HICKSVILLE — The New York State Public Service Commission and the Nassau County Police Dept. are today being asked by the Civic and Community Assoc. to prevent the blockading of Rail Road crossings at Bway and Jerusalem Ave. here, by LIRR passenger and freight trains. The Civics fear that unless the situation is corrected lives will be lost and considerable property damage caused by delays experienced almost daily by fire fighters, ambulances, police and physicians.

The Civics believe the PSC can order the RR to move its mall and express loading platform further west so that long city-bound passenger trains can halt off the crossings when taking on parcels and passengers.

In recent months the size of passenger trains has increased and as a result crossings are blocked for periods as long as 15 minutes and more by the long trains throughout the day, but particularly in the morning and evening hours.

It is also understood that State Law prohibits the blocking of a RR crossing by a train for more than five minutes and that police can enforce this law by giving summonses to the engineers. Some months ago the City of Glen Cove enacted a local ordinance there limiting the crossing blockade time to three minutes and assigned a police officer at the crossing to enforce it.

The decision to appeal to police and PSC was made by the Civic executive committee Friday night, the first conducted by Stanley Mrs. since he took office as president.

Polish DPs Build Laurel St. Home

HICKSVILLE — A 6-room house on Laurel Street being built by Polish displaced persons is expected to be completed and offered for sale in about three weeks, according to the Polish National Alliance who is sponsoring the project.

The 12 men working on the house received their training in architecture, carpentry, etc. while in Europe through the International refugee organization. Further information on the sale of the house may be obtained from Steve Rykowski at Hicksville 3-1690.

Levitt Bought Large Jericho Acreage

JERICHO — Levitt and Sons has acquired substantial acreage in this community, north of Hicksville, it was learned yesterday from a well-informed and reliable source.

The latest report seems to substantiate the frequently heard rumor of recent months that Levitt has acquired, among other tracts, the 283-acre parcel south of the Maine Maid along the east side of Hicksville-Jericho Road which is bounded on the south by the Northern State Parkway.

This tract was bought from A. C. Bostwick by Marcel Weiss who had planned to develop the section as "Jericho Downs" by constructing 1200 homes. Weiss had made application to Oyster Bay Town Board for a change of zoning on several acres fronting on

Building Dept Aware Of Topsoil Depth

OYSTER BAY — Certificates of Occupancy will not be issued for new home built in Hicksville and elsewhere in the township unless six inches of topsoil is left after the home building is completed, an official here told the HERALD this week. A newly enacted amendment to the township topsoil ordinance requires the 6-inch minimum. The question was raised since it is noted that Levitt & Sons is removing thousands of yards of rich soil from the 1200 acres of Hicksville farmland, south of Old County Rd.

Meanwhile, court action against at least one Hicksville home developer is being prepared by the township in an effort to enforce the township ordinance against stripping of topsoil, the HERALD learned.

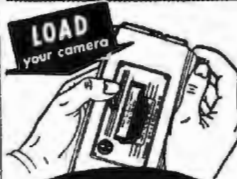

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COLUMBIA REPORT:

School District Must Keep Ancient Nikolai St At Least 10 Years More

While the 50-year-old wooden school buildings on Nikolai St. would normally be recommended for abandonment today, the Columbia survey staff found it necessary to suggest—reluctantly—that the structure be kept in service for 10 years more. The reason is the very heavy enrollment facing Hicksville and the cost of replacing these buildings with a new structure (estimated at \$400,000).

The Columbia Survey describes the Nikolai St. School buildings, which serve the kindergarten thru the sixth grade, as follows:

Started in 1868

"The Nikolai School plant consists of two old wooden buildings, connected by a wooden corridor. The older of the two buildings was reconstructed in 1897 from a still older building erected in 1868. The newer building was erected in 1909. These two, wooden non-fire-resistant buildings have served Hicksville for a number of years, at least 50 years on the average. They lack many features now considered standard for elementary schools.

