

Readers Debate Police Attitude on Loose Dogs

Public attention was focused today upon the dog population of the community with Herald readers expressing opposing opinions upon the subject of dogs at large. One reader insists that the police are lax in not compelling dog owners to keep their animals on leash; and another reader complains the police are heartless in destroying a dog struck by a speeding auto.

Recently the problem of dogs at large was brought to the attention of Oyster Bay Town Board by Capt. Jack Ketcham of Glen Head. His complaint was against strays and he asked for enactment of a town ordinance which would prohibit dogs running at large, licensed or not. Explaining he is fond of dogs and likes animals, the Captain asserted "loose dogs enjoy more privileges than humans."

As a result of his appeal Supervisor Harry Tappen at the January meeting appointed Councilmen Frank Chlumsky of Hicksville and Charles Boutillier of Locust Valley a committee to investigate and report back to the Town Board.

At the same meeting when Ketcham made his plea, the Rev. Howard Rogers of St. Stephen's Lutheran Church of Hicksville was present and he commented about packs of dogs roaming the community. He said that local physicians had told him there had been

more than 100 dog bite cases, a fact which the minister felt is "a matter to which some thought should be given."

Recently a resident of one of the newer Hicksville developments called the Herald about dogs in her neighborhood "destroying plantings and frightening children." When it was suggested she contact the police at Syosset Precinct if she wished to reach the Town Dog Warden, she replied: "Oh no. I know all about that Jack Roeper and what happens to the dogs he catches. I'll just have to put up with a few damaged shrubs rather than have a dog murdered."

Daily newspapers have been publishing accounts of the Hempstead Town Dog Pound which is operated by Roeper. Oyster Bay Township has its own separate dog pound at the Town Incinerator plant in Locust Grove.

At the present time dogs in the township must wear a license. There is no local regulation requiring them to be muzzled or on a leash, according to Town Clerk Leslie D. Disbrow.

Loose dogs in the community have been a continuous topic of interest for the Hicksville Civic and Community Association although there has been no activity on this question of late.

The two unsolicited opposing views on dogs and police directed to the Herald follow:

In Memory of Blackie Boy!

Nine-year-old pedigreed Blackie Boy, a black cocker spaniel, owned by Mr. A. Munkel, was hit by a speeding auto on Woodbury Rd., Hicksville, Friday p. m., Feb. 10. Blackie Boy, who was loved by hundreds of people, young and old, died by being shot to death by the police, who said Blackie Boy was suffering a lot, all alone with no one around him who cared enough to take just a little more time to find out who his master was, of his accident.

And it only happened around the corner from where he lived. To think Blackie who always dreaded shots or backfires, had to go this way. Even the driver of the speeding car never came around to say he was sorry, though he did report the accident.

Just a few doors down from Blackie's home, a party inquired to see if this person knew who owned a black dog that was hit by a car. But do you think he took a few steps to see if he knew the dog? No, but thought a certain house had a black dog, there he sent the party instead, but when this man found out it was Blackie Boy he felt bad 'cause many a time Blackie Boy was there visiting.

Firemen Learn Use of New Masks

HICKSVILLE—Instruction in the use of masks by fire fighters, including a practical demonstration and test of masks in a fumigated room, was given volunteer firemen at the firehouse Thursday night.

The session, conducted by Deputy

Chief Robert Hopkins of the Nassau County Firemen's Training School, was another in the series of indoor classes being held here every other week.

The training and lecture, covering a period of two hours, included study of three types: All Purpose, Chemox and Scott Airpack. The latter two are developments of the second World War, including self-contained breathing units, while the All-Purpose involves a filter canister and resembles the World War I military gas mask. The local department has sev-

eral of the All-Purpose masks on each piece of fire apparatus and two of the new Chemox masks on the new Co. No. 5 truck.

Deputy Chief Hopkins told the class of volunteer firemen, which included several rookies and older members and department officers that the day is fast arriving when breathing apparatus for firemen will be standard equipment, just as vamps are now outfitted with boots, rubber coats and helmets.

The Firemen's Training School gives training to 64 out of 68 volunteer fire units in Nassau County. The courses run for 10 weeks during the winter months, held indoors. In warm weather there are three sessions on outdoor evolutions.

Training is also being given by Hopkins currently at Jericho, while Chief Genesley is training a group at Bethpage.

Local Chief Dan Munch is also present at all training sessions here.

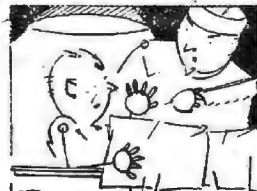

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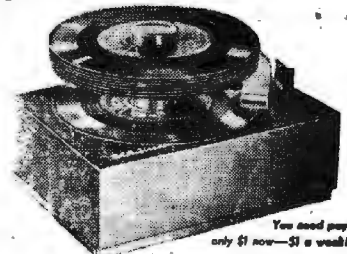

IN OUR OPINION:

Civic Meeting Sounds Interesting

INCORPORATION and town government will be the topic tomorrow (Thursday) night when the Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc. meets in the firehouse auditorium on E. Marie St. The entire community is welcome—all general meetings of the association are open to all interested residents, whether they are members or not.

We believe the Civic group is approaching the topic constructively by inviting speakers to discuss each type of "local" government. Town government is now enjoyed by Hicksville (as well as Bethpage, Plainview, Jericho and vicinity) with its Town Board (supervisor and four councilmen) for general town services and its special districts for various services such as public parking, traffic control, street lighting, garbage disposal, water supply and fire protection.

Newer residents find the system rather complicated and several have suggested publication of a guide to our various functions of government. In brief, fire protection is a local matter with a five-man commission of locally elected commissioners who serve without pay. Water supply is another

local matter with a three-man commission of elected commissioners, each receiving a small compensation.

Street lighting, garbage, parking are town matters, each operated by a special tax district for the community. These special districts are controlled by the Town Board at Oyster Bay. Special local problems concerning these services are unusually referred to Frank Chlumsky of Ernest Ave., Hicksville, who is a member of the Town Board. He is one of four Councilmen elected for four-year terms, city-wide.

Highways are under three agencies. Town highways (most of our residential streets) are under Town Highway Superintendent, John R. Brantiff, who lives on Fourth St. Then there are county highways (ie. Jerusalem Ave., Herzog Place, Marie St.) which are under the county commissioner of public works with headquarters at Mineola. And there are state highways (Broadway, Newbridge Rd.) under the State Dept. of Public Works which has a regional office at Babylon.

Other town departments of government include the Town Clerk (licenses, permits, etc.), Tax Receiver, Building Inspector.

Under incorporation, many of these functions could be centralized in this community. Most incorporated villages have a Mayor and five village trustees, elected locally and each receiving a small compensation. A principal local establishment would be the village clerk's office where licenses and permits would be issued and taxes paid. Many town roads would come under a village street department.

Public schools would remain under the Board of Education just as they are today. Incidentally, the School Board consists of five trustees elected locally for three-year terms each. They receive no compensation for the job.

Services which, in an incorporated area, would remain under the county would include: assessment, health, courts, police, county roads. State roads would remain thuly.

Under incorporation, the town would practically be out of the picture.

All of which is just a preliminary for the discussion and forum tomorrow night. It is hoped that many will attend and ask questions to bring about the fullest consideration of this interesting subject.
