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State Dept. Dimisses Attorney Fee Appeal

ALBANY—A few weeks short of a year after the action was started, the State Dept. of Education this week dismissed the appeal taken by Lawrence A. Roman, as a taxpayer, regarding the attorney fee arrangement of the Hicksville Board of Education. Roman, who was joined by Board Member Emil J. Szendy, had claimed the fee arrangement between the Hicksville Board and Attorney Michael J. Sullivan, based on a percentage of bond issues, was "unreasonably high."

James E. Allen Jr., acting Commissioner of Education, who conducted a hearing on the matter here last Summer, wrote that he found "nothing in the record" to justify interfering with the action of the board and stressed that "a contract between a Board of Education and an attorney for professional services is a matter within the province of the respective parties."

Roman said he was so disturbed by the import of the decision that he preferred to issue a formal statement after he has had the opportunity to weigh the matter. "What is disturbing," he stated, "is the fact that the only avenue open to the residents of this community to prevent the squandering of the taxpayers' money in connection with our schools, is to awaken our community to the realization that in order for them to protect themselves, they must take a greater interest in the election of trustees to the Board of Education."

The decision is dated Monday, Apr. 26, and was served locally by mail on Tuesday.

1,765 to Get Polio Test Shots

HICKSVILLE—Parental requests for participation of their children in the polio vaccine field trial, scheduled to start next week, have been received here for about 55 per cent of the total number eligible. Dr. E. H. LeBarron, school superintendent, reports that 1,765 children in public and parochial schools here will receive the injections next week, again the weeks of May 10 and June 10. School physicians and nurses are cooperating in giving injections, he added. In Nassau county it is estimated participation will run about 60 per cent of those eligible.

CD Office Open Tuesday Nights

HICKSVILLE—Civil Defense headquarters in the Firehouse basement on E. Marie St will be open every Tuesday night from 8 to 11 P.M. it was announced today by Col. William M. Godfrey, new CD director of the area. CD business and signing of applicants for service in the organization is the reason for the opening of headquarters weekly, he said. The county CD has announced that alarms will sound at about 1 o'clock Monday morning, June 14, in a test alert and people will take cover and await CD authority instructions. The test is part of the nationwide CD exercises on June 14 and 15.

HICKSVILLE—The final Senior High P.T.A. dance for this year will take place on Saturday night, May 1 at 8 o'clock in the High School Gym. This dance is called the May Hop and will be a Sadie Hawkins Dance.

Acting as chaperones will be E. Irving Jenner, Miss Jessie DeMonaco and Mrs. Fallon. If anyone is interested in chaperoning for next season, call Mrs. Fallon at Hicksville 4-3177. Chaperones must be parents of Senior High students. Fathers and mothers both are needed.

Assets of Banks at New Peak

HICKSVILLE—Total assets of the two local banks have increased more than six million dollars in the past 12 months, including almost two million dollars gained since the beginning of the year, it was noted today as the Long Island National Bank reported assets of \$21,055,825.70 at the close of business on Apr. 15, and the Bank of Hicksville \$16,210,040.81 on the same day. The total reported for both banks is over 37 million dollars. A year ago the total reported for both banks was \$31 million. In January the total was nearly \$36 million.

SMALL TURNOUT TUESDAY:

Drive on for Record Vote Wednesday

HICKSVILLE—The School Board elections here entered a final phase today as supporters of opposing pairs of candidates sought to promote a record-breaking vote. Three candidates spoke and discussed relative issues at a lightly attended forum at the high school, Tuesday night, sponsored by the P-TA Council. Speakers were Joseph Cawley, Lawrence A. Roman, Jerome Zettler, as candidates, and Audrey Sutton for her mother, Edna Sutton. Charles De-Shaw who has announced withdrawal from the contest was present but did not speak.

Mrs. Harold E. Phillips, vice-president of the P-TA Council, presided. Cawley took nearly a half hour to detail his platform (published in full in Herald) and urge election of himself and Mrs. Sutton, whom he referred to as a "fighting lady", as a team. Miss Sutton read a prepared statement.

