PLAINVIEW — The new post office here will be located at the Morton Village shopping centre on Old Country Rd. near the Methodist Church, it was revealed last night by Postmaster William G. Molitor. The new centre is being built near the corner of Joel Place, facing Old Country Rd. Ground breaking is anticipated within a week, according to Emil Morton, the builder, and the office is expected to be ready in 180 days. Confirmation of the selection of the Morton Village centre as the site for the branch of the Hicksville Post Office was received from Washington.

Urschel added that posters are now ready and will shortly appear in all local stores. The salvation of Koreans lies in outside help—your help. Please give your good, clean useable clothing when the driver calls. Please donated your time to help collect."

Hundreds will pause next Monday morning to participate in mid-Island community Memorial Day services and exercises honoring local men and women who have given their lives in the service of their country in all its wars. Veteran organizations are in charge of local observance and urge the widespread display of the American flag and resident participation.

JERICHO—Assembly of organizations at firehouse at 10:15 AM, march to Friends Cemetery for brief ceremony, return to Underhill Park for exercises. Refreshments will follow at firehouse.

LETHPAGE—Services will be held at St. Paul's Lutheran Church at 8:30 AM this year. Parade will assemble on Washington Ave. at the parking field at 9:30 AM and move at 10 sharp, according to Charles W. B. Schwarz, chairman. It will go north on Stewart Ave. to Bentley Rd., east on Bentley to Broadway School where services will take place in front of the war memorial. Lt. John Norris of Navy will be guest speaker. The parade will then proceed to the firehouse for a special program by the vamps.



## Our Memorial Among Finest

**MEMORIAL DAY** exercises in Hicksville next Monday morning will be held at one of the finest Memorial projects developed on Long Island by a home town community.

Some of the background of this Memorial Mall, located adjacent to the high school gymnasium entrance at Jerusalem Ave. and Fourth St., might be of interest to the many new residents who will be participating in the brief but significant services this year.

The Memorial Mall is dedicated to the men and women of the community who served in two World Wars. A community committee, headed by Frank Sutter, was organized by the veteran groups in June of 1945 to develop a fitting tribute to the 700 men and women of Hicksville who went into military service from Dec. 7, 1941 to Sept. 2, 1945.

Many fine projects were suggested and proposed, hearings and mass meetings were held, but each in turn was found impractical for reasons which seemed pertinent at the time. We recall the proposals included development of the high school grounds as a recreation center including an outdoor pool, a hospital, memorial library, community centre building, etc.

On Pearl Harbor Day in 1947 the project was completed and dedicated. Funds had been contributed in the sum of \$10,402.57 to cover the cost of the bronze tablets mounted on granite and bearing the names of all who served, moving the World War I monument from the Rail Road station to the high school grounds, landscaping and planting.

Of the total \$3,475.70 represented the funds of local Civil Defense, remaining as the war ended. Another \$665.89 was the balance of funds in the Comfort Committee accounts and the remaining \$6,260.98 came from individuals and organization donations.

The cooperation of the school board in permitting the use of a portion of the school grounds as the site for the Memorial Mall has guaranteed the perpetual care of the grounds and its valuable plantings.

The principal function of local government on the town and village level is to provide administrative services. These services are defined and limited by: (1) - Town and village law; (2) - County charter; (3) - Various state laws; (4) - State constitution; (5) - Various federal laws; (6) - Federal constitution, and last but not least (7) - Judicial decision.

These rules and regulations sometimes make it easy for public servants, to stall, to hedge, and to "pass the buck." These things that the "lazy or indifferent" public servant uses for excuses, are really only aids to the effective performance of his duties. For without these rules, without these directives, without these legal decisions, even the most capable of men would be unable to perform any administrative function.

When our councilmen and our supervisor, use us as excuses, the only aids they have—somebody is killing somebody. When our town officials openly admit that they are confused and baffled by their own rules and regulations, we are indeed in a bad way. Excuses are no substitute for performance. They ostrich like seem to believe that if they close their eyes and hide their collective heads in a hole so that they cannot see the problem, that they have frightened it away. They seem to honestly believe that if they ignore any problem long enough, it will get tired and wander away.

Perhaps if our town officials refuse long enough to recognize the seriousness of our shopping and

commuter parking problems—they will go away.

Should we agree with our town officials in their refusal to admit that "down zoning", traffic congestion, dumping areas instead of playground areas, too many gas stations, are real problems? Should we like gullible children stick our heads into the same dark hole with theirs, and wait for our problems to go away?

Do our town officials like ostriches, really believe that if they refuse to "face up" to the problems, that the people will eventually see, with an blind eye as theirs, that the problems are not really real—that they are only "make-believe."

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
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

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

WHEREAS, the Department of Public Works of the County of Nassau has, by direction of the Board of Supervisors, prepared and filed with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors (1) a general plan or sewer facilities proposed to be established, acquired, constructed, reconstructed, enlarged and extended, or otherwise improved, in a proposed sewage collection district, to be known as "Sewage Collection District No. 2-NHP of Nassau County", and (2) an estimate of the cost of such sewer facilities and (3) a report describing the area benefited thereby in such manner as to identify the lots or parcels of land included in such area; and said general plan, estimate and report are identified by the caption "General Plan, Estimate and Report for Sewage Collection District No. 2-NHP of Nassau County", prepared by the Department of Public Works of Nassau County, and are dated December 4, 1953, and filed in the office of said Clerk on February 19, 1954, and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors, on March 22, 1954, duly held a public hearing on said general plan, estimate and report pursuant to and in accordance with Section 1222 of the County Government Law of Nassau County and has, at such public hearing, heard all persons who desired to be heard with respect to such general plan, estimate and report, and has received evidence relative to the matters determined by this ordinance; now, therefore,

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF NASSAU AS FOLLOWS:**

Section 1. The Board of Supervisors of the County of Nassau hereby determines that (1) it is in the public interest to establish a sewage collection district as proposed in said report and (2)

Section 3. The Department of Public Works of the County of Nassau is hereby authorized to establish, reconstruct, enlarge and extend or otherwise improve the sewer facilities required for said district pursuant to and in accordance with said general plan.

The Board of Supervisors hereby further determines from the evidence given at such public hearing, that the benefit which will be conferred upon each lot or parcel of land within said sewage collection district by the construction of sewer facilities therein will be in proportion to the valuation of such lot or parcel of land and that the expense of constructing said sewer facilities shall be raised by the levy annually of an ad valorem tax upon the taxable property within the district.


