Part of the policy is a schedule of charges and fees for various facilities, Monday thru Friday, as follows: general purpose rooms or classrooms \$7, elementary gymnasiums or cafeterias, \$10; senior high school little theatre, \$15; and junior or Senior High auditoriums, gymnasiums and cafeterias \$25. he charge for Saturdays, Sundays and holidays is higher.

All gatherings held in schools must end at 12 midnight, under the new policy, with a charge of \$10 made if the activity runs beyond 11 P.M.
