Refuse Lebkuecher Gas Station Permit

OYSTER BAY.—The application of Anna Lebkuecher for permission to operate a gasoline station on Old Country Rd. at Lee Pl. was rejected by the Town Board, late Tuesday. The application had been protested by residents of the neighborhood when it came up for a public hearing two weeks ago. Leading the opposition was the Duffy Park Civic Assoc. The Board of Education had also registered opposition since the site is across the street from the Old Country Rd. School.

The Town Board on Tuesday also turned down the application for a store change at Jericho to permit a "Little Madison Square Garden" which had also been vigorously opposed by Jericho and Westbury civic groups. Site of the sports arena was proposed near the Coca Cola plant on Brush Hollow Rd. off Jericho Tpk.

Also turned down was an application for business zoning on property near the corner of South Oyster Bay and Woodbury Rd.

Judge Sentences Harbes May 4

MINEOLA—John G. Harbes, former Plainview Water Commissioner, will be sentenced May 4 by Judge Paul J. Whalen in District Court here on the charge that he was improperly paid \$658 for services to the district while a commissioner. The jury found him guilty of a misdemeanor, Wednesday, after four hours of deliberation. Harbes who lost out in the 1951 district election, had submitted the bill for service calls, meter reading and other work. He was commissioner for 20 years. A second charge, involving a larger sum, was dismissed by Judge Whidell.

Propose Limit on New Parking Lot

HICKSVILLE—The new parking field no. 3 behind the Professional Bldg., with entrances from Broadway and E. Barclay St., is about ready, according to Councilman Frank Chlumsky. As soon as it is officially accepted by the township, the Town Board proposes to enact a 2-hour parking limit to determine if it will be used by shoppers. If shoppers fail to take advantage of the field, which is near both bayside, the limit may be lifted to permit its use by commuters, Chlumsky said.

Movie Benefit For New Parish

HICKSVILLE—The Hicksville Theatre has been rented for Tuesday, May 11, afternoon and evening performances by Our Lady of Mercy RC Parish of Plainview. By arrangement with the management, the Parish is holding a benefit showing of "The Secret Conclave", a film dramatization of the life of Pope Pius X, with Henry Viden playing the starring part of the revered Pontiff who died at the start of World War I. The film was made with Vatican approval.

Tickets for the four afternoon and evening showings on May 11 are only available from members of Our Lady of Mercy Parish. No box office admissions will be sold.

Civics Change Night for Meeting

HICKSVILLE—Duffy Park Civics Assoc. monthly meeting, at the Old Country Road School will be changed from the regular last Thursday of the month date to Tuesday, April 27.

This change is necessary because Old Country Road School facilities will be used for School Registration Thursday, April 29.

This meeting that will start at 8:30 P.M. sharp will be devoted mainly to discussion of local civic problems and no guest speaker appears on the agenda to date.

HICKSVILLE—Probably the only joint appearance of all candidates for the Board of Education on the same platform will take place next Tuesday night, Apr. 27, at the high school auditorium on Jerusalem Ave. under the auspices of the Council of P-TA units. The session starts at 8:30 PM and all residents are invited.

Expected to appear are Larry Rooman and Joseph Cawley, candidates for the three-year term caused by the expiration of the term of Henry C. Brengel who is not running; also Mrs. Edna Sutton and Charles DeShaw, candidates for the three-year term caused by the expiration of the term of Mrs. Sutton.

Voting takes place on May 5 from 4 to 10 PM at four polling places (See map elsewhere in this issue). All voters must register personally either this Saturday, Apr. 24, from 2 to 10 PM or Thursday, Apr. 26, from 4 to 10 PM at the four polling places.

BRENGEL SAYS 'LAST WORD'

Szendy 'Life Story' Deadlocks Board

HICKSVILLE—A special meeting of the Board of Education came to an abrupt halt, Wednesday night, by ruling of President Henry C. Brengel. The vacation-absence of Trustee Richard Schoel left the board deadlocked, two and two; as Trustee Emil J. Szendy pushed for answers to his questions regarding preparation and circulation of a report on his personal life.

