WE HAVE OVER 2,500 POPULATION?

Hicksville, Ohio, With 2,629 People Is In Almanac But Not Our 'Hamlet'

Hicksville, New York, is not listed as a place in the United States with a population exceeding 2,500 persons, according to the 1954 edition of the "World Almanac and Book of Facts", now on sale.

The Almanac does list Hicksville, Ohio, which is an incorporated village, as having 2,629 inhabitants.

Hicksville, New York, does not appear although conservative estimates of local population based upon school census and other local surveys set the population at more than 30,000 persons. Neither Levittown, New York or Penna., are listed either.

There are only 20 places in New York

State, including the City of New York, listed in the Almanac as having more than 30,000 inhabitants. The Almanac also lists 16 places which are not incorporated including Oyster Bay 5,215 persons, Port Jefferson 3,296, Islip 5,254, Kings Park 10,960, Brentwood 2,803, Huntington 9,324, and Bay Shore 9,665 to list a few from Long Island.

The figures quoted are for 1950. Among incorporated villages on Long Island, the record shows Farmingdale 4,492, Floral Park 14,582, Rockville Centre 22,362, Westbury 7,112, Garden City 14,486, Valley Stream 26,854, and Glen Cove 17,144.

Promise of 'Shake-Up' in CD Recalls Local Resignations

HICKSVILLE—Reports that the Civil Defense organization in Nassau County is in for a "complete and drastic" shake-up were received with interest by hundreds of CD volunteers, here, this week. However, since the report trickled out of the office of County Director Cyril C. Ryan, local residents concerned about the CD program in the community saw little hope for a real solution of local problems.

Little has been heard about Civil Defense in this community during 1953.

The program was actively carried on for Hicksville and Plainview for a 26-month period which came to an abrupt halt a little over a year ago in December 1952.

At that time Frank Sutter, volunteer community director, and his CD committee which included heads of fire service, evacuation and transportation, welfare service, supply, public works and rescue, besides his deputy director and the secretary of the committee, resigned in a group.

At that time Sutter commented: "Since CD was reactivated over two years ago, I have tried to organize our people in this unit into an efficient CD unit. This work has become more difficult as time goes on. Under the present conditions within the organization, I find it impossible to continue."

Sutter, who had been a leader in CD throughout World War II, with

Ex-Fire Chief Fred Fricke Was Fireman for 44 Years

HICKSVILLE—Religious services for the Ex-Fire Chief Frederick D. Fricke, Sr., late of 75 Heitz Place, who died Tuesday, Jan. 5, were held yesterday (Thursday) at 8 P.M. at the Henry J. Stock Funeral Home with the Rev. Edward H. Stammel, pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church, officiating. Members of the fire department in full uniform also conducted services last night.

His death reduces the ranks of living past fire chiefs to 21. In 1924 as a member of Company Two he served as fire chief. For 39 years and 7 months he was active as a volunteer fireman and for 4 years and 7 months he was on the honorary roll.

After the fire dept passed a re-

solution to create such a list, he was the first man named to it. He had also been a member of the Hook and Ladder Co., and of Co. Three which he joined on April 12, 1928. Besides his membership as an exempt fireman he belonged to the Carpenters Local Union 1772.

The funeral was at 11 A.M. this morning (Friday).

He is survived by his mother, Marie, who is 94 years of age; his widow, Lillian; five sons, Frederick, Dietrich, Louis, Arnold and Irving; one daughter, Mrs. Marie Auer; a brother, Herman; three sisters, Mrs. Catherine Jod, Mrs. Elisabeth Borley and Mrs. Caroline Steele, and also by 13 grandchildren.

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CURRENT COMMENT:

Don't Know Us And Don't Care

SECOND REFLECTION on the information published on the Herald's front page today regarding the fact that Hicksville does not rate a listing "as a place with over 2,500 population" will show that it is not just a subject for smiles—actually, it is darn serious.

Hicksville as an unincorporated hamlet, regardless of its "unofficial" population, receives scant attention on many levels. In the eyes of the Federal government, Hicksville, New York, "does not exist". No Federal or State census figures are available on Hicksville because, under the laws that govern such things, we have "no official boundaries". Our population is counted with the entire unincorporated area of the Township of Oyster Bay.

