Governor Gets Petition:

15,000 Demand RR Crossing Speed-Up

Community leaders will make the formal presentation to Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of a 15,000-signature petition, tomorrow (Fri.), requesting a speed-up of the Hicksville Rail Road grade crossing elimination program. The presentation will be made in the Governor's New York City office shortly after 12 noon.

Circulation of the petition under the auspices of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce began last February. During the interval there has been substantial progress on the job with the anticipation in some well-informed quarters that the State will probably call for bids on the project in October and work will start in the spring.

However, since the petition was prepared, and to emphasize the interest of residents and non-residents who feel the pinch of lower crossing gates in their travel through Hicksville, a formal delivery to the Governor was planned.

Supervisor John J. Burns will accompany Aaron Rochman, Chamber of Commerce president; Michael J. Sullivan and Malcolm Pierce, co-chairmen of the Chamber's grade crossing committee; and County Clerk Francis Anderson of Hicksville, member of the grade crossing committee and a director of the Chamber.

The petition itself, in printed form, is addressed not only to the Governor, but to the President of the State Senate, the Speaker of the Assembly, chairmen of the Senate Finance Committee and Ways and Means Committee, as well as the State Public Service Commission and the State Dept. of Public Works.

The petition states, in part, "The undersigned do hereby respectfully petition the Governor, and the members of the State Legislature, to approve the appropriation for this project, so that the New York State

Public Service Commission and Dept. of Public Works and such other commissions, departments and agencies as have jurisdiction thereover, may continue and redouble their efforts to the end that the public welfare be served by an early commencement of construction so as to assure that the ultimate goal, the elimination of the designated grade crossings, may become a reality at the earliest possible date."

The Hicksville project, embracing seven crossings, is known officially as State Public Service Commission case no. 10324. The PSC on June 28, 1955, adopted an order determining the crossings should be eliminated in the public welfare.

The grade crossing elimination committee in May of this year reported regarding a meeting with state authorities on the project: "We were definitely aware of a sincere desire on the part of these public officials to cooperate and the committee came away with the feeling that everything that can possibly be done is being done to advance the project to the ground breaking stage, possibly as early as May of 1960."

Schools Ready for New Term

The time for schools to open is approaching and the Hicksville, Jericho, and Bethpage Schools are getting ready for the some 19,887 students who will attend classes.

Hicksville, with the largest enrollment of all three, 13,000 will open on Wednesday, Sept. 9.

More than 600 teachers and administrators will assemble Tuesday, Sept. 8, to be greeted by Allen S. Carpenter, president of the School Board.

The Jericho Schools will also open on Sept. 9, with an approximate enrollment of 1,850. However, the new High School will open at a later date. For the present, the high school classes will be held at the Robert Seamen School.

The Bethpage Schools will open on Tuesday, Sept. 8, with an enrollment of 5,037. The new school will be occupied by 960 students.

The Parochial Schools will open on Thursday, Sept. 10, except for St. Martin of Tours in Bethpage, which will open Monday, Sept. 14.

Borley Wins Smash Victory

Harry Borley, re-elected Hicksville Water Commissioner Monday night by an overwhelming majority, today expressed his thanks and appreciation to the voters for their support at the polls.

During a two-hour voting period, 705 votes were cast at Hicksville Courthouse under the supervision of Town Clerk Henry M. Curran, Town Councilman Edmund Ocker and Henry McInnes. In anticipation of a heavy turnout, extra personnel was provided and three voting booths were used.

Borley, starting his 19th year on the Water Board received 575 votes while Charles MacFarland, his opponent, got 87 ballots. George Kunz had defeated MacFarland when he ran last year, getting 148 ballots out of 566 cast.

There were 38 void ballots, three spoiled and one blank.

"It is difficult to thank each voter personally for his and her support," Borley said, "so I hope each will take this as a sincere expression of appreciation and a pledge to be worthy of their continuing confidence."

"As I stated before the election, I will serve the people of Hicksville to the best of my ability."

Penn Fruit Opens Market

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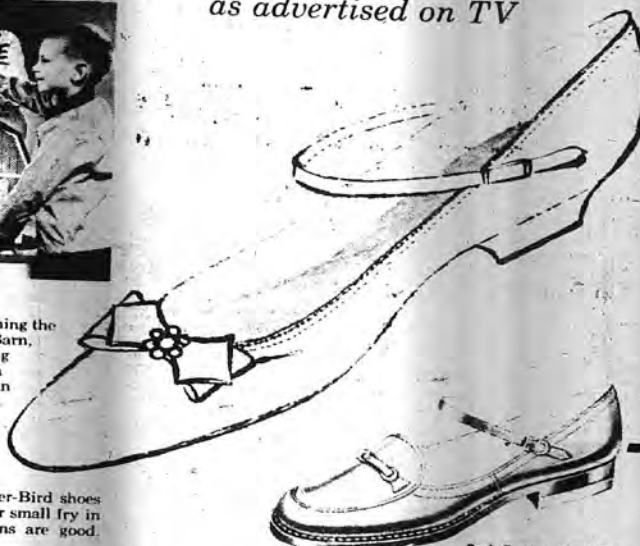


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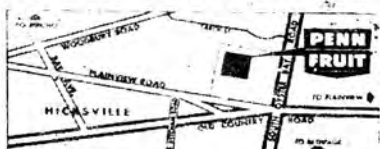

We all like to have something put aside for a rainy day -- let's make that something -- money -- not the life of a Birchwood school child.