"I don't intend to be cross-examined by you," Brengel said to Szendy as he adjourned the meeting.

Earlier, Szendy had brought up the matter of the report and its circulation. District Clerk Andrew B. Heberer read Szendy's three-page statement which had been published in full in Tuesday's Herald, demanding an apology from Brengel and Mrs. Edna Sutton.

TIED VOTE

A motion to have the matter discussed by the board was offered by Szendy and seconded by Arthur Eirich. Mrs. Sutton voted against the motion and Chairman Brengel declared the vote tied. As Szendy insisted upon speaking on the question, Brengel ruled he was out of order.

Eirich insisted that it be shown

on the record that he knew nothing about the source of the report, although he had seen it.

Brengel stated that he had nothing to do with the preparation of the report, that to the best of his knowledge it was not provided by anyone in the school district employ, and as far as he is concerned it "never has been and never will be" paid for with school district funds.

Mrs. Sutton insisted that it is "not legal board business" to discuss the matter, she believes that Mr. Brengel is telling the truth in his comments to Szendy and that to her knowledge the report was not paid for with district funds.

Szendy persisted in questioning Brengel and wanted to know if it

"was possible" that Charles H. Stoll, special attorney for the district in defending the board on the attorney fee question, had provided the report? Brengel insisted

Award New High School Contracts

HICKSVILLE—Contracts totaling \$3,443,810 for the construction of the new high school building on Division Ave were awarded by the Board of Education at a special meeting, Wednesday night. The decision to award the contracts, upon the recommendation of Architects Knapp and Johnson to the lowest bidders in six categories, followed a report from Govt. Statistical Corp. that the

project is not eligible for special federal construction aid. It had been hoped that over \$400,000 would come to the district in federal aid.

Occupancy of the new high school by the fall of 1955 is anticipated and the work of clearing the grounds may start in a matter of days. Voters in March, 1953, approved the expenditure of not more than \$3,900,000 for the pro-

ject. Bonds have not been sold as yet.

Castagna & Son Inc is the general contractor with a bid of \$2,381,993 for the general contract on the 66 room three-story structure.

Other contracts awarded are: Frank Lentini Cont. Corp. \$170,880, Martone Sewage Disposal Co. \$24,770, Willner Heating Co. Inc. \$881,694, Robert Miller and Sons \$146,496, and Geoco Electric Cont. Corp. \$337,977.

Mrs. Sutton, Cawley Team-Up; Voters Register on Saturday

HICKSVILLE—With the first registration for voters this Saturday, Apr. 24, two of the candidates for the Board of Education announced they will "conduct their campaign as a slate". Edna Sutton, seeking re-election, has decided to team up with Joseph Cawley from the Levitt section.


Cawley is running for the position being vacated by Henry C. Brengel who is not a candidate.

Lawrence Roman, who took the School Board before the State Commissioner of Education on the question of "excessive" school attorney fees who has not as yet rendered a decision, is also a candidate for the Board to succeed Brengel. Opposing Mrs. Sutton is Charles De Shaw.

Mrs. Sutton gave Cawley a complimentary build-up in announcing she is teaming up with Roman's opponent. "Mr. Cawley", she said, "has been active in local school affairs for over a year and has served as an active member of the Advisory Committee since August. In that capacity he has familiarized himself with various phases of the building program and many of the requisites for sound expansion."

ATTENDS MEETINGS
"In my capacity as Board liaison member of the committee, I have had ample opportunity to observe Mr. Cawley's performance and the quality of his decisions. Although he and I have had differences of opinion, I have always had reason to believe that his objective approach, careful analysis and sincerity could not be questioned. His frequent attendance at Board meetings has given him considerable understanding of a board member's work, and I feel that he has the ability, time and energy to serve well."

commitments to any group or to any individual. We simply promise the community that we will do our utmost to serve in the best interests of the school district."

