HICKSVILLE—Voters of the school district will cast their ballots at the high school on Saturday, Mar. 6, between 10 AM and 8 PM upon six propositions submitted by the Board of Education. Four of the questions cover additions to each of the four elementary schools opened a year ago, the fifth is for the purchase of five acres off Newbridge Rd. for another school, and the sixth is a question regarding future elections.

The four additions, increasing the size of the Dutch Lane, Old Country Rd., Burns Ave. and Fork Lane Schools to 20 rooms each, will cost an estimated \$600,000 each or a total of \$2,400,000. The land purchase is estimated tentatively at about \$41,000.

The sixth question will be the proposal to divide the school district into election areas for the purposes of voting and registering upon school district questions.

REGISTRATION DATES

The School Board also set dates for the registration of all qualified voters who have not registered for school propositions since last April, 1953. Registration will take place at the high school on Tuesday, Feb. 23, from 4 to 9 P.M. and Saturday, Feb. 27, from 10 A.M. to 8 P.M.

Plans to have members of the Citizens Advisory Committee on Education cooperate with the School Board in providing speakers for meetings on the propositions were discussed at a meeting of the Committee held last night (Monday) at East St. School Cafeteria. The Committee has been on record in favor of the additions, as recommended by the experts employed by the district since June of last year.

Word that Albany has given its approval to the tentative plans to add the four extensions was given to the Committee last week.

The decision to set the date of the vote was made at a Board of

"Fluoridation of the water supply is the most effective in preventing tooth decay in children

from the time of the child's first visit to the dentist to age eight," declared Dr. Robert Unger of Hempstead in a talk to the PTA Council on Jan. 28.

Dr. Unger, who is a member of the 10th District Dental Society, emphasized in his talk what an important asset it would be to the people of Hicksville to have fluoridation of drinking water.

"The longer you wait to put this thing across," he said, "the more decay of teeth you will have." He compared the low cost of this project as against the cost of filling one tooth and remarked that it would cost each person about ten cents a year to have the water treated.

He urged that local service clubs get behind this project as well as civic groups. He said the fact that Hicksville owns its own water district would make the treatment much more simple.

"Although, naturally this cannot mean 'no more cavities in teeth,' it would certainly reduce the number," he said.

Dr. Gilbert Sherman of Valley Stream, chairman of the District 10 Dental Society, was present and spoke briefly.

Good Response To Advisory Plan

Public response to the Plainview Board of Education's plan to setup a "Citizens' Advisory Committee" for the school system has been such that a special meeting will be held in the very near future to complete the organization of the group. At the present time more than 50 per cent of those who originally volunteered to serve on the committee have replied to a questionnaire sent



out by the Board of Education. It is interesting to note that during the past few months the public press has been carrying stories emanating from long established school districts wherein the residents have been loudly protesting their inability to participate in school affairs. Conversely, with Plainview in the process of developing a school system, the Board of Education, the teaching staff and the residents have taken cognizance of the need for all-around cooperation and have laid the foundation which should stand the district in good stead during these formative years.

The format for organizing the Citizens Advisory Committee is based on twelve key committees. They are: budget and finance, transportation, buildings, sites, adult education, health, safety, teenage, recreation, centralization, insurance and information.

Residents who have returned Board of Education questionnaires have indicated which committee they prefer to serve on and every effort will be made to fulfill individual preference. However, in case of a large over-balance on one committee other arrangements will have to be worked out so that the bulk of committees work doesn't fall on any one group of residents.

In a little over a year the community has organized within its boundaries a Democratic and Republican Club, an American Le-

gion Post, Jewish Community organizations and a School Advisory Group.

Add these to the other established organizations such as the Volunteer Fire Dept., Amvets, Civic Assoc., Parent-Teachers Association, Boy and Girl Scouts, Teenagers and a host of others and you have what adds up to a fairly active community.

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

Value of Parking Areas

The value of parking areas has been well demonstrated through the years. The large supermarkets were among the first to realize the necessity of providing convenient parking for customers. Garden City merchants also recognized the need early. The result is that Garden City is a very attractive & prosperous business section. The modern day miracle, the shopping center, is completely dependent upon adequate parking areas. And unless the older established business sections wake up soon, they may well be relegated to a second class status by the shoppers.

High Time

It is high time that the Oyster Bay Town Board is getting around to doing something about more parking for Hicksville. The rest of the county has been going forward, but because of the do-nothing attitude of the Town Board on parking, this community has stood still. We hope that the Board's plans will be carried through to completion at an early date.

