Holts of Bklyn.

### Plan Hearing Set On Four Local Plats

MINEOLA—The Nassau County Planning Commission will hold a public hearing at 107 Mineola Blvd. here, at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon upon approval of plats for subdivision of land, including four in the mid-island area: Homelawn Bldg. Co., east of Jerusalem Ave. and about 500 feet south of 11th St., Hicksville; Roland Homes, Inc., south of Old Country Rd. and west of So. Oyster Bay Rd., Hicksville; Levitt & Sons, Inc., south of Hempstead Ave. and west of Newbridge Rd., Hicksville; Hill View Farms, 230 feet west of So. Oyster Bay Rd. and north of Honved St., Hicksville.

The Levitt plats are described in the hearing notice as "Map of Levittown, sections 9 and 10," although the area is in Oyster Bay township.

### 4 New Ordinances Due For Hearing

OYSTER BAY—A public hearing will be held by the Town Board here on Tuesday morning, Apr. 4, upon the application of Order Made Homes, Inc. for a change of zoning on the south side of Old Country Rd. and east of East Ave. from residential D to Business H.

The board is also expected to hold hearings the same morning upon four new town ordinances: elimination of overhanging signs in business sections, plumbing code for the township, loose dog control and covered garbage trucks in the town.

HICKSVILLE — The executive committee of the Civic and Community Association held conferences with three agencies of local government this week in an effort to stave off an overwhelming tax burden the Civics feel confronts the community as the direct result of Levitt and Sons expansion into the school district.

The committee, led by President Lawrence A. Roman, met with the Nassau County Planning Commission at Mineola on Thursday afternoon, with Town Supervisor Harry Tappen and Building Inspector William S. Tilford at Oyster Bay on Saturday morning, and with the Hicksville School Board on Monday night.

The civic plea won sympathetic interest from the Full Planning Commission which felt it lacked the legal authority to assist. The plea got the promise of thorough study of the problems involved by the Town Board from Tappen, and the Committee found the school board not especially hopeful of getting Levitt to do anything except sell property to the district "at cost."

Roman was spokesman for the group at each conference. His presentation was based upon an assumed construction of up to 3,000 houses by Levitt during the current year resulting in a school construction program during the coming six years of over \$5,000,000 and a doubling of the tax on local property owners.

#### Expect \$40 Tax Rate

Henry G. Eisenmann, vice chairman of the Planning Commission and Hicksville realtor, felt that Roman's figures were generally conservative. Eisenmann told other members of the Commission that he believes the local tax rate would reach \$40 per \$1,000 in "five years." It is \$17.70 per \$1,000 at the present time. He pointed out, however — and his view was shared by the other members of the Commission — that "legally there is nothing we can do" as a planning commission and "we have no

### LEVITT ON MARCH:

## 973 Permits to Build

OYSTER BAY — Levitt and Sons has already received 973 permits for houses to be built in the Hicksville section of the township, it was disclosed here Saturday by Building Inspector William Tilford. The number of permits nearly equals the total permits issued in Hicksville for 1948 and 1949 combined. There were 510 permits for homes issued in Hicksville during the 12 months of last year.

Most reliable estimates now place Levitt's present plans for new home construction in Hicksville at 2,300. In addition it is unofficially and conservatively estimated the other developers will erect upward of 500 more houses in the district during this year.

## Mineola Mayor to Discuss Incorporation At Meeting Tomorrow In Firehouse

HICKSVILLE — Incorporated village government will be the topic tomorrow (Thursday) night of Mayor Joseph Nohowec of Mineola when he speaks at the regular meeting of the Civic and Community Association. The meeting in the firehouse on E. Marie St. will start at 8:30 p. m. and all residents are cordially invited by the Civics to attend.

Mayor Nohowec has promised to answer all possible questions on the subject of incorporation, according to Robert Witt and Stephen Smatlak. Witt is incorporation chairman of the civics and Smatlak is in charge of program.

#### Plan Debate In April

A debate on the topic of incorporation will feature the April meeting of the civics. It is being organized by members of the public speaking class in the Adult Education Program here.

