Fee for Bldg Use

Civic associations and other non-school connected organizations will pay an annual \$15 fee for the use of schools in Hicksville for meetings, recreational or entertainment purposes under a new, all embracing policy on building use adopted by the Board of Education, recently.

Requests for the use of schools must be made in writing, only, not less than 15 days before a desired date.

Part of the policy is a schedule of charges and fees for various facilities, Monday thru Friday, as follows: general purpose rooms or classrooms \$7, elementary gymnasiums or cafeterias, \$10; senior high school little theatre, \$15; and Junior or Senior High auditoriums, gymnasiums and cafeterias \$25. The charge for Saturdays, Sundays and holidays is higher.

All gatherings held in schools must end at 12 midnight, under the new policy, with a charge of \$10 made if the activity runs beyond 11 P.M.

"The tax reduction" Burns

asserted, "will be in addition to the already established tax savings made possible by the consolidation of the Special Garbage and Parking Districts. While there is no dollar estimate at this time," he said, "with regard to the Town tax, the Town Board studies show that the savings through consolidation, coupled with the expected reduction in the general Town tax will be accomplished without sacrificing essential services required by the homeowners and taxpayers."

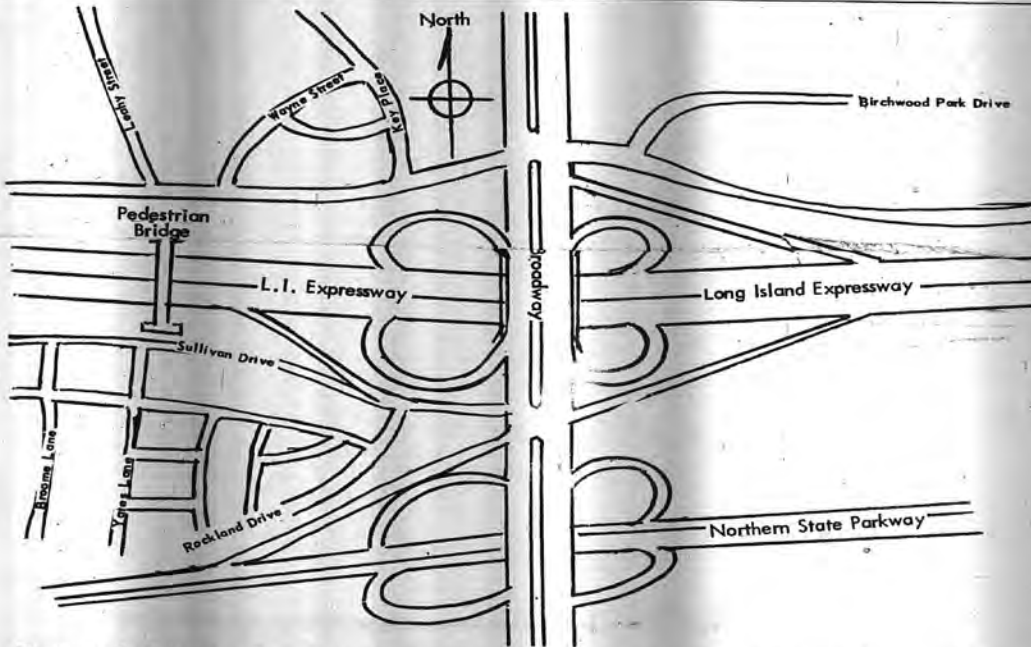

Reveal Plans for Expressway and West Birchwood

by HOWARD COLE

A new map showing the route of the Long Island Expressway through Jericho brings good news to West Birchwood. The map shows exits and entrances to the community.

The map shows the marginal road running parallel to Sullivan Drive. It is a one way road running east until it meets Rockland Drive. There the road widens to 52 feet and becomes a two way street.

In order to enter the highway on the way to New York City, you will leave West Birchwood via Rockland Drive, turn left into Broadway and

head north toward East Birchwood. Entrance to the Long Island Expressway heading west will be a cloverleaf leading off from Broadway. Coming from New York to West Birchwood, you will leave the expressway at the Broadway exit and turn off to Rockland Drive on the right.

Crossing the Expressway halfway between Yates Lane and Essex Place will be a footbridge leading to Leahy St. in Princeton Park, and to the Seaman School. Another point of note is the builder's statement of intention to construct houses in back of the north side of Sullivan Drive, facing the marginal road and the Expressway.

An apparently favorable development is that the interchange roads between the Expressway and Northern State Parkway will be well beyond our area. Plans are for the Expressway to cross beneath Broadway and intersect with the Northern State Parkway near Manetto Hills Road in Plainview. This would alleviate the fears that Broadway would bear a great deal of interchange traffic.

