Average Income Of New Residents Tops Nassau

HICKSVILLE—Families now purchasing medium-priced homes in this area generally have annual incomes which are \$766 higher than the average for Nassau County as a whole and Nassau income is second highest in the entire state. The Hicksville average is \$8,837 per year, compared with Nassau's average of \$8,071 and a state average of \$5,224, according to Walter G. Stackler and Leonard L. Frank, home builders. Westchester tops the Nassau average.

The announcement follows a spot survey of a half-dozen large-scale home developments of more than 1,000 dwellings in this year, together with a detailed analysis of data supplied on mortgage applications by the first 200 families in Stackler and Frank's Mid-Island Park project, here. Stackler added that purchases reported an average annual income of \$8,837, that average liquid assets in bonds and cash amount to \$3,770 per family and that each family in protected by an average of \$9,234 in life insurance. The average age of the head of the household is 35.7 years.

Jericho Flag Will Soon Fly Again

JERICHO—Harry Stewart of the Jericho YFW Post, who for more than 10 years has raised and lowered the American flag daily, except in extreme adverse weather, at the Underhill Memorial Park, here, as a public service today explained why the flag has not been displayed the past week. He said he had more than a dozen inquiries about the flag display. A broken pulley on the flag pole is the reason why he has not been able to put it up this week. The pulley will be replaced in a few days he added.

Fire Chief Contest Narrows Down

HICKSVILLE—The contest for election of a second assistant chief of the fire dept. on Apr. 8, which started out as a five-man race, has now narrowed down to three candidates. Raymond Viethen of Co. 8 and Edward Glinka of Co. 5 have officially withdrawn from the competition, due to the pressure of their private business affairs. The remaining candidates are Charles Sauer of Co. 4, Conrad Schlauch of Co. 2 and Medard Ofenloch of Co. 1. The incumbent second assistant, Larry Huttle, is an unopposed candidate for first assistant chief. Voting is limited to members of the fire dept. and will be held between 7 and 9 PM on Thursday, Apr. 8, at the firehouse.

Teens Go Skating On Saturday

HICKSVILLE—The Teen Canteen roller skating party to be held Saturday, Mar. 27 still has room for 20 or more teenagers to go. The bus will leave the High School between 7 and 7:15 and then will go to Levittown Hall and leave from there at 7:30 PM. A total of sixty persons can be accommodated so it will be "first come first served," the sponsors say.

HICKSVILLE—Plans have been made by the Building Fund Committee of Holy Trinity Episcopal Church, here, to raise money for a new parish hall. The proposed addition will provide badly needed space for Sunday School classes and facilities for auxiliary group activities.

Joseph M. Tracy heads the Building Fund Committee which also includes: Jack Anderson of, Bethpage, construction; Munn D. Myers, finance; Thomas Murphy of Levittown, publicity; Arthur Campbell of Levittown, dinner committee; Stanley Rodgers of Levittown, treasurer; and Rev. David S. Duncombe, Jr., pastor.

Members of the church will be guests at a "kick off" dinner to be given by the committee on Thursday evening, April 29, 8 p.m., in the Masonic Temple, Nichols St. Details of the campaign will be explained and plans for the proposed new building will be shown.

Miss Farley Back At High School

HICKSVILLE—Miss Mabel R. Farley, principal of the Senior High School, has resumed her duties at the school, after an absence of several months as a result of injuries she suffered in an accident on opening day of school last Sept. 1. It was the first time in 25 years that Miss Farley was not present on the school term's first day. She suffered a fractured leg when a pulley in an overhead garage door at her residence on Miller Rd. let go. She underwent an operation in Nassau Hospital, Mineola, following the accident.

Second Bomb Scare Empties HS

HICKSVILLE—The high school was emptied of students at 11 o'clock, Tuesday morning, for the second time in recent weeks following an anonymous phone call that a bomb in the building was scheduled to go off shortly after 12 noon. Senior high pupils were ushered out of the school and police again conducted a thorough search without success. The junior high was

permitted to enter for classes without delay at 1 PM.

The first scare came on Feb. 19 shortly after a quantity of dynamite had been stolen from a local fertilizer concern. That alarm also came shortly before noon, being recorded with the fire dept. HQ. The second false alarm was given to the high school office.

A crude home-made bomb did ex-

plore in Roslyn High School the following day (Wednesday), causing some damage but no personal injuries. County District Attorney Frank A. Gulotta today warned school officials to stop "interfering" with police investigations involving students or face arrest and prosecution. The warning was prompted by a nine-hour delay in reporting the Roslyn High School explosion to the police.