Lawrence A. Roman, civic president, is also expected to report tomorrow night upon the progress of the group in its efforts to obtain relief for local taxpayers in the face of anticipated higher school costs due to large-scale new home developments by Levitt and Sons and other builders.

Plans for the Costume Dance of the Civics, marking the 302nd founding of the community on May 20, will be discussed at the meeting also.

### Cold Hinders Vamps In Midnight Alarms

HICKSVILLE—Biting cold and winds hampered volunteer firemen with two fires within a half-hour of each other, around midnight, Saturday. Both fires were off Duffy Ave., the first was grass at 11:25 p. m., behind Nassau Seed, and the second, a half-hour later, was a shed behind the town highway barn. Prompt action by the firemen under Chief Daniel Munch quickly brought the flames under control, although the spray from hose lines ice-crusted the vamps.

HICKSVILLE — Two residents are prepared to run for the Board of Education in the annual school district election on May 8, the Herald learned today. The two men who made known their intentions individually are Robert W. Corcoran of 74 Twinlawn Ave. and Harry Ernenwein of 265 Jerusalem Avenue.

There are two vacancies on the Board this year. Both vacancies are for three-year terms, one due to the expiration of the term of Lawrence Eisenhauer of 147 W. Cherry St. and the other vacant since the recent resignation of Dr. Charles Masek of South Broadway.

Corcoran, an attorney with Metropolitan Life, is the father of two small pre-school children, a boy and girl. One of the organizers of the Twinlawn Civic Association, he holds the office of corresponding secretary. He is expected to file his designating petition with

District Clerk Andrew B. Heberer later this week.

Friends of Ernenwein are now circulating his designating petition. He is vice president of Keystone Glass Inc. of Duffy Ave., a former banker and active in civic affairs. He is chairman of the ways and means committee for the Junior-Senior Parent-Teacher Association, membership chairman and a charter member of the Civic and Community Association, member of the Lions Club, and a third degree Mason. He is the father of two children, a son, Stanley, who

is in his third year in high school and a daughter, Lorraine, who is a student at Adelphi.

Corcoran has been a local resident about three years and Ernenwein for 10 years.

The intentions of the two men were made known separately and individually.

Eisenhauer, whose term expires, has not announced if he will seek re-election to the board.

All voters wishing to vote for school trustees and upon the budget on Tuesday night, May 2, must be registered. Registration of voters will take place at Nicholas St. School on two Saturdays: April 15 and 22, between the hours of 4 and 9 p. m.

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**ONLY HALF FINISHED:  
 Levitt Section Homes to Top 20,000**

MANHASSET—Levitt & Sons plans to build more than 20,000 homes in the Hicksville-Island Trees section, it was found this week. An official release from the builder, published in the Levitt-owned Levittown Tribune, said "Levittown is expected eventually to consist of a population of approximately 80,000."

With four occupants in a house, this would result in a minimum of 20,000 dwellings. There are now almost 10,000 houses in the Levitt development at Island Trees, in the Township of Hempstead.

The notation was included in an

announcement that 500-seat theatres will be built on the four village greens of Levittown. The fourth of these Greens is on Newbridge Rd., Hicksville, and is now under construction.

The official statement also said that options have been given the theatre operator for all future Village Greens to be erected. Unofficially, it is reported that two and possibly three Village Greens will be built in the Hicksville section, where Levitt has acquired farm acreage for upwards of 3,000 houses.

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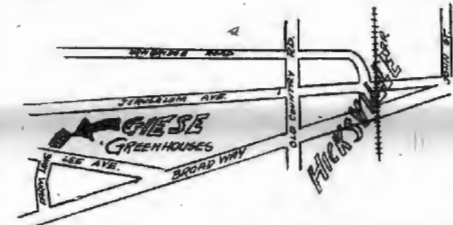


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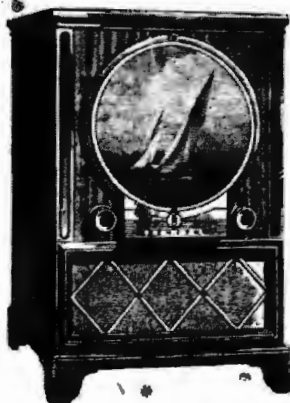

**Chief Psychiatrist Talks To P-TA**

Dr. Paul G. Edgar, chief psychiatrist of the Nassau County Child Guidance Clinic, was the guest speaker at a meeting of the Nicholas Street School P-TA Thursday night, Mar. 16, at the school.

