Mineola Mayor Speaker At Civics on March 23

HICKSVILLE — Joseph Nohowec, mayor of Mineola, will be guest speaker at the next meeting of the Civic and Community Association on Thursday night, Mar. 23, in the firehouse auditorium as the civics continue their study of local government.

Walter Fasbender, supervisor of the Town of Huntington, discussed town government at the February meeting. Mayor Nohowec is expected to speak on incorporated village government, according to Robert Witt who is incorporation chairman of the civic group. The Mayor promises he "will be glad to answer all questions possible relating to village government."

The meeting on Mar. 23 is open to all interested residents, reports Program Chairman Stephen Smatlak. The session starts at 8:30 p. m.

Three-Way Contest For Asst FD Chief

HICKSVILLE — A three-way contest for second assistant chief of the fire department will be decided on Thursday night, Apr. 6, at the firehouse. Stanford Weiss, incumbent first assistant, is unopposed for election as department chief.

Daniel Munch, the present chief, is not a candidate for re-election. Edward R. Schluter Jr. is unopposed as candidate for first assistant, succeeding Weiss.

Details of the forthcoming department election were arranged at the meeting Monday night. The three candidates for second assistant chief are Arnold Jeanson, Ralph Heberer and Gerard Offenloch.

Other unopposed candidates on Apr. 6 include Walter Baldwin, secretary; Joseph Eisenmann, financial secretary; Fred Miller, treasurer.

Kellnerto Build On 10-Year Lease; Govt Calls for Building Site Bids

HICKSVILLE — The Post Office will be located in a new building, constructed for the purpose, on the west side of North Broadway between John St. and James St., it was officially confirmed this week. The building, to be constructed by Sam Kellner, will be leased for at least seven years. Construction is expected to start "in about a week" and the post office may be at its new address by mid-summer.

Property Sales Change Local Situation So Fast, Columbia to Continue Studies

HICKSVILLE — The over-all picture in this area is changing so rapidly, through recent land sales for development purposes, that Columbia experts have asked the school board to wait a little longer for their final report on future planning for the district. An interim report is anticipated later this month.

"If the Columbia people were held to the date of their original contract it would sever the district from professional help in planning for future educational needs of the community which was the original purpose of the study," a board spokesman said yesterday.

The Board of Education has agreed to an extension of time until the final report is made to give the district "the fullest advantage of the expert opinion employed."

Recently the Board made public a preliminary outline of the local situation which was published in the Herald in three installments. The contract with Columbia called for completion of their studies and report in about four months ending about now.

The Board has set Wednesday night, April 12, for a preliminary hearing and discussion of the tentative district budget which comes to a vote the first week in May. Purpose of the preliminary hearing is to answer questions about the budget and to receive suggested changes from the voters.

25 CORNER MAIL BOXES ARE COMING

HICKSVILLE — Postmaster William G. Mollitor told the Herald yesterday that he has been notified of shipment of 25 corner mail boxes to this office. The boxes are urgently needed in this community and in the Levittown area, he said. Most of the boxes will go into new neighborhoods, he indicated.

Watch for Gardening Feature Next Week

Spring begins next Monday, March 26. Starting with next week's edition, the HERALD will publish a regular home maker and gardening page as prepared for the newspaper by experts in these subjects.

The new post office will be a privately-owned building, rented to the government. At the same time that the selection of a new rented location was made, the federal government issued a call for proposed sites for a federal post office building to be erected here.

Postmaster William G. Mollitor told the Herald that bids are now being received by him for sale "or donation" to the U. S. of a lot 120 feet by 170 feet "for a post office, etc.," here. Bids must be delivered to Mollitor before Mar. 27. He has the application forms and a circular of information.

Confirms Herald Exclusive

The call for bids confirms an exclusive report published by the Herald on Feb. 23 as received from Congressman W. Kingland Macy. The issuance of a 7-year lease to Kellner also confirms Macy's prediction on that date that it will be "a few years before a building is actually constructed" by the government.

Kellner was one of five or six persons who submitted bids on rental of quarters for a post office. Other sites included Duffy Ave. and Newbridge Rd., W. Marie St. between Bway and Jerusalem Ave and next to First Reformed Church.

The building on North Broadway will be 50 by 90 feet containing 4500 square feet or about double the space in the present office on Herzog Pl. Kellner has plans for the development of the rest of the property at the corner of Bway and James St. This tract, known as "Murphy's Lots," was for many years the favorite site for carnivals.

Plans Parking Field

Kellner plans to develop the rear of the property left to William St. for public parking. The parcel has a frontage of 185 feet on North Bway, about opposite (continued on page 11)

Bids for sites will be publicly opened at 9 o'clock Monday morning, Mar. 27, at the post office, Mollitor stated.

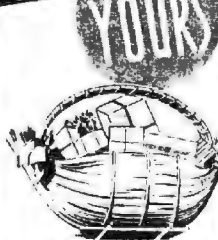

IN OUR OPINION:

Legally, We Just 'Don't Exist'

WHEN THE BUREAU of Census concludes its official nose-counting of the United States later this year, unincorporated communities such as Hicksville, Island Trees, Bethpage, Jericho, and vicinity will still have only AN APPROXIMATE POPULATION FIGURE.

