Local Buying Power Soars

HICKSVILLE—Today's buying power of the 6½ square mile area of Hicksville exceeds \$84,000,000 compared with \$25,000,000 only four years ago, or an increase of \$59,000,000. These calculations were announced by Stackler & Frank, home builders who have an office at 218 No. Bway, based upon new local population figures for Hicksville estimated by the L-L Lighting Co. and published in the Herald, Tuesday. The buying power is figured on a \$2,361 per capita annual income for Nassau County, according to the State Dept. of Commerce. The 1950 U. S. Census gave Nassau a per capita income of \$2,285.

The Hicksville population today is 35,649 or a gain of 112.5 per cent since the 1950 census of 12,070. The area is defined by the Lighting Co. as bounded on the north by Northern State Pkwy., on west by Wantagh State Pkwy., on the east by So. Oyster Bay Rd and on south by Hempstead-Oyster Bay Township line.

BRENGEL NOT RUNNING:

Contest For Vacancy

HICKSVILLE—Larry Roman, well-known civic leader, will be a candidate for the Board of Education in the May 5th election, it was revealed last night by the Home Owners Committee for the Election of Lawrence A. Roman. He will be a candidate for the three-year vacancy to succeed Henry C. Brengel who told the Herald he will not seek election.

A contest for the May 5 voting is assured since Joseph Cawley of Glow Lane has also announced his candidacy for the Brengel vacancy. A new requirement of the State Education Law now requires Board candidates to state the specific person they seek to succeed.

The term of Edna Kuhne Sutton also expires this year. She has not stated whether she will seek another three-year term but friends hope that she would consent to re-election.

Roman who is 38 lives on Notre Dame Ave. He has practically been a life long resident, being born in Jericho.

"His enthusiastic community-wide interest in Hicksville is well established," the sponsoring committee points out. "He has been actively identified with various civic projects and has been president of the Civic and Community Assoc. Fix Voting Districts, Dates

HICKSVILLE—The establishment of four voting districts and revisions in the Education Law will result in changes for local voters in connection with the annual school meeting and election of two trustees next month.

All voters who wish to vote on the two trustee election must register again in person. They may do so on either Saturday, Apr. 24, from 2 to 10 P.M. or Thursday, Apr. 29, from 4 to 10 P.M. They will register at their respective voting places as listed below.

The annual meeting will start at 7:30 P.M. on Tuesday night, May 4, at the high school auditorium. The vote on the budget, election of a library trustee and the library budget will take place at the same place on the same evening.

Election of two trustees to fill two vacancies on the School Board will take place on Wednesday, May 5, at the four district polling places (listed below) between 4 and 10 P.M.

Designating petitions for a specific vacancy on the school board must be filed with District Clerk Andrew B. Heberer no less than 10 days prior to the vote.

Dates and hours regarding the annual meeting and election were set at a meeting of the Board of Education last night.

DISTRICT BOUNDARIES

The School Board has set the boundary lines of four voting districts in the school district as follows:

Dist. 1—Burns Ave. School—bounded on north and west by district line; on east by North Bway and on south by LIRR.

Dist. 2—Old Country Rd. School—bounded on west and south by

district line on north by LIRR and on east by Newbridge Rd. to Old Country, east to Jerusalem and north to LIRR.

Dist. 3—High School—bounded on south and east by district line; west by Newbridge Rd. and north to LIRR.

Dist. 4—East St. School—bounded on north and east by district line; south by Old Country Rd., and west by Jerusalem Ave. north to Broadway and North Broadway to District Line.

Funeral Services Monday For Annapolis Graduate

HICKSVILLE—Funeral services will be held Monday morning, Apr. 5, at 11 o'clock at St. Stephen's Lutheran Church, South Bway, and Fourth St., for Naval Lieut. John J. Entzasser, Jr. who was killed in an aircraft training flight crash in Florida last Monday.

Accompanied by an escort of Naval officers, the body is expected to arrive here Saturday and will lay in state at the Henry J. Stock Funeral Home on Newbridge Rd until the funeral.

Lient Entzasser, son of Mr. and Mrs. John J. Entzasser of 13 Spruce St., was the first Hicksville boy to graduate from the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis. He received his Ensign's commission on June 3, 1953.

He was married on May 24, 1952 to Audrey Marie Hartman of Baltimore, Md. Their son, John J. Entzasser, 3rd, was born on Dec. 28, 1953.

He graduated from Hicksville High School in 1945. He studied

at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy and attended the Naval Academy Preparatory School at Bainbridge, Md. He received the nomination to Annapolis from the Secretary of the Navy and was admitted on June 17, 1947.

The Rev. Howard Rogers, pastor of St. Stephen's Church, will officiate at the services on Monday morning. Interment will follow at the Long Island National Cemetery in Pinelawn. Several fellow Naval officers will be present as a guard of honor.

