SCHOOL ELECTION RESULTS:

Cawley, Mrs. Sutton Win; Board Control Goes South

HICKSVILLE—Joseph F. Cawley of 2 Glow Lane won election to the Board of Education for a three-year term starting July 1, succeeding Henry C. Brengel, in a closely contested election by defeating Lawrence A. Roman, Wednesday. Cawley received 1,078 votes and Roman 920 ballots. Roman carried both voting districts on the north side of the community, but lost ground in the two districts south of Old Country Rd.

In the second contest, incumbent Edna Kulma Sutton was re-elected for her third three-year term by defeating Jerome Zettler nearly two to one. She received 1,287 ballots and Zettler got 671.

It was one of the most hotly contested elections in recent years with more than 2,000 voting and a final registration of 2,242, according to District Clerk Andrew B. Heberer. The name of Charles DeShaw also appeared on the voting machines, although he had withdrawn from the race. However, the lever above DeShaw's name was locked.

When the reorganization meeting of the School Board takes place after July 1, the entire membership will be located in the south end of the community. It was being forecast today that Mrs. Sutton may become president of the Board by reason of seniority on the Board, succeeding Brengel who leaves after 20 years of service to the district. All candidates thanked the people who supported them in the election.

The possibility of an interesting technical question developed during the voting. Cawley, who had filed his petition as "Joseph F.", appeared on the voting machines as "James F.". District Clerk Heberer said it was a "printer's error".

Newborn, McCaffrey Victors

PLAINVIEW—Solomon Newborn and William McCaffrey were elected to the Board of Education, Wednesday, as more than 600 persons voted for the largest turnout in the district's history. Newborn received 362 votes to defeat John Neer who got 257, for election to a three-year term. McCaffrey won 427 votes to defeat Thomas Payne who got 198, to decide the winner of the one-year term. Newborn will succeed John A. Hartmann, who was not a candidate, and McCaffrey will fill out the unexpired term of Leland L. Baker who resigned.

Bethpage Ousts Incumbents

BETHPAGE—Two incumbent members of the School Board here were defeated in their bids for re-election, Wednesday, as 1,065 votes were cast with 1,255 registered. William Benintendi received 599 votes to defeat Peter Curcio, and Mrs. Charles Melone polled 616 votes to defeat Thomas Rozi who received 425 ballots. In an uncontested election, Robert Glasser was re-elected to the Library Board for a five-year term, receiving 596 votes.

Jericho Firemen Invite Public

HICKSVILLE—Mr. and Mrs. Gustav Ressel of Hamburg, Germany, arrived here yesterday (Wed.) to visit their son and his family, Mr. and Mrs. Gustav Ressel of 29 Sleepy Lane.

It is the first time in 20 years that Gustav has seen his parents. It is also the first time that the elder Ressels have seen their daughter-in-law and their two grandsons, Alfred and Robert.

The Ressels expect to be staying with their son and his family for two months.

EXACT LOCATION WITHHELD:

Army Plans Latest Type Anti-Aircraft Post Here

NEW YORK CITY—The Army today confirmed the fact an anti-aircraft installation will be located "in Hicksville" but was unable to provide the exact location. It will be a half-million dollar project and will probably require several acres of ground. The Dept. of Army Corps of Engineers was expected to receive construction bids from contractors by May 18.

CLOSE HICKSVILLE VOTE:

Delay On Recreation; Bethpage Votes Cut

The controlled reading program and plans to hire a business manager were knocked out of the Bethpage School Budget, Tuesday night, while Hicksville voters turned down a last-minute attempt to add \$15,000 for a recreational director. Bethpage voters shaved \$23,000 from their budget in a line-by-line vote which kept the meeting going until 2:30 Wednesday morning.

The Hicksville meeting found only 108 present to vote on the budget for the schools and library.

In one of the shortest meetings in recent years, the entire business was concluded by about 10:30.

WILSON'S LETTER

Lawrence A. Rojahn offered a successfully passed motion to make the starting time of the annual meeting at 8:30 next year, instead of 7:30. He also obtained the reading of the annual letter from Lewis A. Wilson, state education commissioner, providing a copy of the letter when the school board and administrators could not recall getting one.

