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Set Cornerstone Next Monday For New Woodland Ave School

HICKSVILLE—For the seventh time since 1951 a cornerstone will be laid for a new school, the Woodland Ave. Elementary School, a million dollar 20 room building. The ceremony will take place next Monday, Jan. 26, at 10 AM. Henry C. Brengel, president of the Board of Education, will lay the cornerstone. No speeches are scheduled, it was said.

The new school is located in the extreme northeast corner of Hicksville District facing Ketcham Rd., which is listed on older maps as "Woodland Ave."

The first cornerstone in the current new school expansion program was laid May 2, 1951, when a similar ceremony took place at completion of the new additions to East St. School.

The new Woodland School is equipped with two kindergartens, a gymnasium, a general purpose cafeteria room, health unit, library, office unit, conference room, and a room especially set aside for parents.

Since 1951 additional cornerstones have been laid at the Lee Ave., the Burns Ave., Old Country Rd., Dutch Lane, and Egk Lane schools.

Post Office Gives Notice to 2800

HICKSVILLE—Patrons of the post office here in the Levitt-built area were reminded by letter from Postmaster William G. Mollitor to "advise all patrons of this area to use their proper post office address as Hicksville, N. Y. and not Levittown, N. Y. After March 1", he warned, "all improperly addressed mail received at this office or the Levittown Post Office will be returned to the senders." A total of 2,800 copies of the letter were distributed to householders by mail carriers.

Card Party for Benefit Of Scholarship Fund

HICKSVILLE—Community support of the benefit card party at the St. Ignatius School Hall may determine the future of the scholarship awarded annually by the civics to a member of the high school graduating class, according to Chairman Stanley Mrus. Tickets for the affair are \$1 and are available from committee members and at the Herald office, 98 North Broadway, next to the Post Office.

For five years the Civics Assn. has made the annual scholarship grant to a graduate named by the school authorities. "We would like to increase the amount available for the purpose and if we can obtain sufficient response at our benefit this Friday we may be able to enlarge the scholarship," Mrus pointed out.

"The benefit, known far and wide for the many prize awards for participants, is the only fund raising activity of the Civics group during the year. The Civics Assn. was organized in 1946 with membership open to all residents of Hicksville School District. The group will hold its regular meeting at the firehouse auditorium on Thursday night, Jan. 28 at 8:30 PM.

HICKSVILLE—Lack of approval of the State Dept. of Education and the Board of Regents at Albany is delaying the progress of the four million dollar high school construction program here which was approved by the voters almost ten months ago, a spokesman for the Board explained this week.

An official School Board information release stated "Hicksville's expansion program, although much progress is in evidence, is far from its completion."

"Final plans for a new high school, already taxpayer approved, are now awaiting the approval of the Board of Regents and the State Education Dept. Receipt of these approvals will permit the Board of Education to call for bids and proceed with construction." The high school proposition was voted upon on March 28, 1953, by more than the necessary two-thirds favorable majority.

At the time the vote was offered, the School Board announced "The Board of Education feels that some explanation should be given to the voters of the School District for calling the special district meeting to approve the new High School immediately after preliminary approval has been granted by the State Education Dept. The Board would have preferred to allow a month or more for informal public presentation and explanation of the project, through the press, and local organizations.

"It has been necessary, however, to call for a vote on the High School during the month of March in order that the District will be in a position to take advantage of the best possible procedure to obtain the greatest amount of State Aid under the 7-million which provides for State Aid for building construction."

The official project, one of three offered the voters on March 28, called for expenditures of \$3,900,000 for the new high school on district-owned property on the east side of Newbridge Road south of Old Country Rd. and running through to Division Ave.

Discussing the proposed enlargement of the Dutch Lane, Fork Lane, Burns Ave. and Old Country Rd. schools to about double their present 10-room size, the Board of Education release commented:

"The Board is now working on a new proposal which includes additions to the four small elementary schools and site acquisition. Recommendations for this newest phase of the expansion program were presented to the Board in Sept. 1953 by the Institute of Field Services, Columbia University. Architects Kappe and Johnson were engaged to develop the preliminary plans which have already been accepted by the Board and submitted to the State Dept. of Education at Albany.

