

At this time the Nassau Center feels that the community should make available to the parents of these children facilities for their care and training.

By such preventive care not only may many children be reclaimed for society at an early date but the long-term treatment and handling, part or all of which must be sorne by the taxpayer, would be avoided. This, on a long-term basis, would result in a very sizeable decrease in State and Federal funds needed for this aspect of mental illness. The Nassau Center is trying to build the bridge in Nassau County for the psychiatric care, raining and education of these-children to once again make them into, useful members of society.

At the same meeting, Superintendent LaBarron reported that he had been able to procure the services of a Dental Hygenist, a Mrs. Gordon of Bayonne, NJ, at \$8 per day, He recommended that she be engaged and his recommendation was adopted and the outract authorized.

At the meeting of Oct. 27, 1937 he Superintenden reported the engagement of 'Miss Ferna Kendall as Hygenist, action approved by the teachers committee."

By Jan. 26, 1938, Chief Harry Borley and Fire Commissioner Harry Gleckler appeared before the School Board and presented a check for \$185,63, representing the profits on the 1937 loothall season sponsored by the firemen. The check was accepted toward the purchase of a dental chair 'for the anticipated dental clinic in the high school.' A bank accunt fund was established for this purpose.

It was not for several years that sufficient funds were raised, together with additional monies provided by the school district, to buy the dental chair for the new Senior High) was acquired in recent years as part of the building alteration and addition.
