towns of Oyster Bay and North Hempstead, Nassau County, New York, duly called, held and conducted in said School District on April 25, 1959, a certain proposition known as proposition No. 2 which authorized the construction and equipment of a new school building to be erected on the site now owned by the district located at Northumberland Road and Barbara Lane, generally known as the South Parkway Site in said District at a total estimated cost not exceeding \$988,000, and also authorized the levy of a tax to be collected in installments in such amount for such purpose, was approved by two-thirds of the qualified voters of said School District present and voting thereat, and has also been approved by the Board of Regents of the State of New York; and WHEREAS, it is now desired to provide for the issuance of said bonds; now therefore be it

RESOLVED by the Board of Education of Union Free School District No. 15 of the Towns of Oyster Bay and North Hempstead, Nassau County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. In accordance with the aforesaid proposition, the construction and equipment, furnishing and incidental improvement of a new school building to be erected on the site now owned by the District, generally known as the South Parkway Site, is hereby authorized at the estimated maximum cost of \$988,000.

Section 2. The plan of financing such object or purpose is by the issuance of not exceeding \$988,000 of serial bonds of said School District, which are hereby authorized, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. Such bonds are to be payable from amounts which shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property in said School District, and the faith and credit of said Union Free School District No. 15 of the Towns of Oyster Bay and North Hempstead, Nassau County, New York, are hereby pledged for the payment of said bonds and interest thereon.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid building is, pursuant to Subdivision 11 (a) (2) of paragraph (a) of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law, thirty years.

Section 4. The validity of such bonds may be contested only if: 1) Such bonds are authorized for an object or purpose for which said School District is not authorized to expend money, or 2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or 3) Such bonds are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 5. This resolution, which takes effect immediately, shall be published in full in Mid Island Herald together with a Clerk's Certificate in substantial conformity with Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Vision Defects Hinder Pupils

Nearly 600,000 children attending school for the first time this fall will have vision defects effecting success in school work. And in thousands of these schools a large percentage of first graders will be held back due to inability to learn as fast as the rest of the class, according to the New York State Optometric Assoc.

"Roughly 20% of the three million youngsters entering first grade this fall have vision defects, as indicated by past studies," states Dr. Glad, of the N.Y. State Assoc. "Half of these problems can be spotted by parents and teachers. The other half, however, will escape cursory detection because they don't show." According to the Hicksville optometrist, too many children today must struggle through school to the sixth or seventh grade before getting needed professional visual care, often failing one or more grades as a result.

"When a child with visual defects competes with others in the first grade, he may find that he can't keep up with them. So he resorts to dis-interest and drops to the bottom of the class. Then he is in danger of being held back. The slow achievers and those children with obvious vision defects usually get

professional care early, but the others often have to struggle through unsaid for years."

Red Cross Gives Good Advice

Naturally, the best advice regarding accidents is "Avoid them," according to Nassau County Red Cross. But, accidents just happen and, with another holiday weekend soon to come, you'll do well to follow this advice.

"If an accident happens," says Red Cross, "DON'T PANIC, especially if you are in a position to render aid to yourself or another. The immediate care given an accident victim is often the margin between life and death. Even persons without formal first aid training can be of aid. IF THEY FOLLOW THESE GENERAL RED CROSS INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Don't move the injured person unless it is absolutely necessary. If he has a spinal injury or internal injuries, moving may make them worse.
2. Look for bleeding first. Most serious bleeding can be stopped by applying pressure directly on the wound. If the person has stopped breathing, begin artificial respiration immediately.
3. Help prevent shock by keeping the injured person lying flat until you know how serious his injuries are. Keep the victim from becoming chilled.
4. Send someone to call a doctor or an ambulance. Give clear directions on location of the accident and the nature, cause and probably extent of the injuries. If it's a traffic accident, post someone in the road to prevent traffic jams until the police arrive.
5. Keep him comfortable and cheerful if possible. Never give liquids of any kind to an unconscious person.

Jericho, also expects to open a high school and a grammar school this fall, and expects an enrollment of approximately 1,800, with an increase of 50 teachers.

The first fund raising raffle will be held on this evening and all 60 winners will be drawn and announced. Refreshments will be served and there will be dancing.

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

The flight enabled us to inspect the improvements to South Shore Inlets and Inland Waterways and their beneficial effect on navigation as well as inspect the new marinas completed or now under construction such as those at Point Lookout, ToBay Beach, Bay Shore, etc. We observed the dredging operations now underway in the Suffolk County Inland Waterways and we were able to see many areas from the air that might prove troublesome to boatmen and that might need correction to make them safer for boat operators.

There's a tremendous story to be told about Long Island's waterfront and its meaning to the Long Island economy. Long Island, with its tremendous shore line has a greater salt water front than many states in the United States. Without comparative figures we can still estimate that there are more pleasure boats here than any place else in the country. Their dollar value must run into the millions of dollars. In addition, boatmen spend many millions for equipment, repairs and supplies. Boating, fishing and water sports are among the fastest growing recreational activities in the country.

When the investment in public and private beaches, commercial and private waterfront buildings, private and commercial fishing, shell fishing and water freight and passenger transportation to this, you sort of lose count of the astronomical dollar figure represented.

Along the Inland Waterways, a great area of marsh land is being filled and canals created for new waterfront homes. Most of these new homes will have a boat tied up at their docks.

Passengers aboard the flight were composed of officials of Nassau and Suffolk Counties, Towns and Villages, Army Engineers, Marine Division of the Nassau County Police, members of the Freeport Yacht Club, Nassau Yacht Club and South Shore Yacht Club, the United States Power Squadron, the Coast Guard Auxiliary, NY State Dept. of Commerce, and U.S. Department of Commerce. Representatives of various boating magazines, Long Island and metropolitan newspapers and radio station WHLI comprised the rest of the passenger list.





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