"The survey staff would recommend that buildings of this type be abandoned for school use, but in view of both the very heavy enrollment facing Hicksville and the cost of replacing these buildings with a new structure, it

Expect Present Population to Double, May Exceed 22,000 In Next 12 Months

Hicksville Public Schools face a series of unprecedented problems in the years immediately ahead because of tremendous residential development take place. The present population of about 12,000 is expected to double in the next 12 months according to the Institute of Field Studies, Teachers College, Columbia University, which recently completed a study of the present and future needs of the school system under contract with the district. Each week the HERALD is publishing excerpts from this important document of which this is the 4th.

Contributing in large measure to the problem ahead is the construction now underway, of 2,300 Levitt homes in Hicksville. Nearly 25 per cent of these homes have been completed and are now being rapidly occupied. They are the homes between Newbridge Rd. and Jerusalem Ave. from and including Spindle Rd. and northward. — Editor.

would seem desirable to renovate them sufficiently so that they may be kept in service for at least another decade."

The Report continues with a description of Nikolai School. It consists of 15 classrooms (two of which were being used for the Public Library at the time of the Survey, but which will be available for classes in the fall), kindergarten room, teachers' room, principal's office, and assembly room on the second floor.

If all 16 classrooms in these two buildings were used for school purposes, the plant could care for a reasonable capacity of 415 pupils. This figure was determined by allowing 40 pupils in the kindergarten room (20 pupils to each half-day session) and 25 pupils to each of the 15 classrooms. By increasing each class group by 5 pupils, the buildings could house 500 pupils.

In Sept. 1949, Nikolai School cared for 385 pupils in grades kindergarten to 6th, as follows: Kindergarten, 56 (29 and 27); Grade 1, 59 (29-29); Grade 2, 63 (31-32); Grade 3, 71 (20-26-26); Grade 4, 41 (20-21); Grade 5, 37, and Grade 6, 59 (27-32), for a total of 385.

Class Average 28.3
The 12 class groups above the kindergarten had an average size of 28.3 pupils. Four classes enrolled more than 30 pupils, one class enrolled 37 pupils.

This building might possibly care for at least 3 more class groups of approximately 30 pupils each, provided all the classroom space were used for school purposes. Such complete use, of course, would allow no space (other than the assembly room) for special activities.

Firemen Plan Upstate Trip

HICKSVILLE — Members of the fire department are making plans to participate in the N. Y. State Firemen's Association convention and tournament at Syracuse, Aug. 15-18. Plans were discussed at the department meeting, Monday night.

Chief Stanford Weiss will head the delegation of firemen upstate. Some members will leave on Sunday, Aug. 13 and the balance on Aug. 16. Members of the racing team will be led by Capt. Gerard Offenloch.

Edward Dwyer, chairman of the Labor Day Tournament committee, reported that a course for the competitions this year has been selected and will be announced shortly. He also reported that the house-to-house canvass for funds is "almost finished" and that community response has been good.

Potato Crop Late, Harvest Next Week

HICKSVILLE — Potatoes are about two weeks "late" on Long Island this year. Normally, potato digging starts about July 4th but local growers in Nassau and Suffolk don't expect the harvest to begin until July 17.

Nassau and Suffolk potato growers will meet tomorrow (Thursday) night at Polish Hall, Riverhead, to consider marketing of their crop this year since they recently rejected a marketing agreement which also meant the end of price support by the government.

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Levitt Plans 'Gift' Of Community Hall

HICKSVILLE — Construction of another large shopping centre here is contemplated by Levitt and Sons, it was learned this week. The site, for which a change of zoning will be requested, is in the former Frank Terlikosky farm, about mid-way between Old Country Rd. and Hempstead Ave. (Dutch Lane). Levittown Blvd. will be constructed here and the shopping district is expected to border this new highway.

Also planned in the same dis-

trict, according to Councilman Frank Chrusky, is a huge recreational building with a seating capacity for 1,000. Levitt has indicated to the township that he would be willing to turn this structure over to the Hicksville Park and Parking District for maintenance by a local tax upon the Hicksville District.

To Discuss Court

HICKSVILLE — Everett Furman is scheduled to speak today (Wednesday) at the Kiwanis Club meeting at the Legion Hall. He will discuss the work of the Nassau County Surrogate's Court.

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See Post Office Ready by Aug. 1

HICKSVILLE—The new post office structure on North Broadway, near James St., is expected to be ready for occupancy by Aug. 1. It was learned authoritatively this week. Three small stores are now under construction adjacent to the Post Office Building and a gas station is planned for the James St. corner.