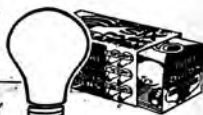

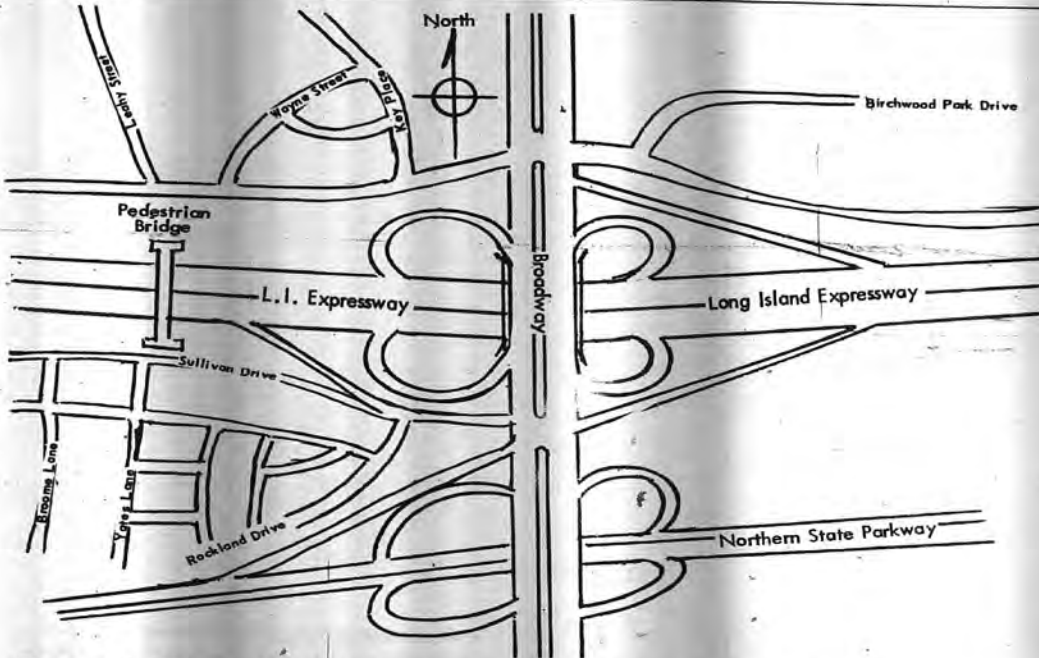

Reveal Plans for Expressway and West Birchwood

by HOWARD COLE

A new map showing the route of the Long Island Expressway through Jericho brings good news to West Birchwood. The map shows exits and entrances to the community.

The map shows the marginal road running parallel to Sullivan Drive. It is a one way road running east until it meets Rockland Drive. There the road widens to 52 feet and becomes a two way street.

In order to enter the highway on the way to New York City, you will leave West Birchwood via Rockland Drive, turn left into Broadway and

head north toward East Birchwood. Entrance to the Long Island Expressway heading west will be a cloverleaf leading off from Broadway. Coming from New York to West Birchwood, you will leave the expressway at the Broadway exit and turn off to Rockland Drive on the right.

Crossing the Expressway halfway between Yates Lane and Essex Place will be a footbridge leading to Leashy St. in Princeton Park, and to the Seaman School. Another point of note is the builder's statement of inten-

tion to construct houses in back of the north side of Sullivan Drive, facing the marginal road and the Expressway.

An apparently favorable development is that the interchange roads between the Expressway and Northern State Parkway will be well be-

yond our area. Plans are for the Expressway to cross beneath Broadway and intersect with the Northern State Parkway near Manetto Hills Road in Plainview. This would alleviate the fears that Broadway would bear a great deal of interchange traffic.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT a Public Hearing will be held by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay on Tuesday, October 6, 1959 at 10 o'clock A.M., prevailing time, in the Hearing Room, Town Hall, Oyster Bay, N.Y., at which hearing citizens and parties interested will have an opportunity to be heard upon the following proposed ordinance regulating the operation of Tow Cars in the Town of Oyster Bay, New York:

TOW CAR ORDINANCE

ARTICLE I

Legislative Findings

Sec. 1.0 It is hereby declared and found that it is of vital importance to the traveling public that disabled vehicles be removed from the highways as promptly as possible, that delay in removal results in retardation of the movement of traffic unnecessarily and causes street accidents and that the towing of disabled motor vehicles in streets of the Town of Oyster Bay is a matter affecting the public interest and consequently should be subject to supervision and administrative control for the purpose of safeguarding the public against fraud and exorbitant rates and similar abuses.