Wilson's letter urged a careful study of the proposed budget and expressed appreciation for the active interest that the lay public is taking in education.

Maurice Postley was elected chairman of the meeting which began with about 20 people in the audience. A motion to add \$15,000 for a recreational director, although the school board is currently having a survey of recreational program costs made, was defeated by a vote of 52 no, 49 yes. It was indicated that a special referendum on recreation, coupled with a northeast site land purchase question, may come in Sept.

The proposed school budget was 93 yes, 18 no, 2 blank, approving a record-breaking \$3 million budget. Vote on the library budget was 76 yes, 8 no, 24 blank. Roland Heberer was re-elected library trustee with 92 votes.

BETHPAGE MARATHON
James "Happy" Norman was

chairman of the Bethpage meeting which started out with an audience of 400 and dwindled down to 10 percent of that number by its conclusion. Deleted by the voters was \$16,500 for continuation of the controlled reading program, and \$8,500 for a proposed business manager.

The final vote on the budget was 80 yes, 11 no and 1 void ballot.

The Jericho meeting, conducted by Arthur Kaye, was lightly attended and the net budget of \$228,675 was increased to \$233,875 by the addition of transportation funds.

Members of the School Board as well as members of all P-TA units in the district are invited to attend.

Hicksville and Plainview Legion Plan Joint Carnival

HICKSVILLE—In a combined effort, members of the Plainview Post No. 1812 and the Charles Wagner Post No. 421, American Legion, are cooperating in presenting a gigantic carnival and show to start Memorial Day, May 31, following the traditional parades and services in both Plainview and Hicksville.

Both Commander William Barnett of Hicksville and Commander Alfred Schupp of Plainview have worked hard and long in completing the many necessary details of such a tremendous undertaking.

The Show will feature the usual imposing array of carnival booths and games in addition to rides for both children and adults, plus a special show still in the formative stage. Refreshments will be available at all times.

The carnival will be held at the boundary line of the two villages, the corner of Old Country and South Oyster Bay Roads, on property belonging to the builders of the Hillside Terrace Development, who have allowed its use by the

Legion Posts.

Arrangements for parking facilities are being made.

Everyone is welcome to attend the first of the outdoor activities and there will be six evening performances and two matinees, the first of which will be on opening day, May 31st at 1 P.M.

Nat Adler, president of the Argosy-Schildknecht Lumber Corp., of Hicksville and one of the most popular men in the lumber industry, was recently elected vice-president of the New York Lumber Trade Assoc. At the induction ceremonies, he was commended for his activities in the industry as well as in other civic, service, fraternal, charitable and community endeavors. At present he is serving as treasurer of the Lumber, Millwork, Woodwork and Allied Industries on behalf of the American Fund for Israel Institutions.

Mr. Adler has been affiliated with Schildknecht Lumber Co. for more than 28 years. He was

vice-president for the past 25 years and vice-president of Argosy-Schildknecht since its inception.

LEGION HEARS PRINCIPAL TUTTLE:

High School Problem Looms: Join Bethpage Or Go It Alone?

PLAINVIEW — At the recent meeting of the Legion Post, Robert Tuttle, principal of the Manetto Hill School, was the guest speaker and told of the rapidly changing structure of the local school district.

During his very interesting talk, Tuttle commented on how there were only a small number of students enrolled in the little two-room schoolhouse at that time and how it has increased over the years to its present high enrollment necessitating the erection of new schools.

He pointed out how the State Dept. of Education sets the number of days required for attendance; how teachers must be approved and certified by the state department thus generally controlling the school districts.

On the local level, Plainview with a general area of 5.7 square miles is hard pressed to meet its ever increasing school enrollment.

He went on to explain how the local Board of Education is the chief policy-making group for the district, charged with the responsibility of employing a satisfactory teaching faculty; selecting books for study use by the various grades and in general acting as the governing agency selected by the local residents.

"In turn," he said, "this is a good indication of the democratic system in action and it is the duty of all local residents to select and elect the members of the Board of Education."