WORK ON DEVELOPMENT PARKS:

Town Warns Rubbish Dumpers

HICKSVILLE—Installation of a four-foot chain link fence around the small park area in the Glenbrook Homes section off Newbridge Rd. has been ordered by the Oyster Bay Town Board, according to Councilman Frank Chlumsky, and the bid for the job has been awarded.

Chlumsky also reported on other park areas. The township, he said, has put up a backstop at the 4 acre park in the Hillside Terrace development and is building

three sand play areas.

"After the town went to the trouble and expense of cleaning up the Hillside Terrace park," he added, "people are still throwing rubbish and debris in the area. Unless this is stopped at once, the town board will send over the police and issue summonses to violators."

He also announced that the town has hired a worker for the Park and Parking District to keep park areas trim, and that the town this

week cleaned up the Abraham Levitt Little League ball field on Hempstead Ave. next to Dutch Lane school.

Representatives of local civic associations met with Supervisor Lewis Waters at Oyster Bay, Saturday morning, regarding the development of park areas, as a follow up of a meeting with Waters on the same problems last January.

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Junior High Busy on Operetta

HICKSVILLE—Students of the Junior High School are finally preparing for their spring operetta. This year's production will be "Martha," or "The Fair at Richmond," by von Flaton, and will be presented on June 4 and 5 at the high school auditorium.

According to Anthony Pollera, Junior High music teacher who is in charge of the production, approximately eighty students have volunteered to participate. Final casting will be held this week.

William Feigin, science teacher, is in charge back stage. Students working with him will handle lighting, stage setting, and properties. Mr. Jacobs and Mr. Ferrara of the Industrial Arts dept. will super-

Plaudits For Senator Hendrikson

Senator Robert C. Hendrikson (Rep., N. J.) deserves special plaudits of every parent.

The legislator, who is chairman of a special committee investigating juvenile delinquency, has announced his intention to introduce a bill providing for a mandatory sentence of not less than one year for all those convicted a second time of dealing with lewd, immoral or licentious material.

He said that an extensive investigation by his subcommittee staff



showed that our youth are the targets of panderers' filth. He disclosed that teen-agers in virtually every city in America are being exposed to indecent smut by shameless and evil merchants of pornography. "An immediate solution to this wicked and disgusting problem must be found," he added.

While Senator Hendrikson's bill is designed to cover only the District of Columbia, the door has been left open for inclusion of a provision to cover the entire country.

In addition, his committee's investigation reveals the need for a job to be done by the citizenry of local communities.

Civic groups and others by setting up special watch-dog commi-

tees can prevent the introduction of written and pictorial sewage in their home villages. They can track down the sources and make an immediate report to law enforcement agencies. They can keep sharp eye on the type of pocket books being sold in community stores and enlist the support of the proprietors to eliminate them from the bookshelves.

Every organized community group should assume the responsibility for keeping the community's mind clean as well as its streets.

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
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CURRENT COMMENT: Let's Continue Pre-Hearings

WE CAN'T HELP express disappointment in the reported decision of the Hicksville Board of Education not to hold a preliminary discussion on the proposed budget of the school district for 1954-55.

The lack of attendance—estimated at about 70 last year—was given as the reason for deciding to discontinue this practice which had been started only a few years ago. Underlying the determination to drop the preliminary hearing, we suspect, is the fact that the Board is of no mood to make any changes in the budget as the result of recommendations which may be offered at such a hearing. Certainly in years gone by it has not changed a single decimal point, even when a preliminary hearing was held.

The annual budget gets bigger and bigger—and it is unofficially estimated that the budget for the coming year will be in excess of three million dollars, gross. This would be nearly one-third as great as the previous year.

We have no quarrel with the size of the budget. The community is growing, the student enrollment continues to climb, we have more schools, more activities, more teachers, etc., etc.

However, it becomes almost impossible for the property owner to get acquainted with the details of the budget on the evening of the annual meeting. On the other hand, a well-advertised preliminary hearing with copies of the budget available well in advance would permit taxpayers the opportunity to intelligently consider it. Such a system would almost eliminate the need for further prolonged discussion on the night of the annual meeting.

We are well aware of the fact that preparation of the budget is a task which consumes a great deal of time and effort on the part of the Board and officials of the district. Every appropriation is weighed and discussed. On the other hand, the preliminary hearing device has proven its value in other school districts and has resulted in broader informed interest on the part of the taxpayers. We dislike seeing this practice discontinued.

We have noted the trend away from discussion in the matter of voting upon new school expansion projects here. Whereas at one time the public had a chance to question authorities in open hearing before being asked to vote on a new bond issue, in recent bond votes there has been a tendency to let informed citizens carry the ball—speaking to civic and P-TA groups. This trend began with Board members carrying the story. In the last referendum not a single public appearance in behalf of the propositions was made at an advertised meeting or hearing by a Board member.

