

AFTER 30 YEARS: Tie in Point Standings For 2nd Consecutive Year

For the second consecutive year in the 30-year running of the Hicksville Fire Dept., Labor Day parade and tournament the old-fashioned bucket brigade decided the tied winners in point standings. Oyster Bay Rough Riders repeated their performance of last year, Monday, and came from behind to tie the points at 16-all to share top honors for the day with Uniondale Hellcats.

St. James, which had tied with Oyster Bay for first last year at 18-18, just missed by one point this year and with a score of 15 took home the handsome second place Grumman's point trophy. Oyster Bay and Uniondale will get duplicates of the 3-foot Certz trophy for the day while the Rough Riders retired the 4-foot leg trophy by winning for the third successive year. Great Neck was third in points with 12 1/2.

Uniondale was one of the big surprises of the day and almost had it made, going into the final contest of the day. Last year Uniondale was way down the list with only 2 points scored ... a fourth place in a single event. The Hellcats had piled up 16 points in the first seven events but failed to score in bucket brigade this year.

Darkness was falling fast and floodlights were used when the bucket contest was run. A good portion of the 10,000 spectators on the course for most of the afternoon was still on hand, so intense was the competition.

Police estimated there were 22,000 spectators on hand for the parade in the morning which included 3,253 marchers, 34 bands, 46 fire departments and 14 ladies' auxiliary units. There were 200 ladies in the parade, 2,157 uniformed firemen and 896 musicians.

There were 60 Nassau County police on duty during the day under the command of three lieutenants and three sergeants. While there were the usual number of injuries to firemen and spectators, none apparently were critical. Three people were removed to the hospital, including two spectators, one of whom fell off the grandstand.

DENTAL PROGRAM STARTED IN 1937:

Professional Dentists Check Teeth

Hicksville Public Schools engaged its first dental hygienist on Feb. 25, 1937 -- twenty-two years ago. With the start of the new fall term in Hicksville, professional dentists will conduct the examination of children's teeth for the first time instead of dental hygienists.

Twenty-two years ago a committee of local dentists met with the Board of Education, according to the official district records. At a meeting held Jan. 27, 1939, Dr. Elkund, Dr. Youdelman, Dr. Ferdinand and the late Dr. E. A. Curtis met with the

School Board.

"The minutes of that meeting read: 'They discussed with members the advisability of having dental service given our children and all agreed that the service is well worth while and should be continued. After some discussion it was decided that for this year the best solution of the problem would be to engage a dental hygienist'."

At the previous meeting held Dec. 30, 1936, the then new School Superintendent, E. H. LeBarron, reported to the Board that the "Red Cross

would not as heretofore do the (dental service) work."

At the Feb. 25, 1937 meeting, Walter Schlichting of the Alumni Assoc was present and reported the will ingness of the Alumni Assn to "equip a chair for the dental clinic and if their funds allowed to further furnish the clinic. He was advised that the efforts of the Assn would be well come and appreciated and due credit given."

At the same meeting, Superintendent LaBarron reported that he had been able to procure the services of a Dental Hygienist, a Mrs. Gordon of Bayonne, N.J., at \$8 per day. He recommended that she be engaged and his recommendation was adopted and the contract authorized.

At the meeting of Oct. 27, 1937 the Superintendent reported the engagement of "Miss Ferna Kendall as Hygienist, action approved by the teachers committee."

By Jan. 26, 1938, Chief Harry Borley and Fire Commissioner Harry Gleckler appeared before the School Board and presented a check for \$185.63, representing the profits on the 1937 football season sponsored by the firemen. The check was accepted toward the purchase of a dental chair "for the anticipated dental clinic in the high school." A bank account fund was established for this purpose.

It was not for several years that sufficient funds were raised, together with additional monies provided by the school district, to buy the dental chair for the new Senior High School. A dental chair for the old High School (now the Junior High) was acquired in recent years as part of the building alteration and addition.

CURRENT COMMENT :

Imperial Opposition

WE DON'T KNOW if the Imperial Gardens Civic Assoc. Inc. is authorized to speak for the 175 families in that new development in the extreme northeast corner of Hicksville, but we hope the comments attributed to the Assoc. in the Westbury Times last week were inaccurate.

To keep the peace in the neighborhood, this information is in the hands of the Hicksville School District and on the East of Oyster Bay side of the town line.

For reasons best known to themselves, the residents have advised the post office department to change their mailing address to Westbury, but that is where their association with Westbury (or more correctly New Cassel) apparently ends.

The Civic group has petitioned the School Board and has received permission to hold meetings in Hicksville schools. The children of the neighborhood attend Hicksville schools.

According to the Westbury report, the Imperial Gardens people are upset about the industrial zoning on Press Wireless. They take issue with the Town Board of Oyster Bay for going to court to appeal the industrial zoning under the town's comprehensive plan. They take issue with the Hicksville School Board for supporting the industrial zone plan. To quote:

"Imperial Gardens civic leaders say they are quite surprised that the School Board, instead of favoring enlarged educational opportunities for children including 'newcomers', sought to take an easy 'economy' way out."

