Roman Hopes Board Will Resume Pre-Budget Talks

HICKSVILLE—Larry Roman today asserted that he was "shocked and disturbed" to find that the Board of Education does not plan to continue the annual preliminary school budget discussion this year. At a time when the school system needs the active interest of all citizens, Roman said he views the decision of the Board to discontinue the preliminary hearing as a "step backwards".

The preliminary budget procedure in this district was established about five years ago, largely as the result of a plea by civic leaders. The School Board in deciding not to hold a preliminary meeting this year appeared to feel "that there has been 'too little public interest'" with attendance less than 100 persons each year.

Preliminary budget discussions are scheduled for next Tuesday, Apr. 20, by Plainview School Board at the Manetto Hill School, for Thursday, Apr. 23, by the Flainedge School Board and for East Meadow on Wednesday, Apr. 24.

Roman does not plan a preliminary, but the pre-budget hearing is an objective of Mrs. Charles Melone, candidate for the Bethpage Board. Roman pointed out that the

local League of Women Voters in a newly published guide entitled "You Run Your Schools", asserts: "Public opinion is recognized as an important quality in the successful operation of today's public schools. Citizens are to be encouraged to participate by informing themselves of educational affairs and attending district meetings."

He said that the Women Voters' League guide also comments: "It is important to attend preliminary budget hearings of your school district as announced by the School Board. The preliminary hearings are for discussion and information purposes. This is the chance for lengthy discussion. With this prior information, voters can come to the Annual Meeting prepared to discuss and make any revisions."

Roman, who is a candidate for the School Board to succeed Henry C. Brengel who is

not running again, stated that the League's comments summarize the feelings of many local property owners regarding the preliminary hearing.

"We are given to understand that a budget of more than three million dollars will be proposed this year to operate our school system. Copies of such budget will be available during a seven-day period prior to the annual meeting on May 4th. It is almost impossible for anyone to get adequately informed on the budget during the few minutes on May 4th before the question is submitted to a vote," Roman told the Herald.

"The preliminary budget hearing is a very successful in many communities. I can't understand why it is being discontinued in Hicksville and I sincerely hope the School Board will conduct such a hearing in the days prior to the annual meeting."



CURRENT COMMENT:

So For 13 Years We Just Wait?

EFFORTS TO GET the Rail Road crossings at grade in Hicksville eliminated by either depressing the tracks below the surface or raising them above ground level have been going on for years.

We have files of correspondence on this subject going back to 1939—an unbelievable period of 16 years.

There were high hopes, early in 1941, that something would be done about the local crossings. Starting in 1926, the state legislature had begun borrowing money to finance elimination of railroad crossings at grade. In the beginning, it was arranged that the state pay 25 per cent of the cost, the locality 25 per cent, and the rail road 50 per cent.

The law was amended in 1927 so that 60 per cent was the joint state and county share. The locality share was reduced in 1928 to 10 per cent and in 1929 to 1 per cent. The law was amended in 1938 to provide that the state bear the entire cost but could recover from the rail roads up to 15 per cent of the cost based on "net benefit" to the rail road.

In the election of November 1941, when Herbert Lehman was governor, a constitutional amendment was passed which permitted the transfer of at least \$60,000,000 out of \$113,000,000 available for grade crossing elimination in the entire state to highway and parkway construction.

At that point the Hicksville crossings were in the part two section of the 1941 law, where they stand right this minute. This is the section of the law listing crossings which may be eliminated "some day" but for which no money has been appropriated even for the development of rough plans.

In the years since 1941, there have been repeated local efforts to get the Hicksville crossings into the Section 1 of the law so that at least preliminary hearings could be held and plans developed. We have correspondence of the Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc. from 1948 thru 1953 on these annual efforts.

As the years rolled by, the state parkways were built with the money "milked" away from the crossing elimination fund by that 1941 constitutional amendment. During the same period, the balance remaining for crossing elimination was drained off by several projects until today the cupboard is bare.

A major appropriation of state funds—by new bond issues—is scheduled for this year to cover the cost of more thruways and parkway improvements and for further grade crossing elimination work. We may profit by this, if we can make our case strong enough.

At present Gov. Dewey has on his desk a simple little bill which merely transfers a listing of "village streets, Oyster Bay" from Section 2 to Section 1 of that 1941 law which sets up the list of crossings to be eliminated. Our crossings are those "village streets, Oyster Bay". Your letters and communications to Dewey at this time will help obtain his signature to move up the status of our projects, we are told.

It is still a long road ahead and we regret exceedingly that more than 13 years has already been lost on this work when the law was first established in 1941 with Hicksville in the "no funds" division.

Yet to come are hearings before the Public Service Commission after recommendation by the Dept. of Public Works, to establish a program or list for the following year. At this point only rough studies and plans are provided.

Still to come are cost estimates, more hearings, and eventual letting of the contracts. This can actually take years.

The Hicksville program was originally and tentatively estimated as a project costing less than a half million dollars. Today, after the passage of all these years, it may run into more than five million dollars.

Sadly, it must be noted that the record is almost devoid of any substantial effort by our Town Board over the years to move along this program which is of such grave concern to the forgotten people they "serve" in Hicksville.

(This is the fourth of a series of articles on New York State Income Taxes.)