Roman and Zettler, who are teamed in opposing the Cawley-Sutton slate, told of their position urging economy while maintaining the highest educational standards.

Roman said that he is in complete agreement with the Columbia Report on the school building requirements, but felt the public should be given the full truth on costs and not "deliberated confused and frightened with threats of triple sessions while being promised something for nothing."

He noted that forecasts of a \$6 school tax rate have been made, that forthcoming equalization rate changes in the state may seriously effect state aid and objected to "sugar coating" of bond issue questions by talk of "debt service" cost while giving the impression that such charges were the full cost.

Zettler also urged greater district-wide representation on the school board and felt that construction should be possible without interference on such important matters as adequate school construction and teaching salaries.

Majority of the questions directed at Roman and Zettler came from people actively identified as comprising the "Parents Committee for the Election of Joseph Cawley", including Milton Leavitt, Jack Drutman, Joseph Mulqueen and John Ehrenfeld. Allen Carpenter, former board member, raised the only questions asked of Cawley.

Less than 100 attended the session. Comments of speakers were tape-recorded by the Mid-Island Herald with the permission of the candidates.

Only persons who have registered will be eligible to vote for two trustees, for three-year terms each, next Wednesday, May 5, between 4 and 10 P.M. in four districts.

Results of the election will be announced at the high school by the Board of Education after 10:30 P.M. on Wednesday.

Daughter Gives Candidate's Statement in School Race

HICKSVILLE—Audrey Sutton, 19-year-old college student daughter of Edna Sutton, will make speaking appearances for her mother if candidate meetings are arranged in the week remaining until the election on Wednesday, May 5. Mrs. Sutton who is a candidate for re-election, left Sunday for Minnesota and is not expected home for a week or more. She and her husband, Wilson Sutton, are both undergoing treatments at the Mayo Clinic. Audrey appeared at the P-TA Council program at the high school, Tuesday night, and read her mother's campaign statement which said she is running and her record and endorsed her running mate, Joseph Cawley.

Szendy and Sullivan Clash on Legal Fees

HICKSVILLE—There was a sharp exchange of comments between School Trustee Emil Szendy and School Attorney Michael J. Sullivan, Wednesday night, when Szendy voted "no" on Sullivan's latest bill of \$13,500 for legal services on the high school project.

It was reported to the Board that the attorney has thus far been paid 75 per cent of his \$37,000 fee on the high school project. The exchange followed an informal report by Sullivan that he had been served with a copy of the State Education Commissioner decision on the "attorney fee question appeal". He thought the Board would get the official report from its special attorney on this action, Charles H. Skoll.

STILL OBJECTS

Szendy said as Sullivan presented his bill for payment, "I still consider the fees 'excessive'. With the balance due on the Woodland Ave. school, he will receive \$20,000 to \$23,000 this year. He was paid about \$10,000 last year. I vote no."

Sullivan retorted "Mr. Szendy voted 'no' on legally binding obligations of the district and continues to vote no even though the Commissioner has dismissed the appeal. I feel this action of a board member in voting no is very improper conduct for a board member."

"Whether the commissioner dismisses the appeal or not," Szendy answered, "does not affect the question. The matter of attorney fees is one for the board members to decide and I disagree with the balance of the board voting no."

President Henry C. Bregel had consented to let Sullivan make his

comments into the record. When Trustee Arthur Erich wondered if the decision to put something into the record should not be with agreement of the entire board, Sullivan withdrew his request and said "I can accomplish the same thing in a letter to the board."

Since the new high school fund, temporarily established pending the sale of the \$5,000,000 bond issue, is inadequate to cover Sullivan's bill, it was decided to borrow \$9,000 from the LI National Bank.

The exchange between Szendy and Sullivan continued when the question of the Fox Plumbing suit (Continued on Page 16)

Plainview Tank Ready by July 1

PLAINVIEW—Now under construction is a million and a quarter gallon water storage tank for the water district which may become the highest tank in this part of Long Island. The giant tank will rise 140 feet above the ground and sit upon a hill, 240 feet above sea level. Superintendent John Trask who went to the top of the 85-foot stand pipe now under construction said he had clear vision for miles and miles.

