Harbes Asks State Call New Election

ALBANY—The State Commissioner of Education today has a formal plea to call a new meeting of the Plainview School District upon the question of establishing a Union Free District and to hold a new election of trustees. Members of the Board of Trustees, elected May 26, and the District Clerk were this week served with papers in the petition made by John G. Harbes.

Prior to May 26, Plainview was a Common School District with three members: Harbes, William Schwartz and John A. Hartmann. The question of changing the set-up to a Union Free School District was submitted at a special district meeting on May 26. The same evening five trustees were declared elected: Girard Lichty, Joseph Stapleton, Joseph Arena, Katherine Greib and Hartmann.

Harbes, who is represented in his appeal by Attorney Thomas F. Hyland of Hempstead, claims that the legal notice published in the Mid-Island Herald was not submitted to members of the 3-man board, that Harbes objected to the form of the proposition and notice, and that the notice of the meeting did not provide for the election of school trustees.

He also alleges that the election was "not properly and legally held" and that the votes were not properly counted.

The present 5-man board has until early next week in which to reply to the charges. Thereafter, the State Education Commissioner is expected to hold a hearing upon the plea at Albany.

Expect Meters by Sept; Commuter Field Soon

OYSTER BAY—Councilman Frank Chlumsky and the Oyster Bay Town Board is studying bids from four parking meter concerns and is expected to reach a decision upon the installation of meters in Hicksville within a few weeks. Approximately 500 meters are expected to be lining the curbs of Hicksville before Labor Day.

Commuter Field Soon
Meanwhile in Hicksville, it was reported officially that the Commuter Parking Field near the corner of Newbridge Rd. and Daffy Ave is expected to be in use by the middle of July. An application has been made by the private concern which owns the 4-acre field for a variance to permit a gas station at the entrance to the field.

The variance request comes before the Zoning Appeals Board here at its next session. The station would be located on Newbridge Rd. Commuters paying a monthly fee to park may be permitted to "work off" their bill by credits for purchasing gasoline, it has been suggested.

Councilman Chlumsky, discussing the parking meters, said yesterday that bids upon meters for 500 car spaces were received by the Town Board last week on Tuesday. Single meters average around \$50 and installation is expected to take about two months.

2 New Members Go On Education Board

HICKSVILLE — Two new members will take office on the Board of Education during the week. Harry Erenwein and Robert Corcoran, elected for three-year terms in May, will start their positions with the first of July. Lawrence Eisenhower, member of the Board for six years, is retiring. He was not a candidate for re-election. For the first time since early March, the Board will have a full 5-man membership. The other vacancy of the Board was caused by the resignation of Dr. Charles Massek.

The Board will reorganize at its first meeting on July 5, electing a chairman, vice chairman and secretary from its membership and (continued on page 17)

Named chairmen of subcommittees were Harry Boyley, finance; Stanley Krusz, research; Robert Corcoran, legal; Mrs. Lucia McIntosh, speakers and Fred J. Noeth, information. They will serve until these sub-divisions have met and chosen their own permanent leaders. Ed Sullivan was named tentatively to head the zone or district block workers.

Over sixty people have volunteered their time and services to incorporation campaign. Roman announced at the meeting held in the Firehouse Auditorium, Thursday night, following the regular Civic Association meeting. It is planned to have the various permanent chairmen named before another general meeting is held a month hence.

Limit Membership

There was a prolonged discussion and debate at the meeting upon the question of who may serve upon the committee. A question by Ernest Francke that membership of the committee be limited to residents of the area which plans to incorporate was carried after considerable argument. The discussion and motion was precipitated by a suggestion from Mrs. McIntosh that Charles E. Stoll be invited to head the legal committee or serve on this committee.

Attorney Stoll who has his office in Hicksville had recently changed his home address to Dix Hills in Suffolk.

Henry Schnepf offered a motion which was carried that Roman be authorized to create new subcommittees as needed.

Hicksville Needs Higher Values To Meet Cost of School Building

Can Hicksville finance a \$6,900,000 school site and building program over the next decade, if events should prove the need for such an extensive outlay? This is a difficult question to answer at this time, although the evidence available now casts doubt on the prospects. It depends on a number of related factors, the two most important of which are (1) the available wealth of the community, and (2) the willingness of the people to expend this wealth in order to provide good schools for their children.

Besides these two factors, there are a number of others which, directly or indirectly, influence both the available wealth of the community and the willingness of the people to support education. The local assessment policy, for example, determines the proportion of the local wealth that can be used for school capital outlay purposes, since bonded indebtedness is restricted to 10 per cent of the assessed valuation unless State approval is given to exceed this percentage.

A policy of assessing property at a low percentage of its true value, or its current value, means that only a relatively small percentage of the local wealth is available for financing the build-

ing program. In many cases the size of the local tax rate, the expenditures for current public services, and the amount of outstanding public debt all have an influence — favorable or unfavorable — on the willingness of the people to spend more money for education.

