# **Readers Debate Police** Attitude on Loose Dogs

Public attention was focused today upon the dog population of the community with Herald readers expressing opposing opinions upon the subject of dogs at large. One reader insists that the police are lax in not compelling dog owners to keep their animals on leash ea; and other reader complains the police are heartless in destroying a dog struck by a speeding auto.

Recently the problem of dogs at large was brought to the attention of Oyster Bay Town Board by Capt. Jack Ketcham of Glen Head. His complaint was against strays and he ask ed for enactment of a town ordinance which would prohibit dogs running at large, licens-ed or not. Explaining he is fond of dogs and likes animals, the Captain asserted "loose dogs enjoy more privileges than humans."

As a result of his appeal Supervisor Harry Tappen at the January meeting appointed Councilmen Frank Chlumsky of Hicksville and Charles Boutillier of Locust Valley a and Charles Boutillier of Locust Valley a committee to investigate and report back to the Town Board

At the same meeting when Ketcham made his plea, the Rev. Howard Rogers of St. Ste-phen's Lutheran Church of Hicksville was and he commented about packs of dogs coaming the community. He said that local physicians had told him there had been

To the People of Hicksville:

It is about time the Nassau Police got after the owners of dogs who allow their pets to run wild around town. Not only are they a menace to the children of the community, but they also do a great deal of damage in breaking shrubs and plants.

Recently a young boy waiking on Broadway in the evening was severely bitten by a large dog and required several stitches on the face and head. What would have happened if it was a small child and was unable to beat off the dog? And yet the police are doing nothing.

It seems most of the dogs I've seen loose are around the development homes why can't the police warn these people about leashing their doge??

There are several residents o Hicksville who feel as I do, and I think a cleanup is in order.

When it was suggested she contact the police at Syosset Precinct if she wished to reach the Town Dog Warden, she replied: "Oh no. I know all about that Jack Roeper and what happens to the dogs he catches. I'll just have to put up with a few damaged shrubs rather than have a dog murdered."

Daily newspapers have been publishing accounts of the Hempstead Town Dog Pound which is operated by Roeper. Oyster Bay Township has its own separate dog pound at the Town Incinerator plant in Locust Grove.

At the present time dogs in the township must wear a license. There is no local regulation requiring them to be muzzled or on a leash, according to Town Clerk Leslie D. Dis-

Town government is now enjoyed by Hickavilie (as well as Bethpage, Pishaview, Jericho and vichity) with its Town Board (supervisor and four councilmen) for general town services and its special districts for various services such special districts for various sexual public parking, traffic control, street lighting, garbage disposal, water supply and fire

lighways are under three agencies. Town high-(most of our residential streets) are under-Town Highway Superintendent, Jöhn R. Braidf, who lives on Fourth St. Then there are county highways (ie, Jerusalem Ave., Herzog Place, Marie St.) which are under the county commissioner of public works with headquarters at Mineola. And there are state highways (Broadway, Newbridge Rd.) under the State Dept. of Public Works which has a regional office at Babylon.

Other town departments of government inclu the Town Clerk (licenses, permits, etc.), Tax Recoiver, Building Inspector.

Under incorporation, many of these functions could be centralized in this community. Most incorporated villages have a Mayor and five village trustees, elected locally and each receiving a small compensation. A principal local establishment would be the village clerk' office where licenses and permits would be is-sued and taxes paid. Many town roads would come under a village street department.

Public schools would remain under the Board of Education just as they are today. Incidentally, the School Board consists of five trustees elected locally for three-year terms each. They receive no compensation for the job.

Services which, in an incorporated area, would remain under the county would include: assessment, health, courts, police, county roads. State roads would remain thusly.

Under incorporation, the town would practically be out of the picture.

All of which is just a preliminary for the discussion and forum tomorrow night. It is hoped that many will attend and ask questions to bring about the fullest consideration of this interesting