The Board of Water Commissioners expects the tank will be finished and in service by July 1. Crews are working on the job six days a week, nine hours a day. The huge tank, the first for the district, stands on Schwartzboeck's Hill behind the Mannetto Hill School.

Sharp Increase in Single Sessions

HICKSVILLE—Actual work on the new 66-room high school off Division Ave. got underway at the site, Tuesday, with stripping and stockpiling of top soil. At the school board meeting the next evening, an informal report was made indicating the possibility of occupancy of the structure by Sept. of next year.

Forty-two per cent of the pupils in the district from the kindergarten thru sixth grade are today on full daily sessions in the system was the encouraging report of Dr. E. H. LeBarron, superintendent of schools.

"We have improved our position quite a bit," he said, noting that less than 20 per cent of the students were on single or full sessions before the opening of Woodland Ave School on Apr. 12.

He announced that dedication of the new elementary school will take place on Sunday afternoon, June 8.

Development of a stagger system at Lee Ave School it was reported, has aided in getting more district children on full sessions. The board is considering a recommendation of Stanton Miller, administrative assistant to the superintendent, on some revision in the plans for the additions to the

four small schools which it is believed will make it possible to work out effective staggering or overlapping schedules in those buildings.

On the overlapping schedule, the school day for one group starts at 8:15 and ends at 2:30, while a second group starts at 10:15 and runs to 4:30.

Architects Knappe and Johnson have been directed to "look into it" and prepare some plans.

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Important Date for You Tuesday

 Next Tuesday evening, May 4, Plainview will hold its annual school district meeting. Other mid-island school districts will also be conducting their annual meetings on the same date. Since the school districts comprising the mid-island section are for the most part continuing to experience substantial population growth, perhaps it's well to review the purpose of these annual sessions.



The annual meeting, with possibly one exception—the election for school board candidates, is probably the most important school conference of the year. It takes on this vital aspect because the school budget which projects the funds required for the operation of the school system for the ensuing year is discussed and approved by the residents.

Each school district has its own budget. In most cases it is prepared by the chief administrative officer of the school system and the budgetary requirements are dependent on such factors as the number of students in the system, number of teachers required, amount of textbooks and related supplies needed and the number of schools owned by the district's residents.

Other items included in the financial projection include the size of the custodial staff and operating equipment, transportation, improvement to existing buildings and grounds and health facilities. All of these factors in addition to the district's current outstanding debt and pension responsibilities make up the principal costs of operating a school system.

The money needed to operate the schools comes from the residents' pocketbooks, state aid, emergency funds and in some cases districts, federal grants.

The emergency state aid is a yearly grant based on laws passed at the previous session of the state legislature. All districts must wait until the formula for the disposition of the emergency moneys is made public in order to determine whether or not they will be included in the grant.

There is never a guarantee that the state legislature will pass an emergency aid law. As

a matter of fact, it's this writer's opinion that in the foreseeable future emergency moneys from the state will diminish and some other method of assisting financially hard-pressed districts will have to be found.

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Tax Warning Is Serious

THESE ARE DIFFICULT days to separate fact from rumor, gossip, and fiction which fills the air during the remaining hours until the votes are counted and the members of our school boards are legally determined. At this point, even the choice of words are being weighed, clarified and analyzed. Truth and accuracy seem very elusive.

Between the election of Joseph Cawley and Lawrence Roman to the Hicksville board to succeed Henry C. Brengel we appear to have a clean-cut choice. Mr. Cawley, for us, represents a persistent minority of the community which only a few years ago was trying to tell us the debt construction cost in our community could not possibly exceed 70 cents per \$100. And yet, Mr. Cawley himself stated publicly, Tuesday night, the debt service portion of the new budget is \$1.12. What happened to the seven-mill law?