Assessed Valuations

The total amount of the assessed valuation serves as one measure of a community's wealth. The assessed valuation in Hicksville has increased sharply over the past 35 years. Over this period the valuation has increased \$15,847,515 from \$890,840 in 1915 to \$16,738,355 in 1949, an average gain of \$452,785 per year. Second Installment Of Columbia Report

The highlights of the recommendations on future school construction in Hicksville District, in view of the current and anticipated new home construction here by Levitt & Sons and other builders, were outlined by the HEEALD last week. The report was based upon the just-completed study made by the Institute of Field Studies, Teachers College, Columbia University, under contract with the school district.

The total cost of the long-range program comes to almost \$7,000,000, with a five-step plan outlined to take place during the next decade (10 years). Foremost question to develop, therefore, is, can the community finance such a program. —Editor.

County Okays \$200,000 Road

GENEOLA—The Nassau County Board of Supervisors on motion of Supervisor Henry Tappen of Oyster Bay adopted the controversial map for re-location of South Oyster Bay Rd. at Bethpage, appropriated \$200,000 for surface construction and designated it as Project No. 1 for 1950, at its stated meeting Monday, June 26.

A public hearing on the proposal was held at Mineola June 14 when the LIRR gave notice it objected and wished to establish a full record of their objections. An adjourned session was held on June 19 when decision was reserved pending the June 26 regular meeting.

In moving for adoption of the map and approval of the project, unanimously voted by the board, Supervisor Tappen stated:

"The Board has carefully considered this resolution and has reviewed some 140 pages of testi-

mony as well as the various exhibits submitted at the hearings. The Grumman plant is without question an integral and essential part of the County's economy. Its removal from the County would entail personal hardship to the thousands of County residents who are employed there as well as cause substantial loss of revenue to the County.

"The railroad did not challenge the necessity of making it possible for the Grumman plant to remain at Bethpage but based its opposition on the narrower ground as stated by its counsel:

"We believe the extension of this runway will present a tremendous hazard to railroad traffic. We want the advantage of a full and complete record to that extent. We trust this Board is not going to do anything to further this project and create such a hazard for railroad traffic. That will be the object to which my case will be directed and all my cross-

examination."

"While conscious of the responsibility for public safety, we must also be fully aware that the only way to guarantee that no disabled plane will ever strike a house or a train in the County of Nassau would be to prohibit the operation of planes in the skies over the County. This is not only beyond the power of the Board but the harmful effects of such a policy upon the people generally would more than offset the effect of the possibility of such an accident. With respect to the possibility of such an accident, we can do no more than see to it that all reasonable precautions be taken," Tappen stated.

HICKSVILLE — Almost 50 per cent of the registered voters of the District turned out Wednesday night, June 21, to decide upon property purchase and elementary school transportation questions. Seven hundred and 25 persons cast their ballots, a near-record vote.

As a result, bus transportation will continue in the fall for as long as the estimated \$20,000 surplus now appropriated lasts. A margin

of almost 4 to 1 approved both the bus question and the purchase of the Lee Ave. site for a new 20-room elementary school.

Voting began at 8:30 after a short interval in which Fred J. Noeth was elected chairman of the meeting and the procedure on the use of opinion questionnaires regarding degrees of service was explained by Henry C. Brengel, president of the School Board.

Bruce Miller was the first person to cast a ballot and Robert Lindeman was the last man to vote at 12:10. The doors of the school were closed at 12 midnight, permitting about 50 people still in the building to cast their ballots.

assessed valuation has increased \$4,965,120 or \$993,036 per year, on the average.

The 1950-51 assessed valuation which does not become available for school purposes until July 1, 1950, was unofficially reported to be \$20,157,420.

It is difficult to estimate the future trend in assessed valuations in Hicksville inasmuch as no one knows for certain how many new dwellings will be erected each year, or how much each of these dwellings will add to the assessed valuation. In the nearby communities, dwellings similar to those planned for Hicksville are now being assessed at approximately \$3,500. If the former assessment on land now occupied by these dwellings is deducted from this amount, these dwellings each add approximately \$3,400 to the tax rolls.

(With 2,300 Levitt houses and 700 other new homes estimated for Hicksville in 1950-51, the assessed value could increase \$10,200,000 or about 50 per cent in one year—Editor).

Other type structures, such as stores, garages, offices, industrial plants, etc. will add considerable valuation to the tax roll. It does not seem unreasonable to expect that these other structures might provide as much as 10 per cent of the local valuations, or approximately \$400 for each new dwelling on the average.

If this be true and the population of Hicksville increases to 30,000 persons by 1955, the local assessed valuations at that time might total as much as \$35,000,000. Furthermore, if local population continues to increase as the result of increased building, and reaches 35,000 by 1960, the valuations might then reach \$40,000,000.

School Tax Rates

The recent increase in the cost of living has made necessary higher wages for teachers and larger expenditures for school operation generally. These increased costs, owing to a lack of a flexible assessment policy, have resulted in higher school tax rates. This is true in Hicksville as well as in other communities.