ARTICLE II

Definitions

Sec. 2.0 Unless otherwise expressly provided, the following word for the purpose of this Ordinance, shall have the meaning herein indicated:

(a) TOWN: "Town" shall mean the unincorporated area of the Town of Oyster Bay, outside the City of Glen Cove and the incorporated villages located within the Town of Oyster Bay, either on private property or on highways within the Town of Oyster Bay.

(b) TOWING: "Towing" shall mean the moving or removing of disabled or abandoned motor vehicles by another vehicle for hire.

(c) TOW CAR: "Tow Car" shall mean a motor vehicle which is used to remove any disabled motor vehicle from the scene of an accident or to remove abandoned motor vehicles.

(d) FOR HIRE: "For Hire" shall include any incident where a fee, charge or other consideration is directly or indirectly imposed for towing, carrying or removing a vehicle, and it shall include any case where any person or persons on a towed vehicle for a consideration although no charge is expressly imposed for the towing of such vehicle.

(e) PERSON: "Person" shall include an individual, a partnership, any unincorporated association, a corporation or any other entity.

(f) OWNER: "Owner" shall include a person owning or leasing or controlling one or more tow cars and driving or operating or causing any such vehicle to be operated upon the public highways for hire.

(g) DRIVER: "Driver" shall mean any person driving a tow car upon the public highways.

(h) HELPER: "Helper" shall include any person on the tow car other than the driver.

(i) OPERATE: "Operate" shall include the control and direction of the use of a vehicle and the use of vehicle for towing from places within the Town of Oyster Bay.

ARTICLE III

Sec. 3.0 It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any tow car owned or controlled by him or permit the same to be operated upon the public highways of the Town, without having first obtained and then having in force, an owner's license therefor, as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 3.1 Every license issued hereunder shall expire on the 31st day of December, next succeeding the date of its issuance, unless sooner revoked by the Town Board, as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 3.2 Every person who desires to operate a tow car or tow cars owned or controlled by him upon the public highways within the Town shall file with the Town Clerk a written application upon forms to be furnished by the Town Clerk, verified under oath stating:

(a) The name and address of the applicant, address place from which tow cars are proposed to be garaged and dispatched, specifying in the case of any unincorporated asso-

ciation, the names and addresses of each number thereof, and in the case of any corporation the names and addresses of each officer.

(b) All crimes of which the applicant or any member thereof, if an unincorporated association, or any officer, if a corporation, has been convicted, stating the name and location of the court in which and the date on which such convictions were had and the penalties imposed therefor.

(c) The experience of the applicant in the towing of vehicles for hire.

(d) Any facts which the applicant believes tend to prove that the public convenience and necessity require the granting of a license to him.

(e) The number of vehicles proposed to be operated by the applicant and a description of each such vehicle including the make, model, year or manufacture, New York State registration number and motor number thereof.

(f) The age and citizenship of the applicant and each member thereof, if an unincorporated association, and each officer thereof, if a corporation.

(g) The location of any and all depots and terminals proposed to be used by the applicant.

(h) Any other relevant information which the Town Clerk may require.

Sec. 3.3 Every individual applicant for an owner's license shall at the time of submitting his application also (a) submit two individual photographs of the applicant taken within thirty days prior to the date of the application, 1 1/2" x 1 1/2" in size and such pictures must be in a true likeness of the applicant and must show neck, shoulders and uncovered head; (b) be fingerprinted under the direction and supervision of the Town Clerk.

Sec. 3.4 Upon receipt of any application, the Town Clerk shall refer the same to the Nassau County Police Department for such investigation as it shall deem necessary or advisable and report therefor.

Sec. 3.5 (a) If the Town Clerk shall find that the tow car service in the area in which the applicant proposes to operate is required by the public convenience and necessity and, from the statements contained in the application for a tow car owner's license that the applicant is a fit and capable of properly conducting such tow car business and to conform to the provisions of this Ordinance, then the Town Clerk upon the certification of each tow car proposed to be operated by the applicant pursuant to Article VIII hereof, and the furnishing by the applicant of proof of insurance, a license stating the name and address of the applicant, and the date of the issuance thereof, the number of vehicles the applicant is authorized to operate, and at the same time the Town Clerk shall issue a license bearing the words "Licensed Tow Car", and assigned number, and the year of issuance; otherwise such application shall be denied.

(b) Before making any findings as to whether public convenience and necessity justify the issuance of a tow car owner's license, or the licensing of additional cars under Section 3.8 hereof, the Town Clerk shall cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the Town of Oyster Bay a notice, stating that application has been made for the licensing of a vehicle or vehicles as tow cars, the number of vehicles for which such application has been made and containing a statement that written arguments as to whether public convenience and necessity require the licensing of such vehicles must be filed with the Town Clerk on or before the date fixed therein, which date must be not less than eight days after the date of such publication. Any arguments so filed must be considered by the Town Clerk in making his findings as to public convenience and necessity.

