## Town Ready to Acquire Parking Field

HICKSVILLE — Councilman Frank Chlunsky brought good news to the Business Men's Assoc. meeting at the Legion Hall, Wednesday night, when he reported Town Board is ready to acquire property behind the stores on the west side of Bway for a 60-car space public parking field with access from W. Marie St.

The town hopes to get title to the property from Mrs. F. N. Taliferro and proceed with surfacing in about 30 days, he added, to help relieve the acute local situation on parking. Other plans on parking and traffic, he reported, include installation of parking meters by

the first of September "and perhaps sooner," two-hour limit on parking on E. Barclay St., one-hour limit on Bway from RR to John St., widening of Hersog Pl. by taking four feet off the south curb "before the Fall starts," and acquisition of a number of other small fields. A three-hour limit on the field opposite the firehouse is also planned.

President Pat Bufalino presided at the meeting when plans were tentatively made for BMA Dollar Days early in August. Charles Schwartz is chairman of the committee.

HICKSVILLE—A mass meeting to start an aggressive campaign for the incorporation of this community will take place tomorrow (Thursday) evening in the Firehouse auditorium on E. Marie St. The meeting is being sponsored by the Civic and Community Assoc. All interested residents are cordially invited to be present, according to Civic President Lawrence A. Roman.

The program for the evening will cover three major phases, according to Roman: (1) Why we should incorporate Hicksville, (2) How do we go about it? and (3) How can we accomplish this objective? Under the first division, it is planned to offer "factual data on the lack of cooperation and inadequacy of town government," the matter of overlapping and duplicated local services, and the question of preserving the identity of the community.

Speakers will include men prominent in the Civic Assoc. who will handle portions of the various topics. Expected to take part are Roman, William L. Geyer, William Botto, Elery Bean, Ernest Dietreich and Stanley Miruz, among others.

Formation of a Committee on Incorporation is scheduled to take place as a result of the meeting.

Posters have been placed around Hicksville, announcing the mass meeting, and featuring the theme "Hold that Line." The reference is to maintaining the geographical boundary line between the present Levitt development and Hicksville.

## School Register May Reach 1500

HICKSVILLE — An all-time peak registration of 1500 persons for the special school district meeting of June 21 at the high school is anticipated by District Clerk Andrew B. Heberer. The final registration day is this coming Saturday, June 10, at Nicholai St. School between 3 and 9 p.m.

Last Saturday, 245 persons registered to bring the total number of eligible voters up to 1,226. Those who registered for the annual meeting on May 2 and the election on May 3 are qualified to vote on the School Bus and Lee Ave. property purchase questions on June 21, according to Heberer.

# Columbia to Present School Report June 15

HICKSVILLE—The final report of Columbia University Institute of Field Studies on public school building needs in this community will be presented at a community meeting in the high school auditorium on Thursday night, June 15. It was announced today by the Board of Education. All residents are urged to be present at this session.

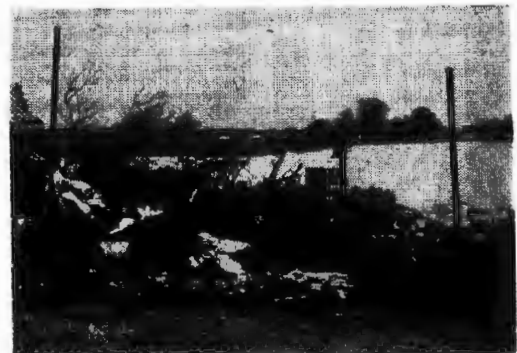
Dr. Felix McCormick, one of the Columbia experts who conducted the survey of the district, will present the report and answer questions.

### Authorized Last Year

The study was authorized over a year ago at the annual school meeting of May 3, 1948, when an appropriation of \$6,000 was added to the budget to cover the cost of the project. Harry Brumswain, who will take his place on the school board after July 1 of this year, offered the motion to authorize the study which was carried almost unanimously.

With the start of the 1950-51 year, the project was undertaken with Columbia University given the contract for the job after several groups of applicants were interviewed. A preliminary report was made publicly by the school board during January of this year and portions of an interim report were released last month.

Recommendations for immediate action included extension of East St. school, which is now on the architect's drafting tables and purchase of a site for a 30-room elementary school at Lee Ave. and South Broadway, which will be (Continued on Page 3)

ture of \$35,000 for the purchase of about 9 acres at Lee Ave. near the intersection of South B'way as the site for a new 20-room elementary school, and (2) expenditure of not more than \$20,000 out of anticipated surplus funds to provide transportation of elementary school pupils starting in September.

The current school bus appropriation expires the end of this month with the current term. An appropriation of \$45,000 to continue this service next term was deleted from the budget at the annual meeting on May 2.

