## Heavy Demand, One WellOut, **Causes Brief Water Shortage**

need arose, as the daily supply howered at times at the lowest point in the history of the water district. With one out of four pumps out of service most of the week, the supply dropped almost to a trickle, Saturday night, and some areas were actually without water for a couple of hours.

The rise in temperature, dry spell and failure of one of the pumps cotributed to the very short supply on the system. The increase in new home construction in the past several months also has brought the district more

Water district officials today (Wednesday) expected air-exssed parts would arrive for Well No. 1 on Bethpage Rd., se that this giant could return to ervice. Meanwhile, a test run this week on Well No. 5, now being constructed on Jerusalem Ave. near the new Levitt houses, was a marked success. However, No. 5 is not expected to be in service for a month or six weeks.

Well No. 1 went out of com mission last week, leaving the other two wells on Sethpage Rd. and one on Newbridge Rd. to carry the burden, About 7:30 Friday evening, housewives noticed the pressure had dropped off and residents in Zelda Park, around East St. School and Twinlawns Ave. reported no water at all. It was not until about 9 o'clock in began to rise again as the peak demand tapered off.

Bids have been let upon the construction of two more wells (Nos. 6 and 7 for the district) in the Dutch Lane section, and a 500,000 gallon storage tank will be erected on Newbridge Rd. near the present tank.

Numerous reports circulated thru the community, Saturday evening as the pressure droppe One incorrect report stated that "Levitt is filling his swimming pools." Actually, no public pools are in Hicksville District, although one is being built at the West Village Green shopping centre on Newbridge Rd., Hicksville.

## Adequacy of Present School Plant, Peak Capacity Studied by Columbia

Before deciding on the number of new school buildings needed in Hickaville, it is necessary to analyze the present school buildings from the standpoints of adequacy and serviceability. How many children can be accommodated in the local schools? Are the buildings satisfactory as school plants? What can be done to improve the present structures and to increase their capacity? Questions such as these need to be answered before and to increase their capacity? Questions such as these need to be answered before deciding on a long-term school building program.

The Hicksville School plant row consists of three buildings, over the years from a small one-facilities.

During that five-year period, the village erected a large high school build-ing (East St.). Since 1930, twenty years ago, the village has carried on no major school build-

ing project.

Stehli Beach, for example, is restricted to town residents only. dents only.

(continued from page 3) mentary and Secondary School plants. Ratings of the present buildings show: High School, 610 out of possible 1,000 points, "good"; East St. School, 560 out of possible 1,000, "good"; and Nicholai St. school, 820 out of possible 1,000, "poor."

for school space.

A more detailed analysis of East St. school reveals this is an attractive two-story and basement brick structure, located on a rather mall site of about six acres. The National Council on Schoolhouse Construction proposes that ele-mentary school sites should have at least 5 acres of land, PLUS an additional acre for every 100 pupils enrolled. On this basis, the East St. building should have a site of nine acres to care for the present maximum capacity of the pla If additional classrooms are added to this building, a still larger site would be desirable, but there is very little prospect of adding much more area to the present

Built for \$210,000 at an approvimate cost of \$210,000, the following contains spaces: 12 classrooms, kindergarten room, teachers' room, principal's office, combination auditorium-gym, basement lunchroom.

If 40 pupils were assigned to the kindergarten (20 pupils in two half-day sessions) and 25 pupils were assigned to each of the II classrooms, the building could care for 340 pupils. This may be rated as a reasonable capacity. If under pressure, each class gr is increased by 5 pupils, the cap-acity rating of the building is increased to 410 pupils. 

## A SUPERINTENDENT RECALLS: School Expansion Today Much Like **Growth of Area Between 1923-1936**

Brooklyn and New York City

my m. m. van sarme the present day growth and elepment of Hicksville was ticated during a previous m in local home canstruc-between 1923 and 1836. In t carlier period, the high both was built and enlarged not immediately and East St. col was constructed.

E. A. Van Styke of 179 W. Marie St., Hicksville, was super-intendent of the school district during this period.—Editor.

The period from 1923 to 1936 as the time of the greatest building program, transition and development of the Hicksville schools. The number of teachers increased from 23 to 65. The value of school property from \$86,950 in 1923 to \$852,717 in 1936.

In the spring of 1923 the peo-ple voted \$20,000 for a new high school site and \$250,000 for a new Junior-Senior High School. In the fall of 1923 it was found that it would require an additional \$95, 000 to construct the building as planned and to properly equip it. This was voted by the people and made \$345,000 for construction.

In Dec. 1923, excavation was started and corner stone laid on Apr. 26, 1924. During Thanksgiving vacation in 1924 the h school equipment was moved to the new building and on Dec. 4, 1924, the new building was occupied by the pupils of the 7th to 12th years.
Used Other Buildings

This relieved the congestion in the Nicholai St. Grammar School. It was necessary in September to use three rooms in the former Parochial School building, kindly of-lered to the Board of Education. One other room was kindly do-nated by the Fire Dept. making several school rooms outside of the school buildings. Those grades were moved back to Nicholai St. on Dec. 4, 1924, when room was provided by shifting the 7th thru 12th grades to the new high

Soon after school opened in Sept. 1923, it was discovered that many pupils found it necessary to travel to Jamaics or New York to take work in commercial sub-In October the School Board authorized the employment of a teacher for commercial sub ject and a business course was of-fered for the first time.

In Sept. 1924 this department was so popular and had grown to such an extent, another teacher was engaged. Since that time our local graduates have been holding



## 500WantSchool Board Reinstate Fitzgerald

persons jammed the auditorium the high school here, June 29, and apparently threw the Board of Education on the defensive as they demanded the reinstatement of Tom Fitzgerald as Director of Athletics with full charge in that ost, both in physical education and interscholastic competition.

The School Board had supposedly demoted Fitzgerald to the role of gym teacher after 29 years as head man of the Westbury plant, and his former athletes rallied to his support and demand-ed an open hearing on the matter.