Sec. 3.6 In making the findings required by Sec. 3.5 hereof, the Town Clerk shall take into consideration the number of tow cars already in operation in the Town, particularly in the area in which

the applicant proposes to locate his depots and terminals, whether existing tow car service is adequate to meet the public need, the probable effect of additional tow cars on local traffic conditions and the character, experience and responsibility of the applicant and the adequacy of the service which the applicant proposes to give.

Sec. 3.7 The Town Clerk may, in his discretion, before the issuance of a license under this Article, require the applicant and any others having knowledge of the facts to submit to an examination under oath and to produce evidence relating thereto, or hold a hearing upon such application as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 3.8 Every owner licensed under this Article who shall desire to add to the number of tow cars he is then operating pursuant to a license hereunder, shall file with the Town Clerk a written application under oath stating:

(a) The name and address of the applicant.

(b) The applicant's owner's license number.

(c) Any facts which the applicant believes tend to prove that the public convenience and necessity require such addition.

(d) A description of each such additional tow car including the make, motor number and the year of manufacture.

(e) If the Town Clerk shall find that the addition of such tow car or tow cars is required by the public convenience and necessity, then he shall issue a supplementary owner's license stating the name and address of the applicant, the number of the applicant's operators license, and the number of additional vehicles the applicant is authorized to operate, and the date of the issuance thereof; and at the same time, a license for each additional tow car in the form as provided in Section 3.5 (a) hereof; otherwise such application shall be denied.

Sec. 3.9 Every owner licensed under this Ordinance who shall desire to add additional places of tow car service or who shall desire to transfer a place of tow car service shall file with the Town Clerk a written application under oath stating:

(a) The name and address of the applicant.

(b) The applicant's owner's license number.

(c) Any facts which the applicant believes tend to prove that the public convenience and necessity require such additional places of tow car service or transfer of place of tow car service.

(d) The address of the additional place of tow car service or transfer.

(e) If the Town Clerk shall find that the additional places or transfer of tow car service is required by the public convenience and necessity, then he shall issue written permission stating the additional places or transfer, as the case may be, and the date thereof; otherwise such application shall be denied.

Sec. 3.10 Any license issued under this Article may be renewed annually for additional periods of one year each from the date of expiration upon the filing of an application containing all the information required by the provisions of this Ordinance for original applications, except the facts with respect to public convenience and necessity.

Sec. 3.11 No license shall be issued or renewed under this Article which shall permit the use of any vehicle as a tow car unless and until it has been inspected pursuant to Article VIII hereof and certified to the Town Clerk as conforming to the provisions of this Article.

Sec. 3.12 Each applicant shall, before the issuance to him of a license under this Article, file with the Town Clerk evidence that he is insured against public liability in the limits of \$10,000 for personal injuries and \$20,000 for personal injuries for each accident and \$5,000 for property damage, which insurance shall be maintained in force during the period covered by the license.

Sec. 3.13 The owner's license issued hereunder shall not be transferable.

ARTICLE IV

Applications to Town Board

Sec. 4.0 It shall be unlawful for any person to operate a tow car for hire in the Town of Oyster Bay as a driver or to be or as a helper on or in connection therewith, unless such driver or helper shall have first obtained a license from the Town Clerk, as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 4.1 Every driver or helper's license issued under this Article shall be issued as of the date of the granting thereof and shall expire on the 31st day of December next succeeding, unless sooner revoked by the Town Board as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 4.2 Every person desiring to operate or drive or act as a helper on a tow car for hire upon the streets of the Town, shall file an application for a license so to operate or act with the Town Clerk which application shall be in writing upon forms to be furnished by the Town Clerk and verified under oath and shall state:

(a) The name, address, and age of the applicant.

(b) A full description of the applicant including his color, height, weight, color of eyes and hair, any scars or marks and the nature of any physical infirmity from which he may suffer.

(c) Recommendation by two residents of Nassau County who have known the applicant for a period of three years or more and who will vouch for the applicant's sobriety, honesty and general good character.

(d) Whether or not he is a citizen of the United States.

(e) The names and addresses of the applicant's employers during the last two years prior to his application.

(f) All crimes of which the applicant has ever been arrested or convicted, stating the date and place of each such arrest and the nature and location of the court in which and the date on which each such conviction was had and the penalty imposed therefor.

(g) In the case of a driver the number and date of issuance of the applicant's New York chauffeur's license.

(h) Any other relevant information which the Town Clerk may require.

Sec. 4.3 Every applicant for a driver or helper's license shall at the time of submitting his application, also:

(a) Submit two individual photographs of the applicant, taken within thirty days prior to the date of the application 1 1/2" x 1 1/2" in size and such pictures must be a true likeness of the applicant, and must show only neck, shoulders and uncovered head.