The decision as to the distance pupils are to be transported and the grades to be included will be made by the Board of Education. At present, students from the kindergarten thru sixth grade are carried if they reside a half mile or more from Eas: St. School, Nicholai St. School and St. Ignatius Parochial School.

Unofficially, it is anticipated that if service is continued for the next term, the distance from schools to the start of service may be increased, especially for the upper grades.

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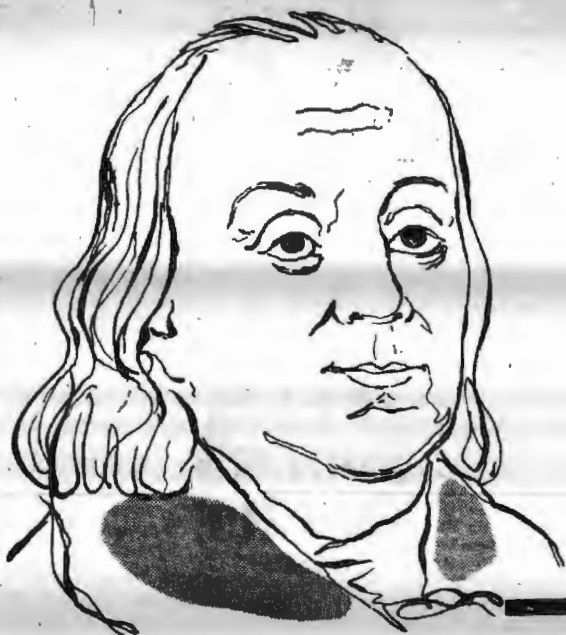
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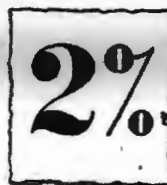
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# Grumman Needs Longer Runways

GRUMMAN AIRCRAFT ENGINEERING Corp at Bethpage has no plans to move away from the community of Long Island, it was verified this week. The mid-Island section hummed during the past couple of weeks with reports that Grumman is moving. Background for most of the reports was the fact that Grumman is trying to get runway no. 88 lengthened to accommodate jet planes being built for the Navy and the incidental relocation of South Oyster Bay Rd.

The Herald first reported the plan to relocate South Oyster Bay Rd. in March and published a map (see below) showing the new route of the highway, in its April 5 issue.

Appearance of a Grumman official at a recent Board of Supervisors' meeting was score-banded by one daily paper with the implication that "the Worry had informed Grumman that longer runways were necessary for their new type planes—or else—contracts would go someplace else."

A spokesman for the aircraft firm told the Herald this week "it is impossible to fly airplanes of future design from our present runways," but he vigorously denied reports of a plan to take the multi-million dollar factory elsewhere.

A hearing is being held next Monday morning, June 12, before the County Board of Supervisors to act upon an emergency resolution of County Execu-

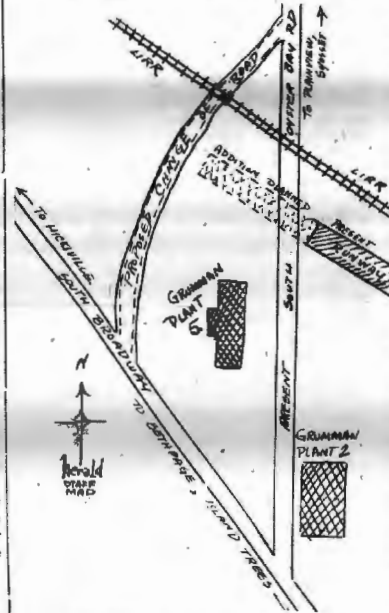
2. Does Hicksville have any separate identity? Who protects this identity if there be one?

tive J. Russel Sprague. According to the Supervisors' calendar for Monday, the hearing is for the purpose of permitting Trustees of the Long Island Rail Road to express their opinion as to the necessity for relocation of South Oyster Bay Rd. A spokesman for the LIRR was quoted as saying that the change in highway route is going to be opposed by the RR because "it would bring a landing strip too close to the railroad tracks and thereby constitute a safety hazard."

The new crossing will be about 784 feet west of the present crossing. The road will cross the main line at grade and the freight siding to Glassfords Corp. A resolution (no. 305) before the Supervisors will authorize Sprague to file a formal petition for the new crossing with the New York State Public Service Commission.

John C. Guilbert, county commissioner of public works, said recently he believes the proposal "a very good thing for the County." He said it is good from the viewpoint of industrial plant taxes paid and good for the workers and residents who share in the company's payroll and spend their money in county retail shops.

All necessary land for the new right-of-way will be dedicated to the county, at no cost, and the county will retain ownership of the old right of way. If conditions change in the future the old roadway could be put back into service as either an alternative route or a one-way route, according to Guilbert, the new road constituting traffic in the opposite direction. All incidental costs are to be borne by Grumman.

The runway to be extended is now over a mile long (5,400 feet), the longest of several on the Grumman property.