MEDICAL EXPENSES: Medical expenses and life insurance premiums are the only personal family or living expenses which are deductible. The deduction includes medical expenses of the taxpayer, his wife, or dependents which exceed 5% of net income up to a maximum of \$1,500 for a joint return or head of a family, and a maximum of \$750 for an individual return. If your medical expenses have been compensated by insurance they are not deductible. Premiums paid for accident, health, and hospitalization insurance are deductible.

MISCELLANEOUS DEDUCTIONS: Travel and entertainment expenses incurred in your employer's business and not reimbursed are deductible. Commutation expenses are never deductible. Bad debts arising out of personal loans and properly substantiated may be deducted. Periodic payments of alimony ordered and paid under a decree of legal separation or divorce are likewise deductible.

CAPITAL GAINS AND LOSSES: Capital gains and losses are reported on page four of the return. Capital losses are deducted from capital gains to arrive at a

net capital gain. The tax rates are one-half the rates on ordinary income. No exemption is permitted unless the net income reported on page one is less than the personal exemption, in which case the unused portion of the exemption may be offset against net capital gain. If a net capital loss results it may be carried over and deducted from net capital gains in returns of the next succeeding five years. The loss on sale of a personal residence is allowed as a capital loss deduction. The basic is cost plus permanent improvements and depreciation need not be deducted. If a gain results the tax may be referred if a new home is purchased or construction begun within six months of the sale of the old residence. If the new home costs less than the old one that part of the gain is taxable at the capital gains rate.

NON-TAXABLE INCOME

- 1. Death benefits paid by an employer under a contract not to exceed \$5,000.
2. Supper money given by an employer.
3. Uniforms supplied by an employer.

DIFFERENCES BETWEEN FEDERAL AND STATE LAWS

CAPITAL LOSSES: Under the State Law losses may be subtracted from gains only and not applied against ordinary income.

NET OPERATING LOSS: New York State has no provisions for carrying forward or backward net operating loss to another year.

OPTIONAL STANDARD DEDUCTION: The federal maximum is \$1,000 while New York State's is \$500. An individual reporting business income reduced by operating expenses may not use the optional standard deduction for State tax purposes.

Q. The Bureau of Internal Revenue checked my 1951 tax return and I had to pay additional taxes. Do I have to report the change to the State?

Q. Are the Social Security taxes I paid for my maid deductible?
A. Yes.

"Chaos" They Say!

The County Board of Supervisors says that "chaos" will result from the indiscriminate annexation of unincorporated areas to villages. If that is so, they can blame only themselves and their predecessors. Indiscriminate Establishment of overlapping special service districts is the real cause—not annexation to incorporated villages. This possibility has been pointed out several times in this column, and now the supervisors have made it official.

Appeal To Governor

The occasion was a brief to Gov. Dewey urging him to make it even more difficult for hamlet areas to join home rule villages. The supervisors want it fixed so that they can decide for the people that want home rule whether or not it is "good for them". After all, Page Supervisor knows best! Experiences like the one former Supervisor Ransom had with our Hicksville home rule plea are not good for a supervisor's peace of mind. It's not good to get people riled up and interested in their government. If they get riled up enough, they might even want to run their own affairs. And where would that leave the supervisor and his colleagues on the township board? To avoid this unhappy situation they want to be able to turn down any home rule movements for any or no reason while they hide behind a "public best interest" policy.

Looking Ahead

There is little doubt about the superiority of home rule versus hamlet communities. We can see the physical evidence when we compare our public facilities with those of the home rule villages. We can see it even better when we compare tax bills. Nassau County is a house divided with almost half the population in home rule communities, and the other half in hamlets. Hamlets may have been fine when most of the county was rural. But now the rural days are gone forever. But the hamlets linger on—like a horse and buggy in the atomic age. With increased population, there is bound to be greater and greater interest in home rule.

And, to be on the safe side, the politicians are seeking to nip in the bud any additions to the home rule ranks. Think it over, and decide if you want "public best interest" thrown in your face when you want improvements for your community.

Republicans Get Report on Albany

HICKSVILLE—Assemblyman John J. Burns, was guest speaker at the Republican Club meeting in the Masonic Temple, Friday night. Burns, during his talk covered a great many subjects, dwelling in particular on the methods and procedures of the Assembly while in session. He explained caucuses as private groups, meeting together and in a series of debates, ironing out minor issues surrounding bills to be presented on the floor of the Legislature.

He spoke of the three years just concluded as being "very productive" as to the number of bills, documents and changes that were wrought. He told the GOP Club that a bill is now "in the works" to establish a 15 man committee to study education matters, that special emergency school aid for one year will be \$1½ million for Nassau, and although this is not definitely established, it seems likely Hicksville's share will be about \$70,000.

He said he and several others were disappointed when the compulsory insurance measure was turned down by the Senate but felt that perhaps the defeat might not have "too much significance". Of the Auto Inspection bill, that was passed, Burns said that there will be approximately 1,500 stations with trained mechanics, to inspect automobiles and that this should eliminate cars with violations, thereby reducing some accidents. This method has been used with great success in Pennsylvania and N. Y. it has been fashioned from it.

Assemblyman Burns went into detail on Hicksville's presently most important problem—R.R. grade crossings and elimination of same. He explained that the Town Board, had made efforts on this as far back as 1941, but at that time the County, had put the local project in Section No. 2, deeming other town's problems much more serious.

The bill has now been passed by the Assembly and the Senate and is on the Governor's desk, awaiting his signature. Burns urged that, all the residents write as soon as possible, requesting the Governor to sign without delay.