Dr. Edgar explained that as it is the child's first reaction to cry, it is the first duty of the parent to make the child laugh for the rest of his life. He likened a child's mind to a motion picture film absorbing all images and said that it is the duty of the parent to develop these images.

He said that a happy relationship between the parent and child is most essential to the child's welfare because the parents' moods are transmitted to the child.

Dr. Edgar voiced his disapproval of corporal punishment because it creates an emotional scar. He said that a child needs an even treatment of affection and not just a display of affection when he is

good. This even treatment of affection is needed, he believes, in order to tone down the child who lives in an excitable world today through his literature, movies, radio, books and television.

"A child has a responsibility to the community," Dr. Edgar said. "The home is the first road to his life in the community and if the child is given his own way all the time at home he will expect the same in society."

"Love, respect and courtesy are the parents' due," Dr. Edgar said, "it is the only thing the child can give and the only thing the parents can expect."

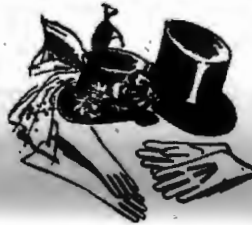

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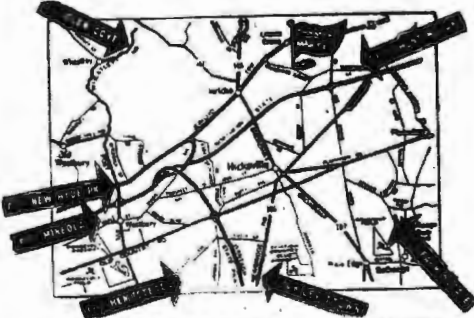

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# TWO ENCORES: Evening of Virtuosity, Musicanship

HICKSVILLE — John Knight, young Canadian pianist, was presented in the High School auditorium in a piano recital by the Hicksville Community Concerts Assoc., Friday night.

It must be said at the outset that here is a young musician with tremendous capabilities which he embodies not only in his musical approach to each composition but which one feels an awareness to, because of his charmingly simple and unaffected stage presence.

Mr. Knight was exceedingly generous in executing a program of wide scope in which he touched upon the classic, romantic and modern eras respectively.

Flawless Technique  
Beginning with Vivaldi's Largo, our soloist demonstrated at once his comprehension of melodic beauty and dignity. As he began the Paradise Toccata one realized that this young man possessed a flawless technique to bring forth the touch needed for the rapid flowing and continuous succession of figures and passages. Continuing on to the three Mozart waltzes (gems of perfection in themselves), Mr. Knight exhibited delicate dynamic beauty.

For the final composition in his first group, we were humbly grateful to hear Bach's Fantasia and Fugue in G minor, one of the noblest conceptions to emanate from the inestimable genius. Here was performance of the highest degree, for Mr. Knight seemingly reached heights of contrapuntal precision coupled with a deep feeling of continuity and enclosure necessary to the whole. Rarely has this writer been more spiritually moved by such an eminent rendition.

The second group—all Chopin—was particularly delightful because of the discriminating selection of compositions. The E major Etude Op. 10 under Mr. Knight's sensitive rendition became a very dignified yet alive picture.

The C minor Etude continued to show pianistic fluency in sweeping arpeggios deepened by very firm melodic content in both left and right hands.

The poignant beauty and deli-

cacy of touch prevailed in the Berceuse and continued even more profusely in the sharp detail of the Mazurka reaching proportions of great depth and limpid delicacy of shading in the C sharp Minor Nocturne. As a climax of combined efforts the A flat Major Polonaise glowed and reverberated in turn with a sincerity of feeling one could sense throughout. Here Mr. Knight again demonstrated a prolific left hand.