'Better Movies' Group Reports

HICKSVILLE—The PTA Council Committee for the Study of Motion Pictures Presented for Children's Viewing, here, reported at the Council meeting Tuesday night, Mar. 23, when the Junior High unit was host in the School library. Dexter Coney of Fork Lane PTA, a member of the committee, read the report at the request of Mrs. Theodore G. Rosebury, chairman of movies being shown here. "The majority are not suitable for children," was the conclusion of the committee report.

Principal Leon Galloway of Junior High, was quoted as saying: "I believe that the movies being shown the youngsters in Hicksville are harmful, and that something should be done to correct this situation."

Also interviewed was Kenneth S. Barnes, librarian of the local library, who said: "Films made from the vast material offered in the many fine books for children would be more in keeping with their interests. Adult movies, on the whole, are very poor for children's viewing."

It was reported that the Great Neck Community Council which includes the PTA, has a film committee which meets monthly with the two local theatre managers, and then selects the movies to be shown children.

The committee quoted Charles Kasten, local manager as saying in an interview: "I consider the N. Y. State Movie Censors Board as sufficient censorship."

Board Frowns Upon Personal Printing for School Trustee

HICKSVILLE—The "indiscretion" of a school trustee in having "personal printing" done in the high school print shop was spread upon the district records at a special meeting last night (Wednesday) and all parties involved hoped it will become a closed incident. The title of the verse is "What Is Success?"

The fact that the school print shop ran off several hundred copies of a poem, author unknown, for Board Member Arthur L. Eirich, had been rumored here for weeks. The issue came before the board, officially, last night.

The following resolution was adopted, after a discussion: "The Board of Education does not condone the indiscretion of Mr. Eirich of having

personal printing done in the high school print shop". The motion was made by Richard School.

School Superintendent E. H. LeBarron, who gave his approval to the printing order, said, "I thought of it merely as a project for our print shop."

Eirich commented, after the resolution was adopted, "the indiscretion is admirable". He said the

work was done not with intent to get something personal at the expense of the district. The district has been reimbursed for the paper stock used in the job, he added.

Cawley Out To Get Brengel's Position

HICKSVILLE—The candidacy of Joseph F. Cawley of 2 Glow Lane for election to the Board of Education on May 5 to succeed Henry C. Brengel was announced Tuesday by his campaign manager, Frank Lagay of 39 Straw Lane. Brengel, who is president of the School Board, told the Herald that he does not think he will be a candidate to succeed himself for another 3-year term.

Cawley who was closely identified with the successful campaign for the election of Arthur Eirich and Richard School to the Board last year and was co-chairman with School of the "Referendum Committee" which promoted the favorable vote for school additions last month, is a 40-year-old Telephone Co. executive.

Twenty couples are named as the charter members of a "Parents Committee for the Election of Joseph F. Cawley". This group selected Lagay as campaign manager. He announced the committee will wage a "vigorous campaign", will announce additional members of the Parents Committee and Cawley's platform shortly.

A statement from Lagay reports: Cawley lives with his wife and two daughters, 4½ and 7 years of age, at 2 Glow Lane. He has resided in the area since 1949. He graduated from Wagner College with a BS degree in 1935 and served as president of the Alumni Assoc. for four years. He also served as a member of the Board of Trustees of the college for two years. A captain in the corps of engineers in World War II, Cawley saw five years of military service, 30 months in the South Pacific.

Cawley is a member of the Board of Directors of the Yorkville Mid-Manhattan Chamber of Commerce and has served on the Dist. 17 Board of Education's Advisory Committee for one year. "He is chairman of the expansion subcommittee of that group and took a leading part in the organization of the campaign to secure approval of the voters, recently, on the bond issue which will make possible the construction of four new school additions and acquisition of a site for another building."

He has been with the Telephone Co. for 18 years, attaining the position of business office manager in New York City.

Levittowners Know 'That Line'

HICKSVILLE — With the exception of a handful which may never admit identity with the community of Hicksville, embittered homeowners who have been trying to convince themselves and their neighbors for nearly five years that they are part of the Super Community of Levittown have finally discovered it just is not so. And the painful truth that the design of a house or the name of the builder has nothing to do with common interest and community life has been put across by—of all people—Levittowners.

This interesting revelation became part of the record when the North Levittown Home Owners met Tuesday night.

