RAIL ROAD PLAZA: GOP Club Plan to Buy Plot Surprises Roman

HICKSVILLE — The published recommendation of the Hicksville Republican Club Inc. that Rail Road Plaza be bought from the LIRR for parking of autos today brought forth an expression of surprise and amazement from Lawrence A. Roman, president of the Civic and Community Association. Rail Road Plaza, the parcel of property just north of the RR station, between Broadway and Jerusalem Ave., has been the topic of considerable concern for the Civics and Town officials.

Remove Last Span Of Motor Parkway

BEHPAGE — The Nassau County Public Works Dept. has begun the demolition of the bridge and grading on probably the last Motor Parkway span in the county, here. The structure which carried the old Motor Parkway across Central Ave. and the LIRR Railroad right-of-way at the point they intersect.

Removal of the span was long the objective of various local civic and community groups during the past several years.

Destruction of a bridge and grading at the Massapequa-Woodbury Rd. and Motor Parkway span, near the Nassau County Sanatorium in Old Bethpage section is also underway.

Francke Injured In Auto Mishap

HICKSVILLE — Ernest F. Francke of Field Ave., Republican village leader, is recovering at his home from a broken left arm and other injuries suffered in an auto accident near his home, this week.

He was hurt when his car collided with a tree on Field Ave. a few hundred feet from his home, Tuesday night, while returning home from work.

Brown-Out Ends After 16 Days

The brown-out of commercial lighting in the mid-island area which went into effect on Feb. 18 was cancelled this week on Monday when County Policemen went from store to store and passed - the word. Business streets which had appeared dreary during the period, sparkled with lights again. The brown-out was intended to conserve fuel by reducing the demand for electricity.

Roman noted the published program of the GOP Club for 1949-50, appearing in "The Hicksville Directory and Almanac" which is now being distributed to local households, states "I. Purchase Railroad Plaza from LIRR for Parking".

Leaves No Doubt

"I am amazed to find the Republican Club taking a stand in favor of purchasing this property when the Town Board has been working so diligently to obtain use of the property without cost to the taxpayers," Roman said last night. "It may be that the word 'purchase' was a poor choice of language and that 'acquire' might have been better. However, the club's platform leaves no doubt when it recommends purchase."

Roman disclosed that he was advised in January by George A. Arkwright of the State Public Service Commission that "steps have been taken by the RR to convey this plot of land to the Town of Oyster Bay without any compensation and such dedication was recommended by the Superintendent of the RR.

"However," Arkwright continued, "an objection has been raised as to the question of legality of such a conveyance" by one of the LIRR trustees and it was his opinion that before a conveyance could be affected permission of the courts should be obtained.

Private Offer Made

The matter is now in abeyance pending court determination, but "in the meantime the RR Company received a private offer for the purchase of the land," Arkwright's letter continued.

Roman during the past month has written Arkwright in an effort (continued on page 14)

State Explains What Signs At 4 Loading Zones Mean

ALBANY — Did you, as a motorist, ever wonder about the wording of the State Loading Zone signs on Broadway, Hicksville? And did you, perhaps, get a warning ticket from a policeman for trying to figure out if it is or isn't okay to stop in the loading zones on a Saturday? Or to load parcels on other days?

Broadway, Hicksville, is a State Highway and under the jurisdiction of the New York State Traffic Commission. R. C. Georger, director, gives the Herald the text of an official order by the Commission dated April 8, 1949: "Prohibits the parking of vehicles, except for the purpose of loading or unloading, from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m. on Broadway, Route 107, S. H. 9017, at the following locations in the Hamlet of Hicksville, Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County. This restriction shall be effective except on Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays." The four locations of zones on Broadway are then described.

In the accompanying picture Robert Botto of Botto Bros. tries to puzzle out the sign in front of the Professional Bldg. which is typical of all of them. First established as an order effective except Sundays and Holidays, it was later revised at the request of the Town Board to exclude Saturdays from enforcement also, according to Georger.

At that time "Sat. Inc." was painted on the signs, and thus results most of the confusion. Local residents believe it is about time the

state put up some new signs which clearly say what is intended.

Reference to loading and unloading, it is also noted, is not limited to commercial vehicles.

The zones are established in front of the Professional Bldg., front of A and P, front of Firestone Dealer Store, and front of Kantor Bros.

Growers Fight Marketing Plan

RIVERHEAD—Nassau potato growers were almost unanimously opposed to controlled marketing of their crop. It was shown at a US Dept. of Agriculture hearing here last week. Suffolk growers were generally in favor of the plan which is expected to come to a vote early in June.

Charles H. Stoll, Hicksville attorney, who owns a Dix Hills farm, bitterly assailed the proposed agreement as a step toward collective farming. Theodore V. Summers of Syosset, as attorney for 163 Nassau and Suffolk farmers, presented the opposition's case. Jack W. Bain presided as examiner at the hearing, which drew a record 560 persons, Monday thru Thursday.

BMA Installs New Officers

HICKSVILLE—Patrick Buffalino was installed as president of the BMA at the dinner-dance and installation held Saturday night at the Alibi. MINEOLA — There were four cases of whooping cough reported for the Hicksville area during the week ending Feb. 27, according to the Nassau County Health Dept. and one case of syphilis.

During the same week Bethpage had two cases of chicken pox and Jericho one chicken pox. This sickness led in the township and county for the week.