The Appassionata Sonata of Beethoven, considered to be one of his greatest compositions in itself, is taxing and needful of particular dynamic force. Throughout this most difficult work, our artist showed scholarly workmanship and far-reaching eloquence sharply executed. Particularly in the second movement did one feel the musicianship expanded under capable yet reserved feeling. The turbulence of passion and yearning could be sensed and defined clearly and eloquently.

The last group in the program comprised Debussy's Fireworks—sufficient in title but alive as it was played. One had no difficulty in feeling the pulsations, the color and flow exploited here. Following through, we heard Ireland's Island Spell given delicate and almost sensuous treatment. The Khachaturian Toccata served as a medium for rhythmical effort of high order and it held together exceedingly well because of the treatment which Mr. Knight was able to give it.

The Rakoczy March of Liszt served to complete the program in suitable fashion. Familiar to all, the March was treated in a triumphal vein with technique of assurance and power.

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A very large and appreciative audience called Mr. Knight back to the platform for two encores, the last of which was the Revolutionary Etude of Chopin. It climaxed an evening of virtuosity and musicianship which should make us all be proud to have had John Knight in our midst.

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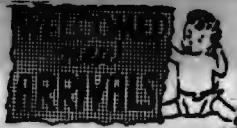

**Early Spring Gardening**

**YOUR LAWN:**  
**LIME**—If your lawn has not been limed in several years, add about 35 lbs. of ground agricultural limestone for every 1000 sq. ft. Use about 3-4 as much if hydrated lime will be used. If turf was limed last year, a soil sample

can be sent to the county farm bureau at Mineola for lime recommendations based on analysis.

**FERTILIZER**—Lawns should receive an application of a complete fertilizer **EARLY** in the spring. The farm bureau suggests Herald readers use one of the following:

- 5-10-5—20 lbs. per 1000 sq. ft.
  - 10-6-4—10 lbs. per 1000 sq. ft.
  - 6-12-6—18 lbs. per 1000 sq. ft.
- Another organic or inorganic fertilizer may be used provided the turf area receives 1 lb. of actual Nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft.

**SEEDING**—Seed large bare spots now. Small spots will fill in after fertilization. Sow only permanent type of seed. Rake seed in lightly and keep uniformly moist.

**ROLLING**—Roll established lawns only if excessive heaving or uprooting has occurred due to alternate freezing and thawing.

**MOWING**—Cut grass often enough so that clippings are very small and can remain on lawn surface. Adjust mower so that height of cut is 1 1/2 to 2 inches. This will help give you a deeper rooted lawn more resistant to drying conditions and will help to control crabgrass.

**GARDEN FLOWERS FROM SEED:**

You can start your annuals and perennials from seed now—and it can be done successfully provided you have a sunny window, can keep the temperature around 68 degrees during the germination period and 10 degrees lower afterwards. A post card to Farm Bureau, Mineola, asking for Bulletin No. 579 on "Growing Flowers from Seed" will get you full information free of charge.

A number of Orange and Black fans have taken issue with us of late for our refusal to refer to the record of the past basketball campaign as the finest in the history of Hicksville High.

We certainly would be only too happy to do so were it true. However, our search of the HHS court records fail to bear the point out.

To be absolutely sure though, we rechecked the records and discovered a hitherto unaccepted laurel for the 1950 Comets.

Their total of 14 victories in a single campaign is the highest number of wins ever recorded by a Hicksville squad.

Previously the team of 1934-'35 was credited with a mark of 14 wins and 3 losses. Subsequent investigation reveals however that one of the claimed victories was a win over the now defunct College Center and the game cannot be accepted in tabulating intercollegiate records.

That reduces the record to 13 wins and 3 losses which is still the best record on the books.

Figures do not lie and .812 still ranks higher than .777 which was the average the latest edition of the Orange and Black was able to achieve with a total of 14 victories in 18 starts.

The only other club to lose just three games was the 1931-'32 outfit. Westbury inflicted 16-12 and 18-16 losses while Roslyn added the other 20-19 that season.

In dealing with this matter of records only cold hard facts are involved. Calibre of opposition and the quality of personnel do not enter into consideration.

