An oil burner was believed the cause of a fire at the home of M. Surkin at 199 Blueberry Lane, Stridley night, at about 7 o'clock. He raced to fire headquarters on E. Marie St. and then went back to the scene with the vamps to guide the Co. No. 2 truck via Newbridge Rd.

To Aid Shoppers: Enforce 3-Hour Parking In Public Lots, Monday

HICKSVILLE—A three-hour limit on parking autos in the two public fields will go into effect next Monday morning, Dec. 18. It was disclosed last night by Councilman Frank Chlumsky. The public fields are both on Marie St., one opposite the firehouse and the other opposite Eisemann Motors. A township ordinance setting the limit was adopted recently.

"After consideration of all factors," Chlumsky said, "the three-hour limit will be enforced. Signs will be erected at the fields to warn motorists and the regulation will take effect Monday morning. It is believed that the greatest number will thus be served."

Seek Commuter Space
He added that efforts are being made by the Town Board to obtain an area for the exclusive use of commuter residents of Hicksville Parking District. He is unable to discuss details since negotiations are underway.

Enactment of the 3-hour limit, which has the support of local organizations including the BMA, Civic Assoc and Citizens' Advisory Committee on Parking, is expected to increase the use of the approximately 150 car spaces several times over by promoting the

Landia Station News to LIRR

JAMAICA—The Long Island Rail Road has no plans for the construction of a station or stop for its passenger trains at the east end of the Levitt and Sons Jericho development to be known as "Landia," a spokesman for the RR told the HERALD yesterday. Preliminary sketches of the 1700-home development in the \$14,000 to \$18,000 price range show a depot for Landia at the intersection of Robbins Lane and the LIRR on the Port Jefferson branch.

The RR says it has not been approached by Levitt regarding a proposed station. It has been indicated that the RR is not interested in establishing new stations on its lines since new stops add to the running time and passengers are interested in faster service.

A county daily paper said this week that 700 contracts for Landia homes at Jericho have been signed even though only the model home is on the site currently. The same daily refers to the community location as "Byosset," which may be the forerunner of a future dispute about community boundaries.

Post Offices Open Saturdays to Six

Hicksville and Bethpage Post Offices will remain open Saturdays until 6 PM starting this week to accommodate the Christmas rush. Postmasters warn the public to mail their parcels and greetings without delay to avoid disappointment.

The Hicksville office has opened another window for the sale of stamps and parcel post this week and Postmaster Wm. G. Mollitor announces that help is wanted for the Christmas period at the office. Full-time workers are needed for this limited period.

Service will be available each weekday, including Saturdays, until 6 PM. Mollitor added, and if necessary until 7 o'clock at night.

More than 25,000 pieces of mail were cancelled at the Hicksville office, Monday, indicating the volume being handled as the rush gets underway.

16 Evening Commuter RR Trains Late As Diesel Stalls, Gets Push Here

HICKSVILLE—Sixteen evening commuter trains thru this community were delayed from 25 minutes to an hour or more, on Monday night, when Montauk

train No. 24 was stalled a mile east of Mineola at 5:05 and had to be pushed into the south siding at the depot here by a following Port Jefferson train.

The 6:30 PM train into Hicksville was halted several hundred feet west of the depot and about 500 commuters who got off here had to walk the tracks from Kroemer's Seed. Fourteen following trains were delayed.

A spokesman for the LIRR told the Herald yesterday that diesel engine had developed trouble in its electrical wiring. Later in the evening the engine was taken back to Jamaica for repairs.

Fire Protection Hearing Tuesday

OYSTER BAY—A public hearing will be held before the Town Board here next Tuesday morning, Dec. 19, at 10 o'clock upon proposed fire protection contracts including Plainview protection and hydrant rental in 1951 for a consideration "not exceeding 21 cents per \$100." Sixteen cents is for fire protection and five cents for hydrant rental. Another contract calls for protection by Jericho Fire District to Cedar Swamp Road Protection District for 10 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation.

