# Town Cracks Down As 321 Seek Topsoil

OYSTER BAY—Six Hicksville residents armed with a petition bearing 321 signatures appealed to the Town Board yesterday (Wednesday) to crack down on developers who have allegedly violated the township topsoil ordinance by leaving less than six inches of soil around new homes in the community. The delegation found the Town Board had anticipated their request and is preparing to act on the problem in several directions.

Supervisor Harry Tappen said he felt the town ordinance as it now stands is adequate to force compliance from builders but that there is a difference of legal opinion on this question. While he personally would be willing to see the ordinance put to the test in litigation, other officials want "more teeth" put in the local law and to that end an amendment to the ordinance specifying home developments will soon be added. A public hearing on the amendment will be held here on Tuesday, May 16.

### All Developments Complain

Lawrence C. McCaffrey, member of the topsoil committee of the Civic Assoc., was principal spokesman for the Hicksville delegation. The others present included Mrs. John Christ and Mrs. Bunny Lauser of Frank Homes, George Fury of Hakstone Homes, and Joseph Nicolini and Lewis Rubell of Hicksville Park Homes. All developments, including Roger and Zeida Park, are represented among the 321 signators on the petition.

Tappen told the group that a meeting of all builders in the township would be called upon the complaints made. Councilmen Frank Chirumsky and Daniel Wall of Massapequa were designated a special Board committee.

The lack of sufficient top soil to cover the gravel, stones and sand around the new homes in Hicksville was cited at the Civic meeting last Thursday night. William L. Geyer, topsoil committee chairman, said he had checked the various local developments and found it "a sad story." He said there is "no question" about violation of the ordinance.

# Change in Floor Space Law May Ignore Levitt

OYSTER BAY—A revision in the Town Building Zone Ordinance, increasing the minimum floor space for dwellings built in the township, was today proposed by the Town Board. The text of the amendment proposed is published in this issue of the Herald on page 12 as a legal notice and a public hearing is scheduled for 10 o'clock Tuesday morning, May 16.

This notice includes a resolution which states that large-scale mass development of homes in the township is creating unanticipated tax burdens, overburdening schools, public transportation, fire protection and other municipal services at a cost out of proportion to the assessment levied upon these new dwellings. The new amendment would require 1000 square feet of habitable floor space and not less than 800 square feet on the ground floor in most zones in Hickville and Bethpage. Whether this change would halt the construction of homes in Hicksville School District by Levitt & Sons appears questionable since it is reported Levitt houses have a shade over 800 square feet of floor space at the ground level. The present law only requires 700 square feet in Zone D where Levitt is now building. As of yesterday Levitt had been issued about 1000 permits in Hicksville with about 500 more about to be processed.

HICKSVILLE — Dr. Otto P. Kretzmann, president of Valparaiso University, will be guest speaker this Sunday morning, May 7, at the 8:30 AM and 11 AM services at the 100th anniversary celebration of Trinity Lutheran Church. Special anniversary services will be held on four consecutive Sundays.

Dr. Kretzmann is an educator and clergyman. Before becoming president of the University at Valparaiso, Ind., he was instructor at Concordia Theological Seminary, Springfield, Ill., and executive secretary of the international Walther League, the youth organization of the Lutheran Church.

He is the author of several religious books, an editor and a columnist. At the request of the chief of chaplains, Department of the Army, Dr. Kretzmann was a member of the party of four American clergymen making a survey tour of Japan, Okinawa, the Philippines, Guam and Hawaii in the summer of 1949.

# Plainview Okays West Site 2 to 1

PLAINVIEW — Purchase of property in the west end of the school district near the Plainview Country Homes for a new school site was approved by the voters of the district, about 2 to 1, at a special meeting, Friday night. The vote was 107 yes and 40 no on this site, and 48 yes and 80 no on site No. 2, near the Model Homes section.

Lester H. Hoffman of 48 Nassau Ave. was elected chairman of the meeting, which was highlighted by an examination of the charges and claims about the estimated cost of the two sites and the statement published in the Herald last week from John G. Harbes, member of the board.