Rainy weather, according to Dr. Walter Sugarmann, Chairman of Health and Welfare of the Civic Association, brings severe traffic snarls at the Geo. A. Jackson School. Parents, in their haste to deposit and pick-up young charges, disregard the signs at the school, put there to insure maximum protection for all.

Drivers are told not to enter the semi-circle directly in front of the school; this sign is flagrantly disregarded during inclement weather. Drivers make U-turns on Maytime Drive, a dangerous action in view of all the children who cross that street during school hours. Whatever the reasons, if we HAVE to drive to school, let's obey the signs, avoid dangerous actions and traffic hiccups. Signs in our community tell outsiders that we love our children, please drive safely. It would be tragic if one of our own parents proved these signs fallacious.

Preview Look at New Jericho High

Recently I had the privilege of being escorted and expertly guided through the wondrous new addition to our school system by our new school board president, Sam Hehr.

The Cedar Swamp school has always been a most appealing looking school, set in extremely attractive surroundings. Now linked with the new Jericho High School, the effect of the colonial architecture and its setting on 52 acres of land, will make it one of the most beautiful schools in Nassau County.

The school is actually a split-level structure, but from the outside it looks like a rambling ranch. Though it is already imposing in size, there are blue prints for further expansion, including a tremendous pool, if it is ever so voted!

Outdoors the track and the football fields have already been laid out. The tennis courts and baseball areas

are of tremendous size, and the overall effect is that of a college campus.

Near the center of the building is a circular office enclosed by window walls. This will be the principal's office and adjacent to it are the administration offices. The principal will have a view which encompasses almost the entire school area.

One of the most unusual and exciting features is the lighting. Throughout the hallways there are huge plastic domes in the ceilings which permit natural light to come thru without glare. The rain falling on the domes was a fascinating sight.

The enormous school rooms are beautifully painted in varied colors surrounded by large window walls.

The core of the school, which can accommodate 1800 to 2000 people, consists of the Speech and Drama rooms, Auditorium, Music, Art rooms and Library. There will be two cafeterias with a connecting kitchen for the junior and senior students respectively. The juniors and seniors will also have separate gymnasiums with spectator seats and adjoining showers. The main gym will hold 1200 persons.

The gigantic stage in the auditorium has entries leading from the music rooms which have elevated seating platforms.

Downstairs are the Homemaking rooms, and the Shops with garage door windows permitting a car to be driven in for practical study.

When this beautiful school opens, we parents will be able to personally view this wonderful place our fortunate children will be attending in the near future.

Syosset Schools Open Sept 8

Syosset school children return to their classrooms on Tuesday Sept. 8. Some 7,500 or more pupils are expected to fill Syosset's ten elementary schools, the High School and the newly opened South Woods Junior High School. This represents an increase of at least 900 over 1958-1959 and the total number of new students is expected to reach 1,000 before the end of this school year.

The schools will be open from Sept. 1 for the registration of pupils new to the district. Children entering Kindergarten must be five years old on or before December 1, 1959 and must be able to furnish a copy of their birth certificate as well as evidence of a recent thorough physical examination.

All Syosset schools will be on single sessions. Elementary schools will be in session from 9:00 A.M. to 3:00 P.M. The Senior High School will start the day at 8:20 A.M. and the Junior High School at 8:30 A.M. and end them at 2:30 P.M. It is expected that single sessions will be maintained throughout the district for at least the next four years pending a SUCCESSFUL vote on the second junior high school and Robbins Lane addition on Sept. 26.

Bus transportation will be had according to the schedule printed last week for all students of the Junior and Senior High School. The two six grades classes will be required to walk to Robbins Lane and then be transported to the Junior High School. Negotiations are being conducted now with the School Board to see if some arrangement can be made so that two pick-up points could be had in Birchwood rather than at the Robbins Lane School. Any information as to the schedule can be had by calling the writer or the school at Walnut 1-5500.

After an extended discussion and review by the Superintendent of Schools, Central District No. 2 plans to make a change in the marking schedule in the High School. Prior to this year, there have been four marking periods of ten weeks each. Between marking periods notices have been sent home to parents of students who were doing work below acceptable standards. The new system will increase the number of marking periods to six with intervals of six to seven weeks in between marks. Dates will be Oct. 16, Dec. 4, Jan. 29, Mar. 11, May 6, and June 24. The final mark will be the average of the six periods plus the final examination.