(b) In the case of an application for a driver's license, exhibit his current New York State chauffeur's license for inspection.

(c) Be fingerprinted under the direction and supervision of the Town Clerk.

Sec. 4.4 Upon the receipt of any application, the Town Clerk shall refer the same to the Nassau County Police Department for such investigation as it shall deem necessary or desirable and report thereon.

Sec. 4.5 Upon the receipt of the police report provided for in this Article, the Town Clerk shall issue a tow car driver's license to the applicant, if he shall find that the applicant holds a New York State chauffeur's license and is a fit and proper person to drive a tow car considering his experience, police record and character otherwise such application shall be denied.

Sec. 4.6 Upon the receipt of the police report provided for in this Article, the Town Clerk shall issue a tow car helper's license to the applicant, if he shall find that the applicant is a fit and proper person considering his experience and character; otherwise such application shall be denied.

Sec. 4.7 The driver or helper's license issued hereunder shall not be transferable.

ARTICLE V

Applications to Town Board

Sec. 5.0 Any applicant who shall have been denied a license, or application, under this Ordinance by the Town Clerk, or who shall have been issued a license by the Town Clerk for less tow cars than the number for which he applied, may

Driver and Helper's License

(b) A full description of the applicant including his color, height, weight, color of eyes and hair, any scars or marks and the nature of any physical infirmity from which he may suffer.

(c) Recommendation by two residents of Nassau County who have known the applicant for a period of three years or more and who will vouch for the applicant's sobriety, honesty and general good character.

(d) Whether or not he is a citizen of the United States.

(e) The names and addresses of the applicant's employers during the last two years prior to his application.

(f) All crimes of which the applicant has ever been arrested or convicted, stating the date and place of each such arrest and the nature and location of the court in which and the date on which each such conviction was had and the penalty imposed therefor.

(g) In the case of a driver the number and date of issuance of the applicant's New York chauffeur's license.

(h) Any other relevant information which the Town Clerk may require.

Sec. 4.3 Every applicant for a driver or helper's license shall at the time of submitting his application, also:

(a) Submit two individual photographs of the applicant, taken within thirty days prior to the date of the application 1 1/2" x 1 1/2" in size and such pictures must be a true likeness of the applicant, and must show only neck, shoulders and uncovered head.

(b) In the case of an application for a driver's license, exhibit his current New York State chauffeur's license for inspection.

(c) Be fingerprinted under the direction and supervision of the Town Clerk.

Sec. 4.4 Upon the receipt of any application, the Town Clerk shall refer the same to the Nassau County Police Department for such investigation as it shall deem necessary or desirable and report thereon.

Sec. 4.5 Upon the receipt of the police report provided for in this Article, the Town Clerk shall issue a tow car driver's license to the applicant, if he shall find that the applicant holds a New York State chauffeur's license and is a fit and proper person to drive a tow car considering his experience, police record and character otherwise such application shall be denied.

Sec. 4.6 Upon the receipt of the police report provided for in this Article, the Town Clerk shall issue a tow car helper's license to the applicant, if he shall find that the applicant is a fit and proper person considering his experience and character; otherwise such application shall be denied.

Sec. 4.7 The driver or helper's license issued hereunder shall not be transferable.

ARTICLE V

Applications to Town Board

Sec. 5.0 Any applicant who shall have been denied a license, or application, under this Ordinance by the Town Clerk, or who shall have been issued a license by the Town Clerk for less tow cars than the number for which he applied, may

apply to the Town Board for a reconsideration of the action of the Town Clerk as hereinafter provided.

(a) Such application to the Town Board shall be in writing, signed and verified by the applicant and shall state the ground or grounds which the applicant claims that the determination of the Town Clerk was erroneous.

(b) Such application shall be filed with the Town Clerk by the applicant within twenty days after notice of denial of his application by the Town Clerk has been mailed to him or delivered to him in person.

(c) Upon the filing of such application, the Town Board shall hold a hearing thereon pursuant to the provisions of Article VI thereof.

(d) At such hearing the Town Board shall consider the applicant's application upon the record before the Town Clerk in connection with the Town Clerk's consideration and in its discretion may receive new or additional evidence in support thereof or in opposition thereto.

(e) Sec. 5.1 The Town Board after such hearing, may affirm the action of the Town Clerk or direct the Town Clerk to issue a proper license pursuant to this Ordinance.

ARTICLE VI

Hearings

Sec. 6.0 (a) Whenever it shall be provided herein that a hearing shall or may be held by the Town Board, such hearing shall be held on a date and at a place to be designated by the Town Board.

