MAY USE SURPLUS:

Legal Question Halts June 13 Vote on Bus

HICKSVILLE—The vote of the school district upon transportation of pupils next fall, previously set for June 13, will not take place, a spokesman for the Board of Education said yesterday. The Board had set June 13 for a special meeting of the district, but a legal difficulty has arisen on the proposed method of financing and a vote may take place later in the month.

A statement from the Board indicates that a vote as proposed could not legally be held until after Oct. 1, but adds that consideration is being given to the possible use of any surplus which may be available at the close of the present fiscal year.

At the annual meeting earlier this month it was publicly disclosed that about \$19,000 might remain as surplus from the current fiscal year. If the State Education Dept. at Albany gives the okay, the local board may call a vote upon using this fund to finance bus service during next September and then another vote would be required on or after Oct. 1 to cover the balance of the fiscal year with Budget notes.

Late yesterday (Tuesday) the School Board received the approval from Albany by phone to hold a vote upon using surplus funds for such purpose. As a result a vote is anticipated sometime in June although this will be set officially by the Board at its next meeting.

Church Exchanges One Acre for Four

ISLAND TREES—An unusual real estate transaction at Levittown Centre, here, involves the non-cash exchange of about one acre of land by four. The land transfer will result in the relocation of St. Bernard's E. C. Church buildings on a new site less than 250 feet away, where its facilities will be expanded, and will enable the builders of Levittown Centre to "square out" needed frontage along Hempstead Tpke., directly opposite their current building operations.

Under the terms of the agreement, St. Bernard's Church has until Aug. 1, 1951, to move its facilities to the new location. There are more than 2,000 Catholic families in the area.

Builders Protest Floor Space, Topsoil Laws; Final Hearing Friday

OYSTER BAY—Builders and developers were out in force yesterday morning at the Town Board meeting to protest the enactment of a law which would increase the minimum floor space of residences built in the town. Several developers also offered objections to the proposed enactment of an amendment to the Town Topsoil Ordinance which would strengthen a requirement of the law that they leave a minimum depth of soil about the houses they built.

William L. Geyer, chairman of the Topsoil Committee for the Hicksville Civic Assoc., was present with several residents of new home sections in Hicksville to urge enforcement of the present ordinance. At a recent Board meeting, petitions bearing 321 signatures of new home owners was presented to the town fathers, requesting enforcement of the code which directs a minimum depth remain after stripping.

Hearing on Friday

A final hearing on the proposed amendment will be held this Friday morning at 10 o'clock at the Hicksville Courthouse, Bay Ave. and Heitz Pl., and Geyer hopes that all interested residents will be present. The builders plan to be present, they said. Among those attending yesterday's meeting from Hicksville was James Condon of the Hicksville Park section.

The major topic at the Board meeting yesterday was the proposed increase in minimum floor space. About two hours of the morning were devoted to this amendment which brought out a packed-house. Several developers were represented by their attorneys.

Members of the Jericho Taxpayers group were present to press for the enforcement of the new code. They cited the burden placed upon municipalities and school districts through the mass construction of low cost homes which fall to carry in real estate taxes a fair share of the added costs of local government.

Phone Co. Gets Rate Increase

HEMPSTEAD—The New York Public Service Commission has granted the N. Y. Telephone Co. its first permanent rate increase in 20 years, effective May 14.

Hicksville 3 and 5 customers now have the following new rates: *Natural* residence service: Individual line \$4.50 a month; 2-party line, \$3.75; 4-party \$3.25, and rural \$3.25. The monthly charge for business service is \$6 for the first 75 message units.

3-Mile Highway Sign Protested

HICKSVILLE—A protest to the New York State Dept. of Public Works is going to Babylon, protesting erection of a roadside sign at Jericho Tpke., Jericho, which indicates the distance to Levittown as 3 miles.

The Civic Assoc. is making the complaint since the three-mile sign almost puts the Levitt development at the Hicksville Rail Road Station. A speedometer check shows that the road distance from Jericho to the Telephone Exchange on Hempstead Tpke, which is not quite the middle of the Levitt section, is over five miles.

Summer School Starts July 5

HICKSVILLE—The first summer high school session in this community, fully authorized and accredited by the University of the State of New York, will start on July 5. Principal Mabel R. Farley said this week. The sessions will be held until Aug. 24 with three classes of one hour and 20 minutes mornings.

No tuition charge is required of pupils living in the school district but resident pupils will pay a registration fee of \$3 per course. The tuition rate for non-residents is \$10 per subject. Miss Farley said.

Registration days for the summer high school will be held June 27, 28, 29 and 30. Students wishing to enroll must make arrangements through their local high school principal.