LI National Bank, adjacent to the present post office on Herzog Pl., is prepared to take over the former address. Over a weekend the bank interior was recently modernized by changing the arrangement of teller windows.

Expect Water Well Back on Job Soon

HICKSVILLE—Well No. 1 of the water district is still out of service today, although the replacement parts have been received. The electric motor is being installed and pumping will resume within a matter of hours, water officials said.

The rainy weather during the past week eased the demand upon the water system considerably.

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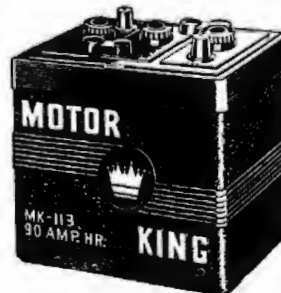
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Home Rule Threat in FD Radio

FIRE DEPARTMENTS in the mid-Island section and the rest of Nassau County are being encouraged to get into a central radio hook-up which will operate out of Mineola. You won't find a group of men more strongly united on the question of home rule than volunteer firemen—and they don't like the radio plan.



They fear it as a foot-in-the-door move to bring about a county-wide paid fire fighting organization. They don't believe it's too practical, either, at this time.

It is planned to operate a transmitter station for the county. Local fire departments (or districts) are asked to install in each piece of apparatus radio equipment which can receive the county calls and can talk back to the central office.

There are several fire departments in

the county with their own radio systems. Hempstead has it and we believe Rockville Centre also uses radio. It's expensive but in those densely populated areas it apparently proves its worth. If apparatus is out at one fire, their local headquarters can alert them about another alarm if it occurs at the same time.

But for areas such as Hicksville, Bethpage, Jericho and vicinity, the proposed county system puts the local vamps squarely under the direction of a county fire boss. It may come eventually, but it won't be encouraged locally at the present time.

Our Identity Being Lost?

A READER finds alarming evidence in the daily newspapers that Hicksville is in fact losing its identity. She notes that the Review-Star and Newday have dropped Hicksville from their news items. Local Memorial Day exercises were not mentioned. . . . A local Catholic Daughters installation was reported in the Review without stating the community. . . . And the big Columbia Survey school meeting here failed to get any coverage.

On the other hand, one has just to indicate some feeble connection with 'Levittown' to rate a headline.

Q.—I am a resident here for a couple of weeks and have noticed a number of women wearing shorts. My daughter wants to wear shorts. Is there a law here, as in New York, against wearing shorts and bathing suits on the streets?

A.—Lieut. Morgan of the Second Police Precinct at Syosset assures us that there is no law against wearing shorts or bathing suits on the streets in Hicksville and vicinity. Some north shore villages such as Bayville do have ordinances against such apparel.

Q.—Myself and several other men are interested in starting a local bus service for shoppers, going through several streets in Hicksville. Who should we see for authority?

A.—Contact the Nassau County Transit Commission at 110 Old Country Rd., Mineola. The County has taken over many of the franchising rights previously controlled by the Town Board.

Shall We Incorporate?

Questions Invited

the HERALD, in cooperation with the Information Division of the Committee for the Incorporation of Hicksville, will publish this department regularly in an effort to bring its readers a full discussion of this question. The HERALD invites comments and questions on this subject in writing.—Editor.

Ques.—What does incorporation of Hicksville mean?

To show what incorporation means, it is necessary to show what Hicksville is right now. This community is an unincorporated section of the Township of Oyster Bay, legally known as a hamlet. It has no local municipal government, no village or city officials, no over-all local and direct control of its own affairs.

It is a part of the Township of Oyster Bay (there are 3 townships in Nassau County), and comes under the jurisdiction of a Town Board which consists of a Supervisor and four Councilmen elected by all the voters in the township. The town seat is on the North Shore in the community of Oyster Bay.

In order that a number of local services might be provided, several special districts have been created. These include the School District (with a board of five non-paid trustees elected for 3-year terms), Fire District (with board of five non-paid commissioners elected for 5 years), Water District (with board of three paid commissioners elected for 3 years), Garbage, Street Lighting, Park and Parking Districts (with no locally elected officials since the Town Board acts as the "commissioners" for each of these last-named Districts).