It is a fine thing that we have capable citizens willing to do the selling job on these propositions. But we have also noticed that when the questions of the audience concern specifics—matters which only Board members can answer—there are some spur-of-the-moment replies or downright evasions.

Hicksville may grow in size and our costs and expenditures may mount, but we trust we will never reach the point where the public is deprived of the opportunity to ask questions and satisfy its desire for information before making a decision involving the taxpayer's obligations. The brief interval at the annual meeting just before votes are cast hardly seems the time to ask those questions.

In People's Corner

Public opinion is like the tide in our familiar ocean. It is always moving, and no human power can stay its course. Unless it is unusually high or low, it excites no special attention. Vain attempts have been made to harness the tide, but largely men have been more successful at adapting themselves to its regular ebb and flow.

Unlike the tide however, public opinion, cannot be calculated or predicted with any degree of accuracy by either mathematicians or men of science. Only through an understanding of our American temperament, our American tradition, can the people's opinion be gauged.

Probably largely due to our American tradition of respect for honest differences of opinion, we are tolerant, sometimes even beyond reason. As a natural result, we are prone to allow action, or the lack of action, on the part of our public officials to go, apparently, unchallenged.

This lack of vigorous exertion and turbulence, inmost of the things that distinguishes our land from many another. This tolerance is an indication of the mature strength of our basic faith in our own Amer-

ican way of life. American public opinion, although seldom expressed in turbulence, has a force as strong and as irresistible as the ocean's tide.

All of us have, at one time or another, witnessed the power of public opinion. Most of us can bring to mind the plight of a public official or party boss, when to his dismay, he found that the strength of our peoples' opinion was far more powerful than that of the deepest entrenched of his political cronies. We can remember his utter collapse when he discovered that the people were stronger than any political machine.

Like a slip on a carelessly dressed woman, our public's opinion is beginning to show. Those of us who can remember back, even only a few years, will recognize the signs of change. You can see the change, the change that grows out of the reaction which always comes after a prolonged appeasement has failed. The point at which our tolerance, our watchful waiting was of value, has been reached and passed. Here in our Towns and hamlets the tide has begun to turn.

Hard To Believe

The Long Island Railroad is reported to be carrying about 40 million fewer passengers annually now than it did in 1930. That figures out to be about 110,000 fewer each day. We don't doubt the figures at all, but that's a lot of people. And we can't figure out where the dickens they put them all back in 1930. Right now, for example, there are 29 trains leaving Pennsylvania Station between 5 and 6 o'clock each evening. That's almost one train every two minutes, and they are all jammed. It's very, very hard to believe.

Money To Improve Service

The LIRR. just saved more than a million and a half dollars in back taxes in their debt with Nassau County. In addition, they will save about two thirds of in future taxes because of reduced assessments. This is certainly a tidy little sum and we hope that most of it will go for improved service, either in new facilities or more efficient use of present facilities.

Could Pay For Electrification

Electrification of the LIRR. from Mineola to Hicksville, a distance of 6½ miles, should be one of the first improvements on the agenda. The tax savings would go a long way toward paying for this. And further, electrification would result in many operating economies to help ease the railroad's financial troubles. For instance, electrification would permit trains to operate directly between Hicksville and Penn Station. As it is now, space for Hicksville passengers must be provided on trains from New York to Jamaica. After discharging them at Jamaica, many trains continue half empty to their destinations along the electrified lines. That could be eliminated, and some electric cars used on the Hicksville line.


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NORTH WEST NOTES:

Local Peddlers Need Licenses

It has been brought to the attention of this column that certain peddlers and hawkers have misrepresented the product or products they have been selling in the North West Section. Quoting one price to a customer as selling elsewhere for much higher, "but if you buy it from me you will get it at great savings."

Several such cases have been reported and with that in mind I would like to call to the attention of the readers the following Ordinance, Rule and Regulation for Hawking and Peddling in the Town of Oyster Bay: "Sec. 1. No person shall solicit the sale of, or hawk, peddle, vend, sell or dispose of any goods, wares or merchandise of any description in or upon the public streets or places of the Town of Oyster Bay, or in or upon private property by calls from house to house within said Town, without having first obtained a license provided." "Sect. 2. License fee for such license is hereby fixed at the sum of

Thirty Dollars (\$30.00), and an additional Thirty Dollars (\$30.00) for each additional vehicle used."

The ordinance further states, "Every applicant for a license is required to submit to the Town Clerk, a written application supplement under the affidavit certifying information required by the Town of Oyster Bay."

Sec. 7. "It" part states, "Any person who solicits the sale of, hawk, peddles, vends, calls or disposes of goods, wares or merchandise, without having obtained a license as provided, or who refuses to produce such license to any Peace Officer, who demands inspection of the same or who violates any provision of this ordinance shall be liable to a penalty of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) recoverable by the Supervisor of the Town, in any court having jurisdiction thereof."