Urge Yes Vote On Fire Budget

At a special meeting of the Board of Directors of the Birchwood Civic Association held last Sunday morning, the Board voted unanimously to support the proposed 1960 Jericho Fire District Budget.

A special committee of the Civic Assoc., composed of Dr. Martin Lawrence and Norman Cohen, met with Chairman Harved Smith and Treasurer Meyers of the Jericho Fire District on Monday, Aug. 24.

The entire budget was reviewed most thoroughly. The 1960 budget is based upon a tax rate of 25¢ per hundred dollars of assessed valuation. This is a 13¢ reduction from the present rate of 38¢.

The committee learned that the Board of Fire Commissioners, Percy Remsen, Van Nostrand, Harry J. Stewart, and Jack Delton, under the able leadership of their Chairman, Harold Smith, had at long last, won their fight with New York State for a settlement on the old fire house property. After a long legal battle, including several trips to Albany by Chairman Smith in person, the State has paid the Fire District \$50,000. This money is to be put in a Capital Reserve Fund to be used for the purchase of expensive apparatus at a future date. The committee commended Mr. Smith for his outstanding leadership of the Board.

The vote on the proposed budget will take place next Tuesday, Sept. 8, 1959 from 7:00 PM to 10:00 PM at the firehouse on Broadway opposite the Birchwood Shopping Center. All taxpayers whose names appear on the last assessment rolls and who have resided in the district for at least 30 days are eligible to vote.

The Editorial Board of THE VILLAGER joins the Board of Directors of the Civic Association in urging all residents to VOTE "YES" on the proposed fire budget.

This listing contains the names of various firms whose goods and services may be obtained at discount prices exclusively for members of the Birchwood Civic Assoc. at Jericho.

The Health, Sanitation and Safety Committee enlightened the board with their progress to date. They are seeking to erect a stop sign on Market St. at the entrance to the shopping center. They reported progress in their efforts to restrict

driving schools from using Birchwood streets for teaching new drivers. They revealed their attempts to correct the unsightly conditions of the two unoccupied homes in Birchwood. Their efforts to change the grass cutting pick-ups from Saturday to Tuesday -- will result in the elimination of week-end carry-overs of grass cuttings.

The Zoning committee reported that Town Supervisor John J. Burns recommended that all interested parties regarding the gas station permit on Merry Lane sit down and seek a solution to this problem and promised that the Town Board will not arrive at any decision during the interim. Madden Speaks at Convention

A recreation leader who has long worked with youth says about 15 per cent of the young people in an average community are "actives" or leaders and 10 per cent are "reactives" or delinquent-prone. The remaining 75 per cent are the "passives" or followers.

Speaking before the 47th annual convention of the American Podiatry Assoc. in the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, Joseph F. Madden, Hicksville School District Recreation Director, issued a plea against shunning the "reactives."

"We act like these boys and girls have a plague because they dress differently, talk differently and have different leisure activities," Madden said. "We shun them and reject them because they don't engage in the so-called 'nice' activities. When they strike back and win over vast numbers of the passive segment, we are appalled."

Madden said it is important for community leaders to find out what the "reactives" enjoy and if the activity is not totally destructive—"and it rarely is"—give it some recognition, thereby bringing them under supervision.

Madden participated in a conference on "Health and Recreation Education for American Youth." Speaking of the "actives" among youth in the community, Madden

said: "These are your leaders. They head up student councils, play on football teams, teach Sunday School. My hat goes off to this valuable segment of our youth."

The passives, or the bulk of community youth, find their own quiet way," Madden said. Many make great contributions later in life.

He urged that every community set up a "sensible pattern for leisure."

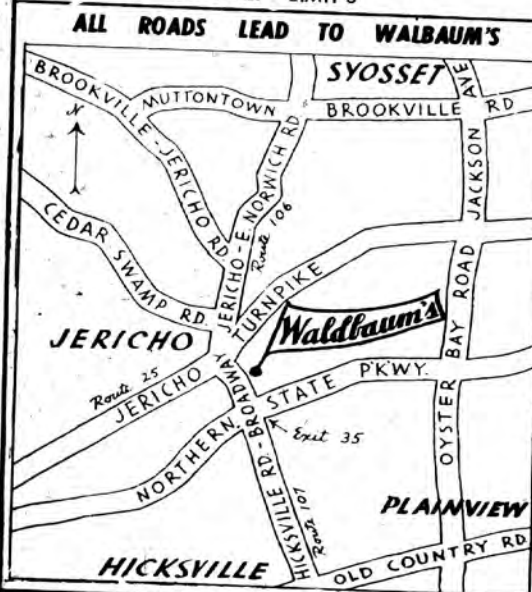