(b) The Town Clerk shall give notice thereof, stating the name and address of the applicant or license holder concerned, the subject matter of the hearing and the date, place and hour thereof designated therefor, by mailing a copy thereof to the applicant or license holder concerned at the address shown upon the most recent application of such applicant or license holder at least (10) ten days before such hearing.

(c) Upon any hearing, the applicant or license holder involved shall be entitled to be represented by legal counsel and to present such competent and material testimony or other evidence in his own behalf as may be relevant to the subject matter of the hearing, and

(d) All witnesses shall be sworn and examined under oath.

ARTICLE VII

Issuance of Licenses

Sec. 7.0 The fees for filing applications hereunder which shall be paid to the Town Clerk at the time the application is filed shall be:

(a) The Owner's license fee of \$20.

(b) A driver's or Helper's license fee of \$2.

(c) Owner's supplementary license fee of \$10.

Sec. 7.1 Upon the issuance of a license or supplementary license:

(a) For each vehicle licensed as a tow car \$50.

(b) For tow car substitution \$10.

(c) For replacement of a license medallion \$10.

(d) For replacement of such drivers or helpers license \$2.

(e) For replacement of vehicle license card \$2.

Sec. 7.2 Every license issued hereunder shall be signed at the direction and in the name of the Town Clerk and sealed with the seal of the Town of Oyster Bay.

Sec. 7.3 The Town Clerk shall keep a record of the name and address of each person to whom a tow car owner's license has been issued under this Ordinance, showing the date and number of such license and all renewals, suspensions and revocations thereof, and a record of each tow car licensed hereunder stating the make, model year of manufacture, New York State registration number, and motor number thereof, and the name and address of the person owning said tow car and a record of each driver and helper's license issued hereunder showing the name and address of such driver and helper, his New York State chauffeur's license number, his driver and helper's license issued hereunder and the date of issuance of such driver and helper's license.

ARTICLE VIII

Condition and Inspection of Tow Cars
Sec. 8.0 Every vehicle operated upon the streets of the Town as a tow car shall be kept fit, of good appearance and in a safe condition for towing.

Sec. 8.1 The Town Board shall establish reasonable rules and regulations for the inspection of tow cars operated upon the streets of the Town.

ARTICLE IX
Suspension and Revocation of License

Sec. 9.0 Any license issued hereunder may be suspended for a period of not more than three months or revoked by the Town Board if the holder thereof shall violate any provision of this Ordinance or any rule or regulation adopted hereunder, or any ordinance of the Town or be convicted of the violation of any traffic law, ordinance or regulation of the State of New York, or any municipality of the State of New York, or of any crime, or be guilty of making a false statement or misrepresentation in his application. Any license issued hereunder may be suspended by the Town Board if the holder thereof shall be indicted or charged upon information, duly filed with the public authorities with or for the commission of any crime or offense until such holder shall be convicted or acquitted of such crime or offense.

No license shall be either suspended or revoked by the Town Board hereunder without a hearing thereon, held not less than twenty days after written notice thereof shall have been given to the licensee, either in person or by registered mail.

Sec. 9.1 The Town Clerk, upon receiving information giving him reasonable cause to believe that the holder of any license issued hereunder has violated any provision of this Ordinance or been convicted of any violation referred to in Sec. 9.0 hereof or indicted or charged with or for any crime or offense, or is guilty of having made a false statement or misrepresentation in his application, may forthwith temporarily suspend such license, until a hearing is held by the Town Board as provided in Sec. 9.0 hereof and the Town Board shall have issued its determination thereon.

ARTICLE X
Regulations for Tow Car Owners

Sec. 10.0 Each tow car operated hereunder shall bear on the outside of each front door the words "Tow Car" and the name and address of the owner in letters not less than 2 inches and not more than 4 inches in height, either painted thereon or otherwise securely affixed thereto. The license shall be affixed to the left front door in a conspicuous place as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 10.1 A tow car owner shall have legibly inscribed on each side of the tow car in letters and numerals not less than 1 1/2 inches in height, the lawful towing rates he has filed with the Town Clerk.

Sec. 10.2 Towing and Storage Charges.

(a) The owner of a tow car shall prepare a typewritten schedule in triplicate of maximum prices to be charged for towing and storing of disabled motor vehicles, and all three copies of such schedule shall be filed with the Town Clerk.

The charges for towing shall be based solely upon the distance disabled vehicles are to be towed and not estimated or based upon the availability of tow cars. Towing charges shown on schedules, filed as required herein, shall not exceed the following maximum charges:

First mile or part thereof. \$10
Each additional mile or part thereof. \$1.

(b) Storage charges shall be at the rate of not more than one dollar for each twenty-four hours or part thereof. These towing or storage charges shall not apply to the towing of motor trucks exceeding one and one-half ton capacity, nor shall they apply to towing under a contract which was in existence prior to the motor vehicle involved having become disabled. No information

shall be contained in this schedule other than charges for towing and storage.

