Sister Rosarita Taught Thousands Over Years

BROOKLYN—Funeral services were held yesterday (Monday) for Sister M. Rosarita who died Thursday at St. Catherine's Hospital, here. Services were also held at the chapel of the Queen of Holy Rosary Convent in North Amityville just prior to interment at the convent cemetery.

Sister Rosarita, who had spent 35 years in Hicksville as a teacher and principal of St. Ignatius Parochial School, went to the Holy Family Convent at 10th St., Brooklyn, six years ago. She was widely known by many Hicksville residents. Priests, doctors and others were among the thousands who received their elementary education from her in Hicksville.

She came to Hicksville from St. Barbara's School at Bleeker St., Brooklyn. She held a bachelor of arts degree and was highly regarded as a teacher with a keen sense of justice. During the time she was in Hicksville, the present school building on E. Nicholai St. was built.

Sister Rosarita was taken ill two weeks ago and entered St. Catherine's Hospital.

NOTHING FOUND YET:

Cops Continue Hunt For Stolen Dynamite

HICKSVILLE—After five days of following fruitless leads, including an anonymous tip which cleared the high school building on Friday, police continued to concentrate their efforts to locate 20 sticks of stolen dynamite in this community, today. Reports that a single stick had been found in the school over the weekend were branded as false by police and school authorities.

Twenty sticks of dynamite and 38 electrical blasting caps—regarded as potentially more dangerous than the dynamite itself—were reported stolen Thursday from a locked powder magazine of the Henry A. Pollack Co. on Charlotte Ave., here. Notice to all school children was given late Thursday and Friday morning warning them not to touch anything suspicious they might find in vacant fields.

Apparently acting on a fruitless tip, police cars cruised up and down Fifth St. near the High School, Thursday night.

Shortly before noon on Friday, a phone call came to the local firehouse stating the stolen dynamite was hidden in the high school. Police were informed who in turn notified Acting Principal Thomas H. B. Horne. Fire drill alarms were sounded and the building cleared while patrolmen and detectives made a concentrated room by room search of the high school.

It was not the first time a "dynamite scare" has been given regarding high schools in the county; however, authorities noted that this report was timed to coincide with the notice of the stolen dynamite, adding a touch of realism to the hoax.

At the time the school was emptied, junior-high students were reporting for the afternoon sessions. It was the last period for senior high. As a result more than 1,700 boys and girls were milling about until the search was called off.

Until a late hour yesterday, police said none of the missing dynamite or blasting caps had been located.

NOTICE OF ENACTMENT OF ORDINANCE

TAKE NOTICE that by resolution of the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, N. Y., duly adopted by said Board and entered in full upon its minutes on the 16th day of February, 1954, following a public hearing duly held thereon, the following advertisement according to law, the following Ordinance was duly enacted:

**AN ORDINANCE RELATING
TO THE CONTROL AND SEIZURE OF DOGS** in the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, pursuant to Article IX, Section 130 of the Town Law of the State of New York.

Section 1. It shall be and hereby is declared unlawful for any person owning, possessing or harboring any dog to allow same to run loose or be at large upon any public highway, street, sidewalk or other public place in the Town of Oyster Bay unless such dog is under the immediate and full control of the owner or person in charge thereof and while said dog is on leash.

Section 2. Any person or persons violating any provisions of this ordinance shall be liable for fine and forfeit and pay a penalty of not more than Twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) for each offense. Any violation of this ordinance or any part thereof shall constitute disorderly conduct and the person so violating any of the provisions thereof shall be and is hereby declared a disorderly person.

Section 3. A dog warden shall seize any dog found at large or not under the immediate control of the owner or person in charge thereof. Every dog seized shall be properly fed and cared for at the expense of the municipality until disposed of. The owner of the dog seized may redeem the dog within five days of the seizure upon payment to the Town Clerk of a fee in the amount of Two dollars (\$2.00) and produce a license for said dog. Any dog not so redeemed within such period of five days shall be sold or killed by the warden. In case of a sale, the purchaser must pay a purchase price of Two dollars (\$2.00) to the Town Clerk and all proceeds from the sale of the dog to the Town warden for seizing and impounding of dog, the redemption, killing or sales thereof, and the fees of such dog warden shall be conducted pursuant to the provisions of the Agriculture and Markets Law of the State of New York.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Dr. Abraham Lefkowitz, principal of Samuel J. Tilden High School and legislative representative of the Empire State Federation of Teachers Unions, A. F. of L., alternately hurled compliments and accusations at Nassau Board of Education when he recently spoke before a legislative committee in Albany.

Dr. Lefkowitz, whose aim was to obtain higher pay for New York City school teachers, told the committee that the city's educational system was rapidly losing its top teachers to Nassau because of higher pay, smaller classes, new schools and general all-around superior teaching conditions.

In later remarks, however, the Tilden High School principal upbraided Nassau school boards charging them with "teacher-raiding."

He singled out Levittown stating that the school board walked off with the best teacher on his staff by offering

him more money than he was earning in the city.

Significantly, very little space if any at all was given Dr. Lefkowitz's remarks by the city newspapers.

All of these developments hold special import for Nassau's residents, particularly since the plan to annex Nassau and possibly Suffolk was brought to the fore by New York City businessmen and legislators.

Each new fact that comes to light adds further clarity to the "annexation picture," and supplies Nassau's residents with many of the underlying reasons why the city would like to gain control

through annexation.

Prior to the learned Dr. Lefkowitz's remarks, it was generally known that city officials were expressing a great deal of concern over the loss of purchasing power and business organizations to Nassau. But now that it has been revealed that many New York City teachers are finding the Long Island air more healthful and appetizing, it would appear ripe for the annexation hucksters to wheel out their big guns preparatory to an all out effort. Their promises should provide us with an additional source of entertainment no matter how fantastic they get.