The Herald on Feb. 15 reported the plan of the Bureau of the Census to lump population data in "the urbanized area of New York" and discussed the importance of accurate census data for regions such as Hicksville and vicinity. The Hicksville Business Men's Association Inc. has since taken up the matter with Congressman W. Kingsland Macy who in turn obtained further data from Philip M. Hauser, acting director, Bureau of Census, Department of Commerce.

The information received by the BMA this week gives us additional cause for alarm because we see therein a danger of Hicksville, for example, being grouped in the population data for the Levitt development at Island Trees. This would speed up the process which we have groaned about before — the possible absorption of Hicksville by Levittown.

Mr. Hauser explains to Congressman Macy just what areas will be set up for Census statistics in 1950. "Figures will be published in the Census volumes for Nassau County as a whole, for each of the towns and incorporated places in the county . . . In addition, statistics will be published for the New York-Northeastern New Jersey Urbanized area which includes practically all of Hempstead and North Hempstead towns and a small part of Oyster Bay Town . . . We have not undertaken to fix boundaries for any unincorporated areas of this type (such as Hicksville—ed) because of the difficulty of establishing arbitrary limits for any particular place in the closely built up area surrounding a large city.

"After the census is taken," Mr. Hauser continues, "it will be possible for the Bureau of the Census to supply interested persons with population statistics for the administrative units used in making the census of Nassau County. These units, known as Enumeration Districts, contain from about 900 to 1200 inhabitants each."

And he adds, "It would appear from an examination of our maps that AN APPROXI-

MATE population figure for the Hicksville area would be obtained by combining several of the enumeration districts." (Capitals are ours).

Our concern about Hicksville identity arises from the fact that someone might easily group a couple of these enumeration districts, which could belong to Hicksville, into the Levitt section.

The key to this whole situation lies, of course, in the matter of incorporation. As we have stated before, Hicksville (and likewise Bethpage, Plainview and vicinity) does not exist in the eyes of the law being an unincorporated section of the Town of Oyster Bay. Lacking boundaries of a city or village, it then becomes a question of who "claims" a certain area to decide its name and identity.

What's Your Problem

Q.—We have hardly any top soil on the grounds of our new home. Is there any law about removing top soil?

A.—The Oyster Bay Township top soil removal ordinance adopted in 1941 with regulatory provisions increased in 1945 requires that at least six inches of soil remain after stripping operations.

Corporations engaged in the removal and sale of top soil in the Township brought action to declare the ordinance unconstitutional and unreasonable. This action came to trial in Nassau Supreme Court in June of 1948. Justice Cortland A. Johnston rendered his decision Dec. 16 sustaining the validity of the ordinance. The decision was appealed and the Appellate Division concurred in Justice Johnston's decision.

Q.—What is the Hicksville tax rate this year?

A.—The aggregate rate per \$1000 of assessed valuation in Hicksville this year is \$46.30; ie, if a home is assessed at \$4,000, the total tax bill is \$185.20. This includes \$17.70 for schools, \$10.50 for county, \$3.80 for highways, \$3.80 for police, \$4.00 for garbage, \$1.50 for water and 55 cents for parking.

AN OLD TIMER STORY:

Motor Parkway Was Super Road

BETHPAGE — Destruction of the last of the old Motor Parkway bridges here by the County Public Works Dept. recalls the hey-day for the early motorists from 1910 to the early Thirties before the advent of the LI State Parkway system.

The venerable Motor Parkway boasted of having no speed limit and no intersections. The route contained many curves and steep grades, but compared with the other roads in existence at the time it was a virtual speedway.

The late William K. Vanderbilt used portions of the Motor Parkway shortly after the turn of the century to stage the famed Vanderbilt Cup Races that spurred new developments in the automotive field.

Planned for RR Route

Upon completion of the route out to Lake Ronkonkoma in Suffolk County, the road was dotted with toll houses, where fees were collected from motorists who desired to use the road for safety and comfort. Originally the right-of-way was acquired by the Vanderbilt interests, who owned the New York Central System, with the thought in mind of constructing a railroad in competition with the LIRR. But when the Long

Island's parent, the Pennsylvania, threatened to give the Central upstate competition, an agreement followed that ended in the right-of-way becoming the motor parkway.

The first international road race ever held in this country was the first Vanderbilt Cup race over the 30-mile LI circuit in 1904. Two French drivers, Panhard and Darraq, took honors from a sterling field which included entries from Germany, Italy and this country.

These two hard-driving Frenchmen won the next two Vanderbilt Cup races, but in 1908 George Robertson put this country in the front. He piloted a Bridgeport-Conn built 90 horsepower Locomobile.

The first World War killed

practically all American interest in road racing. Oval track racing, for special highspeed machines, became the fad.

A brave attempt to revive the Vanderbilt Cup at Roosevelt Raceway was made by the Automobile Racing Club of America, now inactive, in the late 30's. The Raceway at Westbury later became a midget auto racing track for a season, and then trotters arrived on the scene to hold sway to the present time.

By today's standards, the old Motor Parkway was a poor road. Largely of asphalt construction, it was narrow—barely allowing two cars to pass in each direction—and curved sharply. The parkway route through Nassau was dedicated to the county by its last owners about a decade ago.