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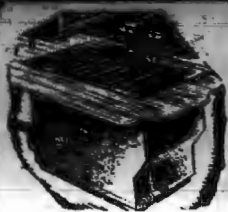
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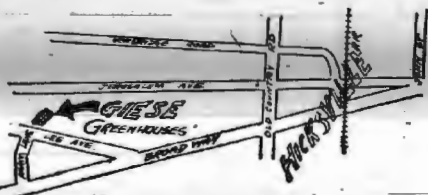
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Fire Chiefs Warn Of Yule Hazards

HICKSVILLE — There are few things more flammable and dangerous than Christmas Trees, Fire Chief Stanford Weiss reminded householders in a warning today on the fire hazards involved in the use of Christmas trees.

Fire Chief Robert Gillespie of Bethpage, Chief Edmund Ocker of Plainview and Chief Anthony Siodorski of Jericho join Chief Weiss in pointing out that a few simple precautions in preparing and setting up the tree will make this a "fire-safe Christmas" in the mid-Island area.

1—Bring in a fresh tree, as short a time before Christmas as possible and get it outside as soon afterwards as you can.

2—Set it in water as soon as it is brought indoors. Cut off the base, at an angle, at least one inch above the original cut and set in a receptacle filled with water to level above the cut. Keep the water level until the tree is taken down.

3—Set the tree up in a place away from all sources of heat, particularly an open fireplace.

4—Secure the tree against falling by setting it on an adequate base and using inconspicuous wires attached to the wall. Place so that, standing or fallen, it cannot block exits in case of fire.

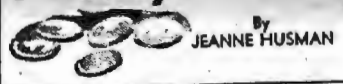

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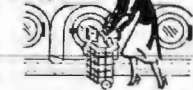

National Commander Charles G. Ball of the Veterans of Foreign Wars recently directed our organization to launch an immediate campaign to make the subject of American History a required course in every public school.

Commander Ball stated that the VFW was also demanding that any universal training program adopted by Congress include factual instruction in the nation's history. He said: "In a world conflict between two ideologies, America has taken the leadership in the fight for free enterprise and justice. He further stated that the VFW's campaign for American history courses in every public school would be conducted on the community level.

I sincerely hope that Post 3211 will do all in its power to see to it that Commander Ball's wishes are carried out wherever the need might be.

We have some opinions and we have, because of our profession, the means, facilities and contacts by which we can rapidly establish certain facts.

Only by voicing our opinions—and you, dear readers, yours—can we hope to know each others' problems and learn to work together. For our part, we don't dislike anyone—especially new residents.

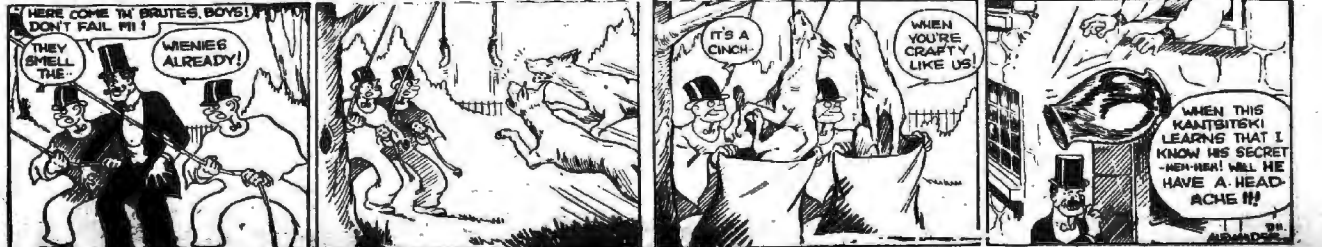

(I quote from my book of poems . . . "Good-Bye.")

HICKSVILLE—Enraged play by tackle Will Kirk highlighted the Field Club's 9-0 victory over previously unbeaten Glen Cove AA here, Sunday, as close to 2,000 (1,000 paid) unemotional fans saw the semi-pro 1950 finale. Zirk played a smashing game at his tackle post as the Black and White cut down the Covers after they had won eleven straight games this season.

He made the cover of a blocked Cover punt on the losers' 13-yard line in the first period, which led to the Hicksville touchdown, and made three important tackles when a 56-yard drive penetrated the local ten-yard line before it was stopped in the second quarter.