They are apparently bothered because the School Board has withdrawn designation of a school site on Cantigue Rd. when the zone change from residential to industrial was announced. The proposed school on Cantigue was never intended to serve Imperial Gardens alone.

Few actions have met with such universal approval in Hicksville, as a whole, as the rezoning of Press Wireless from residential to industrial. The Town Board was actually petitioned in favor of such rezoning by Hicksville residents and civic groups.

The only opposition to the zone change that we recall was from the land speculators who wanted to sell off some 300 to 400 building sites.

We like to think that the Imperial Gardens civic group has been misinformed and could learn to love it. However, the blast in the Westbury Times, after the passage of almost a year of occupancy, makes it appear that the facts are known and bluntly rejected.

Warning on Red Tuna

To The Editor:
 During the past two weeks, four cats were admitted to the Angell Memorial Hospital in Boston, Mass., with a serious disease, Stenitis, due to the feeding of red tuna. Dr. Gerry Schnelle, Chief of Staff of the Hospital, stated that a previous warning had been given on the dangers of this food, but the problem has risen again.

A canned food for cats, a large portion of which is "red", are so called dark meat tuna, and now bearing a notation on the label that Vitamin E has been added, is no safe to feed to cats as a major portion of the diet. It will produce a serious illness manifested by loss of appetite, soreness over the body, and fever. Cats so afflicted will sometimes eat nothing but the dark meat tuna, and thus intensify their illness and increase its seriousness. This food is safe if fed as a treat or as a very small portion of the diet; but otherwise it is not.

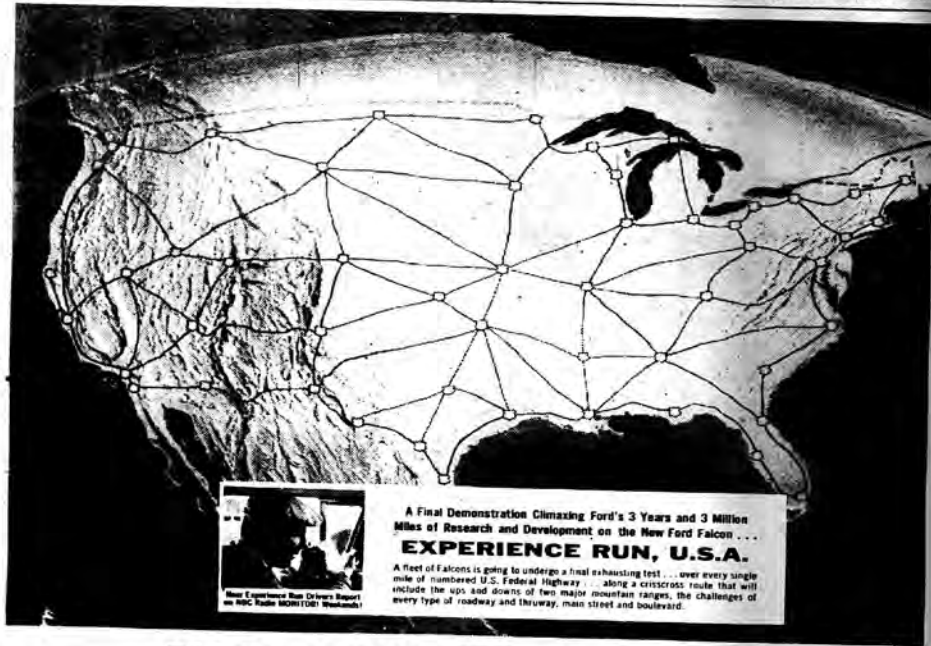

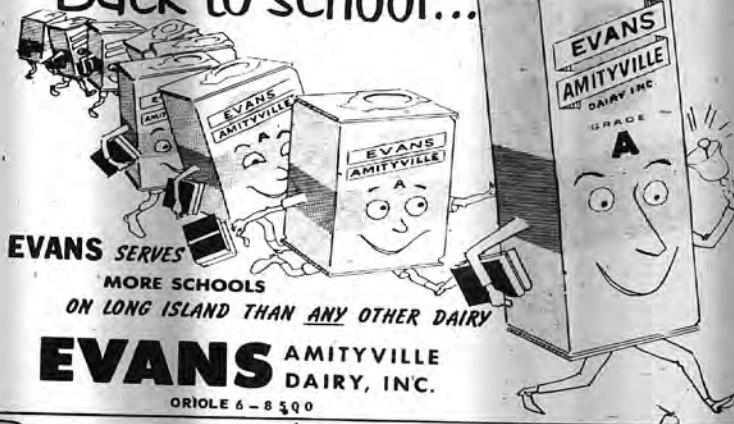
