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State Approves New Project:

\$2 Million School Bldg. Vote Nov. 19

Voters of Hicksville School District will be asked to approve a two-million dollar "package" school construction program at a special referendum on Thursday, Nov. 19. The Board of Education is calling a special meeting for Monday night, Sept. 28, in the Senior High School to explain details of the program to representatives of Parent-Teacher Associations.

A single "yes" or "no" will decide four-part proposal. The School Board voted Friday night to submit the entire package as a single question because each of the four portions depends upon adoption of all other portions.

The total proposal will be a bond issue for \$2,125,000 including:

Construction of an elementary school on Willet Ave. at a cost of \$875,000.

Construction of an addition to the Senior High School and acquisition of some adjacent property at a cost of \$635,000.

Construction of a gymnasium

and some interior alterations at East St. School at a cost of \$305,000.

Provision for moving the temporary classrooms from elementary school sites to the junior and senior high at a cost of \$350,000.

School Board President Allen S. Carpenter and Vice President Jerome Zettler were in Albany last week with Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, superintendent of schools, and the School Architects to get approval from the State Education Dept. upon the entire proposal.

Got a Light -- Anyone?

The newest road hazard to our community and residents lies on the improved strip of Broadway that passes between the Jericho Fire House and the Birchwood Shopping Center. In the absence of traffic lights, or any other means of halting the flow of speeding cars, a double difficulty is mounted. Fire engines have found it difficult, if not impossible, to speedily enter Broadway against heavy traffic during an emergency; and it becomes a dangerous task for shoppers to enter into or exit from the new shopping center. This area screams for traffic control lights.

The VILLAGER learned recently that for at least five months, the necessary poles, cables, switches and control boxes to carry and operate traffic lights have been installed and are ready for operation between the Fire House and the Shopping Center. The only remaining obstacle to the installation of the lights themselves is a dispute between the State Traffic Control Board and the electricians union of the Broadway Maintenance Corp.

It is alleged that Broadway Maintenance Corp. has the contract for installation of all lights on Broadway and the union at this shop insists that non-union electricians can not do the job. The State agency, on the other hand, which does not hire union help, insists upon completing their own work.

This impasse has lasted for more than five months. Meanwhile, there have been two serious accidents in this area, and there may be more. Jericho Fire Commissioner Harold Smith has expressed his deep concern over this situation, but his appeals to State agencies, have been in vain.

There have been installed in the Fire House, for many months, the necessary controls to operate a red danger signal light to stop traffic in all directions when the engines are called out on alarms. Neither this light, nor the regular traffic light prescribed for this area will be installed until the parties to the dispute have agreed on who shall do the final installation. While every day, the danger grows greater, THE VILLAGER is not primarily interested in whose responsibility it is to complete the installation. It is concerned, however, with the safety and well being of all the residents of this area, and will continue to press for an immediate solution to this local hazard.

Fire Budget Wins Approval

On Tuesday, Sept. 8, by a vote of 36 to 1, the budget proposed by the Jericho Fire District for 1960 was approved. This budget provides for a 33% reduction in our tax rate (from 38¢ to 25¢ per hundred dollars of assessed valuation.)

Commissioner Smith stated: "I believe this budget is adequate and can be made to work." He also reported the presence of \$58,000.00 in the Capital Reserve Fund, most of which came from our court battle with the State for our old property. An additional \$10,000.00 is forthcoming from the Defense Dept. of the Federal Government for Civil Defense facilities which were installed by our Fire Department and have a dual role for fire fighting and for warning in Civil Defense.

The monies of this Capital Reserve Fund are intended for the purchase of new Fire Trucks or for the expansion of our present facilities.

Syosset School Vote on Sept 26

On Saturday, Sept. 26, Syosset residents will have the opportunity to vote for the construction of a second Junior High School, to be erected on a site already purchased for that purpose by the School Board. They will also be asked to approve a proposition authorizing the addition of nine class rooms to the Robbins Lane School. This addition has been made necessary by the continued increase in residential construction in the vicinity.

At present, all sixth graders in the school are being transported to the South Grove Jr. H.S. It is expected that, by 1960, there will be no room for these students at that Jr. High School, and that the Robbins Lane School would then be forced onto Double Session. The above mentioned addition would prevent this double session. Since the proposition requires a two-third vote to pass, the Syosset Education Committee of the Birchwood Civic Assoc. urges all residents of Birchwood to vote "YES!" on this most important question.

Financial aid from the State establishes the estimated cost to Birchwood residents for the addition plus the Junior High School at six cents per hundred dollars of assessed valuation.

Reduced operating costs are, also, anticipated as a result of certain design features and because of the location of the second Jr. H.S. in the center of the school population it will serve is expected.

Political Forum

No More Smoking Permitted

As reported in the last issue of the "Villager", the Birchwood Civic Association once again was faced with a local problem which, had it been permitted to continue, might have resulted in physical harm to a number of residents as well as considerable smoke damage to property along Village Drive and Birchwood Park Drive.

Fortunately and due to the fine cooperation by the Jericho Fire Department, L.I. Expressway Contractor De Lillo, a committee of local residents and officers of our Civic Association, an understanding was arrived at during a two hour emergency meeting held Saturday, Sept. 5 at the De Lillo Construction Co. Executive Offices in Hicksville. This meeting was attended by Jericho Fire Commissioner Harold Smith, Fire Chief Allan Monroe, Joseph De Lillo and members of his firm. Village Drive Civic Assn. Block Captain Mike Altman, Ralph Diamond, Gilbert B. Stein, Pres. and 1st Vice President respectively of the Birchwood Civic Assn., and a committee of local homeowners directly affected.