A motion at the start of the meeting made by John Slive to postpone the vote until May 26, "so we can get further data," was defeated. There was a sharp exchange of comments about the two sites between Harbes and Wilhem Schwarz, president of the school board. Others who participated in the discussion and debate included John W. Chisholm, district superintendent; David Welts, and District Clerk Charles Voorhis.

# Election of School Trustees Today

Voters in Hicksville and Bethpage are casting their ballots today between 4 and 9 p. m. at their respective schools for members of the Board of Education for the next three years.

In Hicksville voting is at the high school with three candidates for two vacancies, none of them incumbents. The candidates are Harry Ermenwein, Robert Corcoran and George McIntosh.

In Bethpage, Frederick Kramer and Joseph Ellinger are seeking re-election, opposed by Frederick Willard and Charles W. Pendelbury.

Annual district meetings and voting upon school budgets were held last night. The results will be recorded next week although it was generally expected budgets would be adopted as submitted by the school boards.

# Want Law to Regulate Taxi Business

HICKSVILLE — Parking and traffic problems in the community which appear to grow apace with the development of the community and new home building returned to the spotlight this week with several developments:

1. The Town Board received strongly worded requests from the Citizens Advisory Committee on Parking and the Civic Assoc. for the immediate enactment of a taxicab ordinance.

2. The Town Board disclosed it has tentatively drawn up an ordinance which will provide for the use of parking meters in the community.

3. The Parking Advisory Committee went on record as opposed to the plan to reverse traffic on Nicholas St. It is now east-to-west.

The taxi cab problem which is fast becoming intolerable, was aired at the Civic meeting, Thursday night. The problem appears to centre about the taxi stand at the Railroad station on Jerusalem Ave. although the old question of "reasonable fares" got into the picture also.

### Asked Last October

The Citizens Advisory Committee on parking last October urged "in the public interest and in the interest of highway safety, that efforts be made to regulate the operation of taxi cabs in Hicksville and particularly in the

area near the depot. The public deserves the protection of registered drivers, posted fares and rates in cabs, etc., as have been established for Port Washington and other progressive communities."

It was shown at the Civic meeting that the police are almost powerless to act at present without a regulatory ordinance. A spokesman for a local cab outfit gave his support to a tax law.

One complaint was the charge that cabs standing at the depot refuse to take passengers to local destinations, preferring the more profitable trip to Levittown and Island Trees. The fare to the

# Lang Wins In Bethpage Water Election

BETHPAGE—Albert Lang was re-elected commissioner of the Central Park Water District by a wide margin Monday night, although opposed by two candidates. Lang received 369 of the 581 votes cast. Peter Curcio received 102 and William Stempel had 47 votes. There were 61 ballots voided because they were in-

correctly marked. Two were blank.

In an open letter to taxpayers of the district, Lang said today:

"I wish to thank you from the bottom of my heart for the overwhelming vote that was cast for me at the election Monday night."

### PUBLIC OPINION:

# 6 Out Of 8 Want Parking Meters Here

While they fail to agree on the method of solving Hicksville's parking problems, residents are unanimously of the opinion that parking conditions here are going to get worse. A mail survey by the Herald this week disclosed six out of eight persons in favor of parking meters, with the other two opposed.

All answering the survey felt that present day parking space at curbs and public fields in Hicksville is not adequate. Five out of six in favor of meters believe they should be installed "at once," while the sixth person wants them "within six months." Five out of eight feel that more parking fields should be built with taxpayers' money and the other three said "no" to this question.

Five out of eight felt that commuters are the biggest offenders on parking and one blamed shoppers. Three put "merchants themselves" in the No. 2 spot as the greatest offenders. Theatre patrons fell into third and fourth positions.

Asking to estimate the amount of car parking space needed brought a variety of answers: 200, 500, 1,000, and 2,000.

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**SCHOOL TAXES HIGH?**

**Rate was \$53.50 per \$1000 in 1924**

HICKSVILLE — This school district had an all-time peak tax rate of \$63.60 per \$1000 of assessed valuation a quarter of a century ago, it was recalled this week as the annual school meeting and vote on the budget took place.