We feel this same minority is wrong about building requirements of the community. This element tried to tell the community only last month that triple class sessions (lasting till 7 at night) can be expected in Sept. 1955. And yet, right at this moment (see page 1) 42 per cent of our elementary pupils are on single sessions, and the picture is getting progressively better.

And so with other questions. Mr. Roman, because he is outspoken on questions of taxation, is falsely painted by that vocal element as being "against good educational practices." Nothing could be further from the truth.

Tax problems are complicated. Mr. Roman on Tuesday night warned that new equalization rates are scheduled by the State which could have a seriously adverse effect upon us all as taxpayers.

The State Commissioner of Education writes in a letter which all school boards are expected to have read at the annual meeting Tuesday night—and which will probably not be read in Hicksville, since this annual message has traditionally been ignored—on this very subject:

"New equalization rates", Commissioner Wilson warns, "are being announced for all communities of the State. These rates will ultimately have an effect on the amount of money raised through local taxation, as well as determining the apportionment of state aid to the school districts of the State. I would most urgently recommend that you"—and he is writing for the public at the annual meeting—"study very carefully the effect of these new equalization rates on the possible financing of education in your district."

Mr. Wilson also makes this concluding statement which can be related to the verdict of his department earlier this week on the attorney fee question—"The final responsibility for schools is in your hands." The attorney fee decision said in effect: "The board made the arrangement and the people elect the board."

We should also say something about the views of Richard Schoel, member of the School Board, published elsewhere on this page. He takes exception to two words—"self appointed"—in our long editorial which discussed this vital question of school taxation and the responsibility of the people to themselves as parents and taxpayers. We had also said the facts in the Columbia Report had been distorted, but he made no objections. We had protested promises of something for nothing, but he made no objections.

As for his protests on "self appointment", we offer this footnote. The Referendum Committee, so-called, was not appointed by the school board and it was not appointed by the advisory committee. Therefore, in our view, it was very plainly self-appointed. We do not object to people working for those things in which they honestly believe, but we do object to their masquerading as an official agency when they are not.

We need a man of Mr. Roman's ability and calibre on the School Board.

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In People's Corner

If the best schools in the world were in Hicksville, it would do your children no good, if you could not afford to live here. Is this startling? But a truer fact will never be known. Truth cannot always be ignored, just because it may not be present.

All over our state schools are being built by the hundreds. In every community—good people say, "The state will pay for them". Never, never forget that we are the state. While we have the freedom to dodge some of our democratic responsibilities, none of us can dodge death or taxes. We can put off death for a life-time, but taxes won't wait even for a year or two.

When the state debt becomes too heavy for the politicians—when the state tax becomes so heavy that the people start demanding relief, or a new governor, the load will be transferred back to the counties, and the communities. This can be done tomorrow, next month, next year—but mark my prediction, it will be done, and sooner than is generally expected.

You are told by all the irresponsible "hair-brained Harrys" that new construction cannot cost us over a fixed percentage of our assessed valuation, and since we have reached that point, new construction can cost us nothing more. Nothing however can prevent a reassessment of property values. In 1949 assessments were at full 100% of value. Because of the subsequent increase in real estate values, our present assessment is now generally less than 40% of real value. Without warning, a new assessment policy can be put into effect. It has been done before

It will be done again. Such a policy would transfer back to each school district 100% more of the bonded debt charges. Such a policy would reduce the tax rate, but increase the number of dollars we would pay in taxes. This would apply to all taxes, not just school taxes.

I hope you have heard of this before—it will be easier to understand, and may come as less of a shock.

In our community, we have already approved almost \$4,000,000 for a new high school building. We have voted \$2,400,000 for additional grade school improvements. We have irrevocably committed our community to spend over 6 million 4 hundred thousand dollars, NONE OF WHICH IS AS YET, ON OUR TAX BILL, THIS IS DONE, THIS CANNOT BE CHANGED, THIS IS IRREVOCABLE.

In addition to this \$6,400,000 we need more, approximately \$3,000,000 more for the junior high school modernization. These things are necessary to up-to-date modern education. These things I believe in. These things we should have. These things Hicksville will have.