## Business Section Shift Is Remote

OFFICERS of the Hicksville Business Men's Association Inc. had the opportunity, Friday evening, to confer with the township Citizens' Advisory Committee on Zoning at the office of Henry G. Eisemann, committee member. The meeting was arranged by Councilman Frank Chlumsaky at the request of the BMA.

Among those present was John Mudderman, the planning and zoning consultant being employed by the Township to study the township zoning laws. The laws had not been overhauled in almost 20 years.

Prime question in the minds of the town representatives was the thinking of the town authorities on the question of Hicksville's business section expansion. They went away from the conference feeling greatly reassured. The town committee and officials made it plain that the studies now underway for more than a year have not progressed to the point where definite area decisions have been made; however, they appear to be holding to the view that what now exists will not necessarily be sidetracked or undermined.

Robert Reichter, attorney engaged by the town to help revise the zoning ordinance, expressed the opinion that zoning in itself could not be regarded as protection — that stores would have to meet competition through modernization and adequate provisions made for offstreet parking. That Hicksville merchants are well aware of these factors is evident all about us: new store fronts and interior mo-

dernization is accelerating and no one is more alarmed about the parking problem than the business people.

The exchange of views, Friday night, was profitable as time will prove.



### What's Your Problem

Q—What ever happened to the bus service along Broadway for which we signed petitions? — Frank Holmes resident.

A—Levittown Bus Corp., which wants to run service along Broadway from Hicksville station, south to Millshire Park and Hempstead Tpke, states that its application for such a route is before the authorities and has been for some time. It is reported that approval has been granted on the portion of the route in the Town of Hempstead, approximately north to Grassman's.

Q—We bought a new home for \$8,500. For how much is it assessed?

A—The exact assessment can be obtained by inquiry from the County Bd. of Assessment, Courthouse, Mineola. Generally, however, assessments on most new homes being sold in this area are a little over 50 per cent of the purchase price; i. e., Levitt houses which sell for \$7,990 are assessed at about \$3,600.

power to force Levitt to build schools.

All members of the County agency felt that the problem before Hicksville "is not unlike the one facing other communities — except in its degree." Roman stated that the district could probably absorb the increased local costs resulting from normal development and growth but that Levitt construction of a couple of thousand homes, doubling local population, within a matter of months will be "more than the average small home owners will be able to pay."

Some hope for the suggested upward revision of zoning of land where Levitt is going to build was received at Mineola by the civics, although it could depend upon the reasonableness of the change. A boost in zoning or revision of ordinance requirements as to floor space, it was pointed out, is a township function and authority.

Various members of the Planning Commission felt the best solution for the problem might be found through the enactment of State legislation based upon the emergency situation confronting the community.

#### Tappen Questions 'Right'

When the committee met with Tappen on Saturday, he questioned the legal right of the town to raise the zoning 'unless demanded by the property owners involved' but promised to take the problem up with the Town Board and Town Attorney Theodore V. Summers. The Supervisor said the Town Board might be reluctant to become involved in a "school problem." It was suggested to Tappen that he might exercise his influence through the county Board of Supervisors for the enactment of relief legislation by the state for a hard-pressed district.

During the meeting with the School Board, Monday night, it

was brought out that majority of the Board, at least, felt there was little likelihood of getting Levitt to "do anything." The Board has made no request for special state or federal funds to meet the problem since the extent of the problem has not been determined as yet.

The School Board considers itself fortunate in getting Levitt, through his representatives, to agree to set aside tracts of land in the southwest section of the district where he is going to build for school buildings. President Henry C. Brengel pointed out that four school sites had thus been set aside and will be sold to the district for the same price as Levitt paid for it, plus improvements such as adjoining highways.

#### School Board Foresight

Brengel felt that relations between the School Board and Levitt's representatives, through a series of conferences, have been "pretty good." He pointed out that the board had the foresight to acquire two sites (Bergold property, Newbridge Rd., and Albrecht parcel, Burns Ave.) a year ago even before it was known that Levitt planned to expand into the district.

Lawrence Eisenhower felt that the estimated tax rate of \$40 per \$1,000, anticipated by Roman, is high, and said that Columbia ex-