From 1920 to 1927 the tax rate never dropped less than \$28.00 per \$1,000 and during the same span of years the assessed valuation of the school district ranged from \$1 million to \$3 million. In 1928 the valuation leaped to over \$7 million and has climbed steadily since. Today, it is roughly estimated at about \$16 million.

Only 15 People Voted  
In 1924, when the rate was \$63.60, there were only 15 people voting at the annual meeting. The gross budget was \$102,941 that year. This year it is nearly \$700,000.

Members of the School Board the year of the record tax rate were Dr. E. A. Curtis, Joseph J. Ulmer, William Duffy, G. A. Duke (deceased), and Frank Chlumsky.

However, the record breaking rate of \$63.50 in 1924 does not give a true picture for today's resident of the district. Only during the past decade has a 100 per

cent assessment program been in effect in the county. Prior to that assessments upon property ranged from 25 to 50 per cent of true value.

Between 1928 and 1936, the Hicksville school system experienced tremendous expansion and growth, much the same as what is becoming necessary today in the district. During that period, the high school was built, East St. School was erected and an addition was added to the high school.

Bonds on the high school totaled \$366,000 and were sold to mature in progressive steps: \$2000 in 1925, 1926 and 1927; \$4000 in 1928, \$5000 in 1929 thru 1933, \$10,000 in 1934 thru 1945, and \$15,000 in 1946 thru 1950. The interest rate was 4.75 per cent.

Bonds on the extension to the high school at the rate of \$10,000 matured at the rate of \$10,000 from 1932 thru 1948.

Bonds on the East St. School ran at the rate of 4.5 per cent in \$10,000 installments from 1928 thru 1948. East St. School cost \$185,000.

The span of years from 1928 to 1936 saw great growth in the community from the standpoint of new home construction and population increase. In many respects it paralleled the building boom which is now taking place in the community today.

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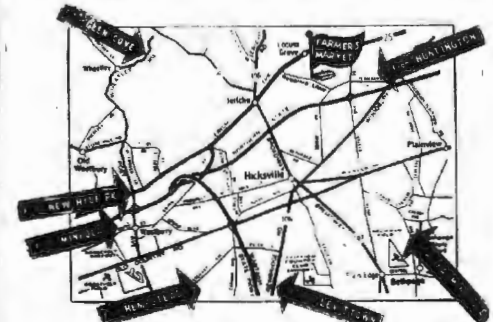

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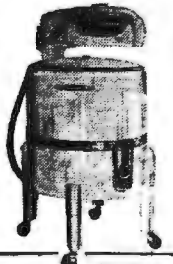

**Dangers Of Spring**

By Joseph A. LePencr, M.D., Hicksville

When I was a boy of about 16 I was very much impressed by a book by a Polish author whose unpronounceable name I still remember; the title of the book I forgot. The book was a kind of philosophy of biology dealing with our often very mysterious connection with nature. Since this book was written, great progress has been made in Medicine, Biology and science in general, yet most of the problems are unsolved and we don't know much more than we did at that time.

One paragraph in this book still sticks in my mind, where the author compares us human beings with a horse firmly tied to a post by a very long rope; the horse can run around, back and forth, in any direction it wants, but it never can leave the circle, it never can get away from the post that symbolizes the naval of Mother Nature. So can't we human beings; by an invisible cord we are tied firmly to Nature, and what is going on there affects us although we most often don't know how. That's my our health, our well-being, even normal growth of our children, is so much affected by seasonal changes of nature. That's why certain germs and viruses apparently become livelier, stronger—we call it more virulent—in certain seasons.

Even if we don't know casual connections, we know a few facts I am going to mention and a few warnings to mothers what to watch for now that Spring is here—at least according to the calendar.

Spring has not only its beauty and its beneficial effect on our body and soul, but also some dangers. The longer days, the increased sunshine, the sight of the first flowers and tender green of sprouting leafy shrubs and trees lifts up our spirit, let us take our daily worries and troubles easier. On the other hand, by way of contrast people inclined to depressions and melancholy get worse, and statistics show the highest incidence of suicides in May and June.