In addition, in the township set-up there are other officials elected town-wide, including Highway Superintendent, Tax Receiver, Town Clerk, Trustees of the Jones Fund, and School Directors.

There are also a number of officials appointed by the Town Board, including the Building Inspector, Zoning Board of Appeals, Town Attorney and Dog Catcher.

Courts, police, health, public welfare (relief), assessment and planning functions are under the jurisdiction of the County of Nassau.

Schools are under the New York State Education Law, county functions are under County Law and the rest of the authorities (including the special districts such as fire, water, garbage, etc.) are under the Town Law.

Rather Strong Measures

THREE MID-ISLAND youths pleaded guilty last week to a charge of loitering on Broadway, Hicksville, and were promptly fined \$10 each by District Court Judge George S. Johnson. Others in the group of about eight who had been herded into three police cars and rushed off to the county jail in Mineola on June 24 are coming up for trial later.

Based upon the information we have received from the father of one of the three boys (he was 16½ years of age), it would appear that the penalty for gabbing on the street with some of the boys was rather stiff.

Apparently there is some kind of a drive in progress by the police to break up sidewalk loitering. First a group was apprehended in Inwood and dealt with by the court. We don't know the penalty in that case. Then came Hicksville's turn and on July 3 another round-up took place, this time in Oyster Bay. Two boys, ages 18 and 19, were nabbed out of a gang which it is reported had been illegally discharging firecrackers on W. Main St.

District Court Judge Leslie J. Ekenberg gave the two boys, who pleaded guilty, a lecture about "have more respect for your community and for a policeman" and then suspended sentence.

Loitering is not to be encouraged, and the fact that some groups of youths block sidewalk passage and pass remarks to the women who pass should be punished. However, the imposition of a \$10 fine after a night in the jug appears rather rough medicine, especially in view of the version one of the dads gave us.

In these days when everyone is worried about the outbreak of a new shooting war and draft news is again capturing the headlines, it does seem curious that a youth in uniform is old enough to die for his country but appears to receive scant consideration when brought before the bar of justice in a case of this type.

It is the community's shame that it lacks the facilities for its young people to gather, other than the public streets. And it is interesting to note that this Hicksville incident centered about the entrance to an ice cream parlor rather than a gin mill.

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32 Gas, Service Stations in Hicksville

OYSTER BAY—Approval for four more gas stations in Hicksville were granted by the Zoning Board of Appeals at a public hearing here, Thursday night. A Herald survey has shown there are now 28 gas stations in Hicksville proper and with the new approvals, the total will reach 32.

Duffy Ave. and Newbridge Rd., Hicksville; David Youdelman of 29 Richmond Rd., Rockville Centre, at the northeast corner of Broadway and Boehme St., Hicksville.

The Board held over until the next meeting the request of Ernest Mazara of 435 Nassau Blvd., West Hempstead, who is seeking a variance to install two underground tanks of 4,500 gallons each to be used for blending oil of a high flash type on the east side of Midland Ave about 800 feet north of Bethpage Rd., Hicksville.

Roman, past president, pointed out: "The name Village Green is definitely associated with Levittown. These stores are in the Town of Oyster Bay and in Hicksville. Therefore the name 'West Village Green' is misleading and confusing. We expect Supervisor Tappen to help us, as he has promised, to protect the identity and best interests of Hicksville."

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**A SUPERINTENDENT RECALLS:
Hicksville Population Was 4,762 in 1925
When Superintendency Was Established**

By E. A. VAN SLYKE
(This is the second article about the tremendous expansion of the Hicksville School system between 1923 and 1930 by E. A. VanSlyke, superintendent of schools during most of that period.—Editor.)

In February 1925, the Hicksville Board of Education requested the State Education Department to take a census of the School District for the purpose of having registration of voters at annual and special meetings. It was voted unanimously at a special meeting to have registration, if the population was 4,500, the required number of people.

The state representative taking the census of the school district reported the population in 1925 to be 4,762. If over 4500 the district could get increased state aid to employ a Superintendent of Schools.