Sec. 10.3 Estimates and Repairs. No fee shall be charged either directly or indirectly for making an estimate for repairs on any motor vehicle involved in an accident or otherwise disabled, without the prior written consent of the owner of the disabled vehicle. The agreement form for repairs required hereunder, must be in substantially the following form:

Sec. 10.4 Towing authorization. No vehicle involved in an accident or otherwise disabled, shall be removed without an authorization, a form prescribed by the Town Clerk, signed by the owner of a vehicle or other person in charge thereof. Such authorization shall be for the towing and storage of the vehicle only, and shall show the rates to be charged for towing and storing said vehicle. Such signed authorization shall be retained by the licensee tow car owner for a period of six months and shall be exhibited upon demand, to any official of the Town or any member of the Nassau County Police Department. The towing authorization required hereunder, must be in substantially the following form:

Sec. 10.5 Bill for Towing. The owner of a tow car shall have prepared a pad of bills containing a printed billhead showing the name and address of his place of business.

The operator of a tow car shall prepare a bill on this billhead form, in duplicate, the original of which shall be furnished to the owner of the disabled vehicle or his authorized representative. This bill must be printed in a form approved by the Town Clerk and shall contain the following information:

(a) Full name and address of person engaging tow car.

(b) State registration number of disabled vehicle.

(c) Total amount to be charged for towing and storage rate per twenty-four hours or part thereof.

(d) Full name and address of operator of tow car.

(e) State registration number of tow car.

(f) Tow Car license number. The duplicate of the bill shall be retained by tow car owner for a period of six months. These bills shall be exhibited upon demand of

any official of the Town or any member of the Nassau County Police Department. Upon payment of the bill given to the owner of the disabled vehicle or his authorized representative, licensee shall acknowledge receipt of payment of such bill.

(g) Every owner, upon the sale or other disposition of a licensed tow car shall within twenty-four hours notify the Town Clerk of such sale or other disposition and surrender the license or licenses.

ARTICLE XI
Regulations for Tow Car Drivers and Helpers

Sec. 11.0 A licensed tow car driver shall employ a helper.

(a) Have his identification card in his possession at all times while engaged in his occupation as a tow car driver or helper, and a tow car driver while so engaged shall also be in possession of his chauffeur's license.

(b) Not permit any other person to use his identification card.

(c) Not be engaged on an unlicensed tow car or on a tow car the license for which has been suspended or revoked.

(d) Promptly report the loss of his identification card to the Town Clerk.

(e) Report change of address to the Town Clerk within forty-eight hours.

(f) Have with him at all times properly authorized forms for towing and repair, such forms to be printed and maintained by tow car owners.

(g) Not be addicted to the use of drugs or intoxicating liquors.

Sec. 11.1 Each driver and helper at the scene of an accident shall:

(a) Exhibit his identification card to owner of disabled vehicle or person in charge thereof or to any Town officer or any member of the Nassau County Police Department.

(b) Not remove any vehicle from the scene of an accident until proper authorization has been signed by owner of disabled vehicle or person in charge thereof.

(c) Not remove any vehicle involved in an accident in which a person has been injured until released by a duly authorized member of the Nassau County Police Department.

Sec. 11.2 Every tow car driver and helper shall obey all traffic laws, ordinances, rules and regulations while operating a tow car and upon receipt of a summons or his arrest for any alleged violations of any such ordinance, rule, regulation or same within three days to the Town Clerk advising him of the nature of the offense charged and the name and the location of the Court and the date upon which said summons is returnable or the date on which the hearing of such trial is to be held.

ARTICLE XII
General Provisions

Sec. 12.0 It shall be unlawful for any person to drive along any street or bridge in the Town of Oyster Bay and solicit towing work. Solicitation of towing work by the operator or other occupant of a tow car while parked on any street or bridge is also prohibited. A tow car operator shall not proceed to the scene of a disabled motor vehicle without having been requested or notified to do so by the owner or his authorized representative or the Police. Responding to a call, merely upon notification from gas station attendants, taxicab drivers or other unauthorized persons shall be considered in violation of this provision.

Sec. 12.1 The owner or driver of any disabled motor vehicle shall have the right to require the services of any available tow car and it shall be unlawful for any owner or driver, or helper of any tow car to refuse to render such services if such owner or driver of such disabled motor vehicle is able and willing to pay the fees prescribed in the schedule of prices filed by the owner of such tow car with the Town Clerk provided, however, that it is physically possible for such tow car to tow such disabled motor vehicle and that such tow car is not already going to or returning from a job.

Sec. 12.2 Licensed tow car owners, drivers and helpers when required, will answer all communications received from the Town Clerk.