Everybody has experienced "Spring fever," a state of weariness or lack of energy, a certain restlessness, a desire to get away, to travel. Observations of thousands of school children in Boston and New York revealed that increase in height and weight is for several months almost stationary; the increase in weight is greatest in Summer and Fall, although you would think that children's over-activity in Summer and increased perspiration should rather have the opposite effect. Increase in weight according to this investigation averaged per month 2 1/2 ounces from January to June and 12 1/2 ounces from June to December.

Frequency of common infectious diseases is too much related to seasons to be purely accidental. Scarlet fever is lowest in August, increases till December, decreases till February, and is then up again till May. Measles increases greatly in Spring, and according to Nassau County Health Department we may expect a sharp increase in May. Common colds are more frequent in Spring, partly due to improper dressing. The sun is already nice and warming but the air is cool. Thus, walking is o.k., but sitting outdoors while there is a great difference in temperature when the sun warms your face and cool air chills your back is dangerous and may cause "colds" or muscular rheumatism. Women especially shouldn't sit on cold stones or damp ground. Let the children play outdoors, but call them in when they are thru and change their clothes when they are in perspiration. Don't forget that now your children may more often contact children already in a state of incubation with some infectious disease or just "carriers" of some germs. That's why you should watch them more closely, have them checked up more frequently by your doctor, have them inoculated and vaccinated if it hasn't been done before, or have them given "booster shots"; clothe them properly, and in the first place insist firmly on their being home in time for regular well-balanced meals with plenty of fresh vegetables, in Spring much richer in important vitamins.

**PUBLIC NOTICE PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY BUILDING ZONE ORDINANCE OF 1929**

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE, that the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, will hold a public hearing on May 16th, 1950, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon (E.D.S.T.) or as soon thereafter as is possible, in the District Court Room, Town Hall, Oyster Bay, New York, at which time citizens and parties interested may be heard on the adoption of proposed amendments to the Town of Oyster Bay Building Zone Ordinance of 1929, which said amendments will be substantially in the following form:

Section 18 Subd. B shall have added to it a new paragraph entitled:

B-1 Any such variance granted shall be conditioned upon the applicant's proceeding with the work called for in the application within 90 days after the filing of the Board's decision granting such variance. In the event of the failure to comply with this condition the variance shall become null and void and the zoning reverted back to its original use the same as if no variance had been granted.

Section 4 shall be amended by adding thereto a new paragraph entitled:

WHEREAS, there has been and continues to be unprecedented and large scale development throughout Nassau County by sub-division of lands and mass improvement and building up of large areas of land and farms that heretofore were and had been, for the most part, unimproved; and

WHEREAS, the said general development is rapidly progressing on a large scale, encompassing many square miles of territory within the Town of Oyster Bay; and

WHEREAS, the modern production methods employed in the erection of the dwellings and other structures result in the rapid erection and completion of an extraordinary number of dwellings in large numbers and groups upon subdivided land within special district areas where the facilities for schools, teachers and equipment, as well as public transportation, sanitation, sewerage, fire protection and other requisite public facilities, utilities and services are wholly inadequate to meet the necessities which arise from the sudden occupancy by many families of said dwellings and structures; and

WHEREAS, in many areas of the Town of Oyster Bay suddenly created and unanticipated tax burdens arising out of such building developments have caused financial distress to its citizens and to the municipal governments and other authorities, many of whom do not have jurisdiction or power to control the said conditions, and wherefore emergency measures have been and are required to be taken in order to endeavor to meet, either temporarily or permanently, the disrupting effect of such sudden and abnormal growth and the undue stresses and strains so arising; and

WHEREAS, the aggregate assessed valuations of such affected areas, either in their undeveloped or improved state are insufficient properly and adequately to meet the costs and expenses so being imposed by the extraordinary requirements of public services and facilities not heretofore necessary therein; and