But many of us will not be here long enough for our children to benefit from these facilities. Many will not be able to afford to live in a community, with a school system as fine as ours, shall be.

I recommend to you, the only economy minded, the only community minded candidates for our school board, LAWRENCE A. ROMAN and JERRY ZETTLER.

Questions 'Unfortunate Phrase'

In the course of discussing school problems in your editorial of April 22nd, you referred to what you called a "self-appointed referendum committee." It is not clear to me what you intended this to mean. Some people might interpret this to mean that you were commending the spirit of the people of our district and supporting their natural interest in the schools. Others might gather the impression that you were implying some sort of high-handed, dictatorial commandering of the referendum. This latter interpretation would, as you know, constitute an unjustified assault upon the decent interest of decent people and might even convey the impression that something was wrong. Accordingly, I know you will be eager to have the facts, since I think the phrase may have been an innocent inadvertence.

The referendum committee began with an expression of policy of the Board of Education, the president of which designated me as a representative of the Board to carry forward the referendum proposals to the people. Since the construction program was sponsored by the Board, it would have been negligent for the Board to fail to tell the people what it hoped the voters would approve and why. The Board intent and direction was for me to cooperate with the citizens of the community. Naturally, the first step was to consult the Citizens' Advisory Committee. Every member of that committee was asked to take active part and most of them did. The committee designated one person as co-chairman, with me, to present the referendum proposal as best we could. Whatever our failings, our effort was the best of which we were capable. After organizing our basic group from the advisory committee, we did the next natural thing, which was to ask the voters of the district to "volunteer and work with us. We were and are happy at the enthusiasm of these voters who worked with us.

In substance, then, the movement conformed to the letter and spirit of the wishes of the Board of Education. It encompassed the membership of the Advisory Committee and it properly welcomed public participation, which is the keystone not only of sound public school betterment, but indeed, of our American heritage.

I suppose it is possible in some way to infer that "self-appointed" carries some nasty connotation. The referendum committee was not self-appointed, but in any event, I do not understand what adverse criticism can be implied when

citizens of a community self-appoint themselves to take a legitimate and proper interest in the advancement of education for their children.

I find it difficult to believe that the unfortunate phrase had any

significance other than the natural errors that accompany such voluminous and trying work as befalls an editor of a community newspaper.

Recipe this week: Sausages and lentils: 1 c dried lentils. 1 qt cold water. 2/3 c minced onion. 1 tbl. minced parsley. 1/4 minced, peeled clove garlic. 3 tbl. minced celery. 2 t salt. 1/8 t pepper. 1 tbl. fat or salad oil. 1 tbl. flour. 1/2 lb sausage (8 small), 2 sliced, peeled, medium tomatoes. Wash lentils; pick over; soak overnight in cold water. Drain. Reserve liquid. Heat 2-c of the liquid; Add lentils, onion, and the next five ingredients; Cook, covered, 12-15 minutes; or until nearly tender. Drain; measure liquid; Add enough of reserve liquid or water to make 1 1/2 c liquid. Place lentil mixture in greased 10x6x2 baking dish. Melt fat in saucepan; Stir in flour; add reserve 1 1/2 c liquid; cook until thickened. Pour over lentils. Place sausages in cold skillet; Sauté over low heat for 12-15 minutes; or until done, turning once or twice, and pouring off fat as it gathers. Place sausages and tomatoes sprinkled with salt, on top of lentils. Bake in moderate oven 350 degrees F. 20 min. Makes 4 to 5 servings.

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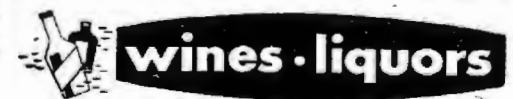

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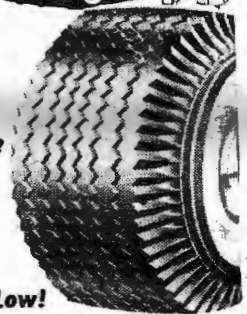