During the years Tuttle has been at Plainview, he has seen the enrollment grow steadily until it was necessary to send some of the students to other districts for their

education. In 1951 it was necessary to lease the old Bethpage school for Plainview students.

At present, most of the students are housed in the geographical confines of Plainview and he believes many advances have been made, which in turn is helping to alleviate the serious situation.

During his most interesting address before the local Legion Post, Tuttle pointed out that several good men were seeking election to the school board this year.

In June 1953, the new school, on Jamaica Ave., was started and it is expected to be completed by August this year. The new Central Park Road School was dedicated on Sunday and started regular classes on Monday of last week.

Proper planning, good management and the cooperation of the builders, construction workers and the local school board resulted in this school being completed two months earlier than was expected.

In September of 1950, there were only four teachers on the Plainview school staff. Today this number has increased to 33 with 2 custodians, 3 office or clerical workers and another principal comprising of the staff.

The financial side of the picture, the principal pointed out that the budget since 1950, when it amounted to \$60,000, has steadily risen to an estimated \$802,000 or ten times the original amount. He went on to say that the school Board here is unique in making the concerted effort to keep the residents informed as to what is going on and added a compliment for LeLand Baker, who has since resigned, for many suggested gains.

He pointed out that the total local assessed valuation is now

estimated at \$14,320,000 thus indicating the possibility that the tax rate will remain at this year's level despite having to build additional schools.

Estimates also indicate that Plainview has reached a saturation of 30 to 35 per cent in building, in turn causing other problems which will be met as they arise.

The high school problem is the most serious at present. Arrangements have been made to send this year's graduates to Bethpage for their four year academic studies. Levittown is accepting a few and there are 101 students at Oyster Bay High School.

This in turn presents a costly problem in the way of transportation. We are now faced with one of two possible courses of action; one, to merge with Bethpage, or two, to go it alone. A high school will cost in the neighborhood of \$2,000,000 and will take two years to build. Plainview now has a 27-acre tract set aside for a senior high school, but merger presents the best possible solution at the present time, helping to reduce the tremendous cost by sharing.

It is hoped that a meeting with the Bethpage Board of Education can be arranged for possible explanatory talks. Tuttle pointed out that the Bethpage High School is as good if not better than some of the other schools thus assuring our students of a well rounded course in high school education.

Following the very interesting address, a question and answer period was held with Tuttle patiently discussing various facts with the Legion membership.

He also stated that the Board used voting machines for the first time for the purpose of deciding whether or not to increase the present number of members on the school board from 5 to 7.

A Chamber of Commerce for Plainview may soon take form. Joseph Arena is a director of the new group which has applied for a charter.

Trains Still Creak Along

START OF CONSTRUCTION on the new four million dollar high school for Hicksville last week, without fanfare, recalls to mind the Hicksville of 29 or 30 years ago when the present high school was built and dedicated.

Hicksville had a population of exactly 4,762 people when the high school was dedicated on May 29, 1925. Today the population is 35,649.

Frank Chlumsky, today a councilman for the town of Oyster Bay, was a member of the Board of Education back in 1925 together with Dr. Elwood A. Curtis. The late George A. Duke was president of the Board. Other Board members, since deceased, were William Duffy and Joseph J. Ulmer. Both of these men, when they passed away a few years ago, were respectively presidents of the two Hicksville banks.

In many ways the Hicksville of 1925 faced many problems confronting the community of today. In the news today are expressways and superhighways cutting north and south, east and west in our vicinity. Back in 1925 they were discussing the widening of Jericho Turnpike from 60 to 90 feet, Northern State Parkway running just north of Hicksville was in the planning stages, and Southern State Pkwy. was being mapped.

A faded newspaper of 1925 recalls: "Business property on Broadway is booming. Lots in the business section are selling at \$350 and upwards a front foot. An offer of \$50,000 has been refused for the former John Hahn Dept. store, 85x150 on the east side of Broadway near the railroad." This is the Spiro building including the present-day A & P, next to the Bank of Hicksville.

The newspaper also notes that local bank resources were \$822,851 for the LI National and \$2,520,000 for the Bank of Hicksville. Last week the Herald reported resources of the two banks today combine to more than \$37 million.