Cawley also decided he likes the idea of running with Mrs. Sutton but said nothing about commitments. He commented: "I have observed Mrs. Sutton's work on the Board for some time, and I admire her progressive attitude and capacity for work. The district more than ever is in need of her experience and interest. I am happy to run with Mrs. Sutton and I know we will serve the community well."

In teaming with Cawley, it was noted, Mrs. Sutton has indicated her disapproval of Roman as a candidate. The committee working to elect Roman to the Board, today pointed out that Mrs. Sutton is on record as stating "that the matter of attorney fees has created a question in the minds of only a handful—a very small number of people in our district. It is regrettable that the few persistent ones appear to find it necessary to close their minds to reason and choose, for reasons that may be remote from the subject, to carry the question to these extremes" (appeal to the Commissioner at Albany). "It is heartening that the one dissenting new board member has so small a following."

(Emil Szendy has agreed with Roman in opposition to the attorney fee arrangement).

LOCALIZE CONTROL?

Regarding Cawley, the committee working for Roman points out that Cawley is credited with "masterminding" the campaign last year which elected Ehrlich and School to the Board. Richard Schuel lives on Grape Lane, the next block over from Cawley's home on Glow Lane.

Roman's backers foresee an attempt to localize the control and membership of the Board of Education in a small section of the district, down near the southerly boundary line. All present Board members, with the exception of Brengel, reside in the area south of Old Country Rd.

"I believe trustees should represent as far as possible the people in all sections of our school district," Roman states. His home address is Notre Dame Ave. off North Broadway.

Co-campaign chairman for Roman are Florence Vryni of 10 Basing Lane and William Oltatay of 75 Sleepy Lane.

Pre-Budget Hearing Is Useful

The "advance Budget Discussion" held by the Plainview Board of Education Tuesday night proved its worth both to the district's residents and to the school trustees. The Manetto Hill auditorium held about 150 of the Plainview's residents and as a result of the friendly but lively discussion on the proposed budget everyone involved benefitted by the interchange of ideas.

In this writer's humble opinion it is a much better way of doing things and far outstrips the cold, impersonal method of presenting a budget and voting on it the same night. That method creates considerable misunderstanding on the part of the residents because insufficient time is allowed to digest and comprehend the need for funds in the various categories of the



school budget.

The school budget in itself is a complicated affair and the more time the residents have to pursue it and understand the many operations covered by the budget the greater the benefit to the school system and to the populace in general.

In addition it gives the local Board of Education an opportunity to expose the budget to the public in advance of the annual meeting in order that items thought to be controversial can be thoroughly aired and the proper preparation made for the annual meeting.

Since no one Board member or the Board as a whole can be expected to have all of the answers all of the time, the establishment of a policy to hold "advance budget discussion" sessions is something that deserves considerable thought by the Board of Education.

CURRENT COMMENT: Time To Think About Taxes

By Fred J. Noeth

THE TIME HAS COME to speak plainly on the subject of school taxes. This is the time of the year when you, as a property owner, should be concerned about taxes and tax bills.

You will not get a tax bill this week or next. But decisions made by you, and your neighbors in the coming two weeks will determine how much taxes you must pay for the operation of our public education system when bills arrive around Sept. 1 and in succeeding years.

Let it be clearly understood: We are not opposed to expenditures for the education of our children. The writer's activities in relation to the expansion program of the Hicksville School District, in particular, are on the record. We have been and continue to serve as secretary of the Citizens' Advisory Committee on Education. We are familiar with the Columbia Report and its recommendations: We have urged our readers to vote for each bond issue for new school construction to date. But we have also found it necessary to warn readers that the decision is theirs and all of us must eventually share the tax burden.

