


PROGRESS ON PARKING: PrivateCommuterField Ready to Collect May 1 HICKSVILLE — A privately-owned parking field near

the Rail Road station where commuters will be able to park upon payment of a small fee is expected to be ready for bus-iness by May 1. The fee has not been fixed as yet, although a weekly charge of 75 cents has been suggested.

Construction of the field, exstarted Friday morning. The prop-arty is the former Kasten prop-erty (see map) at Newbridge Rd. and Duffy Are., south of the RE station. It consists of a little ore than 3 acres.

Capacity of 500 Cars The field dimensions are roughly 295 feet along Newbridge Rd. and 680 feet along Duffy Ave., with an initial capacity of 415 cars and eventual capacity of 500. Parking spee will start 125 feet, back from Newbridge. (continued on page 14)







CATHOLIC DECESS OF BROOKLAN

1. The Lenten fast and shatmence begin on se on Holy Securday at midday. 2. On Sundays there is neither fast nor ab min on Ash Wednesday and

3. All the days of Lient except Sundays are fast days of precept which only one full meal is allowed.

4. Days of both fast and abstinence are the following:

(a) Each Friday of Lent;

(b) Ember Sa.urday and until noon on Holy Saturday; (c) Each Wednesday with the exception of Wednesday of Holy Week.

5. Those who have completed their seventh year are obliged by the law of abstinence.

Those who have completed their 21st year are obliged by the law of fasting until they have begun their 60th year (i.e., from the 21st birthday to the 59th birthday).

6. The use of flesh-meat is allowed at the principal meal on Mon day, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, escept Ember Saturday and Holy Saturday forenoon. 7. Flesh-most and fish may be taken at the same meal on days on