The new high school which was then being dedicated was built at a cost of \$365,000.

Back in 1925 there were about 500 commuters on the LIRR from Hicksville (compared with more than 2,000 today) but strangely enough the running time for trains to New York was 50 minutes. That is about the only thing that has not changed. It still takes an hour to get to New York by train.

Spiritual force cannot be conjured up to fight communism, or any other evil, just because it would be convenient or helpful. Such a hope, is paramount to turning to God only because of our physical fears. Such a hope is as forebore as expecting strength from a union with cowards.

Spiritual force grows out of faith, in spite of suffering. Spiritual force and strength grows because of suffering. Our troubles will give us the maturity, necessary to comprehension, necessary to courage, the necessary basic ingredients of all strength.

The greatest hope for our enemies, lies in our own failures, in our own self-imposed limitations. Fear itself is our greatest weakness. Out of fear grows hasty and immature action. Because of fear we are tempted to abandon our heritage of social justice, our sense of national unity, our appreciation of the dignity of man. Out of fear grows rash expediency, the loss of personal rights, the destruction of our conception of freedom and democracy. Fear breeds distrust and suspicion, as deadly to democracy as is cancer, to the body.

One way to encourage the enemies of our way of life is to embrace the belief that all evil, can be replaced with all good, if only we could use the right combination of global diplomacy, armed force, and

the dollar. This belief is soul shattering to our basic faith in freedom and democracy. Anything that tends to weaken our faith, weakens us, and strengthens our eternal enemy.

"The right combination of global diplomacy, armed might, and the dollar" is not the American way. Those who would make it so, are a greater threat to our way of life than all the communists in the world—for they are tearing down the basic structure of our faith. They would substitute for our free democratic philosophy an expediency that could in the end mean our own national destruction.

Our strength lies in our ideals. Our power lies in the spiritual force of our convictions. As long as our way of life embraces and fosters for ourselves and all mankind, social justice, freedom, friendliness, and respect for the dignity of individual man of all races, we shall live with a purpose. Our purpose will not be merely to survive, but to live in unity for the good of the whole.

If ever our purpose degenerates to merely maintaining existence without freedom, without democracy, then we will have no good reason left for national survival.





AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE NASSAU COUNTY SEWER ORDINANCE (ORDINANCE NO. 54, 1953) IN RELATION TO UNLAWFUL CONNECTIONS AND DISCHARGES AND APPROVAL OF CONNECTIONS; PURSUANT TO THE COUNTY GOVERNMENT LAW OF NASSAU COUNTY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF NASSAU, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 3 of the Nassau County Sewer Ordinance (Ordinance No. 54, 1953) is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 3. Unlawful connections and discharges.

(a) No person, other than a municipality having such right by contract with the county, shall make or cause to be made any connection or attachment to any county sewer facility, nor shall any person maintain, use or cause or permit any such connection or attachment to be maintained or used without having obtained a permit therefor from the Commissioner of Public Works.

(b) No person, other than such a municipality, shall discharge directly or indirectly into any such facility any industrial or objectionable waste without having obtained a permit therefor from the Commissioner of Public Works.

(c) Proof of the existence of any such connection or attachment without a permit from the Commissioner of Public Works shall create a presumption that the connection or attachment was made or caused to be made by the owner of the premises served by such connection or attachment. Proof of the contribution of any such waste shall create a presumption that such waste was discharged by the owner of the premises on which such waste originated.

Section 2. Section 13 of such ordinance is hereby amended to

(a) All connections to county sewer facilities shall be subject to approval and inspection by the county. Before any connection shall be covered, it shall be the duty of the applicant to notify the Department of Public Works that the connection is ready for inspection and such connection shall not be covered until it has been inspected and approved by a county representative.

(b) The Commissioner of Public Works may, however, in his discretion accept and use in connection with the issuance of a general permit the inspection and reports of the building inspectors or other inspection agents of another municipality with reference to inspections when furnished with official records of the results thereof. In such cases, notifications required to be made to the Department of Public Works by this ordinance as to conditions in permits shall be made instead to the building inspector or inspection agent of the appropriate municipality.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.