We have been disturbed to hear the clear statements and recommendations of the Columbia Report, and its revisions, distorted and misquoted. We sounded off last month when we felt the people were not given the full story of what the additions to the four new schools would mean. The presentation of that "pie in the sky" selling job WAS NOT the work of the Advisory Committee. It was the project of a special self-appointed "referendum committee", the membership of which included some people who are also on the advisory committee.

On May 4th we will have the privilege of voting on the expenditure of money to operate our schools in the year 1954-55. In order that we may vote, we must register personally either this Saturday, Apr. 24 or Thursday, Apr. 29. On May 5th we will elect two of our neighbors as members of the Board of Education. (Plainview, Jericho, Bethpage are also electing board candidates at the same time).

We are indebted to the local League of Women Voters for the following concise summary of School Board powers and duties: "A School Board is a corporate body which owns all school property. It can erect and maintain buildings, and employ teachers, etc. It can contract for transportation of pupils and purchase busses for transportation when so authorized by vote. It can adopt courses of study and textbooks. It can raise money for schools by PROPERTY TAXES."

Taxes is the subject we started with and taxes is the subject we want to emphasize. We had the privilege this week, as the guest of William E. Koutensky, president of the Long Island National Bank of Hicksville, to attend an informal luncheon at the Garden City Hotel arranged for a group of the county's prominent bankers, industrialists and businessmen: Garth A. Shoemaker of Elmira, president of the Citizens Public Expenditure Survey, Inc., a state-wide taxpayers association that spearheads the fight for economy in government, spoke on the subject of taxes.

He made this comment which should be posted on every school house door the evening of May 4: "Taxation follows spending, just as surely as night follows day."

What we as taxpayers approve in the way of expenditures—either by favorable vote or by staying away when questions are submitted to vote—we must pay.

"Pie in the sky" promises will not satisfy the tax collector. Mr. Shoemaker told the group, Wednesday, that spending pressures in Albany and local municipalities are increasing.

What we as taxpayers approve in the way of expenditures must be paid for in tax dollars. We are not urging a ruthless taxpayer assault on the school budget. We are urging each and every taxpayer to get the facts, get a copy of the budget (it will be at the office of your public school principal starting Monday, according to law), attend the annual meeting.

But beyond our amateur appraisal of the proposed budget—a record three million dollars—we must also evaluate the candidates for the School Board and their attitude on expenditures and the taxpayers' money.

This week we found that the new high school is not eligible for federal construction aid. Our school facility situation is not considered "critical enough". As a matter of fact, we heard the report at the Board meeting that new home building and occupancy here is NOT moving ahead at the pace which seemed certain only a few months ago.

Let us give our children the best possible education within our means. Let us also be practical and weigh our desires against our ability to pay. Let's be realistic. We get nothing for nothing.

A half million dollars, or one sixth of the entire budget for next year, is required to pay off bond and interest installments coming due next year. Our bond schedule now runs ahead to 1985. We have not begun to get the bill for the high school (\$3,900,000) nor the four additions (\$2,400,000) because these bonds have not as yet been sold. Ahead of us are other construction projects.

Remember the words of Mr. Shoemaker: "Taxation follows spending, just as surely as night follows day", and be guided accordingly.

Such a man has little or no respect for the laws of either man or God. Such a man wants to make his own laws. Of such men are dictators made.

This "Quick Cure—All" can be made to appear both good and practical. To the irreligious, the cynic, to the lazy thinkers, and to others, who may tend to despise the slow sure ways of democracy, it may come as a welcomed relief from what they would term a "do nothing" philosophy. Such people, perhaps without realizing it, are deserting their moral and political democratic principles for expediency. They are joining the unholy chorus, telling the world that the way to freedom and justice is through the death of liberty.

Our way of life will prevail only so long as we continue to follow the laws of God, and the democratic philosophy of our heritage. If we desert our moral and political principles, for expediency—we shall sink to the degenerate level of our most evil antagonist.

In order that we may vote, we must register personally either this Saturday, Apr. 24 or Thursday, Apr. 29. On May 5th we will elect two of our neighbors as members of the Board of Education. (Plainview, Jericho, Bethpage are also electing board candidates at the same time).