Sec. 12.3 It shall be unlawful for any owner, driver or helper to refuse to surrender a license or licenses to the Town Clerk upon demand, after such license or licenses have been suspended, revoked or expired.

Sec. 12.4 It shall be unlawful for any person to demand or receive any payment in excess of the maximum charges permitted by this ordinance or shown on the schedule filed by the owner with the Town Clerk.

Sec. 12.5 (a) It shall be unlawful for any tow car owner, driver or helper or any other person to make repairs or to charge a fee directly or indirectly for making an estimate for repairs on any vehicle involved in an accident or otherwise disabled, without entering into a signed agreement with the owner or other person in charge of said disabled motor vehicle fixing the cost on a form prescribed by Article X hereof.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any owner, driver or helper or any other person to enter into an agreement for the repair or for the estimate for repairs where the owner or person in charge of the motor vehicle involved in an accident is hospitalized because of such accident, until the expiration of at least 24 hours from the time of such accident, unless the injured person has, before the expiration of said time, been discharged from the hospital.

Sec. 12.6 It shall be unlawful for any tow car owner, driver or helper or any other person to remove a motor vehicle involved in an accident or otherwise disabled, without an authorization signed by the owner or other person in charge on a form prescribed by Article X hereof.

ARTICLE XIII
Penalties

Sec. 13.0 Any person who shall violate any provision of this Ordinance shall be liable to a fine of not more than \$100, or imprisonment for not more than six months or to both such fine and imprisonment, and to the suspension or revocation of any license hereunder held by him.

ARTICLE XIV
Severability, Title and Effective Date

Sec. 14.0 If any clause, sentence, section, paragraph or provision of this Ordinance shall be adjudged by a court or competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, section, paragraph or provisions directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered.

Sec. 14.1 This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Tow Car Ordinance of the Town of Oyster Bay."

Sec. 14.2 The foregoing Ordinance shall take effect January 1, 1960.

Blasts 'No Tax' as Tammany Grab

Big City "Tammany politicians" are reaching out for the home communities of Oyster Bay Township again — this time through School Districts — under the guise of "reducing taxes", it was warned today by Thomas R. Pynchon, Oyster Bay Town Republican Chairman.

"The Democrat proposal to load the full cost of local public education 'on the state' is coldly calculated to bedazzle the voters," Pynchon told a meeting of campaign leaders at town headquarters in Hicksville. "The state is the people. This proposal is nothing more than a gimmick to bail out debt-ridden Tammany controlled New York City at the expense of the taxpayers of the state."

"In the process, our community school districts would lose all authority to decide for themselves on the kind of educational program they desire and feel they can afford."

"Promising the voters 'something for nothing' is the oldest device in the Tammany bag of tricks. It can hardly be expected to fool anyone in this enlightened day and age."

"Under the proposal, offered tongue in cheek by the opposition, our hard working and sincere School Board members would be merely rubber stamps for some state bureaucrat. Any failure on the part of a Board of Education to follow the dictates of the ward-healers controlling the purse strings would mean the end of fiscal support to finance local education."

"It would be, in contrast to our great American heritage, taxation without representation since the right of our homeowners to vote

and decide on questions of school taxation would end.

"And the assault on home rule would not end there because the Democrats propose to merge all special districts — without exception. Local home rule of volunteer fire departments and water supply districts would vanish into the hands of political appointees."

"The people of our Town have read a great deal about 'austerity school budgets' in recent months. The sugar-coated Democrat plan would, in effect, impose an austerity budget of minimum services on each and every school district. Under a plan, parents must provide text books, school lunches and transportation."

"Glib political campaign talk by the opposition, unable to find issues on the level of town administration, holds out the phoney promise of specific tax savings for homeowners. The wholehearted promise is qualified by the admission that the laws of the State of New York would have to be changed before anything could happen," Pynchon asserted.

Pynchon noted that "it is significant that no recognized authority or official in the field of public education in our great state, or on the local level, has been found to agree with a single phase of this 'pie in the sky' dazzler."

"Under our present laws providing for local, home rule determination of how our schools shall be operated and the people decide how much they shall tax themselves for their operation, we have developed one of the finest systems

of public education anywhere in the nation."

"Hard pressed school districts with rapid growth problems have received, under Republican-sponsored legislation, financial assistance amounting to millions of dollars."

"No mention of 'emergency aid' for hard-pressed rapid growth areas is to be found in the Democrat proposal. It is to be assumed, therefore, that basic, per pupil aid would not recognize emergency situations."

"As for the cost — even the most casual observer can recognize where it would hit and hit hard. Right back in the pocket book, this time without the right of local vote, smack into the wage earner's pocket in the form of greatly increased income taxes," he declared.