Served 13 Years

The School Board then passed a resolution requesting a superintendency district. This was granted in March 1925. I had been supervising principal since Sept. 1923 and was elected as the first superintendent of schools, serving 13 years until I retired on July 1, 1936.

In 1925, Miss Mabel Farley who had been vice principal was elected principal of the Junior High School. At the same time, Mrs. Evelyn Janke who had been in charge of Nicholas St. School was elected the first principal of Nicholas St. Grammar School. Lester Sterner followed then Mrs. Dorothy Zuest (now Mrs. Sanford of Florida).

In the fall of 1923 outdoor basketball courts were constructed. In 1925 Coach Kinney organized and the Board equipped the first football team. Previous to this in 1924 the gymnasium in the new school building was equipped and physical education stressed.

In June 1924 the Board of Education authorized the hiring of a music supervisor and in Sept. 1924 the work thru grades and high school in music was started. The high school orchestra was organized. High School chorus started and in 1935 the first high school band was equipped, organized and instruction provided.

Also in June 1924 the Board authorized the employment of a librarian in the schools. Miss Nina Plantz (today principal of East St. School — Ed) was engaged.

In the spring of 1924 a school savings system was inaugurated and the important work of teaching thrift was started. In two weeks the schools made the remarkable record of 100 per cent and out of 100 schools in the U. S. of the same or near-size, Hicksville rated second.

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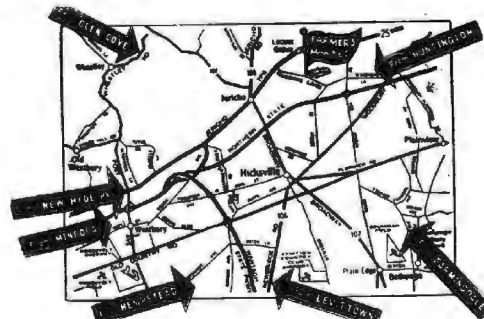

 eola Blvd., Mineola, upon the Town of Oyster Bay amendment to its zoning ordinances changing a vast section of Jericho (including the 288-acre former Bestwick-Wless section) from D to C-1 zoning.

The County enters into this zone change since part of the area abutts upon the Oyster Bay-North Hempstead Townline to the west. When zone changes are within 300 feet of a township line, the county board must also hold a hearing.

The entire section which has been rezoned as C-1 extends from the Township line on the west to Robbins Lane and Hicksville. Airport on the east. It is bounded on the north by Jericho Tpks. and on the south by the Parkway.

Rezoning of the area was undertaken as a result of efforts by the Jericho Taxpayers Association which, however, had wanted a C-2 zoning. The C-1 decision was a compromise.

News from Washington, D. C. . . . President Truman last week scuttled that portion of the Hoover Commission Report which proposed VA hospitals be integrated within a United Medical Administration. The President asked Congress to give cabinet status to Federal Security . . . but to continue Public Health Service . . . which would have been backbone of Hoover merger plan . . . within FSA . . . thus dealing left-handed death blow to Hoover recommendations affecting hospitals.

Veterans holding National Service Life Insurance contracts should be advised not to worry about newspaper reports that Congress is considering changes in GI insurance law to reduce costs to taxpayers . . . thereby reduce size of future dividends . . . in other ways lessen value to veterans of term and permanent insurance. Newspapers have highlighted fact that in past ten years NSLI has cost taxpayers over \$5 billions . . . exclusive of premiums paid by members of armed services and veterans . . . have dished out false impression that GI insurance represents "hidden bonus" system. Congress cannot change terms or conditions of GI insurance . . . can't raise or lower premiums. Most Congress can do is to make minor technical changes and write a new insurance law to cover future policies issued to members of armed services.

One of the bills now at the House is HR 87, granting war service credit to estimated 120,000 War II veterans who have joined field service of Post Office Dept. since discharge from service. If signed by President . . . and veto possibility is apparent, bill would provide average salary increase of \$225 yearly to this group. And would also pave way for similar war service credit to veterans who entered other Federal services since discharge.

ATTENTION all POWs of WW II. If you haven't received your \$1 per day subsistence allowance, don't be alarmed, because the War Claims Comm. has adjudicated only 4,175 claims out of 125,000 applications.
