**GETS OFF AT WESTBURY:**

**Penner Distrusts 'Bridge of Sand'**

**HICKSVILLE** — Isaac Penner of Cantiague Rd. so distrusts the "bridge of sand," the passage of the LIRR near the Jones Institute between two sand pits, that he refuses to take the train to Hicksville Station. He gets off at Westbury on trips out from the City.

Penner has requested the Public Service Commission to make "a complete investigation" of the "serious menace to the road bed of the railroad" at this point, he told the Herald. "In order that there be no misunderstanding as to where the responsibility belongs in event of a disaster, I have given notice by registered mail to George Arkwright, Commissioner of the PSC; the trustees in bankruptcy of the Long Island Rail Road, and the members of the Town Board."

Just east of Charlotte Ave., the LIRR roadbed is bordered on north and south sides by extensive sandpit operations.

Classics Expensive Hotels  
Prior to notifying the various

authorities, Penner held the floor briefly at the Civic Association meeting Thursday night. He asserted that "it will cost the taxpayers six million dollars to fill in those holes. I calculate that two million yards of sand have been removed, leaving us with a bridge of sand. Hundreds could be killed at this point if the weakened roadbed gave way. It would be worse than the accident last week in Rockville Centre."

He also renewed his attack upon Press Wireless and its installations along Cantiague Rd. He informed the Civic meeting audience that his attorney "still says they are there illegally. Since there has been no attempt by the town to get them out, we will bring action against the Town," he asserted, apparently referring to legal action by residents of his neighborhood.

During the meeting, a letter from Town Clerk Leslie C. Dibrow regarding the Press Wire-

**PROGRESS ON PARKING:**

**Private Commuter Field  
Ready to Collect May 1**

**HICKSVILLE** — A privately-owned parking field near the Rail Road station where commuters will be able to park upon payment of a small fee is expected to be ready for business by May 1. The fee has not been fixed as yet, although a weekly charge of 75 cents has been suggested.

Construction of the field, expected to take about 60 days, got started Friday morning. The property is the former Kasten property (see map) at Newbridge Rd. and Duffy Ave., south of the RR station. It consists of a little more than 3 acres.

Station Parking Lot, Inc. owns the property and is developing it. Paul Reizen, is president of the corporation. He is the builder who erected the 100 Hicksville Park Homes on Duffy Ave. (600 Beatty Corp.), and is today building 300 homes in East Meadow.

**Capacity of 500 Cars**

The field dimensions are roughly 295 feet along Newbridge Rd. and 680 feet along Duffy Ave., with an initial capacity of 415 cars and eventual capacity of 600. Parking space will start 125 feet back from Newbridge.

**BETHPAGE**—A meeting of the Citizens' Parking Committee will be held this Sunday afternoon, Mar. 5, at the Bethpage School. Plans will be made for recommendations to be presented to the Oyster Bay Town Board.

Huntington township, in contrast to Oyster Bay, it was brought out during a question and answer period, has zoned all its undeveloped land in Residential Class C. Most of Oyster Bay township's open land is Residential Class D or E. Class C, it was learned, requires a minimum house floor space of 800 square feet and a plot 100 x 100.

In Oyster Bay township, class D calls for 60 x 100 plots and 700 square feet. Class E requirements are even more lenient. All the property in Hicksville School District acquired by Levitt and Sons is in Class D.

**Might Change Code**

Fasbender said, in answer to a question, that he felt it would be difficult to get the zoning raised on property just bought for development into a higher classification. However, he did see a possibility in requesting a change in the Building Code Ordinance of the Township to raise the minimum floor space requirement in Class D.

example, to above 700 square feet. An informed realtor told the Herald this week that a floor space requirement above 700 square feet would make houses of the type and price built by Levitt "impossible."

Fasbender was present at the meeting to discuss "Town Government" in the first part of a forum sponsored by the Civics. At the March 23 meeting, an official of an incorporated village will discuss his form of government.