Between 1939-1940 and 1949-1950, the local school tax rate increased 57 points, or a gain of 47.5 per cent. This percentage increase might be compared with the increase of approximately 70 per cent in the cost of living for the same period. On this basis, the recent increases in the local school tax do not seem inconsistent. If the assessed valuation of individual properties has not increased disproportionately at the same time.

On July 1, 1949, the Hicksville School District had an outstanding bonded indebtedness of \$150,000, this being the balance of the 1924 issue of 4.75 per cent school bonds. This indebtedness will be completely amortized by June 30, 1950.

The State Law permits the Hicksville School District to borrow money up to 10 per cent of the local assessed valuation of property. On July 1, 1949, the local valuation totaled \$16,738,355, thus giving the local Board of Education a gross borrowing capacity of \$1,673,835. When the outstanding indebtedness of July 1, 1949 is deducted from this, there remains a debt leeway of \$1,523,835, which can be used to finance the initial projects of the propos-

ed long-term school building program.

On July 1, 1950, when the outstanding indebtedness is \$138,000 and the bonding limit is raised to an estimated \$2,015,742, the bonding leeway will rise to \$1,877,742. This is more than ample to purchase the proposed sites, to erect an addition to East St. School and to erect a new school on the Lee Ave. site. These three projects are estimated to total \$1,207,500 as follows:

*Acquisition of sites —	\$257,500
East St. addition —	350,000
Lee Ave. School —	600,000
Total	\$1,207,500

(These sites, listed in the Herald June 21st, include Lee Ave. which was approved last Wednesday night, three in the area where Levitt and Sons are building — i.e., Old Country Rd., Dutch Lane and South Hicksville — another 20 acres on Division Ave. and 15 acres for three playgrounds).

QUESTION: The other day a friend and I were discussing this "Home Owners Liability" insurance and a question came up that you may be able to answer: Is the property owner always liable for damages in accidents that happen on his property?
ANSWER: No, of course, not. The property owner is liable only in those accidents which occur because of his negligence. Suppose a person held to a banister while climbing stairs in the property in question and the banister gave way because the property owner had neglected to keep it in good repair. Any resulting injury could be charged to the property owner's negligence. On the other hand, if the stair climber slid down a perfectly good banister, and was injured because of that action, the property owner could hardly be held responsible.

THE HOME HANDYMAN'S COLUMN

By TOM CASHEL

Attic space is too often wasted in a clutter of castoffs when it could be easily made into an attractive combination bedroom for the kids, or a room for your mother-in-law. . . .

The walls and ceiling should first be paneled in sheetrock or wallboard. If the attic has not already been insulated it is wise to give the rooms additional protection by installing blanket insulation.

Don't forget to put a floor in it.

The wall space along one side is divided into three parts. The center part should be long enough to accommodate a bunk or single bed, and the end spaces large enough for built-in shelves and closets.

Partitions the width of the bunk should be placed at either end of the bunk to serve as the end walls for the shelf and closet arrangement.

Obviously these units may be varied to suit the space. If you have sufficient room, one large unit with a closet-and-drawer combination in the base and a smaller unit of drawers will prove convenient. It will be unnecessary to buy a special bunk for the attic room. An unused spring or mattress from a single bed is ideal. Build a low frame around it, that's all.

Decorating is a matter of individual taste—so I'll sign off on that. Don't forget your "Uncle Tom" has all kinds of fancy wallboards already decorated as you put them up.

Build it yourself—it's a lot of fun.

For one who has all but labeled the sports world a callous sphere, it is gratifying to find former athletes of Tom Fitzgerald organizing a protest in behalf of the old master who is now in the midst of a serious controversy with the Westbury School Board.

According to the issue, which has attracted wide attention in the county press, Fitz is no longer the athletic power he once was at the school. It is charged he is being demoted to the role of gym teacher after 29 years as head Athletic Director of the Green Wave.

His former charges are up in arms about the dispute and have forced an open meeting to be called in the month so that the matter may be thrashed out.

We are six miles and a good deal of knowledge removed from this controversy. We are not aware of the merits of the case nor will we pretend to be.

The right of justification is yet to be decided in the case and you will find no attempt to draw conclusions here.

However, we are pleased and impressed by the fact that Westbury has individuals interested enough to find out if the act is sound and wise.

School Board members do the community a fine and difficult service. But in a case such as this the decision most definitely should come under review and be well enough grounded that the questioning of it need not prove embarrassing or harassing.

School Boards change regularly according to the political or social favor individual citizens enjoy in their community.

Action to guard against moves made contrary to the will, expressed or not, of the taxpayers must always be applauded.

It is a splendid civic duty that seeks to prevent unjust harm to those teachers who served their schools and the youth faithfully, be it for twenty-five years or five.

This theory is advanced on a purely athletic plane but it most assuredly applies to all phases of instruction in schools.

Regardless of the outcome, our hat is off to those Westbury who demand a full and open hearing on this matter.

We know not what the final disposition of the case may be. But of one thing we are sure... an investigation will have been made and aired and for that reason Westbury can be glad that nothing will gnaw at the conscience of the community.