Dollar Values

We can all talk about the value of parking to a community, but it is very difficult to establish definite dollar values to an individual parking space. The U. S. Chamber of Commerce has succeeded in doing just this. They recently conducted a nation wide survey and have calculated the value of a single space to be at least \$20,000 in terms of annual retail sales it produces. The values varied from a low of \$10,000 per space in Newton, Mass. to a high of \$64,000 in Modesto, Calif. A great many factors were involved such as the overall volume of retail sales and the use of street cars and buses. These figures are a striking illustration of what the local merchants and the community in general gains when there is adequate parking facilities.

Education meeting last Wednesday.

Richard School, member of the Board, has been designated by President Henry C. Brengel, as chairman of a special committee of the board to work on the extension propositions.

The proposed new site of about five acres, planned for a new small elementary school, will be on the east side of Newbridge Rd. on property of Wettersauer near Glenbrook Homes.

Details of the school expansion program were outlined by Arthur Eirich, secretary of the school board, at a meeting of the Hicksville Civic and Community Association in the firehouse, Thursday night. He said that about 80 per cent of the children

School Psychologist Speaker At Burns Ave. P-TA Session

HICKSVILLE — "Consistent misbehavior to the detriment of himself and the class on the part of today's school child brings the aid of the school's psychologist," declared William Glaser in an interesting talk before the Burns Ave. School PTA at a meeting held at the school Thursday, Jan. 21.

Mr. Glaser, who fills the role of school psychologist in Hicksville, told how he studies the teacher's report; makes observations, and sometimes a few tests on the child to find the cause of the misbehavior.

"Enlistment of the aid of both teacher and parents," he stated, "is the next step in elimination of the root of the trouble. This is a slow process and requires much patience on the part of all concerned," he continued, "since seriously disturbed children constitute a real problem." He said that more complex facilities for handling these children require placing the child's name on a long waiting list for treatment.

Many of his remarks were in re-

sponse to questions raised by parents attending the meeting. Mr. Glaser also showed an interesting film picturing the various stages passed through by children at different age levels.

A Safety Committee was organized at the meeting headed by Jack Rondeau to study walking hazards, attention to stop signs, and the possible cooperation with other PTA units in obtaining the reduction of dangers to the safety of the children.

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

Reviews Growth Of Civic Group

By DOROTHEA GUELPA

Buddy Mazzara installed Robert Feuss as the new president of the North Bethpage Civic Assoc. at the meeting Wednesday, Jan. 20.

He said that it is important to back people of high caliber and integrity for local positions as he charged the new officers. "Only by constant vigilance can we have the type of government we need," he declared.

Mr. Feuss thanked the members for their faith in him and said he hoped he would have as fine a record as the outgoing president, Bill Benintendi.

Mr. Benintendi is summing up his term as president mentioned some interesting facts on the growth of the group. In June of 1924 the first formal organization was established, and called the Scandinavian - American Club.

Prior to this time meetings had been held in homes. In August 1924 the first membership committee was established and in September of the same year, the name was changed to Central Park North Civic Assoc. with Hans Haugen as president.

In November of that year a school committee threatened to go to Albany if the transportation-to-school problem was not solved. The by-laws were written in Sept. of 1924, and by Feb. of 1926 the site of the present clubhouse was purchased with the clubhouse built by Sept. of the same year.

An effort to get electricity into Central Park was made in Dec. of 1926, while in Nov. in 1929 the group went on record in endorsement of adult education.

Profit from the card party held in April 1932 netted \$7.22. In June of 1932 Carl Nyland, backed by the organization, was elected to the school board. Mrs. Kaufman was elected to the board in April of 1934 with the backing of the same group.

In October of 1935 it became necessary to write to a member in regard to his son throwing stones at the clubhouse, asking him "to refrain."

The present name, The North Bethpage Civic Assoc. was adopted in Sept. 1937. The same month \$2 gifts were sent to each of the 19 Bethpage servicemen.

Mr. Feuss appointed several of his committees for 1951 as follows: membership, Edward Schreiber, first vice president; Ways and Means, Joseph Kipp, 2nd vice president; school committee: Bill Benintendi, Catherine Laws, Mary Schreiber, Arthur Mitow and Michael DeFlorio.

A decision not to hold a Poppy Sale Poster Contest this year was made by the American Legion Aux. at the monthly meeting Jan. 21.