The Huntington town supervisor brought one of the most interesting programs of the year for the Civic group. His talk and the question period which followed consumed nearly two hours.

The subject of zoning arose when he mentioned that Huntington is now confronted with an application to rezone C areas into 80 x 100 foot plots. He pointed out that low cost homes selling under \$10,000 "do not pay sufficient taxes" to carry the added services they want in the community in the form of education, refuse removal, street lighting and police protection, not to mention other public services.

Envis Oyster Bay  
Huntington is experiencing a big growth, he stated, and "people are not at all backward about asking for things. Everything you want costs money and the entire burden is falling upon real estate because there is but very little industry." He said he had long envied Oyster Bay Township because it has Grumman's at Bethpage. He paid tribute to the "honest and capable officials you have in Oyster Bay." After the speaker's talk, petitions were distributed which ask the Oyster Bay Town Board to withhold approval on Levitt building permits until arrangements are worked out to protect Hicksville taxpayers in the matter of additional school costs. President Lawrence A. Roman said he hopes to get 5,000 names on the petitions "within one month."

### Informal Meetings

"Our meetings are very informal, with everyone so friendly, and we have one of the biggest lists of committees this year that we have ever had," she said, in explaining the reason for the consistently well attended meetings of the Bethpage P-TA.

"Mrs. Charles Malone, our program chairman, has brought us some excellent speakers for the 1949-50 program, which is based on the theme, 'Community Responsibilities—The Child and the Home,'" she said.

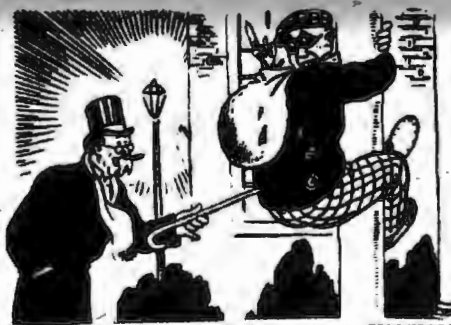

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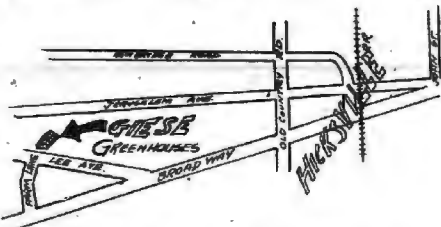

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## Regulations for Lent

CATHOLIC DIOCESE OF BROOKLYN

- The Lenten fast and abstinence begin on Ash Wednesday and cease on Holy Saturday at midday.
- On Sundays there is neither fast nor abstinence.
- All the days of Lent except Sundays are fast days of precept, on which only one full meal is allowed.
- Days of both fast and abstinence are the following:
  - Each Friday of Lent;
  - Ember Saturday and until noon on Holy Saturday;
  - Each Wednesday with the exception of Wednesday of Holy Week.
- Those who have completed their seventh year are obliged by the law of abstinence.
 

Those who have completed their 21st year are obliged by the law of fasting until they have begun their 60th year (i.e., from the 21st birthday to the 59th birthday).
- The use of flesh-meats is allowed at the principal meal on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, except Ember Saturday and Holy Saturday forenoon.
- Flesh-meats and fish may be taken at the same meal on days on which the use of flesh-meats is allowed.
- Those who are exempt from the precept of fasting may eat meat at each meal on the days on which meat is allowed at the principal meal.
- Drugging and lard may be used in preparing food.
- Eggs, milk, butter and cheese may be used every day in Lent at the principal meal and also at the moderate collation in the evening.
- A small quantity of bread, with coffee, tea or thin chocolate may be taken in the morning.
- Where the principal meal cannot conveniently be taken at noon, the order may be inverted, i.e., the collation may be taken at noon and the dinner in the evening.
- By virtue of an Apostolic Indult, the Most Reverend Bishop dispenses working people, who cannot conveniently observe the common law of the Church, from the obligation of ABSTINENCE on all days of the year except Fridays, Ash Wednesday, Vigil of Christmas and the forenoon of Holy Saturday. This dispensation does not exempt from additional obligation of fasting where such exists. It includes, however, not only the individual workmen in whose favor it is granted, but all the members of their families as well. In return, it is expected that those who avail themselves of this indult will endeavor to enter into the spirit of the Holy Season of Lent, by voluntary acts of mortification and penance.
- Paschal Communion in this Diocese should be received between the first Sunday of Lent and Trinity Sunday.

