## Town Engages Lawyer To Negotiate Car Parks

OYSTER BAY — The Town Board, acting upon a resolution submitted by Councilman Frank Chlumsky, has retained Attorney Michael J. Sullivan of Hicksville, to negotiate with property owners in the Hicksville business section for acquisition of property.

## May Leave Post Open Till Vote

HICKSVILLE—A strong possibility that the School Board may defer the appointment of a trustee to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation last week of Dr. Charles J. Masek was seen this week by experienced observers.

The annual school district election of trustees, including one to fill the position left vacant by Dr. Masek, will take place during the first week in May. Candidacy for such election must be made known during April.

And while a person elected in May would not officially take office until July 1, the School Board could decide to appoint the successful candidate immediately to serve out the months of May and June.

HICKSVILLE — All authorities will be solicited by the Civic and Community Association in an effort to obtain fiscal assistance from Levitt and Sons for the school district in building additional schools, it was learned last night. The Civic executive committee will start by asking the Town of Oyster Bay to withhold building permits for proposed construction of Levitt houses in the school district "until cooperation is received on our problem." Civic President Lawrence A. Roman stated.

Acting upon the instructions and authority of the civic membership given at the January meeting, the executive committee met Friday night to consider what action might be taken to obtain relief from the anticipated school cost burden. With 3,000 homes or more to be built by Levitt and Sons in Hicksville School District starting this year, it is anticipated that the number of community schools will have to be doubled.

The Association believes that Levitt and Sons should bear the cost of at least two of the needed schools since the mass influx of population and new students, resulting from the large-scale project, will be more than the community could normally absorb.

OYSTER BAY — While applications have been made to the town building department by Levitt and Sons for home construction in the township and Hicksville, no permits have been issued as yet pending servicing of the applications, it was learned yesterday. Informed sources estimated that construction might be started "in a week or two."

## COLUMBIA REPORT, Part 2: See School Headaches Lasting 10 or 15 Years

HICKSVILLE — This school district must anticipate a "rather serious" situation over the next 10 to 15 years in regard to local school building problems, according to Columbia Teachers' College experts.

The Board of Education today made public the second portion of a recent letter from Education Prof. H. H. Linn of Columbia. The first portion, published in the Herald last week recommended the immediate acquisition of at least eight sites for future school buildings. The report will be concluded next week.

**Must Acquire Property**  
The second installment notes: "There is an immediate need for acquiring property in connection with the Levitt development since this huge project already has been started, and it is quite possible that at least 3,000 more homes will be built in this (Hicksville) area within the next 12 months."

"We have pointed out five sites in the Levitt development that in our judgment should be secured for future school building and playground purposes. These sites range in size from 5 to 20 acres each. While no doubt some people will question the need for the larger acreage, we should like to emphasize the desirability of getting such adequate sites at this time before property has been developed; since, when communities are built up as densely as some of your areas will be in the future, there must be adequate playground space for both the children and the adults of the community." The inquiry has been received by the Business Men's Assoc. Inc. and anyone who can provide 30,000 square feet for this purpose is invited to contact the BMA office at 162 Bway without delay.

The Town Board is seeking property for additional off-street parking facilities in Hicksville, Chlumsky explained.

At the Board meeting last week it was reported that David Smucker (boss of the Long Island Rail Road, has asked the town to be "tolerant and patient" regarding negotiations for the use of the Hicksville Rail Road Plaza for parking also. Smucker advised the town fathers that the RR Plaza "is still the number 1 proposition" although the RR legal department is probing the method by which the RR can transfer the use of the field to the town for parking.

It was pointed out that under the bankruptcy law the RR does not enjoy the freedom of action of a private concern. Smucker is also said to have admitted that the RR did receive an offer from a private party to purchase the Hicksville plaza.

The town board is also progressing ordinances to be adopted shortly ordering the removal of overhanging signs in business streets in the township and regulating plumbing.

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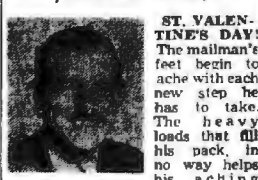

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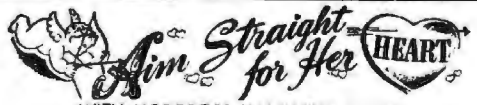
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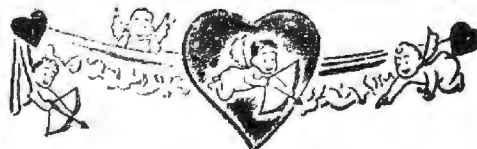
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# MEET THE LADIES: Mrs. Acker Guides East St. P-TA

When an organization dedicated to the promotion of the child's welfare in the school, home, church and community is directed by a president such as the energetic personality of Mrs. John Acker, the result is the kind of meetings that have been going on at East Street School in Hicksville for the past two years.

Important matters pertaining to the school and the pupils' welfare demand much of the parents' time and efforts, yet everyone seems to have a good time at these monthly meetings and the enthusiasm runs high. Attendance averages about 90 to 100 mothers, fathers and teachers and even more parents would like to attend but are faced with baby sitting problems.

### Productive Meetings

"Our friends have been telling us about the wonderful P-TA meetings you've been having," they tell Mrs. Acker.

Talking to Mrs. Acker either during one of her P-TA meetings or in the big windowed living of her home on East St., Hicksville, it is quite apparent why the P-TA meetings are so enjoyable. Her informal manner and wonderful sense of humor create a congeniality so necessary to a good productive meeting.

"There's a fine feeling of generosity in this P-TA group," she said. "Everyone gives his cooperation so eagerly that it's never a question of one person doing all the work."