Subjects to be offered include Chemistry, Science, Social Studies, English, Algebra, Geometry, Mechanical Drawing, Art, Short-hand, Typewriting and Driver Education and Training.

Community Meeting June 8 to Start Effort to Incorporate Hicksville

HICKSVILLE—The first positive step toward the possible incorporation of this community will be taken at a general community meeting set for Thursday night, June 8, in the Firehouse Auditorium on E. Marie St. The meeting, open to all interested residents, is being sponsored by the Civic and Community Assoc.

Purpose of the meeting will be to organize a Committee on Incorporation from among the residents of Hicksville, according to Lawrence A. Roman, Civic president. From among those present who evidence interest in the project will be selected various sub-committees on such topics as speakers' bureau, finance, legal, education, statistics, etc.

The current inroads by Levitt & Sons in Hicksville School District with the "blunt disregard for the established community because of its unincorporated status, as shown by letter to the Civic last week, has stimulated interest in the topic of incorporation as a matter of self-preservation for our town," Roman said.

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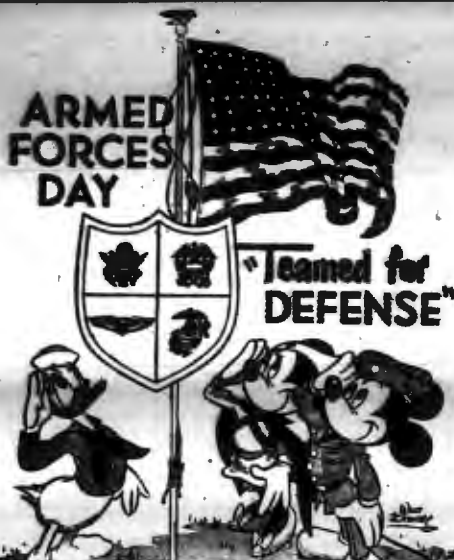

Board follows:

"The Board of Education announced today that it cannot proceed with its announced plan of calling a Special Meeting of the District on June 13 to vote on the question of School Transportation. This announcement was made by the Board after its special meeting of Monday, May 15, which was called to complete arrangements for the transportation vote.

"The Board was advised by its Counsel that the proposed method of financing transportation by the issuance of Budget Notes cannot be used at this time, since such action can be approved only by a meeting of the voters of the District held during the last nine months of the Fiscal year. Such a meeting, therefore, can be held on or after October 1, 1950 and will be called by the Board when permissible.

"The Board is however at this time investigating the possibility of using any surplus which may be available at the close of the present school year, June 30, 1950, for transportation purposes. If a favorable opinion on this procedure is received from the State Education Department, the Board intends to present the question for an expression of opinion from the voters of the District as soon as possible.

"It is hoped that this will make it possible to provide transportation from the beginning of the new school year until such time as a Special Meeting can be held to authorize financing of transportation for the remainder of the year through the issuance of Budget Notes."

Myron Saumar, first vice-president of the club, in the absence of President Roland Heberer, presented the gift, which was accepted by Councilman Frank Chumsky.

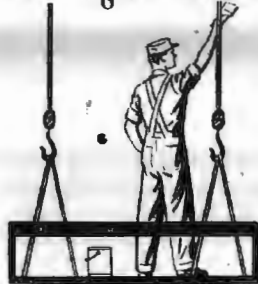
Councilman Chumsky congratulated the Lions upon their civic interest and pride and expressed the hope that residents of the community will make good use of the receptacles and help keep the

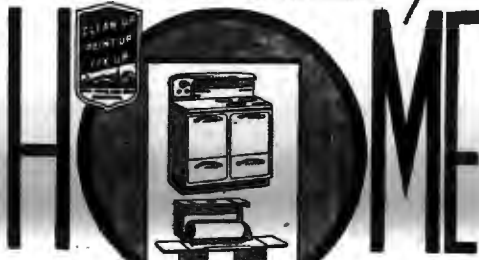

During the beginning of the week, one of the receptacles was the centerpiece of a clean-up window display at the Hickville Firestone Dealer Store at 114 B'way.

The town highway department, under the direction of Superintendent John R. Brandt of Fourth St., is cooperating in the clean-up drive also, and is prepared to cooperate in the disposal of certain types of trash and rubbish.

Supervisor Harry Tappen told the Herald this week that the town is well underway with its program of preparing the beaches for the bathing season which starts around Decoration Day.

Commissioner John H. Beckmann of the Nassau County Police has alerted members of his department to maintain continual vigilance against the rubbish-spreading violators and Commissioner John C. Gilbert of the Public Works Dept. today appealed to "residents who want to keep their highways clean and attractive to observe violations and promptly report car license numbers to the nearest policeman."