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# The Sportlight

The fine work of coach Chet Jaworski and his charges already has the 1949-'50 basketball campaign of Hicksville wrapped up in fancy paper.

And it makes a mighty handsome present for the followers of the Orange and Black.

All that is needed now is a big bright ribbon to top it off.

On the whole the happy Comet supporters will be pleased without it, but all agree that it would finish off the campaign in grand style.

Jaworski's lads can secure the crowning decoration by beating Westbury in the season finale on the home boards this Friday night.

Aside from scoring against an old and consistent tormentor a second place tie in the final NSAL Eastern Division standings looms as a strong possibility so victory would have an added importance.

Now a win on the court for Hicksville over Westbury has never been an easy achievement for the Orange. In fact, it has only been done twice in the past decade.

In 1942 Charlie Van Wickler led Hicksville to a 28-23 victory in the bandbox and in 1946 the crew of Bill Byrnes, George Van Wickler, Norm Shore, Charlie Lieb and Jim Valentine recorded that now immortal upheaval, 17-16.

Victory was just as scarce for Hicksville prior to the past decade and Orange wins number no more than a half dozen in its 25-year basketball history.

The Comets were defeated in the first game at Westbury this year, 41-35, due to a terrible shooting performance from the foul line.

Right now the Comets are really rolling and it is doubtful that the Westbury defense will check them to any great degree. However, the Green Wave manages to throw in a good many points of late so look for a high scoring game with Hicksville somewhere around a 58-50 winner.

It will also be Westbury night for Frank Ruggiero's Hicksville Kiwanis, Thursday, when the Legion comes for a visit.

As with the high school, the Kiwanians will be out to avenge an early season loss, 48-44, suffered in the Westbury gym.

Currently on a three game winning streak and gunning for a 500 season the Kiwanis should be able to gain win number six after a hard struggle.

The Jericho Fire Department is enjoying a two week layoff from NCABL action. Time alone can tell whether or not that will bring peace to the House of Jericho or only add to the rumblings of discontent which have come from the North since the Vamps have fallen into unhappy days.

Councilman Frank Chlunsky and the Rev. Howard Rogers, chairman of the Citizens' Advisory Committee on Parking, were present for the start of ground-clearing Friday. After the grounds are cleared, it will be rolled, graded and then covered with sand and oil. Arrangements for lighting are being made.

"I wish to congratulate the sponsors of this project upon the start of this privately-owned and operated field for commuter use," Chlunsky declared. "The Town is proceeding with arrangements for strategically located shopper parking fields and has an engineer's plan for a 56-car field behind the stores (See C on map) inside the block bounded by Broadway, Marie St., Jerusalem Ave. and Herzog Place."

The town is also planning to acquire other small, localized plots in the business section for shoppers, he continued, "and it is hoped with the imposition of a three-hour parking limit in these fields to make them fluid for shopping."

### Parking Meters Soon

He promised that installation of curb parking meters will take place "just as soon as there is tangible evidence that facilities for off-street parking have been provided." Meters may be installed on Broadway from the Professional Bldg. to Cherry St., East and West Marie St., Herzog Place and Jerusalem Ave., from the station to Nicholas, he added.

The Station Parking Lot Corporation, meanwhile, is attempting to work out a plan for refunding of commuter parking fees in proportion to local shopping done. Under such a plan, merchants would pay back, on the basis of monthly sales by such parkers, a portion of the monthly fee.

There has been talk about a service station being operated on Newbridge Rd. in conjunction with the private parking lot. To date, however, no application for a permit to operate such a station has been filed.