More Sign Request For Fire Company

HICKSVILLE—Additional support was added this week to the plea from residents of Hicksville Park, off Duffy Ave., for the organization of a fire company of volunteers from that area. The Fire Commissioners have received a supplemental petition with 34 names this week to be added to previously filed petitions bearing 46 signatures.

The petition also suggests erection of a fire headquarters for a new "Company No. 6" to house apparatus in that vicinity.

County to Change Road Near Grumman

MINEOLA — The route of South Oyster Bay Road, Hicksville, will be changed near the Grumman plants, as was unofficially reported in the Herald last week.

It has now been confirmed that the Board of Supervisors have enacted an ordinance authorizing J. Russel Sprague, County Executive, to execute an agreement with Grumman's "in connection with South Oyster Bay Rd., Hicksville." The ordinance states "it has become necessary to alter the alignment of the road" and Grumman has agreed, in a document dated Feb. 1, to "pay a portion of the cost of the change of alignment."

It is also stated "it is deemed to be the best interests of the County of Nassau that the offer of Grumman be accepted."

Postmaster's Nephew Dies in Explosion

WESTBURY—Funeral services were held here at St. Brigid's Church, Monday, for James Millitor, 44, who was killed over the weekend in the explosion of a house in Florida. He was the nephew of Postmaster William G. Mollitor of Hicksville.

Engineer Studies 'Bridge of Sand'

HICKSVILLE — Oyster Bay Town Board has engaged H. G. Holzmacher, civil engineer, to make a study of the conditions resulting from sand-digging operations next to the LIRR right of way in the west section of the community. Isaac Penner of Caniague Rd. informed the Herald this week that he was so advised by the Town Board in a letter replying to his complaint regarding the "bridge of sand."

Penner also got a letter back from the Rail Road which said that in 1946 the LIRR had become gravely concerned with the digging of the pits near the right of way and a conference was held with town officials at that time. The RR promised Penner it would make a new check-up in view of his complaint.

A reply from the Public Service Commission regarding the "bridge of sand" is being awaited by Penner.

W. W. Johnston Died in Canada

MINEOLA — William Wilkie Johnston of 51 Fourth St., Hicksville, died in Toronto, Canada on Jan. 30, it was learned this week. Johnston was for many years executive secretary of the Non-Partisan Civic Assoc. of the Town of Oyster Bay, a group influential in township affairs for more than a decade. He left no will and his estate is being administered for the benefit of his son and daughter.

An administration petition was filed with Surrogate Leone D. Howell by Isidor Newirth of 1218 E. 24th St., Brooklyn, a friend of long standing and an attorney. Beneficiaries are a daughter, Jean L. Reed of Nashville, Tenn., and a son, Harold, of Yuma, Arizona. The estate was valued at \$6,000 in real estate and \$5,000 in personal property.

County Lists Work In Mid-Island Area

MINEROLA — Various county highway projects in the mid-island section which were progressed during 1949 were reviewed this week by John C. Gilbert, county public works commissioner. They included reconstruction of

Old Country Rd. at Hicksville from LIRR east to South Oyster Bay Rd., consisting of four-lane reinforced concrete paving with central mall, storm drainage system, storm water storage and re-charge basin, replacement of curbs and sidewalks.

Also at Hicksville, rebuilt Jerusalem Ave. from Fourth St. south to Hempstead Tpke., Island Trees, with four lanes and central mall. This was the first road constructed with a revised design of reinforced pavement eight inches thick with expansion joints at 100 foot intervals and contraction joints at 33 1/2 foot spacing in the panels.

During last year a bituminous macadam road on stone foundations was built at the County Sanatorium in Old Bethpage. Also installed were sanitary sewers, Belgian block curbs and flagstone walks, grading and incidentals in conjunction with four staff buildings.

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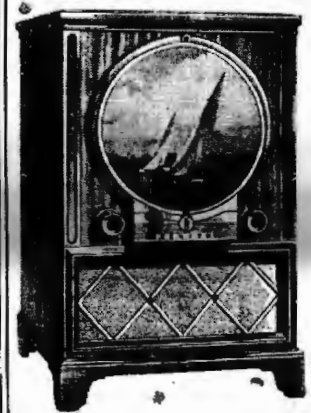
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County Auxiliary Officers Visit

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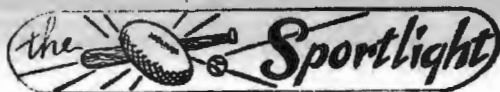
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HHS Crushes Westbury, 56-39, in Season Finale

It is a funny angle in sports that no matter how good you do you are always expected to do a little more.

That explains the great tension that prevailed in the high school gym Friday night.

There really wasn't any need for such a strain. Coach Chet Jaworski already had the Orange and Black more than on its feet in basketball competition in the short span of two seasons.

In 1948 the Comets lost every game on a 17-card schedule. Faced with a hopeless task when he took over in '49, Jaworski won three games out of 15 and reduced the margin of point losses to a respectable level.

And then this season the locals ran off with 13 decisions in their first 17 games.

But the impression was apparent that true achievement wasn't going to be credited until Westbury was beaten in the final game.

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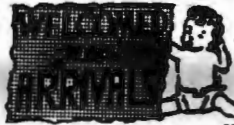

He has written the PSC "under section 54 of the Rail Road Law it would seem that no such service as this commuter parking area which has been provided for the citizens of our community could be discontinued through sale of property or otherwise without the prior consent of your commission. I would greatly appreciate a formal opinion as to the validity of my views under this section."
