- All authorities will be solicited by the Civic and Community tion in an effort to obtain fiscal assistance from Levitt and Sons for the school district in building additional schools, it was learned last night. The Civic executive committee will start by asking the Town of Oyster Bay to withhold building permits for proposed construc-tion of Levitt houses in the school district "until cooperation is received on our problem," Civic President Lawrence A. Roman stated.

Acting upon the instructions and authority of the civic membership given at the January meeting, the". executive committee met Friday night to consider what action might be taken to obtain relief from the anticipated school cost burden. With 3,000 homes or more to be built by Levitt and Sons in Hicksville School District starting this year, it is anticipated that the number of community schools will have to be doubled.

The Association believes that Levitt and Sons should bear the cost of at least two of the needed schools since the mass influx of population and new students, resulting from the large-scale pro-ject, will be more than the community could normally absorb.

See School Headaches Lasting 10 or 15 Years

HICKSVILLE - This school district must anticipate a HICKSVILLE — This school district must anticipate a "rather serious" situation over the next 10 to 15 years in regard to local school building problems, according to Columbia eachers' College experts.

The Board of Education today made public the second portion of a recent letter from Education Prof. H H. Linn of Columbia. The first portion, published in the Herald last week recommended the immediate acquisition of at least eight sites for future school buildings. The report will be con-

Must Acquire Property

The second installment notes: There is an immediate need for acquiring property in connection with the Levitt development since this huge project already has been started, and it is quite possible that at least 3,000 more homes will be built in this (Hicksville) area within the next 12 months.

"We have pointed out five sites in the Levitt development that in our judgment should be secured future school building and playground purposes. These sites range in size from 5 to 20 acres each. While no doubt some people will question the need for the larger acreage, we should like to mphasize the desirability of getling such adequate sites at this time before property has been developed: since, when communities built up as densely as some of your areas will be in the future. there must be adequate play-ground space for both the children and the adults of the com-(continued on page 12)

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
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Mrs. Acker Guides East St. P-TA

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



Complete insurance cannot be expected but provisions for more extensive coverage by the New York State Depart-

nor more extensive coverage by the New 10th State Department of Education would seem only a matter of fairness.

We are at a loss to understand wherein a Public School can see its way clear to pay two men \$12.50 each for officiating its basketball contests and not provide fuller extensive for the allowers. fuller protection for the players.

What the whistle blowers take out of these contests is far out of proportion to what the coaches, teachers, players and parents put into such games and thus make them possible.