De Lillo, under the terms of his contract with the State of New York has a right to burn trees and other refuse which has been accumulated in the course of clearing the right of way behind our community where the new L.I. Expressway will go through. Mr. De Lillo promised to issue immediate orders that no more old rubber tires would be used in starting these fires. In order to obtain enough of a blaze so that tree stumps etc. will burn up, Mr. De Lillo will henceforth make available quantities of kerosene to his workmen which are to be thrown into the fire to create a non-smoking fire generating enough updraft to avoid recurrence of a condition which saw smoke, smell and soot drift into homes along Village Drive and Birchwood Park Drive.

More Facts About Expressway

While meeting with Joseph De Lillo of the De Lillo Construction Co., contractors for the Jericho Section of the L.I. Expressway, several facts were called to our attention which no doubt will prove of interest to Birchwood/Jericho residents.

Firstly, it will be approximately two years until this local section of the Expressway will be completed. THE VILLAGER will publish a map of the Expressway and its various intersections showing the quite intricate network of roads, access-roads and approaches which will be constructed here. Mr. De Lillo pointed out that probably the most serious problem to local residents would be the dust condition which should make itself felt next spring and summer. Before final grading, paving and seeding takes place, dust will no doubt drift into our community and Mr. De Lillo assured us that he stands ready to minimize this problem by liberal use of Water and Calcium Chloride. The Civic Assoc. Liaison Committee, made up of Village Drive residents will, we fear, have an opportunity soon enough to test Mr. De Lillo's offer of cooperation in this regard.

Secondly, a rather serious inconvenience will be in store for residents of Village Drive. Either this Fall or in Spring of 1960, under the terms of the contract with the State, the Contractor is required to break up the entire pavement along Village Drive. New drainage ditches are being dug right now. According to State specifications, Village Drive will receive a concrete base, state

approved curbs, and then a new black top. There is presently no concrete base under the existing black top.

Since Curbstones will be replaced, part of the present curb strip must be disturbed and with it no doubt any trees now located there. This project will take approximately 3 weeks from it's start to completion (it takes 7-10 days for cement to dry). During this time Village Drive residents cannot use this street and will have to park their cars on Birchwood Park Drive, Open Street or Placid Street. Arrangements will have to be made with neighbors to the rear, permitting Village Drive residents to trespass to and from their homes via their Birchwood Park Drive, unless they prefer to walk a goodly distance to their homes. The Civic Association will try to make suitable arrangements with the Traffic Dept. of Nassau County Police, to relax parking restrictions etc. during this period.

Thirdly another and perhaps far more serious problem will be the one of keeping youngsters from playing at an in the Express Way Construction area. The De Lillo Construction Co. has promised to put up a 5 foot high temporary fence along Village Drive. As we know from what has happened in other areas of Greater New York, when children were killed and seriously injured at the scene of road construction after having managed to get over or through such fences, it will be up to each and every parent to instruct his and her children to stay away from this area. Our kids must be constantly reminded of this grave danger to their lives.

into smaller piles and future burnings will not take place when the ceiling is low or when atmospheric conditions will prevent a smokeless blaze. In addition the De Lillo Construction Co. will station two men with ready fire hoses near the scene of these fires, so that they can be put out if need be. The Jericho Fire Dept. also will make available local volunteer firemen to stand by. It was agreed that no burnings would take place on weekends. Finally it was established that only a total of three additional days burnings were needed in our area to complete the elimination of our up trees and refuse.

Fire Chief Monroe and Fire Commissioner Smith made most of these suggestions which of course reflect their experience in dealing with these matters over many years. Their cooperation, and in fact the cooperation of the entire Jericho Volunteer Fire Department during the emergency leading to this meeting, has been outstanding. The community owes them a real vote of thanks.

A Civic Assn. sponsored Homeowners Liaison Committee has been set up to take care of this as well as any other problems which will come up in connection with the Expressway construction. Block Captain Altman is in charge of this committee and will take up any complaints.

We are very appreciative of the fine spirit of cooperation displayed by the Executives of the De Lillo Construction Company who have pledged Birchwood their continued cooperation. As Mr. Joseph De Lillo put it so aptly, "We are going to have to live together during the next two years and there will be many problems arising out of our Jericho phase of the Expressway construction which will affect Birchwoodites. We may as well get to know one another now and see up machinery to lick these problems as they come up." This indeed is what happened at this meeting. It goes without saying that the officers and members of the Board of Directors of our Birchwood Civic Association will continue to do their share in the protection of the residents and (members) affected by this Expressway Construction in helping to minimize the many inconveniences etc. which are bound to crop up time and again.

Last Fall, when our Jericho Players presented their production and tickets had to be pushed, Bob actually made as many as 50 to 60 phone calls of an evening. During World War II he served for three and a half years with the U. S. Air Force. He enlisted as a private and was discharged with the rank of sergeant.

Mr. Ocker who retains his active membership in the Plainview Volunteer Fire Dept., was chief of the department in 1949, 1950 and 1951.

He has been chairman of the Plainview Cancer Fund Drive, zone chairman in the Township for the same fund and has been chairman of Boy Scout and Red Cross fund campaigns in his home community. A past president of Plainview's first service club, the Kiwanis, he has also continued to serve as a Little League team coach.