"Negotiations for sites are well underway and it is expected that taxpayer vote will be called for in the immediate future."

It was also announced that the Hicksville School District has received \$27,489.75 in Federal funds for operating expenses and recently authorized Henry C. Brengel, president of the Board, to sign applications for Federal aid on new construction.

The Citizens Advisory Committee on Education recommended on June 1 of last year that the School Board go ahead with plans for the vote on the bond issue for the 10-room additions to the four elementary schools.

Regarding progress on the submission of the question, the School Board spokesman had this to say this week:

"The Board of Education was recently informed by members of its Advisory Committee that there is some concern over an apparent lack of progress in development (Continued on Page 11).

OPINION DIVIDED

Action on the new dog ordinance was held in abeyance with about 25 persons present Tuesday and evenly divided in opinion concerning the law which calls for both

muzzling and leashing all dogs. The present law simply calls for muzzling.

Mrs. Richard Derby of the North Shore estate section objected to the enactment of the new law. A group of people from Syosset appeared with a petition containing 22 names in favor of it because they "did not want dogs running loose in the development" where they live. Another group from another development said that one reason they had moved out to the suburbs was to get away from such laws, feeling that they should not be required to leash dogs.

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Press Releases Are Not Enough

REPRESENTATIVES of eight Hicksville civic associations risked treacherous road conditions, Saturday morning, to keep an interesting and informative date with Supervisor Lew Waters at Oyster Bay Town Hall. They came away with a feeling of some accomplishment. They got straight forward answers to some of their questions from the new supervisor and they expressed themselves on a variety of problems, from advertising of notices for zone changes to designation of local streets to prohibit truck traffic.

The basic problem which took the 13 men to Oyster Bay involves development of property in new housing areas which the home purchasers have been led to believe will some day be a park or recreation field.

Three stages of such a project appeared to be represented:

(1) Hillside Terrace where about three acres of land has been set aside, fenced and seeded by the developer. Residents wonder about playground equipment to make it useful.

(2) Glenbrook Homes, where about an acre has been left idle by the builder and is supposed to become a park. It has not been fenced or seeded. It has begun to take the form of a first class dump with at least one child already injured on the debris.

(3) Millwood Gate, where there is some vacant land that the residents hope will become a play area.

Supervisor Waters said several interesting things. First, the appearance of "no dumping" signs marked "Town of Oyster Bay" does not necessarily mean the township has taken over the property or owns it. Second, he is getting a map prepared on which will be designated all playground or park areas which developers have deeded or offered to the township. Third, he is getting cost estimates from E. Parker Yutler, one-time Hicksville athletic director, on equipment for such areas. Fourth, absence of an appropriation of funds in the Hicksville Park District budget for such projects is no problem since the township can borrow the funds and pay it back under future budgets. And fifth, maybe the people haven't gotten the right answers to some of their questions relating to this and other subjects.

The group learned also that the area for particular attention of Councilman Frank Chlumsky is being compressed because of the increase in the number of Hicksville problems.

Mr. Waters also made a firm promise that things are going to improve, all around. The park and playground problems will be straightened out when the Spring comes although we won't be able to do everything the first year", and the things he outlined "have got to be done or I won't be in office."

The various Hicksville civic groups are getting together this coming week for the exchange of information of mutual interest. The firm determination to tackle the park and recreation question as a united group was made earlier last week. It hardly seems a coincidence that the civic association representatives met on one evening and the following day this political publicity release, in the name of the Supervisor, went to every newspaper:

"The Town of Oyster Bay has definite plans for playgrounds in the township. As soon as weather permits steps will be taken to execute these plans and get several playgrounds in operation. The Town Board has made the developers lay aside three per cent of the land that they build on for use as playgrounds. These will be equipped by the time warm weather comes and will be put in where needed most, especially in Hicksville, Bethpage and Massapequa."

It gives you the creepy feeling that someone is peeking over your shoulder. The press release came out but the group went to Oyster Bay anyhow. Township administration by press release is no longer enough. The people want straight answers and action.

Remembering the last Township election returns, it looks like they are going to get what they have every right to expect and demand.

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
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