We are indebted to the local League of Women Voters for the following concise summary of School Board powers and duties: "A School Board is a corporate body which owns all school property. It can erect and maintain buildings, and employ teachers, etc. It can contract for transportation of pupils and purchase buses for transportation when so authorized by vote. It can adopt courses of study and textbooks. It can raise money for schools by PROPERTY TAXES."

Taxes is the subject we started with and taxes is the subject we want to emphasize. We had the privilege this week, as the guest of William E. Koutensky, president of the Long Island National Bank of Hicksville, to attend an informal luncheon at the Garden City Hotel arranged for a group of the county's prominent bankers, industrialists and business men, Garth A. Shoemaker of Elmira, president of the Citizens Public Expenditure Survey, Inc., a state-wide taxpayers association that spearheads the fight for economy in government, spoke on the subject of taxes.

He made this comment which should be posted on every school house door the evening of May 4: "Taxation follows spending, just as surely as night follows day."

What we as taxpayers approve in the way of expenditures—either by favorable vote or by staying away when questions are submitted to vote—we must pay.

"Pie in the sky" promises will not satisfy the tax collector. Mr. Shoemaker told the group, Wednesday, that spending pressures in Albany and local municipalities are increasing.

What we as taxpayers approve in the way of expenditures must be paid for in tax dollars. We are not urging a ruthless taxpayer assault on the school budget. We are urging each and every taxpayer to get the facts, get a copy of the budget (it will be at the office of your public school principal starting Monday, according to law), attend the annual meeting.

But beyond our amateur appraisal of the proposed budget—a record three million dollars—we must also evaluate the candidates for the School Board and their attitude on expenditures and the taxpayers' money.

This week we found that the new high school is not eligible for federal construction aid. Our school facility situation is not considered "critical enough". As a matter of fact, we heard the report at the Board meeting that new home building and occupancy here is NOT moving ahead at the pace which seemed certain only a few months ago.

Let us give our children the best possible education within our means. Let us also be practical and weigh our desires against our ability to pay. Let's be realistic. We get nothing for nothing.

A half million dollars, or one sixth of the entire budget for next year, is required to pay off bond and interest installments coming due next year. Our bond schedule now runs ahead to 1985. We have not begun to get the bill for the high school (\$3,900,000) nor the four additions (\$2,400,000) because these bonds have not as yet been sold. Ahead of us are other construction projects.

Remember the words of Mr. Shoemaker: "Taxation follows spending, just as surely as night follows day", and be guided accordingly.

When any man attempts to convince us that his purposes are so good, that any means he may employ to achieve those purposes are justified, then that map will bear much watching. Because that man is both evil and untrustworthy. When any man admits, or we instinctively know, that the methods he uses or proposes to use, are either immoral or unjust, then we should immediately know that he is evil. He may be evil only through ignorance, but nevertheless, he is evil and completely untrustworthy.

Such a man has already deserted, for a "Quick

Cure—All," the American tradition. He has embraced the communist and fascist philosophy that suspends morality and the due processes of law. He, using the same excuse as communism, claims we must suspend our democratic principles to "quickly" and "surely" survive in these perilous times.

Such a man has little or no respect for the laws of either man or God. Such a man wants to make his own laws. Of such men are dictators made.

This "Quick Cure—All" can be made to appear both good and practical. To the irreligious, the cynic, to the lazy thinkers, and to others, who may tend to despise the slow sure ways of democracy, it may come as a welcomed relief from what they would term a "do nothing" philosophy. Such people, perhaps without realizing it, are deserting their moral and political democratic principles for expediency. They are joining the unholy chorus, telling the world that the way to freedom and justice is through the death of liberty.

Our way of life will prevail only so long as we continue to follow the laws of God, and the democratic philosophy of our forefathers. If we desert our moral and political principles, for expediency—we shall sink to the degenerate level of our most evil antagonist.