WHEREAS, among other things and in order to save, conserve, and stabilize the investments in homes and properties of those now and hereafter owning improved and unimproved property in said specific areas so affected, and elsewhere throughout the Town, it has been determined by the Town Board that assessed valuation of the new and altered buildings and structures should be created to an extent sufficient to assist, in some degree at least in paying for the capital costs and maintenance expenses of such new and additional public services and facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay has adopted as a policy, for the

proper development of the Town, that a minimum liveable or habitable area shall be determined and fixed for any and all dwellings and dwelling units hereafter erected or altered in the Town of Oyster Bay in order to equalize and equitably and properly spread such additional requisite tax burdens so being newly created among those being or to be benefited, in a reasonable and proportionate share for all; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay is of the opinion and has determined that an assessed valuation less than that which can be fixed upon a dwelling or structure having the minimum habitable area, as herein specified is unjust, unfair and inequitable, and will result in grossly unequal, unjust, and discriminatory treatment of its citizens and inhabitants, and that the best interests and the general welfare, safety, and morale of the citizens of the Town of Oyster Bay will be served and promoted by providing for such minimum standards and bases for establishment of minimum assessed valuations, not only for the reasons aforesaid, but also to prevent and avoid the creation of presently and potentially sub-minimum dwelling units and slum areas, with their accompanying proven undesirable and dangerous sociological and economic results:

BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, State of New York, that the Town of Oyster Bay Building Zone Ordinance of 1929 shall be, and the same hereby is, amended by adding in Section 4 thereof an additional provision reading as follows, viz:

"In Residence A District and Residence B District no dwelling shall hereafter be erected or altered unless provision shall be made therein for not less than fifteen hundred (1500) square feet of habitable floor area, provided, however, that an area of not less than one thousand (1000) square feet may be provided for within the exterior of the foundation walls at ground level.

"In all other Use Districts no dwelling shall hereafter be erected or altered for a one-family dwelling unless provision shall be made therein for not less than one thousand (1000) square feet of habitable floor area; provided, however, that an area of not less than eight hundred (800) square feet may be provided for within the exterior of the foundation walls at ground level.

"In Residence E District no dwelling shall hereafter be erected or altered for a two-family dwelling unless provision shall be made therein for not less than eight hundred (800) square feet of habitable floor area for each family.

"In Residence F District, no dwelling shall hereafter be erected or altered for an apartment house unless provision shall be made therein for not less than six hundred (600) square feet of habitable floor area for each family unit.

"The foregoing provisions hereof shall not, however, be applicable to the dwelling quarters of domestic employees within an accessory building as permitted by this ordinance.

This amendment shall take effect immediately.

For the record, we must correct the impression given here last week that new community softball league will be conducted under the direction of the Hicksville School Board's Summer Playground Program.

It can be said that that is what was originally intended but the league's complexion changed when the first organizational meeting was held last Friday.

It now develops that the league will operate under the guidance of Gus Econopoly and Ralph Ferrara. They will assume operation of the league in the role of private citizens interested solely in providing the community with such a program.

The School Board has granted permission for the use of school grounds and to our knowledge nothing else.

It is good that we will have a softball league. And those responsible for it should receive just credit for their endeavors.

And when school funds and equipment aren't going to be used in its operation, that fact should be made clear from the beginning.

As for the softball league itself, another meeting will be held this Friday night in the Athletic Directors' office of Hicksville High.

Three clubs had representatives at last week's meeting. They were Shady Maples, Long Island Nationals and Empire Diner.

For this week's meeting all clubs are to file temporary rosters.

There is no restriction concerning player's residence. Entry fee for the league will be in the neighborhood of \$35.00 but the exact amount will be decided on at a later date.

Manager Bill Garbarino is expected to send Jim Barone to the mound this evening when the Empire Diner softball club launches its Hempstead League campaign against the Rams.

It would seem that the comparatively young Empire club has made a wise choice in entering the Hub loops since a novel schedule has been arranged wherein the better teams cannot have a constant field day against the weaker clubs.

The twelve-team league will operate in two divisions and three rounds. There will be six clubs in each division for the first round and at the end, the six best percentage clubs will be placed in one division for round two and the six poorest percentages will be in another bracket.