"The bazaar we held in November was such a grand success because so many worked on the affair," she explained. "They built the booths and decorated them and then made the articles to sell at the bazaar, such as cakes and pies, jellies, cookies and all sorts of knitted articles."

Since the general P-TA was divided into three associations in 1948, the separate units are fast becoming the most popular organizations for the young-parent set and strong voices in community affairs when the issues concern the youth of the town.

Protection at the crossings near East Street School was the first problem tackled by the P-TA when it met for the first meeting of the season last fall. Mrs. Runhild Nygren, program chairman, meets with Mrs. Acker and the executive committee before each meeting to plan the program and discuss new projects for the unit. These suggestions are presented at the next P-TA meeting where the membership either accepts, rejects or modifies the plans.

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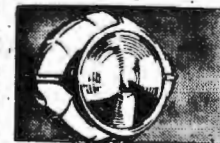
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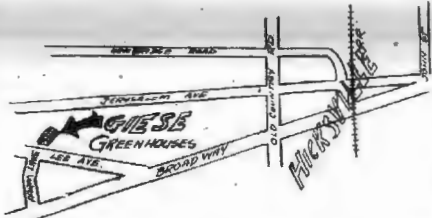

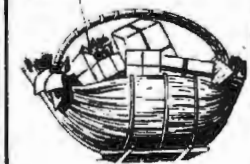

Furthermore some communities are now planning parks adjacent to school grounds.

"Hicksville will not be able to solve all of its school building problems over the next few months but must anticipate a rather serious situation over the next 10 to 15 years. Because so many of the new residents will be

young people with families, there will be a tremendous increase in the elementary school enrollment over the next decade, to be followed by congestion in the junior and senior high school grades a few years later.

"The elementary schools will have a sharp increase in enrollment this coming September (1950) and will be pressed for space from that time on until adequate new building facilities can be provided. Unquestionably, there will have to be several new elementary school buildings erected in Hicksville in the immediate future. How to finance these buildings will be one of the problems facing Hicksville, and it is quite probable that the community will experience some lag in providing essential facilities because the money simply will not be available to do all that would be desired as soon as needed." the installment concludes.

Last week the Civic and Community Assoc., unaware of the findings of the preliminary Columbia Survey report, started an effort to force Levitt and Sons to pay the cost of "at least three" of the new schools which will be needed in the south-west section of the school district by the new residents who will occupy the houses Levitt is building this year.

It is distressing to witness an accident such as the one in which Farmingdale's Charlie Finger and Hicksville's Dick Kerbs were involved, Friday night, and realize that provisions made for such occurrences by our Public School systems are far from adequate.

It is a matter which we will take up at great length when all the facts are known to us, but for now it is enough to know that in the case of injury on the basketball court, football field, baseball diamond, etc. the school is responsible for only a small part of the medical bill.

The major burden for the cost of replacing or repairing such things as teeth falls upon the parents of the student involved.

There can be no doubt that accidents will happen in interscholastic competition but they are far from the number that would happen if the boys were allowed to spend their energies in unsupervised neighborhood contests.

Complete insurance cannot be expected but provisions for more extensive coverage by the New York State Department of Education would seem only a matter of fairness.

We are at a loss to understand wherein a Public School can see its way clear to pay two men \$12.50 each for officiating its basketball contests and not provide fuller protection for the players.

What the whistle blowers take out of these contests is far out of proportion to what the coaches, teachers, players and parents put into such games and thus make them possible.

Frank Ruggiero's blend of seasoned talent and errant but promising youngsters is a year away from spelling any real success for the Hicksville Kiwanis, despite a string of well-played if losing games.

1950 would be chalked up as a banner year, however, if the Blue could apply the crusher to Jericho's pennant hopes tomorrow night.

There is no great open and fierce rivalry here but victory for either side would be sweet.

Judging before hand, this is the hardest one to figure out since the two outfits started tangling with each other. In other games there was a clear advantage extended to one team or the other.

In recent times it has gone to Jericho but this time Hicksville has a very good chance to win.

And it must be remembered that playing on the home-court will work as a hindrance and not as a help to the Kiwanians who have looked to best advantage on the bigger floors of the league.

**IN OUR OPINION:**

**Problem First, Then Tax Money**

JOHN W. CHISHOLM is superintendent of the First Supervisory District of Nassau County, which includes, in this area, all local schools except those in Hicksville District. Hicksville has its own village superintendent, E. H. LeBarron.

In his annual report for 1949, filed with County Executive J. Russel Sprague this week, Chisholm made a point which has significance for other areas experiencing rapid growth:

"In many of the school districts where large developments are taking place most of them are generally instituted following the first of May, when assessments are made for the following tax year. Consequently large numbers of homes are completed during the school year and large segments of population move in; thereby placing a terrific burden upon school housing and instructional facilities without contributing a pro rata share of the increased cost until almost a year later. This problem together with the lag in increased state aid, which extends over a three-year period, places a serious financial burden upon some of the poorer school districts."

And this is what can be expected to happen in Hicksville: Levitt homes built in Hicksville and occupied after May 1st will not appear on the tax rolls until 1951. But students from these new houses (estimated at about 400 pupils to start) will require education before the end of 1950. Eventually, of course, these new houses will pay a proportionate share, but for the first year its going to be rough on the other taxpayers of the district.

**For Centralized Shopping**

PROFESSIONAL city planners, Oscar Stonorov and Louis Kahn, in "You and Your Neighborhood — a Primer" discuss shopping centers. They make this telling point which has great meaning for the mid-Island section:

"Experience has proved that having centralized shopping facilities means greater protection to the neighborhood than having stores scattered haphazardly. . . Most owners of small neighborhood stores barely eke a living from them."