The same thing happens on the state level. It is one of the reasons, in our opinion, why so little has been done regarding our local railroad grade crossing elimination program. The five crossings in Hicksville listed for eventual action under a 1941 law are to be found designated in that law as located in "Oyster Bay".

Is it any wonder that it becomes difficult to convince the state authorities that "Hicksville" has problems of traffic and congestion requiring the elimination of crossings when they don't even keep a record of our population? Building permits statistics are likewise lumped with those for the rest of "Oyster Bay."

There are many other incidents which arise, day in and day out, when the unincorporated status of Hicksville can be seen as a serious detriment: Hicksville is bypassed more frequently than we realize because official information about it and its growth is not recorded. A new business or industry may give some thought to establishing here, but if they can trace through the numerous authorities involved—ie, the township for building permit, the county for planning, the water district for water supply, etc.—they are understandably confused and find it simpler to go elsewhere.

There is no official local office or agency where a person business or industry can go and get authoritative answers and data. New homeowners, for example, are among the first to note this fact. Problems of health go to one community and a matter of garbage collection to a person's private home. Simple questions on zoning almost require the services of a lawyer. Park and recreation inquiries might just as well be sent to Mars via the next Space Cadet program.

Someone has written that simplicity in government is essential if people are to protect their freedoms and obtain the fullest benefits. The present layer upon layer remote-control management of our community affairs is complicated and confusing beyond belief. It is little wonder that the people who compile the World Almanac don't even know we exist.

Town Proposes New Dog Law

A public hearing on the ordinance is scheduled for Tuesday morning, Jan. 19, at the Town Hall, here, starting at 10 o'clock in the morning.

Just A Year Ago

Levitt and Sons closed their Levittown Hall to the public just about a year ago. They had built it as a "gift" to the purchasers of the houses they built, and they didn't like the reluctance shown in accepting it as a public expense. The public showed its usual good sense by looking the gift horse in the mouth and Levitt didn't like it. So he took the bull by the horns and forced the issue.

Levitt Methods

Let it be said that when Levitt wanted something, he knew how to go about getting it. First he tried to get Levittown Hall on the public tax rolls using local residents as intermediaries. That failed. He then used the more direct method of publicly and personally establishing what he called the Levittown Steering Committee. He also publicly admonished the editor of his Levittown Tribune to vigorously support his objectives. We don't presume to know what Levitt did behind the scenes. But we do know that his Steering Committee met with Supervisor Herman of Hempstead and agreed to a public referendum on the question of Levittown Hall and the two swimming pools. We know that each member of the Levitt Committee individually agreed to the questions to be asked. We don't really know (but we can guess!) that Levitt told them they made a faux pas.

The next day the Town Boards of Oyster Bay and Hempstead announced the unanimous agreement of the Levitt Committee to the questions on the proposed referendum. At the same time the Committee said the proposal was unacceptable. The political bodies were amazed and disgusted with the about face, obviously Levitt-inspired. But the amazement and disgust were destined to be short lived.

The Referendum And The 'Rump'

The referendum went off as scheduled with the vote being decisively against the public operation of the Hall. We still remember the rump referendum put on by Levitt's protégés and how they tried to pass off that Yale professor as an impartial arbiter. After setting up a legal referendum at public expense, the Oyster Bay Town Board decided that it didn't count. They obviously felt that Levitt's one vote counted more than the public's vote. The rest of the story was just carrying through with the red tape and now we have the "Joint Hempstead and Oyster Bay Swimming Pool and Community Hall District", popularly known as the Pool Hall District.

Worst Fears Realized

A great many people objected to the Joint Pool Hall district because it would be one of those crazy quilt overlapping special districts for which our county is famous. Others didn't believe its public operation of such a facility. They rightly believed that it would add only expense and confusion to our community problems. Many also believed that the Hempstead Town Board would take over operation of the district completely and that local people would have nothing to say about it. How right they were! It was predicted that our Oyster Bay officials would be outvoted 6 to 5. Actually, it is 2 to 1. Two members of the joint district commission are from Hempstead and one from Oyster Bay. Those who were so anxious to have the joint district are now learning what it means.