Hicksville Complaint
It was disclosed that work had hardly been completed on the new nearly \$400,000 straightening, widening and landscaping of Jerusalem Ave. from Hicksville to Hempstead Tpke., when complaints were received through the Hicksville Civic and Community Assn. of litter marring the roadside.

Department officials recollected that some municipalities had called attention to violations of community decrees with placards reading, "We are doing our best to have our roadsides look their best; please do not contribute to making them look like Hell." Deputy Commissioner Charles V. Smith reported that a recent inspection along Jerusalem Ave. indicated that litter was not rubbish dumped by contractors, but rather rubbish thrown from cars by householders.

He advised the Civics that "it is not necessary to post signs to prevent this practice. The depositing of anything within the highway is a violation of the law."

Gilbert said: "We believe that new residents have a great deal of pride in their new community and want to keep it fresh and appealing. If the very few who cause this litter nuisance could be apprehended it would be stopped because wilful violators have drawn fines ranging around \$50 and thus find it is actually half that price to pay a commercial collector for a whole year. The arranging for a commercial collector, or creation of a municipal collection district is an important matter in all parts of the county. The highways are not the place to dispose of garbage or refuse."

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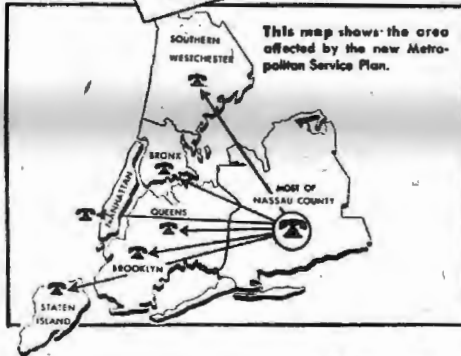

NEWS FROM WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Taft-Hartley Bill, which is supposed to improve the GI Bill education and training program, brought an interesting fact to light. H. V. Sterling, VA's education boss, has harped on training abuses, allegedly reflected by such things as newspaper advertising of GI Bill courses to determine the sex of chicks . . . YET, the House will learn during the T-T debate that veteran graduates of chick-sexing courses are much sought after . . . sometimes earn more money than a member of Congress!

Plenty of headaches stemming from the provision in the new GI Housing Bill which authorizes the VA to permit veterans to reuse their loan guaranty, where property purchased under original guaranty has been disposed of "for compelling reasons devoid of fault upon the part of the veteran." The fact that the VA legal eagles are having difficulty interpreting this provision is encouraging—indicates possibility of liberal ruling—covering such "compelling reasons" as having to dispose of property because of job transfer or change to another city—or because of need for larger home to meet expanding family needs.

Unheralded medical research program . . . carried on by VA National Research Council, and leading medical centers . . . now nearing completion . . . may provide medical criteria on which future inductions into armed services will be based . . . supply answers to 4 pertinent questions involved in care of veterans.

Follow-up studies on 22 major illnesses and disabilities incurred by servicemen during War II, being conducted, on a contract basis, in 23 leading medical schools and 4 hospitals . . . and by VA personnel in VVA hospitals and clinics from coast to coast.

Studies are expected to give VA answers to these questions: (1) Is there a better way of taking care of servicemen who suffer such disabilities in future wars? (2) Is there a type of man or woman whom the armed services should never accept . . . and can VA supply the medical criteria by means of which this fact would be determined . . . especially in neuropsychiatric and tuberculosis cases? (3) What types of patient load in VA hospitals can be expected in the future? (4) What can be done to improve the care in VA hospitals of patients who have such diseases?

Failure to follow-up studies, after World War I, proved costly during War II—since little or no medical knowledge was available to guide doctors treating same disabilities.

VETERANS planning to attend summer school under the GI Bill are advised to begin making arrangements NOW!

The government is offering WW II veterans 54 farm units, covering 6940 acres of irrigable land north of Riverton in central Wyoming. You must have at least \$3000 in cash, assets, livestock or farm equipment—plus 2 years of farming experience—and must plan to farm as an occupation. Deadline for this opportunity is June 26, 1950.

We lost one of the most active supporters of veterans' benefits in the Senate as a result of primary defeat of Sen. Claude Pepper (D., Fla.) in last week's elections . . . Pepper had an excellent record of helping to steer vet legislation through the Senate. Veterans in all cities and states should be on guard in future political elections and check a man's background thoroughly before voting.

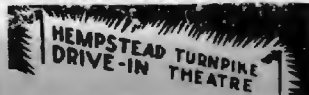