Charles Miller and David Siegerson, long-time champions of the Greater Levittown movement, smoothly gave NLHOA President

Marvin Sultan a rough time of it. Sultan had told the daily press that the NLHOA pulled out of the Levittown Civic Council. In disagreement with a blast at township officials voiced by Mary Dusant, retiring Council president.

Miller, Siegerson and their friends, Tuesday night by a vote reported as 11 to 8 put across a motion in which the NLHOA membership decided to again send delegates to the Civic Council and—spread on the record the fact that Sultan had no right to withdraw in the first place.

Debate on the motion got so heated that Sultan surrendered the chair to speak from the floor.

During the discussion a NLHOA delegate made the tearful admission that whether the group liked it or not, they are not considered a "part of Levittown" by Levittown leaders. Those who live in Levitt homes in Hicksville are being left out of Levittown activity planning, can't get Levittown cooperation on Hicksville (Oyster Bay township) problems because

Levittown is in Hempstead township, and just don't belong south of "That Line".

Volunteers to replace former Civic Council delegates of NLHOA were found in the audience among those who put thru the motion sending delegates back and chastising their leadership.

Supervisors Lewis N. Waters, who had been advertised in a house-to-house mail distribution as the speaker of the evening, did not appear.

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

More About Those High Gas Bills

At long last, I got in touch with William McCaffrey, Plainview attorney who is heading up the petition asking the PSC to investigate the possibility of excessive rates here in our area. We had a long talk, and Mr. McCaffrey conveyed a feeling of great optimism on the subject, but he is not content to sit back and let matters take their course.

"We've got this thing rolling like a snowball now and if we don't keep it on our progress will be diminished," said McCaffrey. He is pursuing the issue by contacting the VA and mortgage holding banks. The latter, he believes, will be extremely interested because several home owners are contemplating moving from their homes—fearing that they might lose them in an effort to keep up such payments that were never estimated in the initial purchase of the homes.

He asked me if this public concern had been going on for long,

and I had to confess that for two or more years neighbors and civic groups have been complaining that they feel that they are overpaying for this utility. This surprised him somewhat, and he mentioned that he was pleasantly surprised, also, with the overwhelming response offered him by local civic associations in the mid-Island area. We both agreed that the press was highly co-operative in this fight.

I was informed that a great many petitions are out and are taking the required length of time to be filled with signatures, and that he is awaiting the returns which he will forward to the PSC. A neighbor of his took out some forms and came back after two days with 181 names. An engineer is doing some mathematical work which will show what percentage higher we are paying over other territories.

Mr. McCaffrey sent a petition form in the mail for me to forward to the Woodbury Gardens Civic Assoc. should these residents desire to enter their names in accord.

A suggestion was made that after the signature the amount of the last bill be entered to further aid the PSC.

All in all, it looks like an event

that should rock the mid-Island area in an unprecedented inquiry into the workings of the meters attached to our homes. The Long Island Lighting Company feels that the rates are justified on the basis that we live in a section that takes more material, labor and investment to service than a closer-to-the-city location, thereby causing rates to be somewhat higher. They explain that one service is not taken into consideration, and that is the hot water that is often overlooked. Washing machines place a heavy burden on the gas system; bathing for our families is often forgotten in this rate problem, and together with the cooking that is usually thought of as the big gas-user the gas bill must be figured on the basis of a highly used gas output. They claim that the gas travels a longer distance here than in the city where many more families are living in one dwelling. They also argue that it was a tremendous task to outfit so many thousands of families with service, and initial outlay and expenses must be considered in such a big—and surprise operation—surprise, because no one can estimate the influx of so many gas and electricity users.

I have outlined in this column the pros and cons, without personally commenting upon either side of the question. I do not like to take sides in matters such as these or political questions as I like the reader to judge for himself what course to take. My opinion doesn't matter. Judge for yourself and when you have reached a conclusion—contact your civic association and air your views.

I wanted to give this last item more space, but the tempos of the times cannot be figured in advance; perhaps I can mention more in a subsequent column. The Woodbury Gardens Softball Team is champing at the bit in anxiety to start its latest season. It looked good last year, although they got off to a late start, and this year—they feel so confident that they will be a big contender in the Hicksville League. But to get into this activity there are certain expenses that will be forthcoming—baseball uniforms, equipment, and entry fees. Now, in order to overcome all of this they have hit upon an idea that will be as welcome as spring (and baseball).

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
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

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
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