The same procedure will follow for round three. Under this system a newly formed team will best be able to exploit its capabilities.

With Barone tonight against the Rams, Manager Garbarino himself will be in the lineup along with Herman Rigby, Jerry McGunnigle, Ed Rusch, Mel Voochries, Sid Rigby, and Jim Valentine.

The Nassau County CYO Bowling League concludes its 1950 season on the South Levittown Alleys tomorrow (Thursday) night and one Hicksville club will have to beat another to come off with a high finish.

The St. Ignatius Hustlers will be out to break their second place tie with St. Barnabas of Bellmore and complete the season in sole possession of the runner-up spot.

In order to do so they will have to beat the St. Ignatius Question Marks headed by Tony Puccio.

Ralph Cuccaro, Steve Ruggiero, Ted Solkloff, Ed Emil and Mike Gregg will make the big bid for the Hustlers.

We can hear the noble talk now concerning the forfeits forced on Oyster Bay's track team for using an ineligible performer.

It will be particularly loud in Hicksville since the Comets absorbed a sound beating which is now removed from the books if not from the mind.

All we can say is that you must play by the rules and win or lose by them.

Hicksville High should do nothing but accept the forfeit. We can still not forgive the famous Baldwin forfeit of over a decade ago nor Hicksville's refusal to sink its teeth in it and hold on.

It will be remembered that Baldwin came to town with a mammoth squad. Late in the first half the officials ejected a Baldwin player from the game for fighting and Coach George Craig refused to continue the game.

Hicksville was awarded a forfeit when Baldwin left the field and its players retired to the dressing room. After thinking the matter over Craig wanted to resume play and Hicksville agreed.

However, the officials declared that one game had already been won by Hicksville 2-0 and considered the resumption of play as an entirely new game. Baldwin won finally, as expected, by a 25-2 count.

That year the Green Wave cleaned up the County and won all the awards. The forfeit was completely forgotten and to this day the Hicksville High athletic office records only a 25-2 loss to Baldwin for the season in question.

# Reverse OB Track Win Over Comet

HICKSVILLE—In line with growing displeasure over extended competition in interscholastic sports that is prevalent in this State, the NSAL Athletic Directors this week ordered all Oyster Bay track meets so far this season forfeited to their opponents on the grounds that its outstanding star, Gene Floyd, was competing for the fifth year.

The ruling reversed the crushing 73-22 victory Oyster Bay scored over Hicksville, here, last Wednesday.

The result will go into the record books as a forfeit win for the Comets, although information passed to the Herald indicates that the local school did not lodge the complaint with the league.

Oyster Bay could have had wide margin of victory over Comets even without Floyd. His double win in the 100-yard dash

and broad jump and his running on the winning relay team were the most sparkling accomplishments of the meet, but the Baymen were consistently superior in every department.

Hicksville only won two firsts. Ronnie Rayburn won the 880-yard dash in 2:17.6 and Frank Tricolo came home in front in the mile run in 5:18.0.

Otherwise, it was a complete sweep for the visitors. Williams finished third for Hicksville in the 100. Dick Scott tied for first with Annottie in the 220 in the fine time of :22.9. Fellens was second in the 440. Bianco was third in the mile, Kerbs and Elder tied for third in the high jump and Elders was third in the pole vault to complete the losers score.

## Comets Bow In First Place Test

HICKSVILLE—Chet Jaworski's Comets kicked away a chance to gain first place in the NSAL Eastern Division diamond race, here Friday, thus allowing Oyster Bay to grab the top rung with a 9-5 victory.

The collapse of the Hicksville defense came three days after John Zix set down Sea Cliff with but one hit and got the Comets off wiggling in their fight for the flag.

In what promises to be a wide open race—since no one team in the league has yet to demonstrate that it holds the balance of power—Oyster Bay gained the victory when Hicksville could get to Spencer James and Gene Beltrido for only two hits.

Ed Milacek struck a double for the Comets in the third inning and Jack Pickering a single in the fifth. Both were important in the scoring and were responsible for Hicksville tying the count at 5-5 in the fifth inning.
